CBC Plans Special V-E Day Broadcasts

Toronto. — Extensive plans for special broadcasts on V-E Day and the national holiday and national day of prayer to follow it, for the Trans-Canada, Dominion, and French networks, have been announced by E. L. Bushnell, director-general of programs of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. These plans will go into operation following the official announcement that terms of unconditional surrender to the Allies have been accepted by the Germans.

Tentative arrangements have been made at various points across the Dominion to broadcast the reaction to the news, with John Fisher at the microphone, and special features will also be presented from Ottawa, London, Washington, San Francisco and other points.

There is a possibility that commercial programs may be cancelled during these days, to be replaced by special musical and dramatic productions which are now in rehearsal. These will include broadcasts written by Len Peterson, Gerald Noxon, and others, to be produced under the supervision of Andrew Allan and J. Frank Willis, of Toronto, and producers at CBC points in other parts of Canada.

Special musical programs are being prepared which will reflect the spirit of victory. One of these will be an orchestral and choral broadcast by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and Mendelssohn Choir.

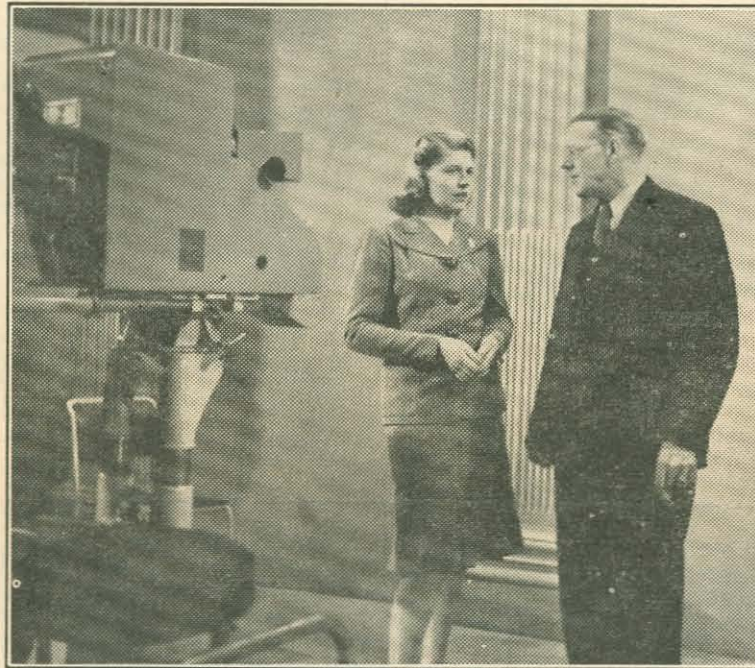
It is planned that when the official announcement of the end of hostilities is made, special CBC bulletins will be broadcast every hour and every half hour.

For several of the specially planned CBC programs the Trans-Canada, Dominion and French networks will be joined together so that programs may be heard in practically every home in Canada.

'Anzac News' Ends, but Exchange to Continue

CBC Chairman gives assurance that Inter-Dominion News Services will go on after war.

Thousands of listeners throughout Western Canada heard with regret of the cessation of the broadcasting of the "Anzac News" on Sunday, April 15. Begun on May 11, 1941, as a service to the Australian and New Zealand airmen training in Canada, the broadcast grew in popularity until it had a wide listening audience among Canadian civilians as well as Anzac airmen. Consistently for four years of war, a member of the staff of the Australian High Commissioner at Ottawa was heard in a lively summary of news from the sister Dominions, brought in by the CBC through the co-operation of the Australian and New Zealand Broadcasting Corporations. Noel Deschamps was the first broadcaster, and the concluding broadcast was made by Ralph Harry, assistant secretary to the High Commissioner

Barkway to Canada as BBC Representative

Toronto. — Michael Barkway will arrive in Canada early in May to take up his new post as BBC Canadian representative, it has been announced. He succeeds S. J. deLotbiniere, who is returning to Britain to resume his post as director of outside broadcasts for the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Last year Mr. Barkway was named deputy chief, radio section, of the psychological warfare division at SHAEF (supreme headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Forces). Later he was organizing secretary for the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference recently held in London, which was attended by official delegates from the broadcasting systems of Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

Mr. Barkway joined the BBC news department in 1934, after graduating from Queens' College, Cambridge, and after a debating team tour of the United States. In 1937, he was transferred to the BBC Empire News department and was seconded to the League of Nations. After a year in Geneva, he returned to London as

"Apple Pie, Home and Mother," as loved, cherished and revered by the North American public, has come to the attention of radio playwright

Lister Sinclair. After due consideration of apple pie, its associated phenomena, and their effects, Mr. Sinclair has produced a drama in which all three are seen in a new light—an off-shade of green. The Sinclair opus will be brought to the Canadian listening audience under the aegis of Andrew Allan, CBC supervisor of drama, in the next broadcast of Stage 45, underscored with Lucio Agostini's music. Lister Sinclair has already achieved a good deal of attention both above and below the border for his striking approach through the drama to aspects of contemporary living and ideals. The youthful author is a fellow in mathematics at the University of Toronto.

CONTEMPORARY MUSIC (9:30 p.m.)

Two modern English composers, Armstrong Gibbs and Julius Harrison, will be represented on this program by Samuel Hersenhoren and orchestra. Leo Barkin, pianist, will be guest soloist.

Armstrong Gibbs, graduate of the Royal College of Music, esteemed as a polished craftsman in the chamber music form, is represented by "Concertino for Piano," and Julius Harrison by "Cornish Holiday Sketches," one of many descriptive pieces the conductor and composer has produced in addition to major choral and orchestral compositions.

WINNIPEG YOUNG WOMEN'S MUSICAL CLUB CHOIR (10:00 p.m.)

A choir of forty voices conducted by Berythe Birse and accompanied by Gwenda Owen Davies, pianist, will be heard in this special program tonight. The program is varied, with classical and modern composers represented. Among the classics are Schumann's "Gypsy Life," Brahms' "The Death of Trerar," Wagner's "Spinning Chorus" from "The Flying Dutchman," and Brahms' "The Gardener." Miss Birse has also included "Two Eastern Pictures" and "Pastoral," by Gustav Holst, and Vaughan-Williams' familiar "Linden Lea." Other numbers are: "Serenade" (Strauss), "Russian Lullaby" (Liodoff-Swann), "In Meze Al Mar" (Geni Saden) and an arrangement of the famous Hebridean melody, "Turn Ye To Me," by R. Gibson.

School Radio Aids National Goodwill

R. S. Lambert, CBC Education Supervisor, addresses United Nations Assembly in New York.

At a recent meeting in New York, the International Education Assembly, composed of educational representatives from the United Nations, passed a resolution urging the San Francisco World Security Conference to take steps to set up an international education office as part of the new world order. Such an office, while not interfering in any way with national or local rights, could serve as a clearing-house for the exchange of information, and the encouragement of educational activities tending to strengthen international understanding.

Schools Are Foundation

The supervisor of educational broadcasts, R. S. Lambert, speaking to the assembly on April 15, stressed the importance of radio in this field. "It is in the schools," he said, "that the foundations of international goodwill must be laid. Radio programs heard in schools can help young people to respect and understand the traditions and problems of other countries and so build bulwarks of tolerance and enlighten men against hatred and war."

Even during World War II, Canada and the United States have shown what can be done. For three years past, the CBC has been regularly exchanging educational programs with CBS American School of the Air, NBC University of the Air, and educational stations in Cleveland, Chicago and other centres.

Valuable Exchange

In general, these exchanges have great value. Through them Canadian children learn of the achievements of science and industry in the United States, of the size of the war

effort; they become familiar with the voices and ideas of public men; they learn to appreciate the music, literature and history of that country. Conversely, we help American children to understand the variety of Canadian life, the contribution made by French Canada to our national culture, our achievement in opening up the great Northwest and the Arctic, our industrial development, the strength of our attachment to British ideals, and the magnitude of our war effort in relation to our resources.

However, Mr. Lambert pointed out, there are also pitfalls to be avoided. Every nation has its own background of history, politics and economics, which provides it (even in the schools) with traditions that can easily be offended. It is, therefore, very important that errors of fact and interpretation should not creep into school broadcasts, whether exchanged internationally, or intended for home consumption only.

Four Years Ago

PROMENADE CONCERT (9:15 p.m.)

Ossy Renardy, native of Vienna, whose exposition of Paganini's violin compositions has brought him acclaim, will be heard with the Toronto Philharmonic Orchestra during the broadcast portion of tonight's concert. Victor Kolar, guest conductor for the first two concerts, will conduct. Orchestral numbers include: "March of the Tin Soldiers," by Gabriel Pierre; Mozart's "Adagio in E Major"; the "Second Rumanian Rhapsody," by Georges Enesco, and an excerpt from Rimsky-Korsakoff's "The Golden Cockerel." Renardy will play in Paganini's "Concerto in D Major for Violin and Orchestra." Like most of Paganini's violin compositions, this is remarkable for virtuosity and whirlwind effects. Renardy came to this continent in 1937, at the age of 16, following a European tour. At one of his New York appearances he astonished the critics by playing all twenty-four of the Paganini Violin Caprices as part of his recital.

of defending Crete. Their commander was a New Zealander, Major-General Bernard Freyburg, V.C. Under a full moon, the German Luftwaffe was bombing Suda Bay as a prelude to the airborne invasion. . . . Summary of Broadcast for May 6, 1945.

Spring Work in the Flower Garden

(a) Seeding Annual Flowers Outdoors:

1. Annuals such as alyssum, phacelia, California poppies, dwarf double blue cornflowers, and many others may be sown this week if not already seeded.

2. For early fall bloom: annual phlox, African daisies, Queen of the market asters, snapdragons, etc. These are sown indoors and transplanted for early summer flower beds but sown outdoors give good late season bloom.

3. Clarkia is one of the showiest summer annuals. Sown this week it will bloom in July.

4. Named varieties in separate colours are usually more desirable than mixtures.

5. Seeding: Thoroughly worked loamy soil free from grass roots and weed seeds is best. It should be fine, porous, firm, and full of moisture. Deep planting of small seeds should be avoided. Half an inch deep is the limit for very fine seeds. Shallow planting in firm moist soil will produce good germination. Don't waste seed sowing too thickly. Most plants need at least a foot of room, some much more. Three or four seeds to a foot should be enough.

6. Thinning while the seedlings are still small gives the selected plants a better chance to grow without too much competition.

7. Cultivation should be started as soon as seedlings appear above

ground and continued until plants cover the ground. Beds must be 100% free from weeds.

8. For screens or hedges: Cosmos, small flowered sunflowers and lavatera are dependable. On a fence or trellis: sweet peas, ornamental gourds, morning glories, Canary creeper and trailing nasturtiums.

9. For perfume: sweet peas, mig-nonette, nicotine, evening-scented stocks, four o'clocks and petunias.

10. For dry districts: alyssum, bartonia, Scotch marigolds, lavatera, dwarf petunias, California poppies, portulaca.

11. For partial shade try Clarkia, pansies, nicotine and annual phlox.

(b) Watering Flower Beds:

1. Plants vary as to moisture needs. Indiscriminate watering may prove harmful. Study the needs of each kind of plant.

2. Sprinkling should be reserved for washing foliage and flowers once in a while when needed.

3. Water is taken in by roots. The right place to put water is in the ground near the roots. Trench irrigation is more satisfactory than sprinkling. In the case of large plants a tin can with perforated base placed near each plant permits watering the roots when necessary. After watering trenches should be filled with soil by raking.

4. Three good waterings at ten-day intervals while plants are growing and weather is dry are all that are necessary for most flower beds most seasons in most districts.

5. Well prepared seed beds full of moisture, regular cultivation and proper spacing are more important in moisture control than artificial watering except in very dry seasons or in very dry districts.

6. Plants bloom best in seasons of moderate rainfall. Excessive moisture promotes growth of foliage. This is a guide to the gardener in watering flowering plants.

(c) Cutworms: Poison bait to reduce cutworm damage may be prepared by mixing three ounces Paris Green with five pounds of bran and then moistening with 1½ cups molasses mixed with two quarts of water. Spread bait thinly over ground in the evening.

(d) Excessive heat in hot-beds and small greenhouses may be reduced by spraying undersurface of glass with white-wash, clay wash, or green calcimine. The latter should be mixed with a little gasoline and diluted with linseed oil. Don't make coating heavier than necessary to cut down heat as it also cuts down light.
