Lord Selkirk School Choir on CBC Dec. 19

English-speaking Students to Broadcast French Carols for Tenth Consecutive Year

For the tenth consecutive year, the CBC will present the English-speaking, French-singing choir of Lord Selkirk School, Winnipeg, as a program for the Christmas season, to be heard this year, on Wednesday, December 19, at 6 p.m.

Forty-five boys and girls taking first, second and third year French, will be heard in Christmas carols and songs in the French language. The singers are all English-speaking.

Ken Houston, 13 years old, will be the bilingual interlocutor, and will introduce M. Godias Brunet, French teacher at the school, who will comment in French and English on the songs, which he has chosen for the broadcast.

Miss Margaret Thomson will conduct the choir, with Miss Florence Baskerville as accompanist.

Here is this year's program:

Le Jardinier du Roi (The King's Gardener), a song attributed to the unhappy Queen Marie Antoinette.

Il Est Né, Le Divin Enfant (He Is Born, the Divine Infant), an old cantique de Noel in which the music imitates the joyous chiming of silver hells

Les Anges Dans Nos Campagnes (The Angels in our Fields), a carol of Christmas Eve ("And there were in that country shepherds abiding in the fields, watching their flocks by night, and lo! the angels of the Lord appeared unto them.")

Un Flambeau, Jeannette Isabelle (Bring a Torch, Jeanette, Isabelle), a homely simple song, familiar to English listeners.

Entre le Boeuf et l'Ane Gris (Between the Ox and the Grey Donkey), an ancient carol, resembling a lullaby.

Hosanna Gloire Au Liberateur. To celebrate Victory and Peace in 1945, the choir will sing Lully's celebrated March of the Kings.

En Ce Jour Ineffable (On This Great Day), a French carol of the 15th century.

Courez, Joyeux Cortege, a song of a snowshoe party, ending with a hymn.

Minuit Chretiens. On Christmas night, precisely at twelve, choirs and congregations in French churches sing: O Holy Night!

"Charades" Producer



Producer, script-writer, and master-mind of CBC-Winnipeg's new quiz series Let's Play Charades is DICK HALHED, formerly of Vancouver, now of CBC's Winnipeg producing staff. The Charades program, with studio audience and listener participation, and prizes offered each week for answers and contributions, is something new in the quiz category.

Radio Pillow Latest Gadget For Patients

An odd little radio accessory developed for the use of disabled veterans in hospital, is the "radio pillow," which has recently been tried out successfully at Deer Lodge Military Hospital, St. James, Manitoba.

The apparatus consists of a small ear phone enclosed in a soft cushion about six by four inches, and connected by a wire lead to a standard radio set. A small, double-throw switch cuts out the loud-speaker in the set and transfers the impulses to the radio pillow. The volume is decreased, and the sound is inaudible to people near the patient. The pillow is placed under or near the patient's head. Any number of these accessories can be hooked up to a standard receiving set.

Hospital authorities are planning to make radio pillows available in quantity as soon as the manufacturers are ready to supply them.

"Midnight Mass at Tadoussac" is the last of three Christmas tales by Marius Barbeau. It is the legendary story of the death of the Saguenay Valley's most colourful missionary, Father de la Brosse. The third of Mr. Barbeau's stories tells how Midnight Mass at Christmas had been forbidden at the trading post at Tadoussac for many years because it had been followed by intemperance and debauch among the Indians and traders. Father de la Brosse, sick at heart over the irreligious spirit of the Valley, arrived at Tadoussac on Christmas Eve to find the drunken revelry in full swing. He made his way to the chapel where, says the legend, he was transfigured, his voyageurs' clothes falling from his limbs and giving way to priestly raiments of white and gold. Proceeding to the altar he is supposed to have celebrated mass with but one hearer, the ghost of a missionary who had been burned at the stake.

Summary of Broadcast of December 9, 1945

Vegetative Propagation of Plants (continued):

Correction: The word "not" in the middle of the last paragraph in last week's summary should read "now."

(k) Rooting Cuttings successfully is dependent on many factors such as nature of the cutting, kind of plant, use of suitable rooting media, temperature, humidity, etc. In the case of soft wood cuttings light is also important. A good rooting medium is one that holds plenty of water evenly distributed, that provides ample aeration, and that is free of organisms that might cause decay.

For rooting one or two cuttings at a time in the house, a flower pot filled with sharp sand, except for an inch of peat or moss in the bottom, and standing in a shallow saucer filled with water, is generally satisfactory. A glass jar to cover the cuttings will control humidity.

(1) Soft-wood Cuttings are made from new growth that has had time to form much if any woody tissues. Some leaves are left on the cutting. Where this method can be used it has many advantages such as (i) quicker rooting and (ii) greater number of cuttings per plant per season. Working out correct formulas re light, humidity, bottom and top heat, moisture, aeration, rooting media, etc., has extended the use of this method by commercial nurseries. The home gardener can make use of similar methods for propagating some of his shrubs, trees and vines.

MORNING DEVOTIONS (9:45 a.m.)

Rev. Arthur F. Willis, of Emmanuel Baptist Church, Winnipeg, will conduct Morning Devotions every day, Monday to Saturday, this week. Mr. Willis is an Englishman, come to Canada during the past year after a strenuous period of service in Freetown, West Africa. In Freetown his work was largely with survivors of ships torpedoed in the South Atlantic. These survivors, picked up by rescue ships and carried to Freetown in large numbers, were invariably in need of physical and spiritual succor, and these Mr. Willis helped to administer nineteen hours a day through twenty-one months. This work, though exhausting, was a never-failing source of inspiration, says Mr. Willis; he claims he has a fund of 10,000 true stories of faith and courage. There was one example of what might be called Divine Supply which occurred at a time when supplies of clothing for shipwreck survivors had run out. As if in answer to a prayer, a shipment of 750 complete outfits arrived, unsolicited and unannounced-only a few hours before a message was received to stand by for 500 survivors from the torpedoed Empress of Canada. It turned out that a group of Argentine seamen who had been helped in Freetown had sent the clothing as an expression of gratitude-and, Mr. Willis adds, it was of the finest quality, far above anything that had previously been available.

WOMEN IN OFFICE (3:18 p.m.)

The Hon. Cairine Wilson, member of the Senate, will speak from Ottawa in the CBC series; "Women in Office." She is one of a number of women prominent in Canadian, British and American political affairs, who are addressing the radio audience in this series. Appointed to the Senate by the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King in 1930, Senator Wilson was the first woman to hold office in the upper house. She is a past president of the League of Nations Society in Canada, and now serves on the executive of the United Nations Society. Among her other interests, she acts as chairman of the Canadian National Committee on Refugees, and is Canadian director of the Victorian Order of Nurses. Senator Wilson was born in Montreal daughter of the Hon. Robert Mackay, and received her education in that city. She has eight children, five girls and three boys.

DON MESSER AND HIS ISLANDERS (5:00 p.m.)

An infectious smile that adds personality to a rich tenor voice is one of the many assets that is winning new friends and admirers for George Murray. In addition to his pleasant singing, George also speeds the program on its happy way, acting as emcee. Besides singing the popular songs of the day, George-who has gone far since his first professional engagement in 1930-joins with the eight male voices of the Balladeers. The two-piano team of Snider and Ross, the Leslie Bell singers, songs by Annabelle and the ingenius music of the show's conductor-arranger, Howard Cable, and his 30-piece orchestra, complete the weekly musical agenda of "Jolly Miller Time."

CBC CONCERT ORCHESTRA (8:00 p.m.)

Alexander Brott, Montreal violinist and composer, will be heard with the CBC Concert Orchestra tonight. He will play Dvorak's Slavonic Dance with the orchestra under J. J. Gagnier. Brott is the first violinist of the McGill String Quartet which is being heard intermittently on the network in a series of concerts sponsored by the Montreal Festivals. His compositions have been played not only by symphony orchestras in Canada but also abroad, in England and on the European continent. Another feature of this program will be the playing by the orchestra of conductor Gagnier's composition "Eternal Comedy," a suite of three preludes, which will be given its premiere. The work follows the Italian classic theme, centering around the characters of Columbine, Pierrot, and Harlequin but is written in modern style. To complete the program Dr. Gagnier has scheduled the overture to Rossini's "Barber of Seville," and "Gopak," by Moussorsky.

THE WHITE EMPIRE (9:30 p.m.)

The founding of the Hudson's Bay Company by Royal Charter from King Charles the Second becomes the focal point in the sixth episode of the

CBC's drama, "The White Empire." Taking as its setting the ice-bound lands and waters of the Canadian north, "The White Empire" presents a documentary story, from the 16th century to today, of the explorers, adventurers and technicians who opened these lands for commerce and science. The series has been written for radio by Alan King and is produced by J. Frank Willis, supervisor of features for the CBC. Geoffrey Waddington directs the orchestra in an original score by John Weinzweig, in which the composer uses rhythms and melodies of the Coppermine Eskimo's dance songs. Chapter six, dealing with the beginning of the fur trade, introduces Groseillers and Radisson whose search for furs in the name of France ended in their joining forces with England. The cast includes Alex McKee playing the part of Groseillers, Roxanna Bond as his wife, Jeanne; Art Martin as Radisson; Lister Sinclair as the Governor of Quebec: the drama's author, Alan King, as Prince Rupert; and Fletcher Markle as narrator. Also in the cast are Frank Peddie, Joe Carr, Tommy Tweed, Frank Perry, and Mercer Mc-Leod.

RECITAL (11:15 p.m.)

Ena Foley Scott, soprano, with Margaret Fetherstonhaugh, as piano accompanist, will be heard tonight from Winnipeg. Her program includes: As When the Dove Laments, from Acis and Galatea (Handel); Lord Randall (English Folk Song); Gay Lon La (French Canadian Folk Song); Babulalaw (Peter Warlock); and The Christmas Tree (Cornelius).

THE ABDUCTION OF SANTA CLAUS (11:30 p.m.)

A merry tale of Christmas is this new comedy in verse, "The Abduction Of Santa Claus," by a Vancouver writer, Frank Vyvyan. The play tells the story of four villains-Gilbert, Oscar, Winfield, and Sir Plus-who plot to kidnap Santa Claus, and how they have a change of heart and the Christmas spirit is triumphant. Vyvyan is a former British professional who appeared in Christmas pantomimes in England and wrote and produced several successful "pantos" here, including the British Guild production of "Rip Vancouver Winkle." He plays one of the villains. Other familiar CBC players taking part will be Sam Payne as the narrator; Eric Vale, John Bethune, and Larry McCance as the other three villains; Jack Bowdery as a gnome; and Alan Roughton and Ruby Chamberlain as Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus. "These are bad, bad villains," says author Vyvyan. "They abduct Santa so as to sell his toys above ceiling price, and also to discover how it is he gets into houses when the doors and windows are locked. But though they stand guard, something in each man's nature proves his undoing. He has a change of heart, Santa is able to escape and continue on his Christmas rounds, and all is well."

Radio Advertisement Proves Boomerang

One of the American radio stations which periodically announces that it was the first station on the air—there are several of them—recently published an advertisement stating that it was the station which "started radio" 25 years ago, and received the following answer from an infuriated listener:

"I read your advertisement telling us it was you who started radio 25 years ago. I feel compelled to let you know that I, for one, do not share your enthusiasm over this fact. In my experience, radio has meant just 25 years of increasing hell. However, maybe it was pretty brave of you to acknowledge your responsibility.

"You loosed on the world a flood of loathsome gibberish formerly confined solely to lunatic asylums. You have poisoned and undermined the natural joy of decent living everywhere. You have misled and drugged and debauched the tastes and sensibilities of a whole people. And embittered me.

"The few possible advantages of radio have been swamped and nullified in the noxious mess that pours out of these boxes day and night.

"I wouldn't have boasted about having started this thing. It would have been more seemly of you, I think, not to have mentioned it. Silence is still golden (in principle, at least)."
