
Toronto Prom

WEEKLY institution during the summer A months in Toronto, Ontario, are the Thursday "Prom" concerts, now in their sixteenth seasontwelfth on the air. Considered somewhat radical at their inception, they gained favour gradually-first with the Toronto audience and then, starting in the summer of 1938, with CBC network listeners. Today they are as much a part of Toronto musical history as anything in the body of tradition on which they were resisted at first in some quarters. They are in distinguished company, with the famous London "Proms" and the Boston "Pops." The easy, relaxed atmosphere in Toronto's Varsity Arena while the concerts are in progress has something infectious about it which seems to enter the microphones with the music and brings a special brand of summer enjoyment to the network listener. +

Musical Developments In Winnipeg

Possibly the most spectacular musical and artistic developments at any point along the CBC's Continent-wide networks during the past year, have occurred at Winnipeg, where, apart from the celebrated Winnipeg Ballet which has won all hearts, the growth of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and of the important orchestral groups associated with CBC broadcasts, have been phenomenal.

To its unrivalled reputation as a centre of choral music, Winnipeg is now able to add a strong orchestral organization. As headquarters of the CBC Prairie Region, it now contributes at least four important musical programs regularly to the networks, including the distinguished series of Winnipeg Sunday Concerts (Sundays, CBW 10:30 p.m.; CBK 9:30 p.m.; CBX 8:30 p.m.), and contributions to the Canadian Summer Concerts, on



Fridays (partially interrupted until after June 27). On the lighter side, the perennially popular Prairie Schooner continues to delight listeners from Grande Prairie to Inverness (it is rebroadcast on the CBC International Service, and carried by the BBC's Scottish transmission), and the Saturday Night Red River Barn Dance packs the big No. 1 studio at CBW, Manitoba, week after week.

The re-establishment of a sound and permanent core of key instrumentalists in Winnipeg following

the disruptive war years, largely through CBC initiative, has been of solid assistance to the founders and authorities of the Winnipeg Sym-phony Orchestra, which has shown tremendous growth, both in scope and quality of performance, during the past season. The steady employment offered these musicians on regular CBC programs has strengthened the city's musical life considerably.

the famous Winnipeg Choristers, by the Ukrainian Male Choir, and by other choral groups, have been broadcast frequently, and have delighted listeners from coast to coast.

Highly interesting from the radio standpoint have been the continued broadcasts of the Manitoba Schools Orchestra. Here the pioneer work of the late P. G. Padwick, who is believed to have been the first musician anywhere to attempt musical education by organized broadcast rehearsals, is being carried on in regular broadcasts over CBW, Manitoba, with interesting results.

Summary Of Broadcast Of May 22, 1949.

Lawns and Lawn Making:

A good home requires attractively laid out grounds to give it an appropriate setting. In this outdoor living space a well kept lawn is an essential element.

Lawns are long term investments deserving of some considerable effort and expense. To make the investment likely to yield adequate dividends lawn-making should be planned with the utmost care. Guidance should be sought from competent authorities.

Reliable information can be secured from several sources. The Dominion Experimental Station at Morden, Manitoba, covered the subject in a number of weekly letters issued for distribution this spring, and will be glad to advise anyone seeking information. In cities the Parks superintendent and his staff are usually willing to advise their local residents. In Saskatchewan the University of Saskatchewan's Department of Horticulture at Saskatoon has made extensive experiments covering the best lawnmaking grasses and methods. The Dominion Department of Agriculture has leaflets covering the subject.

Since the right kinds of grass seeds to use, and to some extent the best techniques to be followed vary from area to area it is wise to seek advice from successful lawn-makers and experts closest to each locality. Preparing the seed bed for a lawn:

The land should be ploughed or dug and then graded until level and free from any hollows or soft spots. The top six inches should be made up to (Continued on page 5)

Commission Hearings

To Begin In August Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey Heads Study Of National Development In Arts, Letters and Sciences.

The Massey Royal Commission on National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences-established by order-in-council on April 8-has completed its organization meetings and will begin public hearings in Ottawa at the beginning of August. Its work will take many months and will involve visits to each of the ten provinces.

The preamble to the order-incouncil lists agencies which contribute to cultural ends, and says it is desirable to conduct an examination of them with a view to recommending their more effective conduct in the national interest. The agencies and

activities mentioned are the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, the National Film Board, the National Gallery, the National Museum, the Public Archives, the Library of Parliament, the National War Museum, and the system of aid for research including scholarships maintained by the National Research Council and other governmental agencies.

The chairman of the Commission is the Right Honourable Vincent Massey, P.C., C.H., Chancellor of the University of Toronto, who served as Canada's High Commissioner in the United Kingdom from 1935-46.

The four members are: Dr. Arthur Surveyer of Montreal, a civil engineer; Dr. Norman A. M. MacKenzie, president of the University of British Columbia; the Reverend Georges-Henri Levesque, dean of the faculty of social sciences at Laval University; and Dr. Hilda Neatby, professor of history and acting head of the department at the University of Saskatchewan.

Orchestra conducted by Nicholas Goldschmidt; Louise Roy, soprano; Pierre Boutet, tenor. Excerpts from the operetta Night In Venice; Strauss waltzes. A program marking the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Johann Strauss the Younger, which falls on June 8. From Toronto. The younger Strauss is possibly the most famous of a famous family. For many years he was the undisputed "King of the Waltz," and his music was magically expressive of the spirit of Vienna, the gayest capital in the world. A few still living remember that he visited Boston in 1872, under a contract providing for a fee of \$100,000 plus travelling expenses for himself, his wife, and two servants. He appeared in an auditorium designed to seat 100,000. He relates that there were 20,000 singers on the musicians' platform, and that he had 100 assistant conductors to control the massed voices. He seems to have regarded the whole performance as utterly ridiculous, and said that one performance was enough to send him back to Europe as fast as he could go.

Schnitzler's father was a famous Viennese throat specialist, and the boy was influenced by the many personages of drama and opera who came as patients to their home. He wrote a five-act tragedy at the age of nine. He followed his father as a doctor, but practised only a few years. In 1891, with Hermann Bahr, Richard Beer-Hofmann, Felix Salton and Hugo von Hofmannstahl, he formed the Young Vienna literary group. Anatol,

produced in 1893, and Liebelei, in 1895, established his reputation as an author. Irene Prado, Hungarian actress, is a sister of Lilli Palmer of the films. Anton Walbrook, also of films, played Anatol in Munich and Vienna before the war.

PRAIRIE GARDENER-Concluded the character of a rich garden loam. A clay sub-soil is best for holding moisture in dry districts but in wetter areas such soil should have good drainage.

Heavy soils are benefited by the application of an inch or two of sand. Light soils should have clay added. Both are improved by the addition of a layer of pulverized acid peat. Rotted cow manure is an excellent soil conditioner.

After repeated rollings and rakings to secure a firm even seed bed the seed may be sown. Sowing:

The last two weeks of May and the first week of June are suitable for seeding work. Early fall sowings can be made successfully if moisture conditions are favourable.

The rate of seeding varies according to the kind used and the nature of local climatic conditions, as well as the purpose for which the lawn is intended. Consult the best and nearest local authorities on this question.

If possible, keep soil moist until germination of seeds is completed. Water with a fine spray but do not flood the surface with water.



Free Network Time Assigned To Parties Party Representatives And CBC

Officials Set Schedule.

The following statement has been issued by A. Davidson Dunton, Chairman of the Board of Governors, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Ottawa, May 3, 1948:

Allocation of free network time among national political parties for the federal election campaign has been decided at a meeting of party representatives with CBC officials.

On national network facilities, including affiliated private stations, a total of fourteen and one-half hours will be provided. The total is divided among the parties as follows: Liberals, 5½; Progressive Conservatives, 4½; C.C.F., 3½; Social Credit 1½.

The division of time was agreed among the party representatives with differing opinions recorded regarding the White Paper formula for setting a ratio. The agreed division differed from the ratio which would have resulted from the White Paper formula

The series of free network time for the election campaign began May 9 and ends on June 24.

Daylight Saving-Some New Ideas.
