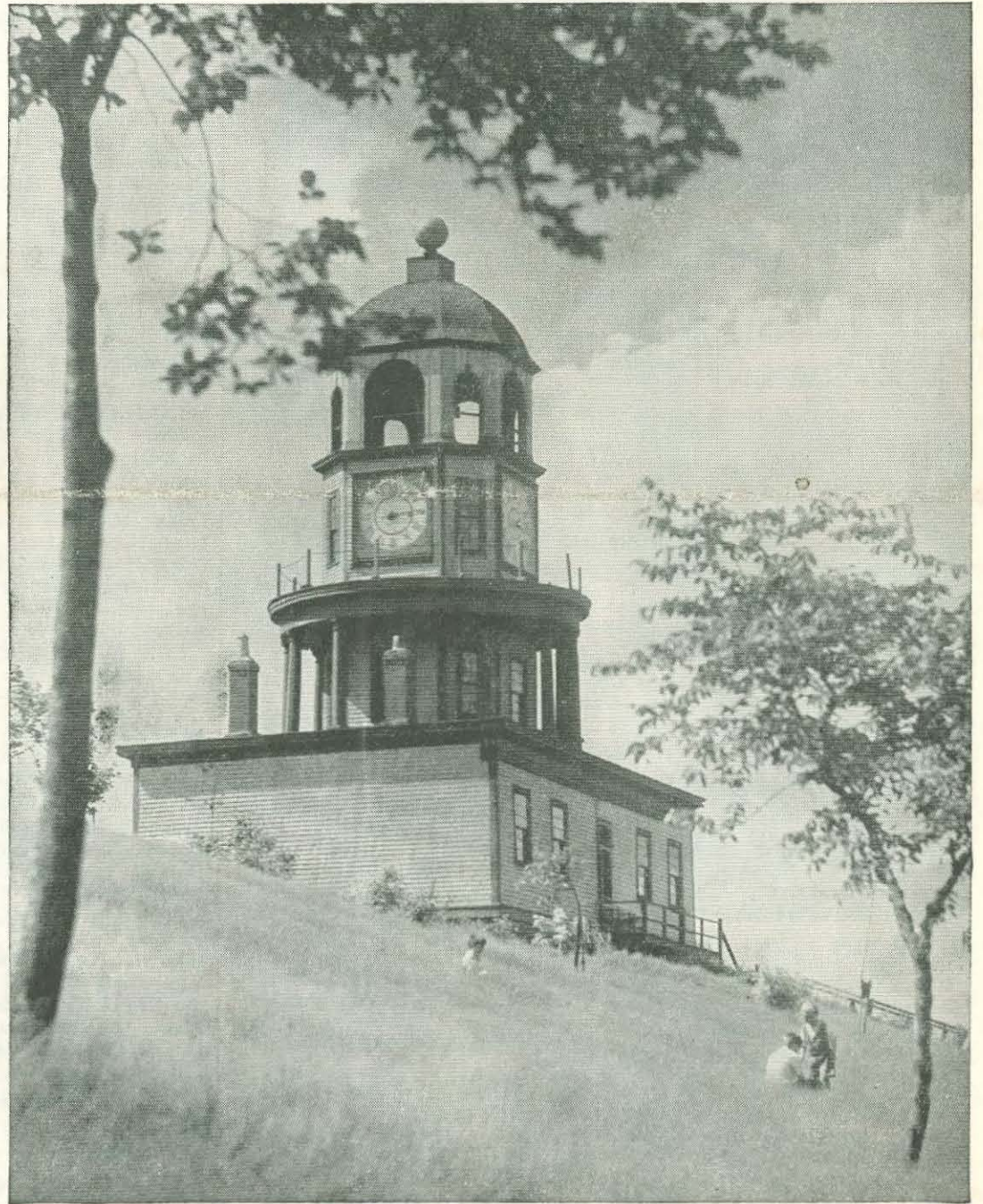
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The Atlantic — A 2-Way Street

Trans-atlantic radio broadcasting traffic between Canada and Britain is a two-way affair. While the CBC in Canada is busy picking up BBC programs for relay, such as the news and the commentaries which originate in London, Canada is feeding a constant stream of material to British listeners. Some of it is fed direct via shortwave; a great deal more of it reaches London on discs through the mails.

The voices and accents of Canadian broadcasters are as familiar in Britain today as they have ever been. "Salesmen" for these voices may be found in the BBC's Canadian office in Toronto, and in the CBC International Service offices in Montreal. Their contact men across the Atlantic are in the various departments of the BBC and in the office of the CBC's European representative. They are in constant communication, sounding out program "appetites" of each other's broadcasting systems, offering specially-tailored suggestions, alerting each other concerning forthcoming events of international interest.



Evidence of the success of this constant co-operation reveals itself through the list of Canadian contributions to the BBC's domestic and foreign services. For instance, in Auchtermuchtie, Arthur L. Phelps, who broadcasts the *Scottish Newsletter*, is almost as famous as the perennially favourite *Prairie Schooner*. The BBC's Scottish region regularly airs both these Canadian features, and the Red River tunes conducted by Jimmy Cowler make the heather hop many thousands of miles from

where they originally made the tumbleweed tremble. Scotland also hears the *Gaelic Newsletter*, a quarter-hour news commentary recorded by Roderrick MacDonald in Toronto and airmailed to the BBC.

The *Newsletter* family is growing. For well over two years the musical tones of the Welsh tongue have been heard in the *Welsh Newsletter*, another Canadian origination for a special BBC audience in Britain. On St. David's Day, (Turn to page 6)

Summary of Broadcast of June 12, 1949.

Summer Pruning Jobs:

A. Pruning at its best is plant surgery, surgery that involves exact knowledge of plant structure, and a definite objective to be gained in well directed operations; pruning at its worst is just plain murder. Pruning

tools are dangerous weapons when used without knowledge or skill. If you are not sure why a plant needs to be pruned or how the pruning should be done, then don't prune.

B. Pruning can be used for many important purposes, the chief of which are:

1. To rejuvenate an old tree or shrub.
2. To re-direct growth of stems and branches into more artistic form.
3. To induce increased fruitfulness.
4. To reduce size of crop but increase size of fruit or flowers, or
5. To hasten ripening of new wood to increase winter hardiness.

C. In doing the job here are a few samples of principles and facts to keep in mind:

1. Heavy pruning of dormant plants induces stronger growth when activity is renewed.

2. Flowering shrubs such as lilacs, spireas and honeysuckles that bloom in the spring, should be pruned immediately after flowering is completed.

3. Pruning during the summer reduces the capacity of the shrubs for manufacturing food.

4. In pruning trees cuts should be made close to the stem from which the pruned branch originates. Clean, smooth cuts will heal more quickly than rough ones. No stubs should be left to become infected with rot fungi. Wounds more than an inch in diameter should be treated with a protective coating.

5. Cutting off the tips of branches induces side branching if done early while the tree is in vigorous growth. When done in late summer it induces ripening of the new wood in the branch so pruned.

D. Some examples:

(a) If staking tomatoes are to be pruned to one stem and a limited number of trusses of fruit: first, eliminate all side branches as they develop in the axils of the leaves but leave the leaves belonging to the main stem intact. Second, snip out the tip of the main stem as soon as required number of trusses of fruit have formed. Third, when the fruit is well filled prune away part of the leaves and cut some of the main roots with a spade to prevent rise of excess water.

(b) Steps in pruning lilacs: First, remove dead flowers, noting new shoots developing just below the truss. Thin out the number of main branches to permit more light and air reaching the centre of the shrub. Third, eliminate unnecessary sucker growth but allow some new shoots to develop to replace old branches removed. Old, overgrown lilacs should be rejuvenated gradually over a period of three or four years, removing two or three old branches each year.

Two Centuries Old:

The City of Halifax

Halifax, the first British civic settlement in Canada, celebrates the bicentenary of its founding on June 21, 1749, and anniversary celebrations have been planned to extend over an eleven-week period, from June 19 to September 8, beginning and ending with special religious ceremonies.

Lord and Lady Cornwallis, direct descendants of the founder of the city, are due to arrive from England to take part in the official ceremonies on June 21. Two hundred years ago, on that day, a fleet of thirteen transports bearing 2,576 colonists reached Chebucto, escorted by the sloop-of-war Sphinx. The expedition was led by Edward Cornwallis.

One June 21 a special ceremony in St. Paul's Church, Halifax—the oldest Protestant church in Canada—will commemorate the church's founding in 1750. The bodies of many of the original colonists and their descendants are buried in the churchyard, which has not been in use since 1844.

Several of the bicentenary events, which will be described fully in CBC broadcasts, are to take place in an outdoor theatre which has been erected inside the Citadel—or Fort St. George—which dates back to the time

of the early settlers, although the present fort was not built until 1828.

On Sunday, June 19, on CBC Trans-Canada, a Nova Scotia author, Thomas Raddall, will give the first of a series of four talks about the city of Halifax in the program *Canadiana* (CBK 11:15 p.m.; CBX 10:15 p.m.). Mr. Raddall recently published a book entitled *Halifax—Warden of the North*. His talks on this and subsequent Sundays will deal with episodes in the history of the city, such as the great explosion in 1917.

The program *Harmony Harbour*, by the Acadian Male Quartet, heard on Sundays, will also mark the anniversary with special selections. The broadcast on June 19 will come from the ballroom of the Nova Scotian Hotel in Halifax, where the National Convention of Men's Press Clubs will be holding a luncheon meeting.

Telling Canada's Story:

CBC School Broadcasting Abroad

This year more children will probably listen to Canadian school broadcasts outside Canada than listen here at home. Through the efforts of the CBC International Service, school broadcasts have been prepared in a number of languages and sent to countries whose populations of school children bulk much larger than those of the whole of Canada. The school broadcasting activities of the CBC International Service began more than four years ago. At that time, with the war's end only a few months past, the nucleus of what was later to become the UNESCO (United Nations Educa-

Because of the extensive devastation in many European countries and the lack of teaching staffs and supplies, European children, many of whom had been unable to attend school during much of the war, faced a bleak prospect. The pressing need was for trained teachers and textbooks. The conference was reported to the International Service by the Canadian representative on his return home and, as a result, Canada offered to provide recorded school broadcasts in as many languages as were needed to help bridge the gap. At the same time, Canadian schools undertook to collect other supplies—paper, pencils and so on.

Broadcasts Translated

Eleven hundred school broadcasts were prepared, translated and recorded in four languages — Greek, Polish, Czech and French. The subjects chosen were for the most part basic ones: The History of Medicine, Human Geography, Nature Studies, Adventures in Science, and Science in Industry.

The chief source of material was the school broadcast program of the CBC's French network, Radio College, although it was found that considerable alteration of the original scripts was necessary.

Greece eventually received 182 programs, Czechoslovakia 260, Poland 260, Luxembourg 130 and France 260. It was even necessary to include phonograph needles with each transcription, for these were unobtainable in most of the countries.

Later, other international relief agencies took over the work of providing basic materials for school children and assisting in the re-establishment of educational facilities, so that while the effort of the CBC International Service continued, it became possible to limit the work and to prepare more specifically Canadian programs which could form a part of the regular school broadcasting pattern in many European countries.

The work of the International Service has been made easier in two respects. In the first place, school broadcasting in most European countries is an acknowledged form of educational participation going back years with well-staffed school broadcasting departments in most radio organizations. Secondly, in addition to nationalized radio systems, most Euro-

pean countries have national educational policies and authorities so that by dealing with one department it is possible to work out plans for radio broadcasts which will eventually reach all the children of the country.

Dealing with such highly-concentrated educational organizations, administering relatively densely populated small countries, has made real the difficulties facing Canadian educationists. At the present time, the countries with which Canada is co-operating in the preparation of school broadcasts are Germany, Sweden, Norway and Switzerland. In addition, plans are under way to include Denmark, the Netherlands and Italy during the next few months.

The German Broadcasts

The broadcasts for Germany are the best developed. Last winter ten twenty-minute dramatized programs in German were recorded and sent to the school broadcasting department of the North-west German Radio network in the British Zone. There they were relayed over the entire network once in the morning and once in the afternoon to different classes. Then the same programs were sent to the American Zone and relayed on the American German network. After that, they were sent to Berlin where they were again broadcast.

Typical Canadian topics are chosen. On January 18, for example, the German audience visited Winnipeg, the fourth Canadian city they have come to know through the radio. Some of the other topics which have been dealt with are Der Hohe Norden (The Far North), an actuality broadcast from the Yukon; Volk mit vielen Sprachen (A People with Many Languages), a drama introducing Canada's citizens of foreign extraction; Kanadische Zeitungen (Canadian Newspapers); Gebaendigte Energien: Arvida (Harnessed Energy: Arvida); and many others.

children from Toronto and Vancouver sang and spoke in Welsh their greetings to fellow-students in Wales. On that day too, the BBC Welsh region broadcast a half-hour of drama and choral music prepared in Canada by the CBC.

Not many months ago, Canadian broadcasters contributed with great success to the BBC series for domestic listening, *Commonwealth and Empire*. They described the maple-sugar industry of Quebec, Canada's Arctic weather stations, and the forestry industry.

Some of these talks are prepared by the CBC International Service, others by the BBC's Canadian representatives. The latter range far and wide across the country in search of program material. The result of one such trip was heard in Britain in a feature broadcast on Canada's newsprint industry. Facts gleaned on another were woven into a documentary on the Yukon—a broadcast which was heard in Britain, on its overseas transmitters, and next will be issued in transcription form for stations all over the world.

Canadian choirs have been heard in England in a special series *Canada Sings*. Robert Service, the bard of the days of '98, officials of Canada's newest oil-well projects, some of our leading business men, and armed services officers have spoken over the BBC by means of Canadian-prepared recordings, and shortwave re-broadcasts. Certainly there is no lack of variety of speakers, music, and the spoken word.

Meet the Commonwealth is a new field Canadian magazine have entered. On this BBC magazine program, from week to week, listeners in Golders Green and Cretna Green, Aberdeen and Rottingdean hear the stories of *The Northern Messenger*, *Saskatchewan's Flying Ambulance Service*, *The Weathership "St. Stephen"*, *The Spiral Tunnels*, and half a dozen more such as these. These stories will go forth too from the BBC's shortwave transmitters, telling listeners in Capetown and Khartoum and California about Canada.

In April, Canada made her first contribution to BBC television. An exhibition of paintings by Toronto school children was seen by British viewers. And while they watched the pictures in review, they heard descriptions of Niagara, of Indians, of winter sports and of the Santa Claus parade in Toronto, written by these same children.

The BBC's news division in London knows intimately the procedure connected with the "monitoring" of the CBC's Sackville transmitters. Several times a week, acting on cabled advice, the news editors and news talks editors listen to our announcers say: "Hello BBC, here is an item for the BBC news division." It may be a report on Canadian reaction to the budget. Perhaps it is a short comment on a Canadian political statement of great interest to Britain, or the voice of a mercy pilot just back from the Arctic, or an observation on a trade agreement or a flood or a ship arrival or a food shipment. All are a part of the story of Canada. And whether words span the Atlantic on disc, or by shortwave the voices of Canada reach into the homes of Britain at the eastern end of the Atlantic's two-way street.

CBC western sports commentator, Bill Good, is off again. For the next two months he'll be covering national sporting events in three provinces and working in a holiday in a fourth province.

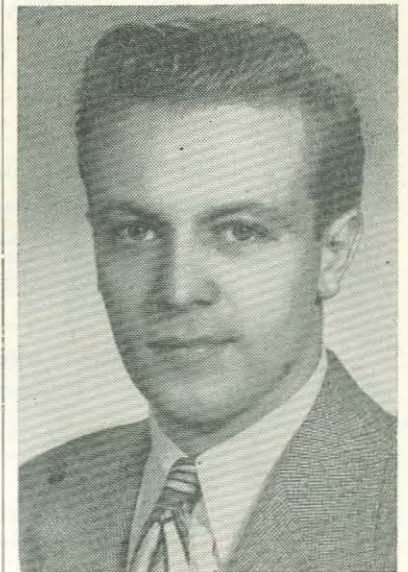

Making A Gun

A typical Birmingham business was featured in a BBC program called "Master Gunsmith." This took listeners through the workshops of a firm established in 1829, and told them exactly how a sporting gun is made, a protracted and complicated job, with fifteen major processes and thirty-three subsidiary ones. A man is measured for a gun, which is made to his exact specifications. A handmade weapon will last his lifetime and, provided he takes good care of it, can be passed on to his son. Gun-making cannot be done in a hurry, and every gunsmith is a craftsman who takes intense pride in his job. When one slow and careful process after another has been completed the gun will have taken some twelve months to make and will cost the buyer several hundred pounds. Gunsmiths stick to the job and many of the men working for this firm are over fifty. The one who makes the wooden

stocks is eighty-three. While men in modern factories work with micrometers for exact measurements these craftsmen use a little paraffin lamp and cover their work with thick black smoke. The gun parts are then clamped together. Any slightly high bit shows bright and is at once smoothed away to ensure a perfect fit. Listeners heard of the boring of the barrels—by which a nine-pound piece of steel is reduced to one and a half pounds—their straightening and proving, the jointing and the locking of the gun, the making of its "furniture"—to the layman, the trigger and its surrounds—the fine chequering on the stock which prevents it slipping in the hand, the engraving of the steelwork, and finally its hardening, when it is immersed in charcoal and other ingredients, baked in an oven and finally plunged in running water, emerging a fine blue in tone. The secret of the efficiency and beauty of these guns is that every process in their making is a labour of love, done by British workmen who have an intense pride in their old and complicated craft.—BBC London Letter.

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
