

# CBC Weather Reports Have Huge Audience

It's early morning and the CBC announcer is just beginning to read the weather forecast. "Rising temperatures... increased humidity... clear skies." You unbutton one eye and glance out the window. If you're a candy manufacturer, you glower because your chocolate shipments will have to be delayed; and if you're an ice-cream salesman, you smile in quiet anticipation.

But if it's pouring cats and dogs and has cooled down by noon, don't blame the announcer-all he does is read the telegraphed message from the nearest Dominion Public Weather Office.



If you are determined to take it out on someone, you may be impelled to write a scorching letter to your radio station or weather bureau. Even then, however, your letter is likely to be offset by others in a very different vein—from farmers, manufacturers and lumbermen who have been saved time or money by the weather man's warning of coming atmospheric changes.

Four times a day the teletype wires of the Dominion Public Weather Offices send up-to-theminute forecasts to CBC stations and newspaper offices across the country.

The first reports—from about four hundred observation stations all over Canada—arrive at the meteorological offices shortly after midnight. They are sent in by farmers, teachers, fishermen, housewives and others retained as weather observers.

Immediately, plotters begin the job of writing each report in "met" shorthand on special weather maps. Each entry is written in (Turn to page 8)

#### I.S. Librarian Pays First Visit To West

The Fourth Annual Conference of the Canadian Library Association held in Winnipeg June 20-25 brought Mme. Juliette Dupont, librarian of the CBC International Service in Montreal to the west for her first visit. A member of the association and of the council of the Quebec Librarians Association, Mme. Dupont attended the conference as the Quebec Association's delegate to the special committee on public relations.

In addition to this being her first trip to Winnipeg it turned out to be a first experience in another line-trying her hand or rather her thumb at hitch-hiking. Arrangements had been made for her to broadcast a report on the conference for the French network's news roundup but a short while before broadcast time found Mme. Dupont at the University of Manitoba in Fort Garry, a good seven miles from the CBC studios with no bus in sight. That's when she and another delegate tried the thumb method which brought them into town in time for her to go over the script and do the broadcast.

Mme. Dupont's experience as a radio speaker dates back to the war years when she was lecturer and coordinator in Quebec for the Consumer Branch of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. She gave many talks on the air in connection with her work. A librarian by profession, she is a graduate of McGill University, joining the CBC when the International Service was being organized.

Late Summer Activities in the Garden

1. It is time for the last "weed round-up" in the garden area. Every weed prevented from going to seed means fewer weeds in the garden next year and less work controlling them.

2. The last summer cultivation should be completed in the next ten days. During August cutworm moths lay their eggs in weedy, rough ground. Clean cultivation that leaves the ground level and firm during August will reduce likelihood of cutworm infestation next season. There should be no cultivation done during August.

3. Reduction in watering is in order for late summer. By mid-July the making of new growth which requires plenty of water is over or almost over for most plants. Reduction in watering will encourage flowers and fruit and the maturing of the crop. Fruit trees and shrubs especially should have less water in late summer so that they will ripen their wood and form good strong buds for next year. There are some exceptions in this program. Dahlias and gladioli for instance require additional watering in quantity for another month as they don't mature until late August or early September.

4. In dry districts, or in any district to conserve moisture in the soil, plants such as dahlias and gladioli should be mulched now. If necessary water well before mulching. Fine rotted manure or short chaffy straw makes a good mulch.

5. Late July is the time for planting iris, dividing old clumps and setting out divisions. Prune out any rot in the rhizomes and dust cuts with powdered sulphur.

6. Plant peonies between September 10 and 15.

7. Keep flower borders tidy and plants productive by removing old flowers and bloomed out stems.

8. Make up bouquets for table decoration and as gifts to friends and neighbours, including the sick. Practise flower arrangement in preparation for the local horticultural show.

9. Plan entries for the local Horticultural Show.

10. Visit other gardens to exchange ideas and gather suggestions for the improvement of next year's gardening

## New Music By Modern European Composers

#### CBC Wednesday Night To Present Works By Contemporary Composers Of Four Countries

Through CBC International Service shortwave broadcasts and recordings, and as a result of expeditions by our musicians, audiences in Europe have recently heard many examples of the work of Canadian composers.

This Wednesday Night, July 27th, by co-operation with the International Service, the signals are to be reversed -the works of contemporary European composers of four different nationalities are to be heard by Canadian listeners in an hour-long recorded concert (CBW 7:00 p.m., CBK 10:00 p.m., CBX 9:00 p.m.).

The composers represented in the program are William van Otterloo of the Netherlands, Othmar Schoeck of Switzerland, Dag Wiren of Sweden and Karl Orff of Germany.

One of Holland's most prominent younger conductors and composers, van Otterloo was born in 1907 and first made a name for himself when he received a prize from the Amsterdam Concertgebouw for an orchestral suite. He is the regular conductor of the Hilversum orchestra and directed it for the recording of his own music which is to be heard on the program. Othmar Schoek has the reputation of being one of the last European composers in the tradition of Schumann and Hugo Wolf. He has written many

Dag Wiren is one of Sweden's bestknown contemporary composers. He was born in 1905 and studied at the Conservatory of Stockholm from 1926 to 1931. Since 1938 he has been music critic for one of Sweden's leading newspapers.

Karl Orff, who was born in Munich in 1895, has been engaged for the last twelve years in creating a new musical style, one that is mainly concerned with rhythm and gives the drums great prominence. He has composed much music for the modern theatre in Germany.

All the recordings to be heard in this program were supplied to the CBC by the national radio organizations of the countries concerned. The CBC International Service has been in close touch with these organizations for some time through its shortwave broadcasts to Europe, many of which have been relayed to national audiences in Sweden, Germany, Switzerland and the Netherlands.

his first actual radio job in 1941 when he won an announcer audition conducted by a Winnipeg band leader. It consisted of writing and announcing the band's nightly dance broadcasts from the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium for a local station. That led to a job as staff announcer in Yorkton where he gained experience doing sportscasts and play-by-play descriptions of hockey games.

George enlisted in the R.C.A.F. in 1942, serving in Gander, Newfoundland, where he was instrumental in the organization and establishment of the R.C.A.F. radio station VORG, a station which served the Canadian Army, the R.C.A.F. and the U.S. Army Air Forces there. He later became assistant to the officer-in-charge.

Following his discharge in 1945, George joined CKY and his assignments included CBC newscasts and several other network broadcasts. From there he went to another Winnipeg station in 1946, and then to Brandon, two moves which gave him further experience in sports broadcasts, interviews and on-the-spot reports along with other types of programs.

George joined the CBC in October, 1948, and partially realized a long ambition when he broadcast a playby-play report of the sixth seventh games of the 1948-49 Memorial Cup Final between the Brandon Wheat Kings and the Montreal Royals. He now has his own daily sports broadcast on CBW in which he reports on current sports events and interviews celebrities. His main ambition now is television sportscasting. Outside of sports, George's interests run to radio, movies and music-he's a devotee of jazz. He enjoys poetry and does a fair amount of reading.

#### Mass Listening

An eight-year program has been launched to extend the use of radio throughout India. When the program of expansion is completed, broadcasting stations in India will serve 10 times their former areas. The number of villages served will be 80,000 compared with 5,000 at the present time.

But there are not enough radio receiving sets to bring programs directly into the average home in India. That is why the government provides receiving sets and loud speakers. This equipment is set up in the centre of the village. Hundreds of people can then listen to a single set. In four provinces alone this community listening plan has brought radio within the reach of sixteen million people who would otherwise not be able to listen.

And this means more than might think to India's national life. For the Indians use their radio to present special programs on health and to discuss the economic problems which come very close to the lives of the people.-From the Saturday program, UNESCO World Review.

and this one is used in farm broadcasts and noontime newscasts. Another at tea-time is for the convenience of people planning their evening's activities; and the late night report helps householders set their furnaces correctly in winter-and decide whether to bring in the lawn hammock for the night in the summer.

One of the most important weather bulletins issued from the CBC's Halifax studios is the marine forecast, broadcast three or four times daily. While it is used by large ships off the Atlantic coast, it is of greatest value to fishing vessels and smaller craft which must seek shelter in case of storms.

Because of the peculiar situation of the Maritimes-almost completely surrounded by water and close to the Gulf Stream and to Labrador-the weather varies greatly from point to point, even in a small area. why forecasts are prepared and broadcast for ten marine and thirteen inland regions.

CBC listeners in Quebec hear forecasts issued at Dorval Airport and Ontario's bulletins are prepared by the meteorological offices at Malton Airport, near Toronto. The Prairie Provinces rely on weather bureaus in Winnipeg and Edmonton.

In British Columbia, the emphasis is on weather news for foresters and fruit growers. A five-minute marine bulletin is included in the daily farm broadcast.

Dr. T. G. How of Toronto, head of the Dominion Public Weather Forecast Service, has an unusual problem. He is constantly receiving letters from town councils and other bodies asking for mention of a certain community's name in the CBC's weather forecasts. Dr. How says the CBC weather reports have a huge audience and publicity-conscious communities want other centres to know they are on the map!

The Battle of Prestonpans.-A man in Westminster County Court announced that he had been wounded at the battle of Prestonpans and wanted something done about it. 

# CBC Weather Reports Have Huge Audience

It's early morning and the CBC announcer is just beginning to read the weather forecast. "Rising temperatures... increased humidity... clear skies." You unbutton one eye and glance out the window. If you're a candy manufacturer, you glower because your chocolate shipments will have to be delayed; and if you're an ice-cream salesman, you smile in quiet anticipation.

But if it's pouring cats and dogs and has cooled down by noon, don't blame the announcer-all he does is read the telegraphed message from the nearest Dominion Public Weather Office.



If you are determined to take it out on someone, you may be impelled to write a scorching letter to your radio station or weather bureau. Even then, however, your letter is likely to be offset by others in a very different vein—from farmers, manufacturers and lumbermen who have been saved time or money by the weather man's warning of coming atmospheric changes.

Four times a day the teletype wires of the Dominion Public Weather Offices send up-to-theminute forecasts to CBC stations and newspaper offices across the country.

The first reports—from about four hundred observation stations all over Canada—arrive at the meteorological offices shortly after midnight. They are sent in by farmers, teachers, fishermen, housewives and others retained as weather observers.

Immediately, plotters begin the job of writing each report in "met" shorthand on special weather maps. Each entry is written in (Turn to page 8)

#### I.S. Librarian Pays First Visit To West

The Fourth Annual Conference of the Canadian Library Association held in Winnipeg June 20-25 brought Mme. Late Summer Activities in the Garden

1. It is time for the last "weed round-up" in the garden area. Every weed prevented from going to seed means fewer weeds in the garden next year and less work controlling them.

2. The last summer cultivation should be completed in the next ten days. During August cutworm moths lay their eggs in weedy, rough ground. Clean cultivation that leaves the ground level and firm during August will reduce likelihood of cutworm infestation next season. There should be no cultivation done during August.

3. Reduction in watering is in order for late summer. By mid-July the making of new growth which requires plenty of water is over or almost over for most plants. Reduction in watering will encourage flowers and fruit and the maturing of the crop. Fruit trees and shrubs especially should have less water in late summer so that they will ripen their wood and form good strong buds for next year. There are some exceptions in this program. Dahlias and gladioli for instance require additional watering in quantity for another month as they don't mature until late August or early September.

4. In dry districts, or in any district to conserve moisture in the soil, plants such as dahlias and gladioli should be mulched now. If necessary water well before mulching. Fine rotted manure or short chaffy straw makes a good mulch.

5. Late July is the time for planting iris, dividing old clumps and setting out divisions. Prune out any rot in the rhizomes and dust cuts with powdered sulphur.

6. Plant peonies between September 10 and 15.

7. Keep flower borders tidy and plants productive by removing old flowers and bloomed out stems.

8. Make up bouquets for table decoration and as gifts to friends and neighbours, including the sick. Practise flower arrangement in preparation for the local horticultural show.

9. Plan entries for the local Horticultural Show.

10. Visit other gardens to exchange ideas and gather suggestions for the improvement of next year's gardening operations.

## New Music By Modern European Composers

#### CBC Wednesday Night To Present Works By Contemporary Composers Of Four Countries

Through CBC International Service shortwave broadcasts and recordings, and as a result of expeditions by our musicians, audiences in Europe have recently heard many examples of the work of Canadian composers.

This Wednesday Night, July 27th, by co-operation with the International Service, the signals are to be reversed -the works of contemporary European composers of four different nationalities are to be heard by Canadian listeners in an hour-long recorded concert (CBW 7:00 p.m., CBK 10:00 p.m., CBX 9:00 p.m.).

The composers represented in the program are William van Otterloo of the Netherlands, Othmar Schoeck of Switzerland, Dag Wiren of Sweden and Karl Orff of Germany.

One of Holland's most prominent younger conductors and composers, van Otterloo was born in 1907 and first made a name for himself when he received a prize from the Amsterdam Concertgebouw for an orchestral suite. He is the regular conductor of the Hilversum orchestra and directed it for the recording of his own music which is to be heard on the program. Othmar Schoek has the reputation of being one of the last European composers in the tradition of Schumann and Hugo Wolf. He has written many

Dag Wiren is one of Sweden's bestknown contemporary composers. He was born in 1905 and studied at the Conservatory of Stockholm from 1926 to 1931. Since 1938 he has been music critic for one of Sweden's leading newspapers.

Karl Orff, who was born in Munich in 1895, has been engaged for the last twelve years in creating a new musical style, one that is mainly concerned with rhythm and gives the drums great prominence. He has composed much music for the modern theatre in Germany.

All the recordings to be heard in this program were supplied to the CBC by the national radio organizations of the countries concerned. The CBC International Service has been in close touch with these organizations for some time through its shortwave broadcasts to Europe, many of which have been relayed to national audiences in Sweden, Germany, Switzerland and the Netherlands.

his first actual radio job in 1941 when he won an announcer audition conducted by a Winnipeg band leader. It consisted of writing and announc-ing the band's nightly dance broadcasts from the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium for a local station. That led to a job as staff announcer in Yorkton where he gained experience doing sportscasts and play-by-play descriptions of hockey games.

George enlisted in the R.C.A.F. in 1942, serving in Gander, Newfoundland, where he was instrumental in the organization and establishment of the R.C.A.F. radio station VORG, a station which served the Canadian Army, the R.C.A.F. and the U.S. Army Air Forces there. He later became assistant to the officer-in-charge.

Following his discharge in 1945, George joined CKY and his assignments included CBC newscasts and several other network broadcasts. From there he went to another Winnipeg station in 1946, and then to Brandon, two moves which gave him further experience in sports broadcasts, interviews and on-the-spot reports along with other types of programs.

George joined the CBC in October, 1948, and partially realized a long ambition when he broadcast a playby-play report of the sixth seventh games of the 1948-49 Memorial Cup Final between the Brandon Wheat Kings and the Montreal Royals. He now has his own daily sports broadcast on CBW in which he reports on current sports events and interviews celebrities. His main ambition now is television sportscasting. Outside of sports, George's interests run to radio, movies and music-he's a devotee of jazz. He enjoys poetry and does a fair amount of reading.

#### Mass Listening

An eight-year program has been launched to extend the use of radio throughout India. When the program of expansion is completed, broadcasting stations in India will serve 10 times their former areas. The number of villages served will be 80,000 compared with 5,000 at the present time.

But there are not enough radio receiving sets to bring programs directly into the average home in India. That is why the government provides receiving sets and loud speakers. This equipment is set up in the centre of the village. Hundreds of people can then listen to a single set. In four provinces alone this community listening plan has brought radio within the reach of sixteen million people who would otherwise not be able to listen.

And this means more than you might think to India's national life. For the Indians use their radio to present special programs on health and to discuss the economic problems which come very close to the lives of the people.-From the Saturday program, UNESCO World Review.

a circle about the size of a dime around the name of the point where it originated. The maps cover the continent from Mexico to the Arctic. Plotting is completed by about two o'clock and by five the meteorologists have compiled their analyses and sent them off to radio stations in the dis-

This early-morning report is designed for farmers and the city worker who is wondering what to wear for the day. Another report, after similar preparation, is issued at nine o'clock,

and this one is used in farm broadcasts and noontime newscasts. Another at tea-time is for the convenience of people planning their evening's activities; and the late night report helps householders set their furnaces correctly in winter-and decide whether to bring in the lawn hammock for the night in the summer.

One of the most important weather bulletins issued from the CBC's Halifax studios is the marine forecast, broadcast three or four times daily. While it is used by large ships off the Atlantic coast, it is of greatest value to fishing vessels and smaller craft which must seek shelter in case of storms.

Because of the peculiar situation of the Maritimes-almost completely surrounded by water and close to the Gulf Stream and to Labrador-the weather varies greatly from point to point, even in a small area. why forecasts are prepared and broadcast for ten marine and thirteen inland regions.

CBC listeners in Quebec hear forecasts issued at Dorval Airport and Ontario's bulletins are prepared by the meteorological offices at Malton Airport, near Toronto. The Prairie Provinces rely on weather bureaus in Winnipeg and Edmonton.

In British Columbia, the emphasis is on weather news for foresters and fruit growers. A five-minute marine bulletin is included in the daily farm broadcast.

Dr. T. G. How of Toronto, head of the Dominion Public Weather Forecast Service, has an unusual problem. He is constantly receiving letters from town councils and other bodies asking for mention of a certain community's name in the CBC's weather forecasts. Dr. How says the CBC weather reports have a huge audience and publicity-conscious communities want other centres to know they are on the map!

The Battle of Prestonpans.-A man in Westminster County Court announced that he had been wounded at the battle of Prestonpans and wanted something done about it. Well, since the battle of Prestonpans took place in the year 1745, this might be considered a little odd . . .
