Talks For Women

It is a long time since I have met anyone who has told me that women listeners don't like women on the air and that a woman's talk is an audience-loser on any station at any time. The latest audience surveys are giving women commentators high ratings. So, after thirty years of radio, I fancy even the most cautious conservative will admit that women broadcasters have, perhaps, arrived.

In the CBC, women have been broadcasting from the very first, and since 1939 CBC talks for women have been a regular feature of our daytime schedule. Their object is to provide a medium through which women may exchange opinions and

information on all matters of concern to them in their homes, in their activities as citizens, or at work.

Women's broadcasting skills have developed with radio-mindedness, but they found a women's audience ready and waiting for them from the beginning. Canadians always have had an insati-

able taste for speeches. We enjoy getting our information by the talking method. Then Canada is a nation of one-woman homes. Housewives, especially in isolated places, get lonely for the sound of another woman's voice. National radio was the first medium that brought them the voices of women from other parts (Turn to page 2)

of Canada—women like themselves—but with some specialized knowledge or experience to share with listeners in all provinces . . .

The war left everyone more internationally-minded and we found a women's audience ready and waiting to welcome news of women outside Canada and their ideas on common human problems. To meet this need, CBC undertook the ambitious project of having women speak to women, across the national boundaries. This project now has grown into the most comprehensive plan of international broadcasts for women set up by any radio system in the world. In fact, when you hear Carin Bergman talking on A Good Wife in Sweden on the afternoon talks period on the Trans-Canada network, June 21st, it will be the 185th consecutive Wednesday afternoon on which Canadian women have heard the voice of a woman from some part of the world in a special report to Canada on the everyday activities of women in the country concerned.

News from women correspondents in various parts of the world is aired by our regional morning commentators—the women heard over CBC stations and networks five days a week. They are: Joan Marshall in the Maritimes, Shirley Brett in Montreal, Jane Weston and June Dennis in Toronto, Helen Jackman in Saskatchewan and Alberta, Ellen Harris in British Columbia and Kay O'Neill, a newcomer to Winnipeg this month. These women quickly become household names in their regions, and the constant flow of mail from their listeners forms the necessary link in what then becomes a friendly conversation between commentator and listener.

**Beginners Learn In
CBC Square Dance
Saturday Night Program From
Winnipeg Gives Lessons
For Listeners**

Each Saturday night a small group gathers in the CBC's Winnipeg studios for the half-hour program of instruction in old-time dancing, CBC Square Dance (W-9:00 p.m., K-10:00 p.m., X-9:00 p.m.) The dancing master is Hart Devenney. The announcer is Ken Dougan. Mr. Devenney is the director of physical fitness for the Manitoba Department of Public Health. He also adjudicates at folk-dance festivals and gives instruction in folk and old-time dancing. The music is directed by Pete Couture.

When the program was in the planning stage, producer J. W. Kent decided that those in the studio group should all be beginners so that as they were being taught the different steps, listeners who had never done any old-time dancing could form their own set at home and follow at the same speed. This idea was carried out and since the program went on the air, the studio group has covered all the fundamental square-set figures. The dancers have now reached the point where they know all the essentials to take part in a simple square dance which includes such calls as ladies to centre and bow, gentlemen to the centre and stamp, circle right and circle left, grand right and left, allemande right and left, swing your partners, dos-a-dos and promenade.

From time to time during the course of instruction the program will be in the form of a review of what has been covered in order to allow the studio

group and listeners to get some practice. Now that the dancers have learned to follow the calls without getting mixed up, Mr. Kent is including an advanced call on each program so that listeners who are already familiar with the fundamentals may learn something new every week.

Later on the studio group will be instructed in several other old-time dances including quadrilles, running-sets and longways sets.

**Another Award For
Book By R. S. Lambert**

Another distinction has been conferred on R. S. Lambert's book for children, Franklin of the Arctic. It is the Governor-General's Juvenile Medal for 1949, judged and donated by the Canadian Authors' Association.

Only a short time ago the book was chosen by a poll of the children's librarians of Canada as last year's outstanding book for young readers. Thus, for the first time, the same book has received both the awards which are given annually in Canada for the best children's book of the year. Mr. Lambert is the CBC's supervisor of school broadcasts. Apart from the arrangements to adapt Franklin of the Arctic for radio, reported last week, the book has now been authorized for required reading in senior grades of New Brunswick's public schools.

To Visit Europe

CBC drama supervisor Andrew Allan is off to Europe this month to see for himself what is being done there in stage work of various kinds—theatre, film and television. He will spend most of the summer in England, but expects to visit Paris late this month to attend an international theatre conference which has been organized by UNESCO.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of June 11th, 1950.

June in the Garden

1. *Transplant* the last of the bedding plants and warm weather crops such as tomatoes.
2. *Make succession sowings* of radishes, lettuce, beets and summer turnips.
3. *This is about the best week* for sowing cucumbers. Give them plenty of manure and humus to feed on.
4. *Seed the cold frame* with perennials. Provide the seedlings with half shade with a lath lattice.
5. *Pot up a few extra bedding plants* (petunias, stocks, snaps) to have on hand to fill in weak spots in the flower border in July.
6. *Sow winter flowering begonias* to make house plants for next winter.
7. *Get the weed-killing campaign* in full swing. Have a hundred percent weed free garden before taking a holiday in July.
8. *Stake and support such things* as peonies, delphiniums, dahlias, etc. before they get damaged in a summer storm.
9. *Make a propagating box* filled with a mixture of sand, peat and vermiculite and enclosed by four panes of glass and a fifth glass for a cover. Root green cuttings of shrubs (honeysuckle, spirea), dahlias, and perennials to increase your stock of nursery plants.
10. *Renovate the lawn.* Re-seed bare spots. Trim the edges of walks and flower beds. Kill the dandelions with 2,4-D.
11. *Pin down strawberry runner* to make new plants early. Prune off extra runners so as not to waste strength of mother plants.

More about Perennials: (continued from May 28)

Planning a Perennial Border:

1. *Make a plan on square paper.* Quarter-inch squares each equivalent to one square foot in the border are convenient ones to use.
2. *List plants by heights* in order to choose those best suited to the back, middle or front of the border.
3. *Plant in groups* of three to five of a kind rather than in rows.
4. *Avoid uniformity* in height from back to front. There should be "capes and bays" of foliage to vary the profile of the layout.
5. *List plants by season of bloom* in order to have groups in bloom scattered throughout the border at any one time.

Alberta Students to Visit Lake Success

Tour Follows CBC Broadcast

Partly as a result of a report broadcast in April on *CBC News Roundup*, eleven rural school children in Alberta are being sent on a six-week expense-free transcontinental trip, the highlight of which will be a visit to Lake Success to see the United Nations Security Council in action.

Here's how it happened. Andy Snaddon of Calgary got wind of an interesting educational project at the tiny, two-room Loyalty Public School at Huxley, Alberta, a hundred miles northeast of Calgary, and went up to see if the story would make an item for *CBC News Roundup*.

It was a Thursday afternoon, and this is what he found in the little brown-and-white schoolhouse. Around a trestle table at the back of the class sat a group of pupils with a glass of water, a pencil and a pad of paper in front of each. They were in the midst of a heated argument, and they were discussing, not sports or plans for a dance, but international problems and matters of social import.

They were grade seven, eight and nine pupils who make up a junior "UN Security Council" which meets every Thursday and follows the agenda of the regular UN Council at Lake Success. It's a practical way of teaching social studies that has paid off in higher marks and better attendance than in previous years.

Credit goes to English-born teacher Gordon G. Fellowes, who has been in Canada just over a year. Each week he gives his students a question dealing with United Nations decisions, world affairs or other current events. They have a week to find the answer, and Mr. Fellowes says parents complain they can't get near their radios—the boys and girls want to hear every scrap of news in preparation for the next meeting. The children are expected to know all about the countries they represent, so they clip and study everything they can find about the various countries in newspapers, magazines and pamphlets.

In his *CBC News Roundup* report, Mr. Snaddon said that the three best students, judged on a year-round point basis, would be given a trip to Lake Success in July.

After the broadcast letters began pouring into the little schoolhouse, suggesting that the whole Loyalty "Security Council" should be taken to Lake Success. Soon Mr. Fellowes was able to report that "the community, in fact most of southern Alberta, have decided to send the entire group on a tour of Canada en route to New York." He added that the National Broadcasting Company in the United States had telephoned to arrange for the children to make a broadcast in New York, and the UN publicity office had invited them to attend an assembly meeting. Eleven children and two parents will make the trip, leaving Calgary on July 14 and stopping off at Regina, Winnipeg and Toronto en route.

LP Records Boon to Producers

Installation of equipment for using long-playing records started in CBC studios a year ago, and now all points across the country except Newfoundland are equipped, including the CBC International Service in Montreal.

Most CBC stations began using "LP" records in certain programs of classical music on a more or less experimental basis about two months ago, but in the studios in Winnipeg, the largest CBC recording centre, they have been used quite extensively since last summer.

To the casual observer, LP records look much like other ten or twelve-inch discs. But closer examination reveals that their grooves are much finer and closer together. And on the turntable they must be revolved less than half as fast as ordinary records. One twelve-inch LP record will carry up to twenty-five minutes of sound on each side. This compares with about four-and-half minutes on each side of an ordinary record.

Although the "micro-groove" process is of recent development, LP records have been used and sold commercially for a long time. For example, they have provided organ music and

hymns in undertakers' parlours on this continent for more than twenty years.

Ten years ago the CBC bought a few of them for use in religious programs, and started watching reports on experiments to make them suitable for mass production and for wide distribution among the record-buying public.

About a year ago, when "micro-groove" LP's were first manufactured and circulated widely, CBC music librarians acquired a few, but found (as they had suspected) that they could not be reproduced satisfactorily for broadcasting with the equipment available. So the necessary equipment was made in the CBC's engineering workshop in Montreal.

The engineers' problem was simple enough in theory, though not in practice. The micro-grooved LP's have 250 lines per inch, compared to 136 on the ordinary commercial records, and play at thirty-three-and-a-third revolutions per minute, instead of at seventy-eight, as the ordinary ones do.

CBC turntables were already equipped for slow revolving, which is used for playing regular sixteen-inch transcription discs. But there was another difficulty. The reproducing needles for ordinary records have rounded points of about two-and-a-half mills (or two-and-a-half thousandths of an inch radius) and the phonograph pick-up in which they are inserted weighs about fifteen grams. LP records, to follow the extremely fine groove, need points of about one mill radius, and with the ordinary pick-up weighing fifteen grams, this fine point would dig into the record and soon destroy it.

So it was necessary to make a lighter pick-up. CBC's workshop produced one weighing about ten grams. The result was excellent and practically noiseless reproduction on the vinylite surface. Each turntable in CBC studios using LP's is now equipped with two tone-arms, one for LP's and one for ordinary records. As the standard classical repertoire wears out, it is being replaced, in most cases, by LP's.

J. Marcotte, supervisor of technical operations at the CBC's Montreal studios, is enthusiastic about LP's because, having a minimum of surface noise, they can reproduce a wider frequency range. The result, he says, is a quality much nearer the full, round tones of a live studio program—something of a third dimension in sound. Unfortunately, however, this is noticeable to the average listener only on a frequency modulation receiver.

CBC librarians store LP's in the individual, tight, stiff cardboard covers provided to prevent warping and to keep them clean. Dust, they say, is the big bugbear to people using LP's. The vinylite surface is subject to a static charge which seems to attract dust out of nowhere. Consequently the surface should be cleaned with a

Mr. Fellowes said that other plans for the trip include a two-week stay at Lake Success, a week in and around New York seeing everything from Coney Island to the ballet, sitting in on one of President Truman's press conferences at the White House, and a tour through the Chicago Tribune newspaper plant.

Since their story was told in the press and on News Roundup the boys and girls have made several personal appearances at Rotary and other club meetings. On June 12 they made a one-day trip to Edmonton to meet members of the Alberta Legislative Assembly and tour the oil fields.

Another new development at the enterprising little school is the opening of a small radio station, over which the Thursday meetings are often broadcast. The transmitter was made by Mr. Fellowes and his students. The license for this amateur broadcasting unit is held by one of the students. The station, which has a radius of twenty-five miles, is also used to send homework instructions to sick pupils.

damp cloth before using. If this is neglected, troublesome dust particles will turn up in the broadcast as nasty bits of static—their presence in the record's fine grooves causes the delicate needle to stumble.

T. M. Taylor, Winnipeg producer who handles numerous programs of recorded music, considers LP's the best records he has heard, aside from some top British standard recordings. "But the LP's have one weakness," he says. "They tend to wear more quickly than other records. On the other hand, they largely eliminate the problem of flips—reversing discs in the middle of a number."

LP's offer other economies, too. A whole album of "78's," costing about eleven dollars, can be recorded on one LP record, costing about four-eighty-five. An album of Bach's St. Matthew Passion recorded on "78's" sells for about sixty-five dollars, while the same thing on LP's would cost in the neighborhood of twenty-five dollars. LP's are easy on storage space, too. In the Winnipeg studios there are a hundred and sixty-five LP's stored in about three feet of cabinet shelf. To store the same amount of music on "78's" would take about fifteen feet of shelf.

Montreal producer Don McGill puts it this way: "Day in, day out, for years we have made the weary trek from record library to office to control booth, arms sagging with the weight of records they could barely cope with. No longer is the burden of life intolerable, no longer do we drag our way along this Via Dolorosa—for the long-playing record has come into our lives. Now we foot it fleetly down the corridors with a full day's programs lightly balanced on our sturdy forefinger!"

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
