• Peering into the depths of space, the earth-bound camera caught a view of the winter sky in the region of the constellation of Orion, which is reproduced on our cover this week. In the picture is a portion of another impersonal "eye"—the 74-inch telescope at the David Dunlap Observatory near Richmond Hill, Ontario. This is a mood photograph—intended to help listeners prepare their thoughts for a conducted tour of the universe which the CBC will present in the form of eight weekly talks by the Cambridge astrophysicist Dr. Fred Hoyle. Full details are on *Page Five*.

• An important source of broadcasts of many kinds during the coming months will be the fabulous Festival of Britain. Andrew Allan will be going to the United Kingdom to co-ordinate the CBC's coverage of the Festival, which will be opened in a special ceremony in London on Thursday. For the opening, the King and Queen will drive in semi-state from Buckingham Palace to St. Paul's Cathedral for a dedication service conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. As the clock of St. Paul's strikes noon, Their Majesties will come out on the steps of the Cathedral and His Majesty will deliver a message, during which he will

declare the Festival open. The steps of St. Paul's, rather than the main Festival site on the south bank of the Thames, have been chosen for this ceremony, as a spiritual setting which symbolizes the nation-wide significance of the Festival. Later in the day, the Festival Gardens will be opened by H.R.H. Princess Margaret and Their Majesties will unveil a tablet at the Royal Festival Hall. CBC listeners may hear a half-hour program on May 4 (6:00 p.m. on Dominion) made up of recorded highlights of the opening day's events.

• In most parts of Canada clocks will be moved ahead one hour some time before breakfast on Sunday, April 29—including the clocks in CBC studios. In this issue of CBC Times all time references are in Central Daylight Time for CBW, Mountain Daylight Time for CBK, Mountain Standard Time for CBX and Mountain Daylight Time for the Dominion network.

Singing Star



JUNE KOWALCHUK, Regina soprano who won the top \$1,000 prize in the 1950-51 Singing Stars of Tomorrow contest April 15, though she is only 23 has been singing for 16 years. She made her debut in 1935 at the age of seven, singing in Regina's Ukrainian Hall. Sixteen years later she was presented by Edward Johnson, former Metropolitan Opera manager, before a celebrity-studded audience of 3,000 in Massey Hall, Toronto, and informed that she had won the \$1,000 cash scholarship. She will continue her studies at the Royal Conservatory of Music at Toronto. Meanwhile, she will go home to Regina to open the music festival there on May 9, returning to Toronto for a performance of Smetana's Bartered Bride May 14. The rest of the summer she will spend singing in five concerts between Regina and Edmonton. June's father, Nicholas Kowalchuk, Regina shoemaker, himself a violinist, did much to encourage his daughter in her musical career. She studied with Alicia Birkett at Regina Conservatory, and later went to Winnipeg and Toronto on scholarships provided by the Regina Kiwanis Club.

Sunday Evening Hour. Two weeks ago Dr. Homer R. Lane president of the Saskatchewan Conference of the United Church of Canada, received his Doctor of Divinity degree from his alma mater, United College in Winnipeg. Sunday Concert. During this time his musicians recorded five sides for RCA Victor. While he was conducting the Central R.C.A.F. Band in Ottawa it was chosen to play the national anthem in a film which has been used widely in movie theatres to end the evening's show. Two years ago he was appointed director of the London Civic Orchestra. He is also a church organist and music advisor to the London Board of Education.

THE nature of the sun and the stars, and latterly nothing less than the whole universe, provide the subjects to be attacked by the scientists." Thus says Dr. Fred Hoyle, lecturer in mathematics at Cambridge University. When we survey the heavens, we are reminded of the infinite smallness of man. Inhabitants of one of the smaller planets split off from the sun, we have to remember that the sun itself is not one of the largest stars and that it in turn holds only a tiny place in the galactic system, while other systems stretch far away, if not for ever, at least farther than the mind can grasp.

... If and how other human beings dwell in this inconceivable universe we do not know, though it seems likely that we are the only human

Peering into Time and Space

An introduction to Fred Hoyle's provocative series of talks

(After Dr. Hoyle's talks were broadcast in the United Kingdom, they were reprinted in the BBC's LISTENER. As a preface to the series, which starts May 2 on the Trans-Canada network as a feature of the CBC Wednesday Night Program CBC TIMES reprints below part of an editorial which appeared in THE LISTENER with the first talk.)

(From THE LISTENER, February 9, 1950)

beings in the solar system. But whether minds like ours exist or not, the study of astronomy must induce a profound sense of humility, which other sciences and arts do not confer. The historian can transmute military geniuses like Alexander and Napoleon into thugs with a veneer of culture; or the psychologist, for example, can inflate himself in exposing the perversions of another human being. But the astronomer can scarcely identify himself with the stars. At best he must accept the universe.

But how, one muses, can the universe accept us? If human minds exist elsewhere, can they imagine that in this planet, precariously balanced in space, we should seriously consider blowing ourselves asunder? ... Is it not enough, the outsider might ask, that the earth may be struck from powers beyond its control or torn from within by some great quake without its inhabitants for reasons of greed or jealousy or fear striving to extinguish themselves and destroy their world as they know it?

Yet the past week's news about the hydrogen bomb (President Truman discussed the hydrogen bomb at a press conference on February 2, 1950) is a precise reminder of this dreadful possibility. Perhaps rulers aided by scientists will not quite succeed in wiping out humanity and a new civili-

zation, following in the wake of those listed by Arnold Toynbee and others, will survive a painful birth and blossom into an age where atomic secrets are mercifully unknown. Whichever alternative faces humanity, the stars may well look down in bewilderment and pity . . .

It is perhaps some consolation that much as we know, much we shall never know. In a pregnant sentence the late Sir James Jeans wrote of "a growing conviction that the ultimate realities of the universe are at present quite beyond the reach of science, and may be—and probably are—for ever beyond the comprehension of the human mind."

Trial For Treason. A dramatization of the trial of John Horne Tooke in 1794 for treason, by Alan King. Based on the original reporter's transcript of evidence, made available through Eric Johnston, librarian of Osgoode Hall, Toronto, and giving in the main the actual words of Tooke; Erskine, his counsel; Pitt, Sheridan, Fox. Speaking of this broadcast and the remarkable trial upon which it is based, King says: "In 1794, the Pitt government was ruled by near hysteria . . . Societies had sprung up with the implied or expressed intention of spreading the principles of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity among the British people. In the utterances of the English radicals, Pitt and his colleagues could hear the echoes of the inflamed mobs of Paris. They became sensitive about their necks, and with the vision of blood drenching the streets of London acted vigorously and precipitately to suppress all voices raised against their authority. The Habeas Corpus Act was suspended, men were plucked from their homes in the dead of night, and suspects were kept for months in prison without charge or explanation. "Tooke could have avoided arrest, but instead courted it . . . His appearance in the Old Bailey was his most glorious moment. The stage was set, and he made it his. Though he was defended by Thomas Erskine, one of the greatest counsel in the history of the English bar, he directed and conducted most of his own defence. To Erskine's credit, he sat back and allowed Tooke his way, realizing that here was the most potent weapon against grasping authority—the arrow of wit, inflicting the wound of ridicule . . . The Crown's case, built of hysteria and flimsy evidence, collapsed . . . Erskine made his own plea for tolerance and freedom of expression. His speech to

the jury is one of the greatest ever delivered in any court. He spoke till he was exhausted, but left an everlasting monument to his cause. The acquittal marked the end of Pitt's suppressive tactics."

Nature of the Universe. First of a series of eight talks by Fred Hoyle, Cambridge astrophysicist and mathematician, originally broadcast on BBC Home Service. The series describes developments in cosmology during the last decade. This series aroused great interest and some controversy when first broadcast. Hoyle is a Yorkshireman, a follower of the great Cam-

bridge astrophysicists Sir Arthur Eddington and Sir James Jeans—a mathematician rather than practising astronomer. With two other Cambridge mathematicians, Bondi and Gold, his name has become associated with the new theory of continuous

creation, possibly the most exciting, as it is certainly the most startling and controversial hypothesis to come from mathematical astronomers in a decade. The New Cosmology supposes that the universe was not created in "one big bang" in the remote past, but is continually being created and will go on being created into the infinite future. Hoyle presents his subject in a way that can be followed by the lay listener.

International Concert. Recorded program featuring the Leslie Bell Singers, a CBC Toronto orchestra conducted by Howard Cable and a CBC Montreal orchestra conducted by Neil Chotem. The program will include some popular tunes arranged by Cable and Chotem, as well as some of the lesser-known selections from the repertoire of the famous girl choir. The transcriptions were made by the CBC International Service, primarily for use by radio stations in other countries. As the series progresses, similar transcriptions from other countries will become a feature.

Ohio Awards

Dr. Keith Tyler of Ohio State University has announced that more than 400 recorded entries of programs broadcast over United States and Canadian radio stations last year have been submitted for the 15th annual American Exhibition of Educational Radio Programs. Awards will be announced on May 4. Entries by 146 individual exhibitors include 61 cultural programs, covering art, science, literature and music; 60 dealing with personal and social problems; and 47 special one-occasion broadcasts. Judging of the entries is handled by co-operative judging centres in various cities across the country, headed by well-known authorities in radio education.

Charlotte Russe
Elegant Party Dessert (Serves 12)

Choose a three-pint circular mould with plain sides and bottom. Line it with Lady Fingers, placing them like a rosette on the bottom and standing them upright and close together around the sides. Soak two tablespoons of gelatine in a quarter of a cup of cold water. Dissolve in two cups of scalded milk. Stir in half a cup of sugar. Beat three egg yolks very lightly and pour over the yolks some of the scalded milk, stirring constantly. Return the egg mixture to the hot milk and cook over hot water in a double boiler until the mixture coats the spoon. Remove from the hot water and cool. Add one teaspoon of vanilla. Whip three egg whites with a quarter of a teaspoon of salt until stiff. Fold lightly into custard. Turn the mixture into the lined Charlotte Russe mould. Place a layer of Lady Fingers on top. Chill thoroughly before unmoulding. Garnish with green leaves cut from candied angelica and flowers cut from candied or canned cherries. Surround with pink tinted whipped cream.
