**Hallman and Hiller: Prize-Winning Team**

LAST month, when the judges had completed their work of listening to the hundreds of programs competing for Ohio Radio Awards, they picked out six CBC programs and program-series for high honours. The series which won prizes did so on the basis of representative programs submitted. All in all, the prize-list meant multiple honours for several Canadian radio people. Producer J. Frank Willis was responsible for three major entries which won prizes for *Stage 52* and *CBC Wednesday Night*. Writer Joseph Schull prepared the scripts for two prize-winning entries and George Salverson for two others. Two of the prizes were a result of collaboration between two CBC men, Eugene Hallman and Arthur Hiller, jointly responsible for the short verse-drama *No Escape* and for the documentary series *Cross Section*. Hallman was the author of *No Escape* and he is the person who plans and edits *Cross Section*; Hiller was the producer working with him on both programs.

### **Cross Section, Hallman and Hiller**

EUGENE HALLMAN and Arthur Hiller of the CBC co-operate in putting on the air the program *Cross Section*, the CBC Dominion network documentary series which covers management-labour questions. In dramatized form, *Cross Section* presents all sides of various controversial topics, and to date there have been no accusations

from any quarter of unfairness. Each show during the last season of broadcasts brought letters of praise and numerous requests for copies of scripts.

One of the programs last winter was an enquiry into the setting up of a small business. The program presented two imaginary stores describing one that was a failure and another that succeeded. A few days later, when the mail began to come in, there was a letter from someone who was planning to

open up a business. He wrote: "Your program not only presented the issues which have already occurred to me but also gave me at least eight other points for consideration which I had not thought about and which, if overlooked, would have put me out of business before I even got started."

Hallman is the planner and script editor. He spends much of his time checking facts and finding writers. Documentary (Please turn to page 6)

Beatty left Canada in 1937 to study at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London. In addition to his stage work, he has appeared in motion pictures and is well known to radio listeners. He has appeared in many plays including *Lifeline*, *The Petrified Forest* and *A Bell for Adano*. Canadian movie-goers will remember him for his roles in *Odd Man Out* and *Captain Hornblower, R.N.* At present he is working on a new picture, *The Gentle Gunman*. Hockridge has made

a name for himself in musical comedy in England. He first went to the U.K. with the R.C.A.F., and during the war took part in a number of BBC shows for the forces. RELIGIOUS RADIO CLINICS

CBC Group Meetings Acquaint Clergy With Microphone Technique

The technique of speaking on the air, where the audience consists as a rule of a few people in a living room or den, differs considerably from the technique of public speaking, where the voice must be projected to fill a large hall. Many excellent public speakers find microphone technique difficult, and nowhere is this more evident, according to W. J. Dunlop, CBC supervisor of religious broadcasts, than among the members of the clergy who are called upon occasionally and infrequently throughout the year for

broadcasts in the various CBC religious series.

"Many of our ministers," Mr. Dunlop says, "have had to contend with poor acoustics or inadequate public address systems in their churches. Very naturally, they raise their voices and speak to the man in the back pew. But this is not good microphone technique."

It is for this reason that during the past year and a half the CBC has conducted religious radio clinics in an attempt to acquaint clergymen with the use of the microphone. Generally speaking, the instruction is designed to assist speakers to forget the man in the back pew and concentrate on the microphone, which leads in most cases to the man in the front pew, beside his radio.

The most recent clinic was conducted in Toronto on April 29, when members of the Presbyterian Church radio committee, which includes ministers, laymen, choirmasters and organists, met to hear talks by Reid Forsee, CBC producer, Roland Anderson, CBC operator, and Dunlop. The talks dealt with use of the microphone, radio writing and speaking, and the CBC religious broadcasts on networks and stations.

Dunlop and Forsee have conducted twenty clinics in the last eighteen months, in Ontario and Maritime centres. In the prairie provinces and British Columbia, clinics have been held by CBC regional representatives and producers. In places where there are no CBC studios, clinics may be held at local stations.

The race is run over a course of one mile, four furlongs and five yards. Both colts and fillies can enter, and the first prize is usually about £13,000.

**Our Babies.** A United Nations report on infant mortality in different parts of the world shows at least ten countries with lower death rates for infants than Canada's. Records for 1950 indicate that 41 Canadian babies per 1,000 died in the first year of life. Countries ahead of Canada include: Sweden (where the rate is only 20 per 1,000), New Zealand, Australia, Netherlands, Norway, United States, United Kingdom, Switzerland, Denmark, and South Africa. To let Canadian women hear what efforts are being made in other countries to reduce the rates of infant mortality, the CBC will broadcast an international series of talks beginning today. The first speaker is Dr. Maeve Kenny of England, a Fellow of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists. Dr. Kenny, who has a small daughter of her own, has worked in New York City and lectured at the Yale School of Medicine. Her work has also taken her to Ireland and India, and she has lived in Singapore and travelled in South Africa.

**Trial of John Horne Tooke.**

Adaptation by Alan King based on the verbatim transcript of the trial of John Horne Tooke for treason in

1794; Andrew Allan, producer, assisted by Alice Frick; from Toronto. Mr. Allan will be heard in the brilliant "summing up" passage by Erskine, defence counsel.

This radio adaptation was performed on Wednesday Night last year. King gained access to the Tooke trial evidence through the courtesy of Eric Johnston, librarian at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. The play uses the actual words of Tooke, Thomas Erskine, defence counsel, Richard Brindley Sheridan, James Fox, and William Pitt.

"The importance of the trial," King says, "lies in the fact that Tooke was a less dangerous radical and a more formidable opponent than his associates. His aim was parliamentary reform, along the lines that Pitt himself had once advocated. . . . He could have avoided arrest, but instead courted it. His appearance at the Old Bailey was his most glorious moment, and his course was justified."

Andrew Allan steps down from the control room (as in last year's performance) to deliver the great summing up by the defence—a *tour de force* for any actor, since he holds the stage continuously for almost half-an-hour. The courtroom scene is being reproduced as accurately as possible on the stage of the CBC Concert Studios at Toronto. The Judge speaks from a raised dais, lawyers move around the floor as they wish, addressing the Bench. The jury files in with normal sounds of shuffling, coughing, etc. No attempt is made to disguise normal courtroom sounds—clearing of throats, yawning, stretching, etc. Microphones placed around the set pick up voices and sounds. It sounds spontaneous, but is all very carefully worked out and timed. There is no music.

**The Prairie Gardener**

Summary of Broadcast of May 18, 1952.

**Making a Good Lawn**

1. A good lawn is the carpet of outdoor living space and as essential to the landscape of the home grounds as floor coverings are in a living room.

2. The best time to seed a lawn is in late May or early June when moisture is likely to be plentiful and the weather not too hot or dry.

3. The first step is to grade the area. Gentle slopes are permissible but sharp slopes are difficult to handle in a dry climate. Except for a slight slope away from the house foundations, level lawns are best to catch and hold moisture.

4. In grading it is essential to make all fills firm. There should be no soft spots likely to sink after seeding.

5. The seed bed should consist of six to eight inches of rich loam. Both sandy and very clayey soils should be conditioned with heavy applications of rotted manure.

6. To prepare the surface for seeding roll and rake repeatedly until a uniformly firm bed has been formed.

7. Broadcast the seed evenly and rake with a to-and-fro motion to secure even coverage of seed and uniform distribution. Then roll again.

8. Water with a fine spray if possible and keep uniformly moist until grass appears.

9. In dry areas or where water cannot be used sow seeds deeper and use (Continued on page 6)

CROSS SECTION, HALLMAN AND HILLER

writing, he points out, is not the easiest thing to do. So often a good dramatist has no idea how to do the type of research required for *Cross Section*, or else the person who is good at research is a poor dramatist. This means that Hallman often has to do considerable rewriting of scripts submitted.

Hallman came to the CBC from the Dominion Public Weather Service. His first encounter with *Cross Section* was in 1949 when he wrote a script called *A New Deal For Women*. It won a Canadian Radio Award. Then he joined the CBC and has been in charge of *Cross Section* ever since.

His interest in management-labour problems has been virtually life-long. He was born in Windsor, Ontario, where his father worked in a factory.

As a youngster, he saw the effects of depression on a one-industry city. At university he studied English, philosophy and history—and began his training as a writer by contributing to and editing a college magazine.

Hallman knows what he wants from radio writers who handle documentary scripts. People, he says, do not face crises with gesticulations and hysterical voices but as part of their daily lives, and they treat them normally, though perhaps with clenched teeth and tense voices. Documentaries must be authentic and that's what he is striving for.

Arthur Hiller, *Cross Section's* producer, seldom disagrees with Hallman. Hallman believes that Hiller's academic background in psychology makes him an ideal person to produce the show. Hiller is aware of the motivations behind the characters' actions and he is able to help the actors to point up not only the emotions aroused by the lines themselves, but the basic complexities that make the problem an important one.

Hiller was born in Edmonton 28 years ago. In the summer of 1946 he acted at station CKUA, Edmonton, and the following year joined the staff as an announcer-operator. He came to the CBC as a producer in May, 1949, but left at the end of November to complete his master's degree in psychology at the University of Toronto. Then he re-joined the CBC and has been with *Cross Section* ever since.

*Cross Section's* record is enviable. It won Canadian Radio Awards in 1948, 1949, 1950 (awards for 1951 have yet to be announced) and it won a first prize in the Columbus Radio Awards for 1951. Now Hallman and Hiller are planning the 1952-53 season, with their eyes on more laurels

Summer Sports

Racing, Rowing, Golf and Olympic Games On CBC List

**D**URING the warm-weather sports season, already well under way, the CBC plans to cover a variety of important events, ranging from Canada, and crossing the Atlantic for the Olympic Games in Helsinki.

Thom Benson of the CBC will broadcast daily reports from Finland from July 19 to August 3, on the CBC Trans-Canada and Dominion networks.

On June 7, the microphones go to Toronto's Thorncliffe track, where the Canada Cup Handicap will be run. On June 14, the CBC will return to Thorncliffe for the running of the Ontario Handicap. This will be followed on June 21 by a description of the running of the Prince of Wales Plate, a race that generally finds the winner of the Queen's Plate among the starters.

Hotspurs vs. Manchester

For soccer fans, on June 14, there will be an account of the match which two English teams, Tottenham Hotspurs and Manchester United, will play in Toronto. CBC will broadcast a running commentary on the second half of the game. On the same day, a description of the Olympic rowing trials will go on the air from Port Dalhousie, Ontario. On June 28, it will be Olympic trials again, with Thom

Benson at the microphone as a preliminary to his assignment in Helsinki. The season's golf broadcast start June 3 with reports on the Ontario Open from the Weston Golf and Country Club near Toronto. The final round of the Canadian Open will be broadcast on Saturday, July 19, from the St. Charles Golf and Country Club in Winnipeg.

The roving microphones return to Port Dalhousie on July 26 for the Royal Canadian Henley.

The balance of the summer and early fall will bring more broadcasts on golf and horse racing, with the added excitement of harness racing. One of the country's outstanding harness races, the Canada Cup Pace, will be described from Toronto on August 9. Golf gets back into the picture on August 23 with an account of the Willingdon Cup competition—a cup for which teams from nine provinces compete—and reports on the play for the Canadian Junior Golf Championship. Both these events take place at Vancouver's Capilano Golf and Country Club. The following Saturday, August 30, CBC reporters will follow play around the same course for a description of the Canadian Amateur.

**Back to Shakespeare**

**Radio Writer's Hope**

**Dr. Herbert White, CBC author, Makes Plea For Revival of Poetic Language**

Hard-headed, practicality, while doubtless useful or even essential in the production of good radio programs, may be carried too far, in the opinion of Dr. Herbert Dennis White of Winnipeg, author of a number of CBC drama scripts.

"I have noticed a tendency in producers to shy away from the colourful phrase, the striking metaphor—in short, poetic language generally. But is this necessary? What about Christopher Fry?"

Dr. White—a Ph.D. in both music and architecture of the University of Leipzig—sees the limitations of radio drama as similar to those of the Elizabethan stage with its paucity of sets and properties, and suggests that if the "wooden O" of the Globe and Curtain produced the mighty lines of Marlowe and Shakespeare, then the limitations of radio drama—which has no scenery at all—ought to have an equally good effect on modern writing.

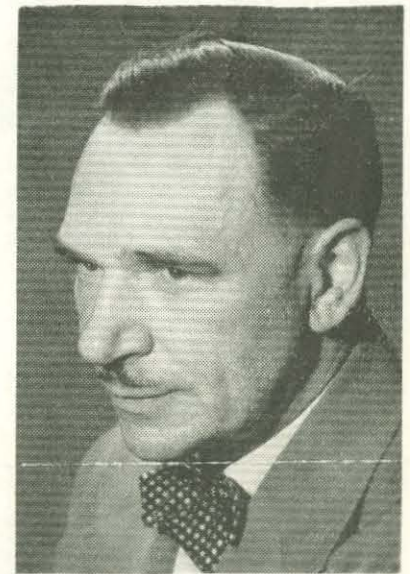
"Such magical evocations as the descriptions of Glamis Castle in *Macbeth*, of the cliffs of Dover in *Lear* and *King John*, or of the woodlands and thymey banks in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, certainly ought to have a place in radio. They set the scene, they establish the background, in the only way radio can—by the use of vivid descriptive writing."

Since settling in Winnipeg in 1950 as organist and choirmaster of St. Luke's Anglican Church, Dr. White has contributed seven half-hour plays

and a 13-weeks' serial drama to CBC. A number of his plays have had musical or religious themes—*Breakfast for Bach*, *Cassock and Cossack* (story of Franz Liszt), *Via Crucis*, *The Noel Candle*. *The Big Gravel Sifter* was an adaptation of one of Strindberg's short stories. For the CBC Children's Theatre he wrote *The Bremen Town Band*, adapted from the *Grimms*, and *Eagles Against the Fire*, an original story of a boy scout patrol. *Cook of the Seven Seas*, a vivid tale of adventure, ran for 13 weeks.

Dr. White's career to date displays an extraordinary versatility. His book, *The Singing Stream*, published in England, is an interesting history of vocal music from primitive times to the present. His work in oils and pastels may soon have a Winnipeg

showing. By virtue of his architectural skill he has a regular stint to do in a Winnipeg architect's office. He has conducted archaeological excavations in Sussex and Suffolk.

He hopes to develop his technique in radio writing, and has a keen eye on television. He considers Christopher Fry's *Phoenix Too Frequent* and *The Lady's Not For Burning* as excellent examples of radio drama because they have not been afraid of poetic language, but have used it with rare skill for the purpose for which it was originally intended—to evoke vivid scenes and images, and to impress the listener's mind with the essential things in drama, which are human character and its environment, real or imagined.

**Correction.**—In CBC Times for May 11-17, page five, it was stated erroneously that Bernard Braden "rewrote" Joseph Schull's *The Shadow of the Tree* as a stage play after it had been presented on the CBC as a radio drama. The radio version was adapted for the stage by Schull himself, and the stage version was then taken by Braden to England, where it won the London Little Theatre Award.
