bers in the Vancouver area. The panel will include journalist and critic Clyde Gilmour, Dr. N. A. M. MacKenzie, president of the University of British Columbia who served on the Massey Commission, and Alex Mitchell, a business executive. Many Vancouver citizens have been watching American TV programs and their own CBC-TV station will have been on the air just three weeks by the day of the broadcast.

TV Network

CBC Accepts Joint C.N.-C.P. Tender

Ottawa—CBC general manager, J. A. Ouimet, has announced that the Corporation has accepted the joint tender of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways to provide television network service from Toronto to Windsor and from Montreal to Quebec City. Financial details were not announced.

The Toronto-Windsor link will pass through Kitchener, Hamilton and London, thus making direct network service available to television stations in those centres. CP and CN expect to have a temporary link operating between Toronto and London before Christmas. The CBC is now providing CFPL-TV London, with network program service by means of kinescope, or film recording. Permanent facilities will probably be completed by the time stations in Hamilton and Kitchener are ready to go on the air, and then extended to Windsor as rapidly as construction conditions permit. The Quebec City link with Montreal is also expected to be completed in 1954, probably in time to coincide with the opening of a television station in Quebec.

The contract between CBC, Canadian National and Canadian Pacific calls for network facilities to be available eight hours daily and for such additional services as the Corporation may require.

FAMOUS MUSICIANS INTERVIEWED ON AFTERNOON RECORDED SERIES

CBC Producer Talks with Visiting Personalities

WHEN CBC Producer T. M. Taylor announced a new plan for his Concert Hour series (W-4:15 p.m.; Since November, when the plan was announced, the schedule of visitors has been quite spectacular.



The Concert Hour (CBW-4:15 p.m.; CBK, CBX-3:15 p.m.), normally a recorded program, is very much "live" for part of its time these days, as CBC Producer T. M. TAYLOR interviews musical personalities. Here he is with YEHUDI MENUHIN, celebrated violinist, in the studio at the CBC Building, Winnipeg.

K,X-3:15 p.m.) early in November, he had no idea how successful it would be. His plan was to interview musical personalities now and then during the program, and to play recordings of their music.

First to arrive was Yehudi Menuhin, celebrated violinist. Hard on his heels came Don Garrard, brilliant young Canadian baritone. Then, only a week ago, Gyorgy Sandor, famous Hungarian pianist.

The views expressed by these artists, Mr. Taylor said, were both interesting and surprising. Who would have thought that the principal complaint of such an artist as Mr. Menuhin would be that he seldom has an opportunity to listen to good music, and that a brief holiday at the Edinburgh Festival was one of the greatest luxuries he has enjoyed in years? Mr. Taylor remarked on Mr. Menuhin's clear and incisive voice and fine command of descriptive English, combined with extraordinary musical knowledge.

Mr. Garrard, the CBC producer said, is a young artist, greatly endowed vocally and with definite purpose and clear aims in his musical career. He is keenly interested in Canadian music and Canadian artists, (Continued on page 7)

VANCOUVER THEATRE. Four thousand years ago, during the Third Dynasty of Ur, there was a great upsurge of the Sumerians—that mystery people who came into Mesopotamia already civilized. It was a period of great splendour and of great power. All Sumerian cities were temple cities, in which it was believed that the patron god actually ruled in person. In Ur, Nannar was the god, and like other gods was conceived of as being completely human.

This is the background of the first of three plays on antiquity by W. G. Hardy of the Department of English, University of Alberta, which producer Raymond Whitehouse will present tonight.

Professor Hardy's first play, *The Beggar of Ur*, deals with a conflict between the beggar, Adag, and the high priest of Nannar, one called Kur-lil. Adag, captured from his home in the hills to work as a slave on the monumental temple (known as a ziggurat) had lost his right hand by command of Kur-lil. Adag has a beautiful daughter, who has been anointed as a priestess, and who may fall into the treacherous hands of Kur-lil—for it is he who chooses who will be the bride of the god Nannar.

Against a completely authentic historical background Professor Hardy has woven a story of treachery and intrigue that will take the radio audience back to the times of 2,000 years before Christ.

Exchange Programs

Canadian listeners had available from CBC networks 3,663 hours of service from the United States networks and the BBC during 1952-53. Of this figure 3,056 hours were contributed by the American networks and the remaining 607 hours from the BBC. There was a decrease of service from the United States over the previous year. The BBC figure remained the same.

A total of 35 hours of Canadian service was fed to three networks in the United States. Of the total, 33 hours were broadcast by the Mutual network with the American and National Broadcasting companies carrying one hour each.

THE POLITICAL NOVEL. In preparation for a radio adaptation of Joseph

Conrad's novel, *Secret Agent*, on January 13, CBC Wednesday Night this week presents the first of two talks by Irving Howe on the political novel. In the first broadcast Howe will discuss the works of such great 19th-century political novelists as Stendhal, Turgenev and Dostoyevsky. The following week he will concern himself with the moderns in the field of the political novel—Conrad, Malraux, Koestler and Silone. A former reviewer for Time Magazine, Howe is a professor of English at Brandeis University in Massachusetts. He is the author of critical studies on Sherwood Anderson and William Faulkner, and is currently working on a book on the political novel. He has broadcast before on CBC Wednesday Night, about new American writing.

Macheath is sung by Fabian Smith and Polly by Doris Gambell. A chamber orchestra drawn from the BBC West of England Light Orchestra, with Winifred Davey at the harpsichord, conducted by Reginald Redman; program linked by Douglas Vaughan as narrator.

The Beggar's Opera was first produced by John Rich at the Theatre in Lincoln's Inn Fields on January 29, 1728. It was an immediate success. The original run of this ballad-opera was 62 performances—a record for those times. It was revived repeatedly, notably in 1886, with Sims Reeves as Macheath, and in 1920 when a new version was produced by Nigel Playfair with new song-settings by Frederic Austin. Tonight's presentation is based on the 1920 production.

The plot centres around the fortunes of Captain Macheath, a highwayman and a pistol-packing gay blade who cuts quite a swath amongst the ladies in the gaming houses of London. His deeds on the highway continually land him in Newgate Gaol. But he always

manages to engineer an escape by making love to the warden's curvaceous daughter, until one day she discovers he is married and Macheath finds himself on the way to the gallows, singing lustily to a collection of female fans. However, in the nick of time, fate intervenes to save our rascal-hero and quieten the anxious fluttering in the bosoms of his followers.

ADVENTURE STORY. CBC Wednesday night this week takes a sharp look at one of the most romantic figures in history—Alexander the Great. *Adventure Story* is the play's title and it has been adapted for radio by Nathan Cohen from a story by the English playwright and author, Terrence Rattigan. J. Frank Willis will be the producer.

Without taking from him any of his accomplishments on the battle field, the play does strip Alexander of the man-god myth which has encrusted him for centuries, and reveals him as a human being, with all the accompanying frailties.

The drama begins in the tent of the dying Alexander as two of his generals are begging him to decree who is to be his successor. The only words Alexander is able to speak provide his own epitaph: "Whom shall I condemn to death?"

Then, as the officers, who have been with him during his short (he died at 32 of a chill) but brilliant military career, file past the deathly figure of their commander, Alexander's mind—still sharp and clear—reflects upon the glories he has achieved and the price he has paid for them.

Spurred on by a hatred of his father who had divorced Alexander's mother to marry again, Alexander set out to conquer the world at the age of 20, firmly convinced that he was invincible. But like all man-gods, he found himself cut off from humanity,

lonely and suspicious of those around him. Slowly he changed from a great leader possessed with a sense of humanity to a murderous despot who sacrificed friend and foe alike to retain the sense of power so necessary to him. The realization that he has exchanged his soul for the world comes to him at the height of his career, but then it is too late to turn back. Only on his death-bed is he able to leave the Olympian world he has lived in to return to humanity.

FORD THEATRE. Some years ago Enid Bagnold wrote a novel of a teen-aged girl who yearns to ride a horse in the Grand National steeplechase, and *National Velvet* became an international favourite. Then she wrote a play-version of the story, which was later made into a successful film starring Elizabeth Taylor as Velvet, who, disguised as a boy, rides a pet horse, the Piebald, to victory against the best horses and jockeys in England. Tonight's radio version of the story has been adapted by Joseph Schull. The script follows Velvet and her understanding friend, Mi, from the time the great plan first occurs to them, through the excitement of the race, to the exhilarating conclusion when the dumb-founded judges discover that Velvet won the Piebald on a shilling raffle, and that she was trained as a jockey by a man who never mounted a horse in his life. Another endearing member of the cast is Velvet's mother, Mrs. Brown, who swam the English Channel when she was 19, and knows both the sweetness and the fleeting nature of fame. But Mrs. Brown retains no bitterness, and in a crisis helps Mi and Velvet to pay the steep entry fee for the race.

Program Statistics

During the fiscal year, 1952-53, a total of 75,797 programs representing 24,926 hours were presented to Cana-

dian listeners over the Trans-Canada, Dominion and French networks. Of the total number of hours broadcast 78.7 per cent was non-commercial service, with 21.3 per cent of the total network broadcasting hours consisting of commercial service.

The Trans-Canada network carried the greatest volume of broadcasting, accounting for 66.0 per cent of the year's broadcasting hours.

The French network carried 23.0 per cent and the Dominion network 11.0 per cent. This latter figure for Dominion network broadcasting represents 2,750 hours, an increase of 264 hours over last year.

The 24,926 hours of broadcasting includes all program originations, national and regional, directed to stations of the three networks. It includes each origination of those programs which are produced "live" at one point, and must be recorded and re-broadcast in other regions in order that they may be heard at suitable listening times. To make possible the presentation of programs of special regional interest (the noon-hour farm broadcast, for instance), as many as six different programs may be broadcast simultaneously in different regions on the Trans-Canada network alone.

and spoke enthusiastically of his work at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto.

The bewildering life of a concert artist, who must travel the world over to reach his audiences, was aptly illustrated, Mr. Taylor thought, in a remark of Mr. Gyorgy Sandor's. Mr. Sandor recalled an occasion when he had emerged from a cinema in one of the cities he was visiting, and had had to stop and search his memory to remember what country he was in, and what language he should speak.

Mr. Sandor spoke warmly of his student days with Bela Bartok in

Hungary—"known, of course, chiefly for his compositions, but also one of the greatest pianists of his day." He studied also with Zoltan Kodaly. He referred to a recent concert tour he had made in Spain—"the audiences there are very enthusiastic, very sympathetic." On his last visit, he had with some hesitation decided to include some Spanish music, because "Spaniards tend to feel that Spanish music is something special, belonging to them, and that it requires a Spaniard to perform it properly." But the response to his performances of some pieces by Granados, De Falla, and Albeniz, had been quite reassuring.

Burton, England, on June 8, 1900, but came to Canada with his parents at an early age. He was raised on a farm near Vanguard, Saskatchewan. In 1916 he joined up and saw front line service with the 209th Battalion and other units until demobilized in March, 1919.

Minifie then studied at Regina College and the University of Saskatchewan and won a Rhodes Scholarship in 1923. He graduated from Oxford in 1926.

After kicking around Europe for three years he turned up in New York and got a job with the New York Herald Tribune. He's been with them ever since with the exception of three years in the hush-hush American Office of Strategic Services during World War II. A lot of this time was spent in psychological warfare in Sicily, Italy and Austria and for his services he was awarded the American Medal of Freedom and the British Order of the British Empire.

Reviewing his 20 years of reporting, Minifie lists as high spots his capture in Spain by General Franco's legionnaires and Moorish troops during the Civil War, the eventful weeks spent during the first blitz in London and his coverage at the same time of the great Parliamentary speeches of Winston Churchill.

Minifie's personable radio voice and a knowledge of U.S. politics have combined to give his comments on the Washington scene an interested audience on both sides of the border. He broadcasts regularly on CBC's "Capital Report" and "News Roundup."

Tape Recorders. - Tape recording has continued to increase in CBC recording rooms, while the proportionately smaller amount of disc recording remains at about the same level. As the operating load increases, the cost of tape recordings continues to decrease on a unit basis, and the capital cost of equipment is absorbed in a short time.
