### **Maureen Forrester**

"CHILDREN are marvellous," says Maureen Forrester, the young Montreal contralto. She's speaking from a professional point of view, of children as a musical audience.

"They are so spontaneous—quick to express their likes and dislikes," she explains. "As an artist you really have to give your best. And it is so much more satisfying when you know that they are pleased with your performance."

This has been her experience on a recent tour through Ontario and Quebec with Les Jeunesses Musicales du Canada. She presented 45 concerts before varied audiences, many of them made up largely of school children.

Fresh from her tour, she will give a radio recital this Monday on CBC Trans-Canada, in the *Distinguished Artists* series.



**Calgary Symphony Orchestra**

The critics have been generous in their praise of this Canadian artist since her first public recital in March, 1953. They have written of her rich and beautiful voice, her relaxed manner, the feeling she puts into her singing.

In fact, in a very short space of time she has risen to a prominent place, and is being compared with Lois Marshall as one of our most promising young concert artists.

Her first singing experience in public was with

church choirs. At 17 she began taking voice lessons, having already been studying piano since the age of five. But she did not decide on singing as a career until some months later, when her voice changed from a high soprano to a contralto. At that point Bernard Diamant, a Dutch singer and teacher who came to Canada four years ago, took charge of her training.

"He's a wonderful teacher," she says. "Seems to know exactly what you (Please turn to page 6)

Arthur LeBlanc was born in St. Anselme, N.B., where he received his first music lessons from his father. At the age of thirteen such was his virtuosity that the people of Moncton, N.B.,

sent him to Quebec City to further his musical education. From there he went to the New England Conservatory of Music, then to New York and finally to Paris, the latter being financed by a scholarship granted by the Quebec Provincial Government. In Paris where he spent eight years, he was a favourite pupil of the great Jacques Thibaud and won highest honours at l'Ecole Normale de Musique. Concert engagements followed in Paris, Belgium and Switzerland. In America Arthur LeBlanc has given more than 250 concerts throughout Canada and the United States. As a soloist he has played under Arthur Fiedler, Wilfrid Pelletier, Reginald Stewart, Desire Defauw and George Sebastian.

**A Big Opportunity For Janine Gingras**

Winner of the Grand Award in the latest Opportunity Knocks contest cycle on CBC Dominion, which ended on July 5, is popular vocalist Janine Gingras of Montreal, who commutes to Toronto every week to appear on the Opportunity Winners program featuring her with two earlier grand-award winners — coloratura soprano Lesia Zubrack and accordionist Paul Norrback.

As in the past summers, Opportunity Winners has replaced Opportunity Knocks in CBC Dominion's Monday-evening schedule, the main prize for each of the three grand-award winners during the winter being a contract for the summer series.

Miss Zubrack is from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, and is studying at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto. Norrback is a New Canadian, from Finland; he is living at present in Port Arthur and his contributions to each Opportunity Winners show will be fed by line from the Lakehead to Toronto.

During the summer, Opportunity Winners will also feature repeat performances of many of the original compositions by Canadian composers which were heard on Opportunity Knocks during the winter.

Runner-up in the contest which ended recently in Montreal was Claude Beaulieu, a young Montreal pianist who won the Prix Archambault in 1953; she plans to continue studying with the hope of eventually getting over to Europe. The other semi-finalists were Gerard Fournier, operatic baritone, and Svetlana Rajewsky, mezzo-soprano. She was born in Latvia and recently became a Canadian citizen; she was also a semi-finalist in Opportunity Knocks two years ago.





need to develop your talent, handles every one of his pupils differently and has the ability to bring out their best qualities."

Diamant has been grooming her for a concert career. He stresses the need for an understanding of what each composer was trying to express and lays great emphasis on diction—and these are points which the critics have mentioned since she began her public appearances. She says her experience has shown how important clear diction is when singing for children—for them an understanding of the words is essential.

Miss Forrester was born of Scottish-Irish parents and brought up in a French-speaking district of Montreal. As a result, she has been bilingual from childhood. She learned a third language while working with an Italian construction company to help pay for her studies. In her work, she had to converse with the labourers in the only language they understood and the knowledge gained in this way has

made it easier for her to interpret songs by Italian composers. She also speaks or understands Hebrew, Spanish and German.

She hopes to add to her languages next February and March, when she

will travel to Europe with pianist John Newmark on an exchange tour sponsored by Les Jeunesses Musicales du Canada. The countries they will visit are Italy, Spain, Portugal, France, Switzerland, Luxembourg, Belgium and Germany. She regards the projected trip as a great responsibility, as well as an honour, and feels she will be going as a representative of Canadian musical talent.

On July 6 she sang in the Chalet Concert on Mount Royal, with Wilfrid Pelletier conducting. This month she is singing at the Otter Lake Music Festival and in September she will take part in two Montreal Festivals presentations.

*Rule Britannia.*—The famous tune is from a masque by T. A. Arne, written (about 1750) for a garden party given by the Prince of Wales. Wagner said that its opening strain expressed the whole English character in eight notes.

**The Prairie Gardener**

Summary of Broadcast of July 18, 1954.

*Planting Lilies and Daylilies.*

1. Good garden soil that is not too alkaline, is well supplied with humus, and is well-drained, is suitable for most lilies hardy in the Prairie Region.

2. Drainage is essential. Lilies don't like wet feet. A gentle slope and a porous subsoil provide natural drainage. Heavy soil in level beds is likely to be too wet at times. Lighten the subsoil and raise the bed.

3. Humus from leaves, garden compost and peat should be worked into the soil and also used for a mulch on the surface.

4. The best time to plant is in the fall. Winter storage of bulbs results in damaged roots and inform bulbs in the spring.
