Writing in the September, 1977 issue of <u>Smithsonian</u>, Dr. Martha Kendall, who has a PhD in anthropology, with a specialty in American Indian languages, says that it troubles her that we know even less about Tonto than the Lone Ranger, who <u>tried</u> to keep his identity a secret. We know nothing about Tonto's tribal origin, we don't know where he came from (although the Ranger's origin is well documented), and he has no Indian friends. All we know about him is that he has a horse named Scout and keeps using the phrase <u>kemo sabe</u> from an unknown language when speaking to the Lone Ranger. Dr. Kendall set out to identify that language and explains her search to find the meaning of <u>kemo sabe</u>.

In my collection I have a recording of an interview with Brace Beemer, and when asked what the phrase meant, he said it was Potawatomi, meaning "Hail faithful friend." The October 14, 1939 issue of the <u>Saturday Evening Post</u> stated that Tonto was indeed a Potawatomi. Now this is a Michigan tribe, far removed from the Western plains and this transition was never explained. Following these clues, Dr. Kendall consulted an expert on the Potawatomi language who told her that it was really Tewa. The Tewa language has the word <u>sabe</u> which means "Apache" and <u>kema</u> which means "friend." As we will see in a moment, this won't work. She does speculate that Fran Striker, the writer of the show, ran across these words in a government publication and decided to use them even though they didn't fit.

Going with the idea mentioned above, and a few other clues, she decided that Tonto must be a "Tonto Apache," but then in one of his ad-

ventures Tonto meets Geronimo and can't speak a word of Apache to him, so that shot down that idea.

She took her problem to her colleagues at the Smithsonian Institution and most of them "white man" or "friend," but they seemed to base this more on the context of the story than any-thing else. Some, however, sug-gested that it might be a corruption of the Spanish guien lo sabe, which means "who knows, or <u>el que lo sabe</u>, which is "he who knows." If we accept this, we would also have to assume that the name "Tonto" comes from the same source, and "tonto" means "stupid" or "crazy." This would leave us with the Lone Ranger being a racist who is running around calling his faithful In-dian companion "stupid" all the time. She then decided that it must be one of the 220-odd Indian languages which were found north of the Rio Grande.

The next possibility that





occured to her was that Striker, wanting to research the area of the country where his heroes would wander, went to Arizona and visited the Tonto tribe (thus giving him the Indian's name). Had he done so, and had he held up a picture of the Lone Ranger and asked them to describe it, he might have re-"the one who is white," or kinmasabeh, "hey you, white rags." You can take your choice of these. We have already seen, however, that Tonto couldn't speak Apache.

Dr. Kendall has gone through numbers of Indian dictionaries and has come up with the following possibilities which Striker could have used if he heard them pronounced without seeing them spelled out:

CREE: <u>kemootisew</u> - "he is secret, concealed" which might fit with the wearing of the mask. SOUTHERN PAIUTE: <u>guima</u> - "stranger," plus the word <u>sautsi</u> - "to peep" which might refer to his peeping out through his mask.



OSAGE: <u>kemogezhu</u> - "red-breasted turtle." There really isn't very much that we can do with that one.

With that one. TUNICA: <u>koma</u>, which is to "comb one's hair," plus either (1) <u>sara</u> - "to beg or implore." or (2) <u>sari</u> - to "hate" or "detest." So, either the Lone Ranger loved to comb big heig or he bated it. He his hair or he hated it. He was fastidious or slovenly.

NAVAJO: (1) <u>kineedlishii</u> - "stink beetle" which is what Tonto might think after the Ranger spent the day riding wildly over the prairie on Silver



(2) kineeshbizhii - "dumpling" which might tell us

that the Ranger meeded to go on a diet. (3) kin yaah sizini - "whore." I have always thought it a little strange that these two men spent years riding around together, alone. Perhaps he was the original "Midnight Cowboy."

Now I suppose that one of you living in Buffalo might have asked Fran Striker before he died about his use of the phrase <u>kemo</u> <u>sabe</u>, but that would kind of taken the fun out of the above exercise.



With just as much info as the old "big" IP. find the new IP A-OK. And besides, it saves paper for our posterity





This of course comes out to \$1.87 per unit and is cheaper than I have seen it elsewhere. I spoke with their regional salesman, Mike Golacinski, 20030 Century Blvd., Germantown, Maryland 20767. (Phone 1-301-428-0795) Unfortunately, I could not qualify for a cheaper price either as a retailer or wholesaler. He had asked me for a tax number, which obviously I do not have, to get a lower price. Since I had ber, which obviously I do not have, to get a lower price. Since I had seen your mention of trying to get a good source of quality tape for mem-bers, I thought I would pass this along to you. Perhaps, with the volume that fellow members would use, it could be turned into a good lead. I like the Mod-Line tape and find it superior to Shamrock, with which I am not happy at all due to imperfections, flaking, etc. Whether or not this lead could be used, I do appreciate your efforts in attempting to obtain an economical source of supply for the membership, and I will be anxious-ly waiting to see if you can find a good source for our membership."
