

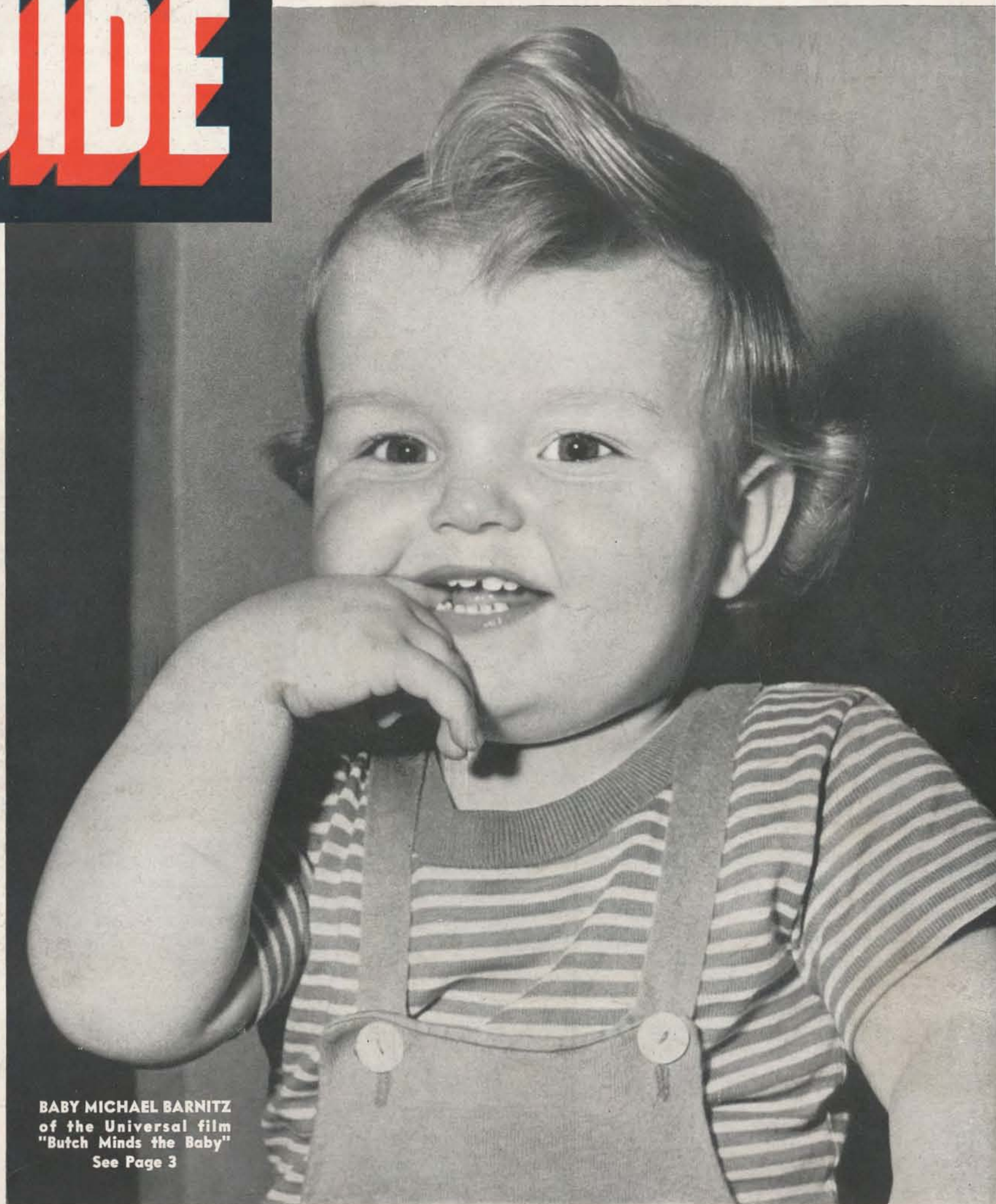

Scoop! Why George Montgomery Is Marrying Hedy Lamarr**

Editorially Speaking . . .

TODAY we're feeling pretty doggone smart. We know, for instance, that the first woman to sing over the radio was Madame Eugenia Farrar, the Swedish concert artist. We know presidential election returns were put on the air for the first time in 1920, that the first church of the air was heard in 1921 and that the first opera broadcast was made in 1923. In fact, there are many things about radio we know this week we didn't know before.

We've been assimilating this information in a not only painless but enjoyable fashion the past few days by reading a new book on radio just issued: "Sound and Fury," by Francis Chase, Jr. (Harper's, \$3.00).

Labeled "an informal history of broadcasting," the work is just that. From the wireless operator in Brooklyn Navy Yard who heard a woman's voice coming over the air instead of the usual dots and dashes in 1907 to a prediction of what radio will become when the war is over, the book is completely absorbing to anyone at all interested in this industry's history and background.

Francis Chase, Jr., the author, is a widely experienced reporter and facile writer who brings to this first book a wide knowledge of radio, much of it obtained as a staff member of this

very publication. It is authoritative in the sense that much research has gone into its preparation. It is good reading in that the parade of characters which it depicts is a colorful one, and the era which it covers is crowded with significant events.

The early days of radio and the conditions under which inventors struggled and artists worked are the most interesting. They are vivid, alive and hectic. Radio's more recent accomplishments are as yet too familiar to most to be as thrilling, but they round out a complete picture nicely.

Dr. John Romulus Brinkley, the fabulous Kansan who became known via radio for an unusual operation he developed and performed, and his battles with the American Medical Society make an interesting chapter, as does the radio history of Father Charles

E. Coughlin, the famed radio priest. Other personalities, milestones of broadcasting and interesting "inside" stories add to the book's interest.

All in all, "Sound and Fury" is a complete, informative, well-rounded history of radio and the personalities who made it. Anyone who thrills to the twist of a dial will thrill to the flip of its pages as the dramatic story of broadcasting unfolds.

LATEST radio show to spotlight entertainment for service men is "Your Blind Date." Beginning as a West Coast show, only a few weeks ago, program goes Coast to Coast over Blue Network April 20. Time: Mondays, 9:00 p.m. EWT. Emceed by Frances Scully, show features Connie Haines, comedienes like Brenda and Cobina, and Tizzie Lish, together with the Melodates. A movie star is also highlighted in a skit each week.

Unique feature of the program is that service men who attend the broadcast at Radio City in Hollywood really have a blind date in store for them after the show, when they dance with girls that emcee Scully invites to be their hostesses for the evening.

Soon as the program is over, the stage is cleared of mikes and other props, a juke box is set in motion, and boys take their pick of pretties on the stage to dance with them.

Another grand feature that Miss Scully has brought to the "Blind Date" program, styled for service men, is the letter read each week by a mother to her son in America's armed forces. A separate recording is made of this feature and presented to the mother by emcee Scully, which makes "Your Blind Date" show a national family affair for the boys.

WE'VE visited the Old Hayloft, home of the "National Barn Dance," before. We like to drop in there, because the Hayloft gang, with their genuine pep and good nature and their aged-in-the-heart music, have a way of making one feel welcome and warm-spirited. So we took in a recent special anniversary broadcast of the "National Barn Dance" to make sure the Old Hayloft was still the same. It was the tenth anniversary of the show's moving into Chicago's Eighth Street Theater, though the WLS "Barn Dance" itself, from which the "National Barn Dance" sprung, is older, in fact eighteen years old this week. The same old crowds swarm laughingly into the doors of the theater and fill it twice each Saturday night, though the show's admission fee is unique in broadcasting. In the decade of frolicking in the Eighth Street Theater, the stage of which is popularly known as the Old Hayloft, more than one million fans have paid \$662,000 to see the shows. And nobody ever asked for his money back. On two successive Saturday nights recently a survey was taken among 1,000 of the 4,800 people attending. It was found that 447 towns in thirty-four states, Canada and England were represented. And probably some of those in attendance had been visiting the Old Hayloft more or less regularly during the past ten years. They've learned that this rustic spot in the heart of metropolitan Chicago is a dandy place to shed cramping sophistication as easily as taking off their shoes. It's a fine place in which to forget the high cost of living and war for a while, and have some plain, lively fun

MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE RECOMMENDS: "Butch Minds the Baby"

HOLLYWOOD'S newest and most adorable discovery is lusty, apple-cheeked Harold Michael Barnitz, thirteen-month-old wonder boy who won a Universal contract in race with 150 other babies for screen job. Sunny dispositioned, only time Mike cries is when he's put to bed; then he sets up a yell. But after protest, he goes to sleep, isn't heard from again until morning. Mike's mother, a nurse before her marriage, doesn't believe in coddling, keeps him on a strict feeding, rest and sleep schedule. Says Mike's dad, Blair Barnitz, sales manager for a heating-system: "We aren't concerned over the idea of a movie career, fame, for Michael. The opportunities and advantages would be nice, but if it doesn't work out, we can still give him a good home and the necessary training that makes for useful citizenship." Studio executives who worked with Baby Michael were much more excited over his prospects than parents. Director Al Rogell even thought up speeches for him to make in "Butch Minds the Baby," until Brod Crawford (Butch) reminded him that kids of that age wouldn't be apt to carry on such adult conversation. "All right, all right," Rogell came back, "but this baby's a wizard." That retort got plenty of laughs on the Universal lot; that is until Baby Michael commenced doing his stuff, justified the director's praise of his talents. And when movie-goers hear Butch telling Michael how much he loves him in "Butch Minds the Baby," he isn't acting; for lines voice the feelings of "Butch" Crawford; as a matter of fact, everyone who works with Baby Michael.

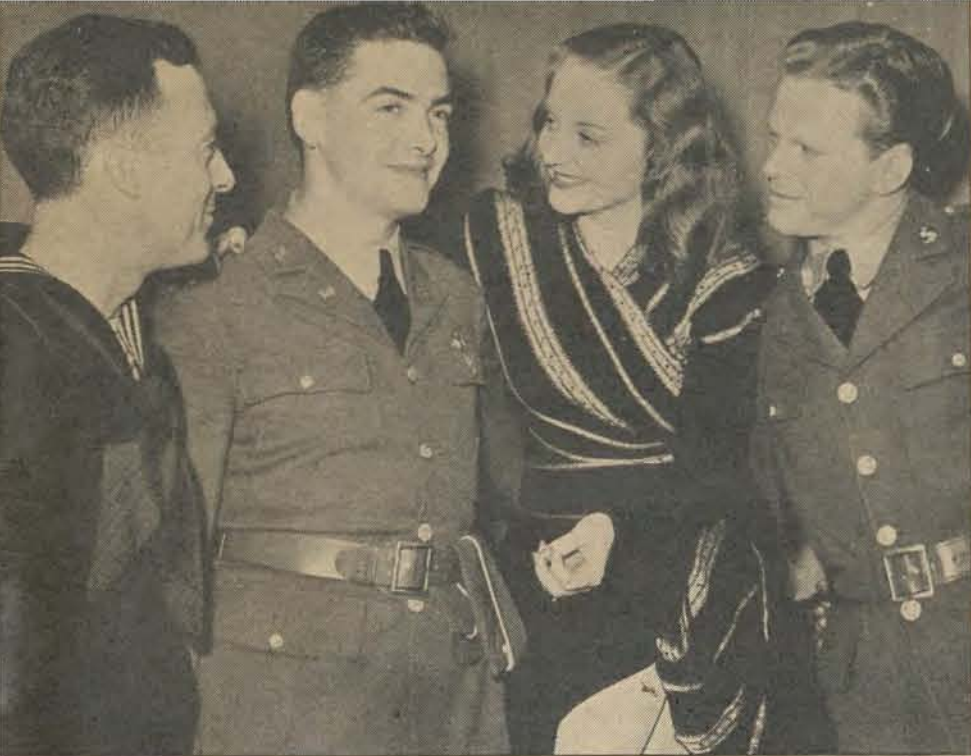
(George's next picture will be playing opposite Linda Darnell in "Orchestra Wife," which leads to the conclusion that his luck is really double-barreled on all fronts.)

Banishing Those "BIG CITY BLUES!"

NEW YORK with its throngs of gay crowds and pleasure-seekers is a legend to millions of Americans; but to newcomers it can be the loneliest city in the world, until they have found their special niche and friends to enjoy it with them.

This is particularly true of service men who find themselves in the city for the first—and often for a short—time, with little or no money to spend and nowhere to go.

Realizing the need for a home away from home for these boys, the American Theater Wing War Service, Inc., an organization headed by big-name entertainment folk, decided to do something about it and opened the Stage Door Canteen in former Little Club quarters at the 44th Street

Theater, just west of Broadway.

Open daily from 5 p.m. until midnight for the duration, all service men are welcomed, made to feel at home in gay, informal surroundings.

All facilities of the canteen are free to any man who wears the uniform of any of America's fighting forces on land, sea or in the air. This includes admission, refreshments, dancing, general entertainment.

Only time the general public was admitted to the canteen was the first two days the place opened. Admission to the previews was not by ticket but by one of following foodstuffs: One pound of cheese or sugar, a jar of peanut butter, a jar of jelly or five cans of tomato soup.

Quarters of the Stage Door Canteen

—once the Little Club, one of Broadway's night-spots during the 1920's and 30's—were given rent free to the War Theater Wing by Lee Shubert, veteran producer and theater operator.

Through the combined efforts and talents of the many theater crafts, the premises were entirely redone in a gay, but friendly, modern manner.

All services at the canteen, from those of highly paid stars to dish-washers, are performed by volunteers, drawn from the ranks of the theater and its many allied organizations. Added to these is an impressive list of free-lance newspaper artists, photographers and many firms contributing needed supplies for the canteen's upkeep. In fact, the roster of contributors indicates that the Stage Door

Canteen is all of Broadway and Radio City's salute to America's fighting men. It is New York's way of saying that the stars of stage, screen and radio are backing them up on the home front, doing everything they can do to banish their blues among New York's teeming millions.

As playwright Rachel Crothers, who headed the Stage Women's War Relief in World War I and is now president of the American Theater Wing, so aptly put it, "The whole purpose of Stage Door Canteen is to make a pool into which the entertainment world will pour its gifts for the men who are going to fight for us. It is the most direct way we can give our pride, our gratitude, and Godspeed to our boys."

The BARBOUR FAMILY

Continuing the Fictionized Version of "One Man's Family," Radio's Best-Loved Serial. This Third Instalment Brings a Happy Surprise, Grim Tragedy!

The first two instalments of Mrs. Carlton Morse's fictionized version of the radio serial "One Man's Family," heard every Sunday night at 8:30 EWT over NBC, under the sponsorship of Tender Leaf Tea, introduced readers to Father and Mother Barbour and their five children—Paul, veteran of World War I; Hazel, her father's favorite; the twins, Claudia and Cliff; Jack, the youngest son, and Paul's adopted daughter, Teddy. Trouble clouds gather when Claudia, left a rich widow with one daughter, Joan, quarrels with her family and rushes off to Europe; Cliff, the playboy, falls in love with a girl who turns him down; Hazel finds that her husband, Bill Herbert, is a victim of amnesia; Jack, the kid, gets interested in girls, and Paul struggles with the problem of being a bachelor father to Teddy. Mother and Father Barbour finally follow Claudia to Europe, find that she has really fallen in love with a Captain Nicholas Lacey, British nobleman. Reconciled with her parents, Claudia returns home, marries Captain Lacey. Their purchase of a ranch keeps family excitement bubbling, and Father Barbour is elated over the fact that Cliff has quieted down and become a partner in his Dad's stock-and-bond business. Hazel's problem isn't solved, but it has been lightened by a talk with Paul. Big question is, who will move into Claudia's beautiful city home, now that she and her new husband have gone to the ranch? For Claudia has

said that the first brother to marry will get it just as it stands for a wedding present. Paul, Cliff or Jack—which one will it be? Now go on with the story.—The Editors.

IT WAS Clifford who first moved into the house next door—the house Claudia promised to the first of her brothers who married. Clifford and his beautiful wife Anne. Her name was Anne Waite, the daughter of a professor of music, and she was a fine musician and composer in her own right. Neither Clifford nor any of his family, except perhaps Paul, had ever known anyone quite like her. She was like a gentle strain of music herself, so gossamer delicate were all her reactions to life. Clifford loved her madly, fiercely, but his efforts to approach her softly, to reach her plane of thought and feeling were obviously failures from the moment they were married. Anne tried and Clifford tried, but it was like trying to put a star in your pocket. They simply didn't fuse.

Some there are who can never face the world and its realities, who can

almost WILL a cessation of life rather than make an admission of its earthy, cruder aspects. Anne was one of these. The sheltered, almost hidden life she lived with her unworldly father had done nothing to mitigate her own inborn instinct for retreat from harshness of any sort.

The honeymoon, a trip to the Orient aboard the China Clipper, given them by Father Barbour, was thrill and adventure to Clifford. It was one long violence to Anne. A violence of her very spirit. They did not think alike, they did not feel alike. To Anne, steeped in a deep, almost Old World culture, Clifford's

brashness, robust vigorosity, was a foreign language. The things she held important, counted dear, were beyond his reach. He loved her music and stood in pleased amazement at her abilities, but he could not understand them. To

Clifford a swing tune was much more intriguing than a sonata.

For months the gallant efforts Clifford and Anne made for each other kept them together, but it couldn't last. They loved deeply but could only carry that love in their hearts; always seeking, never finding, a common resting-place on which to place their love; never any foundation for future years together. Anne perhaps suffered least in this maelstrom of emotion, for she had some escape in her music, her books, her tremendous mental resources. Clifford had none of these to soften the blow to his pride, to moderate his knowledge that he had failed hopelessly with this woman he loved.

Clifford's mind was a wide, straight road leading from one end of his life to the other. Anne's mind was full of little winding paths, small, secret byways wherein she and her broken heart might hide. There was no such retreat for Clifford, no spot on his open road where he could bind his wounds in hiding. They were there for all the world to see, and all of us in the neighborhood grieved with him when Anne returned to her father's

home and Clifford returned to the Barbour family home, and the house next door once more stood empty.

Clifford was like a lost child after that. Alternately sobbing his heart out and running blindly, madly, bumping himself into all sorts of hurtful situations and problems seeking assuagement of his pain. There seemed to be no end to the trouble he found, and no way his family could help. They stood by helpless until the night he drove his car into a maintenance truck on the San Francisco-Oakland bridge. The whole story of that accident never came to light, but this much was discovered: Clifford had gone to Berkeley to make one more effort to come to an understanding with Anne. The outcome of that last desperate effort for reconciliation was so final, so devastating that Clifford turned homeward dazed and almost blind with grief and hysteria! The accident on the bridge undoubtedly was caused by the strain he was under. That accident was to have a far-reaching effect on Clifford's life, for it left him with a silver plate in his skull. Years later, when the country's need for men was urgent, he tried to enlist in the Army and was refused. That was the final and perhaps the most bitter of the wounds received by Clifford as the result of his tragic marriage to Anne.

Clifford's grief, puzzlement and harassment reached a climax the day news came that Anne was dying. She died, the doctor said, only because she refused to live. Clifford had not even known she was to have his child, and his anguish and rebellion at Anne's death turned almost to hatred for the son she left. Mother Barbour took the baby, sure that in some way she could open Clifford's heart and arms to the little boy, all that was left to them of poor, lost, unhappy Anne. It was months before Mrs. Barbour succeeded in her hope, but the day did come when Clifford held his son in his arms. From that day to this they have been inseparable. Young J. D., alias The Skipper, as his father calls him, is four years old now and is the happiest, dearest thing in Clifford's world. The last four years have brought several in-

teresting girls into Cliff's life, but none so interesting that she quite measured up when with J. D. (John Doe), and so they departed out of Clifford's life as easily as they had come in. Jack and Betty had known almost since childhood they were destined for each other, and with no advice, in fact not even the knowledge of their families, they secretly married

... years before it became known. They had kept their secret well and had only giggled together when Clifford and Anne had moved into the house next door. Their house, because Claudia had promised it to the first of her brothers to marry. But only they knew that, and they never meant for anyone to know of their prior claim, but now that Clifford and Anne had left it, Jack and Betty moved in.

There were reverberations for weeks from Jack's family and from Betty's family. The children were too young to marry. To that the children blandly answered that they WERE married. Of course the tiny budget would not allow for children, or new clothes, or much of anything that required money but . . . who cared?

They had plenty of clothes anyway, just being together was all the fun they needed and they could wait for children until Jack's college education was completed.

There seemed to be no flaws in this arrangement except for a certain dissatisfaction Betty's mother began to feel at the economic straits her daughter must face. Mrs. Carter's attempts to influence Betty came to nothing, though, for Betty was firm in her decisions and very determined that she and Jack make their own way without parental interference. Father Barbour did not use his generosity as an excuse to force his opinions upon them, though he frequently offered advice, and that only some of it was put into practise he did not resent.

"Juke Girl"

Type of Picture: A little-known corner of the United States is explored, with exciting and entertaining results, in "Juke Girl," again co-starring Ann Sheridan and Ronald Reagan, who scored so notably when they were first teamed in "Kings Row." Others prominent in the cast are Richard Whorf, George Tobias, Gene Lockhart, Alan Hale, Betty Brewer and Faye Emerson.

This Is the Story: The truck-farming region of interior Florida, a section that has been little softened by the refining influences of current American civilization, is the locale of this tempestuous story.

Characteristic of the region are the rude "night spots," where cheap liquor is dispensed to the raucous accompaniment of blaring juke-boxes. Just as characteristic are the bedraggled "juke girls," who dance with the customers and encourage them to buy more drinks. Miss Sheridan is seen as one of these.

Reagan is an itinerant farm laborer who becomes a friend of a poor Greek farmer played by Tobias, and soon finds himself fighting valiantly with Tobias to break the grip which the owner of the local packing-plant has on the downtrodden community. This is a battle with no quarter. It is climaxed by the murder of Tobias and the imprisonment of Reagan on trumped-up evidence that he committed the crime. Ann has been an unwitting link in the chain of circumstances that threatens to turn into a rope around Reagan's neck. With the aid of Whorf, a former pal who has been fighting on the other side, Reagan beats the charge against him, and settles down with Ann on the farm that Tobias had willed to him.

Verdict: Strong, virile stuff, a guaranteed entertainment for film-goers who like their plots and their characters raw and unadulterated. But adult only.

It's a great record author Carlton E. Morse has made for himself with "One Man's Family." Take for instance the recent singing of Edna Fisher's "Great-Great-Great-Grandfather" song on the show, not once but several times. That was because Morse is sold on its power to inspire American patriotism . . .

By way of clever dramas with social significance and pointed morals, there is little doubt that "Big Town," starring Edward G. Robinson, is one of radio's most influential crusaders. But in addition to acting the part, Robinson lives it. Last week, Robinson announced the selection of Providence, R. I., as the winner of his Traffic Safety Award, a plaque provided by the star and which was announced to be given to the city of 250,000 or more population which during the past five years has had the lowest average automobile death rate. Providence rated lowest with 9.0 deaths per hundred thousand people, according to the National Safety Council, judges of the competition . . .

Thousands of Radio Listeners Will Hear "Siegfried Idyll" Over CBS on April 19; But the First Time It Was Played, Audience Was Just One Woman—Cosima Wagner!

ON CHRISTMAS morning, in the year 1870, a little orchestra took its place on the staircase of Richard Wagner's villa at Triebtschen, on Lake Lucerne, the composer gave the cue, and the music of the "Siegfried Idyll" floated provocatively through the house. Soon Cosima Wagner appeared. She leaned over the railing of the upper floor and gazed mystified at the scene below. Slowly it began to dawn on her that this performance of a new composition was for her benefit and she stood there enraptured with the beauties of the score. It was her birthday, and her husband had taken this means to honor the occasion.

Preparations for the event had, naturally, been made in secret. The orchestra had been assembled by Hans Richter, and only the day before Wagner had conducted the last rehearsal at the Hotel du Lac. On the eventful morning, the group did their tuning up in the kitchen with the greatest possible dispatch, lest the whole thing be given away before the important moment.

The "Siegfried Idyll" is one of the gems of the orchestral repertory. Wagner, at the time, was scoring "Siegfried," and for themes in the "Idyll" he utilized music from the third act of that opera, the slumber motive from "Die Walkure" and the German cradle song, "Schlafe, Kindchen, Schlafe," besides some other material. Oddly enough, the two chief themes of the piece, which originated in "Siegfried," had once been intended for use in chamber-music, but the idea was later abandoned.

A Coloratura Standby

The Mad Scene from Donizetti's "Lucia di Lammermoor" has been, practically from the first performance of the opera at the Teatro San Carlo, Naples, on September 26, 1835, a battle-horse of literature. The florid sopranos, from Fanny Persiani—who created the role of Lucia—on to those of the present day have reveled in the countless opportunities the music holds for them, since it is the display piece par excellence. We come across such distinguished names as Jenny Lind, Adelina Patti, Emma Albani, Christine Nilsson, Luisa Tetrazzini, Maria Barrientos, Amelita Galli-Curci, Toti dal Monte and Lily Pons in tracing the history of the opera's Lucias and all of these have taken full advantage of the Mad Scene's teeming coloratura.

Based on Walter Scott's novel "The Bride of Lammermoor," Donizetti's opera has been a favorite of audiences the world over for almost one hundred years. The composer, son of a minor government official in Ber-

gamo, Italy, was originally slated for the career of a lawyer. But he later turned to architecture, owing to strong artistic instincts, and then to music. His father, a practical parent, insisted that the composer give music lessons for a livelihood, whereupon young Donizetti revolted against what must have seemed an abhorrent idea and enlisted in the army. Luck was with him through that move, for his regiment was stationed in Venice and there he could take an active interest in the bristling musical life. It was in that city that he wrote his first operas, which served to win him a quick reputation as a talented composer for the stage.

Donizetti died at the age of fifty-one. He composed his first opera at the age of twenty-one. In all, he wrote something like sixty-five, of which "L'Elisir d'Amore," "Lucia di Lammermoor," "La Fille du Regiment," "La Favorita," and "Don Pasquale" have proved the most enduring.

New Approach to Opera via Films

IN THESE modern times, composers are vitally concerned with the creation of film music fitted for outlets via the concert hall and opera. Latest of these compositions is a score written by Miklos Rozsa for Korda's Technicolor movie version of Kipling's "Jungle Book." Rozsa, shown above with Sabu, hero of the piece, has contrived music that is unusual—a tentative approach to "film opera." Rozsa, with the NBC Symphony and Sabu as narrator, has made a series of recordings for Victor, with the score virtually telling the story of Mowgli's (Sabu's) dramatic exploits in music. Afro-American Union

Winner of such distinctive honors as the Harmon Award, a Rosenwald Fellowship and several Guggenheim fellowships, besides commissions from the Columbia Broadcasting System, Paul Whiteman and the 1939 New York World's Fair, William Grant Still is the best known of the contemporary Negro composers. Born in Woodville, Mississippi, on May 11, 1895, he began his musical studies at an early age, later took up work with Edgar Varese and George Whitefield Chadwick.

Orchestration appealed to him almost from the start, and he developed himself at the art, doing arrangements for compositions of W. C. Handy, arranging for Paul Whiteman's orchestra, for Don Voorhees and a number of Broadway musical shows. However, while this sort of work provided him with a comfortable living, he was most interested in producing compositions of his own.

Mr. Still came to a serious decision in 1925, namely, to devote himself to the development of the Negro idiom as well as to utilize that idiom in his works. Thus, following in the wake of that decision, he composed a symphonic trilogy, consisting of "Africa," the "Afro-American" Symphony (both dating from 1930) and the Symphony in G Minor (1937). It is interesting to note that "Africa" was revised no less than five times, such is Mr. Still's eagerness to perfect his writing. The "Afro-American" Symphony has graced the programs of a number of our major orchestras as well as several abroad.

Music for Films

These days composers are immensely concerned with the creation of film music that can also serve its purpose

in the concert hall, the radio, or wherever else there is an outlet for it. The latest of these attempts is the score written by Miklos Rozsa for Alexander Korda's film version of Rudyard Kipling's "The Jungle Book." Mr. Rozsa, we are told, has contrived music that is "unusual" and which "makes a tentative approach to that 'film opera' envisioned by some commentators."

He has even utilized such a device as the "leitmotif," employing one for each of the animal and human characters in the film. He has dwelt on "continuity of literary theme" and he has composed some "genuine symphonic sequences in the more spectacular scenes," so that "the score virtually tells the story of Mowgli in music."

Victor has already recorded the music, which rather evidences its importance. Mr. Rozsa himself conducted the NBC Symphony Orchestra for the recording, and Sabu, young star of the film, does a narrative commentary much in the fashion of the narrator in the Prokofiev "Peter and the Wolf." Previous to this recording the only music from films put on disks consisted of popular dance tunes and songs from film musicals.

Compositions of Mr. Rozsa, who is Hungarian, have been performed by such outstanding conductors as Bruno Walter, Pierre Monteux, Hans Lange, Ernst von Dohnanyi and others.

Some Recent Recordings

Columbia offers several interesting items in its April list, some of which we have already mentioned. There are others worth consideration. For instance, the performance of the Richard Strauss "Death and Transfiguration" by Leopold Stokowski and the All-American Orchestra is entirely creditable and scarcely out of line with the import of the music. Then Adolf Busch and Rudolf Serkin, an excellent violin-and-piano team, supply a thoroughly satisfying version of the Beethoven "Kreutzer" Sonata. Fritz Reiner can usually be depended upon to give a musicianly interpretation of any piece he conducts, and no less so with respect to his recording, at the head of the Pittsburgh Symphony, of three excerpts from Wagner's "Die Meistersinger," comprising the Prelude to Act III, the Dance of the Apprentices and the Procession of the Meistersingers.

POPULAR MUSIC

RED NORVO, who has been called "the greatest xylophonist in the world," though some of our concert artists might challenge that statement, has been a top-notch in the popular-music field for many years. He was born in Beardstown, Illinois, a town hard by the Mississippi River, whose excursion boats, in the not too dim nor distant past, used to feature some of the greatest jazz musicians of the day. Red was practically brought up on this "river boat jive" and is entitled to describe himself as a pioneer of this type of rhythm.

He got the xylophone bug when, as a youngster, he heard a movie-house xylophonist doing "wonderful things" with those sticks. This, therefore, became his life work. He had already had piano instruction, so that it took little time for him to master the xylophone. He later went to Chicago, where he joined Paul Ash's orchestra. In 1929, determined on a leader's career, he formed an orchestra of his own, pioneering, as early as that, in swing. Presently Paul Whiteman, to whom most of the modern jazz greats owe a lot, made him an offer, whereupon Red broke up his own group and joined the sophisticated orchestra of the "King of Jazz." In 1935, Red organized again a group of his own, which, with the exception of some reshufflings, he leads to this day.

Popular Records

It is only right to start off this section of the column with a favorable word concerning the first recording of the new Norvo band. They play on Columbia 36557 "Arthur Murray Taught Me Dancing in a Hurry," and "Jersey Bounce." What's more, Mildred Bailey, the incomparable, sings the vocal in the former. These pieces show versatility, for in the first named the playing is rhythmic, but not to the exclusion of the melody itself. In "Jersey Bounce" the idea is swing.

A fine and timely Victor album is that containing "Songs of the Service," including such spine-tinglers as "Anchors Aweigh," "The Marine's Hymn," "The Caissons Go Rolling Along," and other items representative of the different branches of Uncle Sam's armed forces. Leonard Joy conducts the Victor Military Band and the Four Clubmen do the vocals.

American Soldiers in Australia Talk to Their Loved Ones at Home

"Americans Calling Home"

AN ABSOLUTE program "must" for those who have sons, brothers or husbands on active duty "somewhere in Australia," is the new Australian program called "Americans Calling Home," which you can hear Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings at 6:45 a.m. or 10:20 a.m. CWT over VLG2 (9.54), Melbourne. By tuning in at one of these times you may get the thrill of a lifetime by hearing your loved one talking directly to you over ten thousand miles of land and water. On each program, announcer Braddon Mitchell introduces five or six soldiers who then take over the mike one at a time for a little informal one-way chat with the folks at home. Just in case you haven't heard this program yet here are a few of the things our boys are saying: "Having a grand time" . . . "The people here are swell. They are doing everything in the world they can to make us feel at home; showing us the sights and inviting us into their homes for dinner" . . . "The Women's U. S. Auxiliary Corps are doing a wonderful thing. You can get real American hamburgers and coffee at the Hospitality Centers" . . . "This is a country of wide open spaces. The scenery is grand. Wonder where the kangaroos are?" One fellow asked his dad to say "hello" to his dog for him, another asked his folks to pray hard that his tooth would stop aching—just simple little homey things but things that bring a real heart-throb and a sudden tight feeling around the chest to us here at home. The "Aus-sies" are grand people and we won't forget how they have opened their hearts and homes to our lads.

Timings and frequencies for the Australian transmissions to North America underwent some changes effective April 1. The new set-up is as follows (CWT):

To eastern North America—6:25 to 7:10 a.m. over VLG2 (9.54), VLQ4 (7.22).

To western North America—11:25 p.m. to 12:10 a.m. over VLG7 (15.16); 10:00 to 10:45 a.m. over VLG2 (9.54), VLQ4 (9.58).

"Voice of Free India"

A few days ago I received a letter from Mrs. Mabel Allen of Lafayette, Rhode Island, informing me that she was hearing a mysterious undercover station, identified only as "The Voice of Free India," nightly from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. CWT on a frequency of 9.40 megs. News in English—of a decidedly anti-British nature—was given at 9:10 p.m. CWT. Later, a West Coast listener, Harold Baxter of Berkeley, California, furnished me additional details concerning this station. He stated that "The Voice of Free India," operating on dual frequencies of 9.40 and 11.47 megs, was being heard very well there daily from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. and from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. CWT. The programs often feature anti-British, pro-axis talks by Indian leader Bose. According to an announcement over the station the hours of operation are to be

increased shortly. This is undoubtedly a Nazi-controlled station—somewhere in Asia or even India—whose sole excuse for existence is to sell Axis propaganda to the peoples of India, to confuse and divide them, to separate them from the British Empire.

"Bunk" from Station Debunk

Joe Goebbels seems to have an inexhaustible supply of tricks to use in attempting to put over his seditious Nazi propaganda. The latest and most corny of the lot is station DEBUNK. This illegitimate station is on the air nightly from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m. CWT on a frequency of 7.20 megs. The transmission begins with the piano melody for the words ". . . by the

aganda formula. The anti-British, anti-American, anti-Communist, anti-Jewish, in fact, anti everything but National Socialism talk which Joe gives is the same sort of Nazi propaganda drivel that Goebbels reels off his mimeograph in bales day and night. After Joe has talked himself out, there being no further excuse for the station to be on the air longer, announcer closes the broadcast with the statement that they will be on the air at the same time the following evening, the "Star-Spangled Banner" is played on the piano and the carrier vanishes. The whole program put on by this obnoxious station is decidedly amateurish in nature, the modulation is as rotten as the talks. The

dawn's early light," which is repeated over and over to attract the attention of the listener. As a variation the announcer sometimes whistles the melody and yells into the mike: "Tune in, please. This is station DEBUNK. Phone your neighbors to get tuned in on us. We will start our program in a few minutes." When the barker has gathered around him as big a crowd as he thinks he is going to get he starts the program off by playing a couple of noisy jitterbug records. At about 7:40 p.m. the announcer introduces the "soap-box orator" Joe Scanlon, who immediately starts in to sell his bill of goods. From here on the program follows the usual Nazi prop-

announcer tries to give the impression that this station is actually located in the United States, but this is extremely doubtful, as our Federal authorities undoubtedly are aware of the station's existence and could fix its position and make short work of it if this were true. At any rate, know this wolf in sheep's clothing for what it really is—just another outlet for Nazi propaganda. And remember the main purpose of their propaganda is to win this war—not for us but for National Socialism.

MOSCOW RADIO said many of the German prisoners that had been taken recently had not removed their coats or shoes since January 11 . . . The FINNISH RADIO—displaying sudden distaste for their Nazi overlords—was heard to predict that "China may suddenly rise up strong and Germany collapse" . . . The following message, purporting to come from a Guam Island prisoner of war in Japan, was read over TOKYO RADIO: "I am safe, uninjured and in good health, as are all of the Guam personnel here at Kobi. I get ten hours of sleep each day. My weight is normal, as I am fed on a balanced diet of American food. I am getting more exercise than I have had in a long time. Each day we are given more liberty by being allowed to play football and baseball in the near-by parks. I am being treated fine. The Japanese people don't seem to have any grudge against us." (Not bad, Johnny, but that ain't the way I heered it.)

Frequency Modulation

News on All FM Fronts Continues to Mount With Amazing Rapidity as Its Geographical Boundaries Stretch to Include More and More Territory!

By DICK DORRANCE

FM and the Deaf

THE unexpected discovery that FM programs can sometimes be clearly heard by persons who suffer from impaired hearing has brought joy to more than one handicapped radio listener. The wide tonal range, from the lowest notes to the highest, is able in certain cases to penetrate the veil of deafness. Recently a Columbus, Ohio, advertising executive heard his first FM broadcast, and this is how he enthusiastically described the experience:

"My hearing is a bit dull. In quiet surroundings I have to employ a hearing-device. When listening to the radio it is necessary for me to sit right next to the receiver or else turn up the volume so high the curtains flutter and the furniture begins to dance around the room.

"But when I heard the FM receiver this afternoon (at a demonstration) I thought by some miracle my hearing had been restored to normal. The demonstration was held in quite a large room, with heavy drapes and a thick rug to swallow up sound. (That's the kind of setting which proves toughest on my hearing acuity. Oh, yes, the ceiling was high. And that didn't help any, either.)

"Point of it all is that I heard the complete FM demonstration without hearing-aid as well as anybody in the room—yet I was sitting a good fifty feet or more away from the speaker cabinet. I could hear perfectly the full rich tones of the piano—high notes and low notes equally well. That goes for the music of the other instruments that were broadcast, too. The announcer's voice was clear and distinct—so effortless to listen to."

It must be pointed out here, however, that there are many different kinds of deafness. Obviously FM cannot be expected to give similar results in every instance, but there are occasional cases where the ear has become insensitive to middle-register tones yet can still detect and appreciate the extreme highs and lows of the sound scale. Full-fidelity FM is then beneficial and may be enjoyed.

The Geography of FM

Unfortunately the reception of FM stations is not yet available to everyone in this country. Most of the stations operate in sections where the population is densest, although the growth of FM has spread across the nation from east to west at a surprising pace during the past twelve or eighteen months. There will be more new stations on the air in 1942, despite grave difficulties in securing transmitters and other essential equipment. Most executives in the broadcasting industry frankly admit that

FM, like television, is slated for a brilliant career as a post-war industry.

The great majority of all letters from readers of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE contain inquiries about the location of FM stations, or the probability of eventual FM service in definite cities. To anticipate many more of these queries, even before they're asked, we offer the following breakdown of areas that today enjoy FM reception.

If you live anywhere in New England, except in the northern half of Maine, you may count on hearing one to nine FM stations, depending on your location. New Yorkers have a choice of six; Philadelphians, three. There is FM service throughout New Jersey, in both eastern and western Pennsylvania, around Albany and Schenectady, and in Rochester, N. Y. Chicagoans may hear three FM transmitters regularly; Detroiters, two.

If you live near any of the above-mentioned cities, or close to any of the following—within thirty to fifty or sixty miles—you should find FM reception good: Pittsburgh; Columbus, Ohio; Nashville, Tenn.; Evansville, Ind.; Baton Rouge, La.; Milwaukee, Wis., or Los Angeles. There are educational or experimental transmitters of lesser range serving these additional cities: Cleveland; San Francisco; Washington, D. C.; Springfield and Worcester, Mass.; Duluth, Minn.; Superior, Wis., and Kansas City, Mo.

Others A-Building

New FM stations have recently gone on the air in Boston and Pittsburgh. Others are expected shortly for Philadelphia, Fort Wayne, New York City, and a large part of the South (via W41MN, atop Clingman's peak in North Carolina). Service is authorized for other important cities, and many stations are actively under construction at this time. The FCC has approved quite a few FM transmitters that are not yet operating. Among them we find four in southern California; three for Chicago; two for Detroit; two for Jersey City; five in New York City; three for Philadelphia; and one each in Rockford, Ill., South Bend and Fort Wayne, Ind.; Lexington, Ky.; Baltimore; Springfield, Mass.; Lansing and Grand Rapids, Mich.; Schenectady, Syracuse, Binghamton and Rochester, N. Y.; Amarillo, Texas, and Salt Lake City.

Newsman in the News

Cecil Brown is a name you hear often when the talk is about correspondents who get into the middle of things and who speak out forcefully. For that trait he has just won the Peabody Award among newsmen. For outstanding radio reporting he was also honored a short while ago by the distinguished Overseas Press Club.

Brown's name is best known, of course, for his spectacular eye-witness report of the sinking of Britain's *Prince of Wales*, and *Repulse*, which he was aboard. But Brown has been in close on other momentous events. He was in Yugoslavia when the Nazis invaded that country. He started for Belgrade by automobile, was captured and later released by the Germans. He was expelled from Italy for his too truthful reports from Rome. He's the man who more recently spoke very plainly about Singapore, got himself barred by British authorities. Still more recently he has been talking straight talk from Australia, and he is now back in the United States with a militant reporter's picture of the war in the Far East.

Tall, lean and hard, Brown is thirty-three, married, a native of Brighton, Pennsylvania. He was graduated from Ohio State University, worked as a reporter on various papers until International News Service sent him to Rome, where he resigned to join CBS, with which network he has helped make the news with his reporting of the news.

through Asia and his book, "The Revolt of Asia," became a best-seller. The New York Times called him "the prophet of New Asia." And eight years ago Close wrote in his book, "Challenge Behind the Face of Japan," that America and Japan should not fight and that neither had anything to gain by war. But he wrote also of his conviction that the break would come and explained why.

Now there are those who say that if the public had heeded carefully the words of Upton Close these past few years, we might have headed off the Far Eastern war or at least been better prepared to engage in it. There is still much timely truth and projection of the future to be gleaned from "Challenge Behind the Face of Japan," and the book is therefore to be reissued by its publishers.

Upton Close was born Josef Washington Hall in Kelso, Wash., forty-eight years ago, of a French mother and a down-East Yankee father. In both official and unofficial capacities he has traveled much, investigated much in the Far East. He has also written and talked much about the Orient. He has written ten books on adventure, history, romance and biography, also over a thousand magazine and newspaper articles. He's now a special writer for *Reader's Digest*.

He's also on the air for NBC each Sunday. America is listening belatedly but intently to this realistic prophet. They're hearing shrewd and straightforward comment about the Pacific war and its ramifications. And they're hearing a voice already established as number one in that field.

In Hollywood her talent came to the attention of Irene Rich, who had the part of Pamela written into the "Dear John" script for the little girl.

Spring brings many things, and not the least of them is the circus. This traditional show continues despite the war. It's just another of the countless things for which we are fighting.

Bigger 'n' better than ever—The Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Combined Shows is making its annual visit to New York. From there it'll go on to Boston. And by the time the "big show" is ready for winter quarters, it shall have visited most of the big cities of the country.

The circus caravan is undergoing a change with the passing of the years. Time was when much of the equipment, after being unloaded from special railroad cars, was transported to the circus site by horse and wagon.

Now streamlined tractors and trucks are used. Even the special trains have been given the modernistic touch. Silver streaks of paint on the cars glisten in the spring sunlight as though to proudly show that the circus can keep pace with the rest of the nation.

This year the circus entourage will not be able to boast about one thing, though. Do you remember having read last winter of the elephants that died of poisoning? In the pachyderm department only, the circus isn't "bigger 'n' better." Last year there were fifty-five elephants in the gi-gan-tic show. Now there are only thirty-seven.

It might be several months before the circus comes your way—but it's on its way! . . .

Perhaps Joe Debroski, a sailor in the U. S. Navy, hoped to come to the attention of circus talent-scouts. For Joe is the youth who held an audience of approximately ten thousand persons spellbound in Times Square recently as he nimbly climbed up and down and around a sign about fifty feet above the ground . . .

Well, as many of us were speculating about the advisability of buying bicycles, the government placed a surprise ban on the sale of two-wheelers. Besides using bicycles for practical duties around town, many persons were thinking of all the fun they'd have pedaling around the countryside. Although he makes the reader well aware of the negligence of the democracies in this field, he does include enough to give one the impression that we've almost caught up with the Axis this time, and that there are definite things we could do to make up for our period of neglect.

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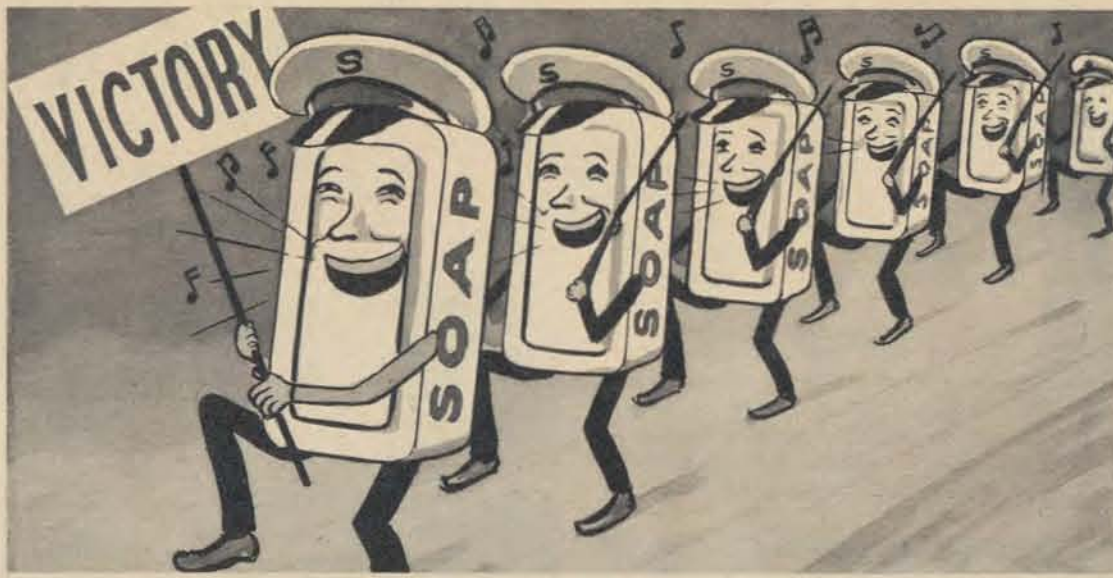

WHAT'S COOKING!

By GEORGIA SCOTT

Livening Up Leftovers

ANYBODY can cook superlative meals if they can spend as much money as they want to; there's no special art involved in preparing a luscious porterhouse steak. But the woman on a limited budget who is able to make superlative meals using thrift cuts of meat and leftovers is a real artist. She'll never win any fancy medals, but she'll have the undying devotion of her husband and children.

It's more than ever important now to conserve foods, and the smart housewife daily is learning new tricks for old foods. It takes imagination and considerable culinary skill to convert a day-before-yesterday roast-end into a new and savory dish, and it's one of the most-rewarding experiences a cook can have. That old roast, that ham-bone, that chicken skeleton, the water you cooked the vegetables in, leftover vegetables—all of these are finding second lives in soup-pots. Meat loaves, ragouts, croquettes, casseroles—these are the second- or third-day havens for leftovers.

Take a look at the ham-and-veal pie (right); any member of your family who turns up his nose at that deserves to go to bed without any supper for a week. The ingredients are simple and you can substitute other meats and vegetables if you don't happen to have the ones on hand called for in this recipe:

- 2 cups diced cooked veal
- 1 cup diced cooked ham
- 1/2 cup diced cooked potatoes
- 1/2 cup cooked peas
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/2 cup cooked sliced carrots
- 1/2 cup leftover gravy
- 1/2 salt and season to taste
- 1/2 biscuit dough

Combine meat, vegetables and gravy in a kettle and season to taste, as Rise Stevens is doing above. She adds bay leaf, a sprig or so of parsley, and some herb seasonings to this dish. Heat to boiling and turn into a casserole. Meanwhile cut your biscuit dough into whatever fancy shapes that please you. Bake in a hot oven (450) until the biscuits are thoroughly done. (About twenty minutes.) This will serve about four or five.

Another delicious casserole dish for leftover ham or other roast meat is to arrange in layers in a baking-dish 2 cups diced potatoes, 1/2 cup diced carrots, 1 cup diced cooked ham. Then pour over this 1 can condensed cream-of-mushroom soup with 1/2 cup milk. Season to taste and bake in a moderate oven (350).

And here is an appetizing beef-croquette recipe prepared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture:

- 2 cups ground lean cooked beef
- 1 cup mashed potatoes
- 3 tablespoons gravy or stock
- 1 tablespoon onion juice
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 tablespoon butter
- Tabasco sauce
- salt
- pepper
- dry grated bread crumbs
- 1 egg beaten up with 1 tablespoon water
- fat for deep frying

Cook the parsley in butter and mix with the meat, potato, gravy and other seasonings thoroughly. Mold into croquette shapes. Dip into the egg mixture, roll in bread crumbs, and let stand an hour or longer to dry the coating. Heat the fat in a deep vessel to 350 or until a cube of bread browns in forty seconds. Place two or three croquettes at a time in a frying-basket and lower into the hot fat until they are golden brown. Drain on a sheet of brown paper. Serve hot with parsley garnish and tomato sauce.

Don't throw out stale bread. It comes in handy for so many uses, like that above, or in meat loaves, or for sprinkling on top of a baked dish. Crosby Gaige, one of our honorary judges, suggests this use: "Cube your stale bread and fry it in drippings or other fat. Drain on brown paper. Serve warm on French spinach (cooked spinach put through a grinder, a little stock and nutmeg added and the whole thing slightly thickened in the reheating)." Mr. Gaige says also that you can give new life to waste odds and ends of cooked vegetables by blending them with sauces. Curry sauce for one. Or pink a white sauce with plenty of paprika and toss in the green vegetables.

These are just a few suggestions for making good, tempting dishes out of leftovers. You probably have a lot more ideas; if you want to pass them along to me, and they're really good, I'll pass them along to other readers.

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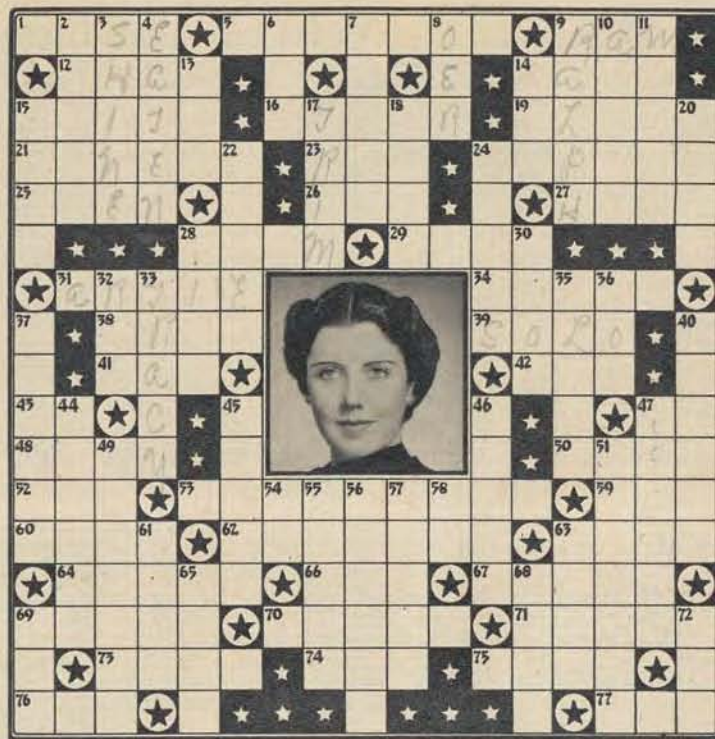
