MR. & MRS. MINIVER'S BOMB-SHELTER

VIVID true-to-life picture of how just plain folks handle the situation when their homes are bombed in England is shown in M-G-M's film "Mrs. Miniver," based on Jan Struther's great novel, a story about an average English woman of the middle classes who faces war, its horrors on the home front with quiet courage and an unshakable faith in the future. Greer Garson, as Mrs. Miniver, makes the role vitally real. Co-starred with her is Walter Pidgeon. Together they make the same ideal team they did in "Blossoms in the Dust," another story based on the life of a real woman. With William Wyler directing the film, M-G-M has an unbeatable combination for another unforgettable picture. To get an authentic reproduction of patented type of shelter in bombing sequences, exact plans direct from England were used.

Only change in model for "Mrs. Miniver"—it had to be built larger to accommodate six-foot-four Mr. Miniver (Pidgeon), as standard is only six feet. Since a shelter of this type is buried several feet underground and covered with earth, sandbags, the shock of a large bomb landing close by causes a tremor much like that in an earthquake. To get this effect in picture, the sets were sharply jarred to time exactly with explosions. The English have learned to make these cellars as homey as possible. An exact replica of those in use today in England, Mr. and Mrs. Miniver's bomb-shelter is an excellent example for American moviegoers to copy should the bloody arrow of war point to invasion of America!



Type of Picture: Melodrama based upon activities of saboteurs during war-time.

This Is the Story: Under mysterious circumstances fire breaks out at an airplane factory, kills a young worker. His buddy, played by Robert Cummings, is falsely accused, escapes and sets out to find the real saboteur. Before long he uncovers the trail to a gang operating all over the country. Because the police won't believe his story, he sets out to bring them in single-handed. When a girl (Priscilla Lane) tries to deliver him to the police, Cummings takes her along with him, proves to her that the next job of sabotage is to be a huge dam.

Verdict: Splendid performances by Robert Cummings and Priscilla Lane.

"The Wife Takes a Flyer"

Cast: Joan Bennett, Franchot Tone, Allyn Joslyn, et al. A Columbia Picture.

Type of Picture: This is an anti-Axis farce-comedy which really kids the stuffed shirts right off the Germans, Japs and Italians. Satire and slapstick galore hold no punches for the dictators and the dictated to.

This Is the Story: In Holland an RAF flyer (Franchot Tone) is brought down but sheltered by a Dutch family, who tell a Nazi major (Allyn Joslyn) living with them that the Englander is their son, released from a sanitarium and soon to be divorced by his "wife" (Joan Bennett), who also lives with them. The major, taking advantage of the marital rift he foresees, or thinks he does, tries to make what he thinks is love in a very broadly comic lavender manner, and flyer Tone, feigning intermittent insane spells, keeps the major in place, wins Joan, acquires valuable military information and escapes with it and Miss Bennett to England to rejoin his squadron.

Verdict: This will help both Tone and Miss Bennett, but the picture really establishes Joslyn, who steals every scene he shares.—Family.

New York Studios Under Strict War-Time Regulations; "O. M. F." Gives New San Francisco Studios Ticket Trouble; Zero Mostel Is Plus Quantity

WASHINGTON

I read this just the other day: "The god of war hates those who hesitate." Euripides said that several thousand years ago.

No phrase could better express the philosophy of successful war. Perhaps, if the French had read Euripides, their own fate might not be in the hands of the Hun.

Which leads to a question that residents of this war capital debate regularly. It was asked in the leading article of the April *Reader's Digest*, "Are We Awake—Even Yet?"

As I drive to work, the evidence of war is all along my way. At the Potomac's edge, just below this suburban community, a trailer-camp is crowded with cars and people from every state in the land. Some of them are war workers, many are wives and children who have come to be near Fort Belvoir and their soldier-husbands and fathers.

At the new Washington airport, sentries parade with naked bayonets about the gasoline tanks. A hundred yards from the giant airport building, a half-dozen temporary buildings are rising out of the red Virginia clay and hundreds of men and trucks mingle with steam cranes and snorting power shovels as this emergency structure is born.

At the railroad bridge which connects the South and Washington, more

bayonets gleam in the sun. Soldiers in tin hats watch every car. Over to the right, a half-dozen khaki tents are pitched at the river's edge. Before them, ditches have been dug in the earth. Potomac fox-holes.

Against the sky, one sees the up-tilted barrels of machine-guns and the silhouetted helmets of watchers who wait for the air attack we all expect.

Further along, beyond what was the old Washington airport, is a monster shape which is still shrouded in scaffolding. It has risen like a mountain out of the plain until now it dominates the distance like a titanic sleeping elephant. At night, lights blaze all about it, even during blackouts, because this building must be finished. It will be the new home of the War Department and it will contain twenty thousand persons. No other office building in the world is so large.

Across the Arlington Memorial Bridge in Washington, D. C., the famous reflecting pool between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial once stretched a glassy surface, but now even its mirrored beauty has been violated. Two slim and ugly bridges, battleship gray, reach across the center of its two-blocks-long length so that war workers may hurry their work.

NEW YORK

If you plan to visit the broadcasting studios in New York this summer, don't be surprised at the very strict war regulations imposed by the broadcasting companies. Groups of visitors are closely watched while on the studio tours. No longer are they permitted to visit the master control-room at Radio City. This room, which had been partitioned with heavy glass, now is boarded up. There haven't been any known instances of sabotage of radio stations in this important broadcasting center and there won't be. Special police details at CBS and Radio City have been on the job since shortly after December 7. But all visitors, unless in the group tours, must show special passes before they are permitted to the studio section of NBC and the Blue networks. At CBS access to the studios is somewhat easier during the daytime than in the evening, but it is impossible to get by the doorman unless you have a broadcast ticket or CBS building pass. Unlike Radio City's broadcasting companies, CBS doesn't have any regular studio tours. The only way one may visit CBS is to write well in advance to CBS, 485 Madison Avenue, for broadcast tickets. Be sure to state when you expect to be in New York and how many tickets you want...

Within the last two months there has emerged a triple-threat entertainer who really started with nothing. At least, his name is Zero—Zero Mostel. January and February of 1942 came and went and Zero still didn't mean anything—mathematically or otherwise. Shortly afterward, patrons of a New York night-club called Cafe Society Downtown watched him in his professional debut. There he was—chubby-faced Zero imitating "a man in Hollywood named Charles Boyer."

His routine led him into a zany narration about a man who baffled a dentist because on one side of his mouth he had a perfect set of teeth, and on the other side: "One tooth, no tooth, half a tooth, one tooth, no tooth, half a tooth" et cetera. This monolog, which Zero chants as he runs a finger along one side of his mouth, is catchy, and spectators found themselves joining the chant. And then the punch line, to wit: "Why shouldn't I have one tooth, no tooth, half a tooth (et cetera), when I only talk out of one side of my mouth?" credited Mr. Mostel with one of the best night-club specialties since prewar days.

Zero's night-club locale was changed from Cafe Society Downtown to Cafe Society Uptown. Both clubs are owned by the same man, but Cafe Society Uptown is the super supper-club. Like the Downtown devotees, the Uptown's ultra-smart following acknowledged with complete unanimity that Zero Mostel's antics were smart and refreshing.

When the "Basin Street" program on the Blue Network revised its format to include a comedian, Zero got the nod, and now his personality is offered on a nation-wide basis. Two weeks later, he appeared before a Broadway audience in the new play called "Keep 'Em Laughing" and proved to be the hit of the show.

Interview With Sixteen-Year-Old Violinist Dolores Miller Reveals One Youthful Prodigy Capable of Dividing Interest in Good Music With Sports

WINNING prizes is a habit for Dolores Maurine Miller, sixteen-year-old violinist from Livermore, California. Her latest was the scholarship sponsored jointly by the NBC, the Juilliard School of Music and the National Federation of Music Clubs. But four times previously, young, alive and personable Miss Miller had waltzed off with top honors in competitions that were scarcely sinecures.

A healthy, sturdy-looking youngster, Miss Miller admitted quite proudly that her favorite sport is baseball.

"And I play with a hard ball, too," she said, "you know, a regulation baseball. The softball stuff is for sissies."

She knows the names and records of the major league stars, her favorites, of course, being the Di Maggios, sensational California phenoms (with apologies to sports department vernacular).

Her favorite team?

"Why, the Yankees. Isn't Joe Di Maggio the works on that club?"

But Miss Miller made it quite clear that she was speaking of major-league teams. Her heart really belongs to the San Francisco Seals, well-known minor-league outfit, which served as cradle for a number of stellar players, including the Di Maggios.

By this time one began to get the idea. The young Californian worships her state and everything connected with it—even the "mists," which we call hurricanes in the East, with due apologies, this time, to West Coast sensibilities.

When we kidded Miss Miller—who doesn't take it too easily, you can wager—she said it was sabotage that made people talk that way about her

native state. We might add she seemed a little pugnacious about it, too.

It is no effort at all for Miss Miller to leap from baseball or boxing or tennis, other favorite sports of hers, to music. Her enthusiasm remains the same, no matter what the subject. We found that out.

"I PREFER Bach to all other composers," she said in stride. "If you can play Bach, you can play anybody; really play, I mean. I don't think I have ever heard Bach played well. Usually you get too much form and too little expression in the performances of his music by even the best artists. I think Bach was very human.

He had feeling, too, and it's all in his music. It's up to the interpreter to bring it all out."

Miss Miller finds it harder to perform small pieces with orchestra than the big concertos. "In the small items," she related, "the orchestration, no matter how good, always appears to be heavy. It drags. Such numbers I like to play with piano accompaniment. In the big works, naturally, you want to get more powerful, more dramatic effects, and the orchestra helps like anything to put them across. And I wouldn't want to play the big compositions with piano. That would be reducing them to too small a frame."

We asked her if she had ever been

bitten by the composing-bug.

"No, I don't want to compose. At least, I don't feel that way now," she explained. "You have to walk by the river in the moonlight to do that sort of thing. Anyway, the way they're writing music now doesn't make me want to take it up. I guess I'm too young, or maybe I haven't got the ability or something. I just want to play music, the best music, that's all."

One of her most exhilarating experiences, to be alliterative about it, was going to the circus in New York. She made friends with one of the young dancers in the elephant ballet number.

"Her name is Betty Jean Tull," Miss Miller told us. "Gee, she was wonderful. What a thrill I got when she passed by the seats Mother and Dad and I were sitting in and not only smiled but actually waved at us. Boy, that's something."

"And then I met one of the clowns. Gee, he was funny. We took pictures together and all. I got lots of autographs from the people in the circus."

The young violinist's mother, her first teacher, incidentally, recounted the hair-raising adventures they had had in New York revolving doors, thanks to her daughter's curiosity.

"Sure," said Dolores, "I had a swell time going around in circles. Our revolving doors back home are too slow. And you ought to see the fun I had on escalators, too."

"You mean California's revolving doors aren't as good as New York's?" we asked.

Miss Miller—she was definitely Miss Miller now—said starchily and with a touch of hauteur, "You can say for me as follows, 'To the public of New York: California is a great state.'"

We left this lovable girl with an altogether different conception of youthful prodigies. Not all of them, we thought, spend their lives on billowy clouds, lost in meditative contemplation, and far, far removed from the world. Some of them, it was obvious, live right among us.

Music Is Music

It is beginning to dawn on many music-lovers that the playing of symphonic bands often comes up to the most exacting requirements. We could mention any number of such organizations holding forth in most authoritative fashion, some of which, however, do not appear regularly on the radio. But there are enough excellent ones to warrant a listener's time. There is the U. S. Army Band, which plays under Capt. Thomas F. D'Arcy's direction over the Blue Network, the Royal Canadian Air Force Band, also on the Blue Network, and the U. S. Navy Band, heard over CBS. There are others, of course, some of them doing deeds of derring-do over local stations. The surprise in store for the uninitiated listener is the skill and finished effectiveness with which music can be played by a symphonic band. These are war times, and, naturally, they are reflected in the bands' programs, but they do perform repertory music and in most satisfactory fashion. Besides, patriotic and martial pieces possess more than ever the ability to stir the pulse. Tune in.

(The U. S. Army Band may be heard on the Blue Network Tuesday, the U. S. Navy Band broadcasts over CBS on Tuesday and the Royal Canadian Air Force Band is on the Blue Network Saturday.)

Mozart-Schubert

The Philharmonic-Symphony having ended its radio concert series for the season, we shall be discussing frequently the programs of the Columbia Broadcasting Symphony, which has taken the Sunday afternoon spot on CBS formerly occupied by the famous New York concert hall orchestra.

We notice, for instance, that Howard Barlow has scheduled a Mozart-Schubert program for May 10, and with his usual good judgment he has listed an unfamiliar work of Mozart's, "Ascanio in Alba," besides the G Minor Symphony, No. 40. Schubert is represented by the Seventh Symphony.

"Ascanio in Alba," a "serenata" or "festa teatrale," was composed for the marriage in October, 1771, of the Archduke Ferdinand to Princess Maria Ricciardi Beatrice of Modena. It was staged on October 17 with phenomenal success, so much so that it was given much more frequently than "Ruggiero," which had been commissioned from Metastasio, the famous poet and dramatist, and Hasse, then riding high as a composer.

(Howard Barlow will conduct the Columbia Broadcasting Symphony in a Mozart-Schubert program Sunday afternoon over CBS.)

POPULAR MUSIC

THE phonograph record shortage, which may be brought about by the WPB rationing of shellac, will undoubtedly have an influence on the whole industry of music. Leonard G. Feather, noted swing authority, has hopes, however, for the survival of swing. He says, logically enough, "There is a better chance now that good jazz may be able to find its rightful place, for quality will have to replace quantity."

He points out that jazz took the worst blows of a slump with something like flying colors once before. "The phonograph was virtually out of fashion in the early 1930's as a medium of popular entertainment. Sales, then, were far lower than they will be in 1942 or 1943. Yet all through that period, jazz continued to be recorded, and it was around 1935, when Benny Goodman started the whole swing craze, that the industry underwent a surprise renaissance.

"With the advent of the Goodman era, records of the kind that had previously appealed to only a few specialists now reached five- and later six-figure sales. The phonograph, more than any other influence, was responsible for making the whole world swing-conscious. For a while the demand for recorded jazz was greater abroad than it was here, and several series of disks were recorded here especially for export. Even today, despite the shipping difficulties, American swing records are constantly in demand abroad. Nothing as firmly established as swing can be knocked out by the temporary blow.

What makes a hit song? Walter Gross, young CBS maestro, allegedly replies, "In the first place, your melody should be built up on a demitance harmony which spundulates through the ectogravic tonostat every eight bars. Be sure that the range covers every trebulum of the diabenic scale. In writing the verse, make it terse, with plenty of harmonic fidulation in every second spivule of the pre-thermovox."

All we can add is that Mr. Gross' press-agent may know the rules but that Mr. Gross knows how to write the song.

Short Waves

NBC and CBS Add More Top-Flight Shows for American Troops Abroad

It Mustn't Happen Here

WILLIAM TENCER, a Balkan expert speaking over the London short-wave station, recently gave some details as to what happened when the Nazis overran Yugoslavia:

"Through the sleepy streets of the Yugoslav capital a German fring-squad marched a group of Serbs to the place of their execution. In the main square, right in the heart of the city, the procession halted. A few short commands—and all was over.

"Belgraders flocking to their work saw a grim picture. There were men and women hung up on lamp-posts with their faces already black and their hands tied together behind their backs.

"For several days the corpses were left hanging. The Germans hoped this would frighten the Serbs into submission. They have probably never heard of blood vengeance. Anyway, the Serbs soon took action. Unprecedented violence broke out in Belgrade. German soldiers were attacked from roofs and windows. Schroeder, the German commander, dared to rush out into the street. He did not survive. He was stoned to death.

"Now a surprising thing happened. Dankelman, the new German commander, asked for reinforcements. He needed them. Yugoslav Tchetnik forces, already in command of large parts of the country, were within a few miles of Belgrade. But Berlin could not spare troops to be sent to Yugoslavia. So Dankelman decided to make use of the Serbian Quislings. He set up a Serbian puppet government. Neditch, a Serbian general and an extremely vain man, became prime minister. The first act Dankelman asked from Neditch was to mobilize ten thousand Serbian gendarmes to fight the Tchetniks. You see the trick? Still Neditch obeyed. He still does obey—yet Neditch knows what happened in Kragujevac, the largest armament center of Serbia. As a reprisal for a spontaneous Serbian school-children demonstration, the German police cleared the entire municipal school and put all its children before a firing-squad. The horrified school-master offered his own life to save those of the children. So he was shot, too. On this day in October, 1941, over four thousand persons in all were shot in Kragujevac and over two thousand in Kraljevo. But Neditch, the Quisling, still carries on to serve the German butchers." The Nazis can rule only with the aid of traitors.

The incident of Kragujevac must never happen in these United States of America.

From My Notebook

At time of writing, Jane Anderson, Catholic firebrand orator-propagandist of the German short-wave station, is still "unable to appear before the microphone," according to air announcements. Is she really ill or, as many believe, still being punished by Dr. Goebbels for her ill-timed statements in a recent speech to the effect

that she and her friends had enjoyed iced champagne spiced with cognac at a theater party—this at a time when the German working man seldom gets a drink of beer, lives mostly on ersatz foods of the poorest quality? . . . According to Wickham Steed, speaking from London, British bombers flew so low on their way to Lubeck that Nazi fighters almost shot the tops off several German dwellings trying to shoot them down . . . The German radio states that these little attacks by the British Commandos on the French coast are only of propaganda value and leave Berlin absolutely indifferent. Yes, so indifferent that half of the short-wave station's airtime and column after column of newsprint must be used up to explain to the German and Italian people just how "unimportant" these raids are . . . The Berlin short-wave station has also been making considerable fun of the "big" American bombers that we are now supposed to be flying to Great Britain. "The main thing that Europeans are interested in," said the Berlin speaker, "is that the bigger the bombers the easier they are to hit and the harder they fall." Mr. Hitler's spokesman in this case neglected to mention the small fact that the bigger the planes the greater the load of death-dealing bombs they can carry to blast Nazi factories, Nazi docks, Nazi warehouses and supplies off the map.

Pope to Commemorate Jubilee

In commemoration of his Episcopal (twenty-fifth anniversary of his consecration as a bishop) Jubilee, Pope Pius XII will broadcast on Wednesday, May 13, at 11:30 a.m. CWT, a message to the war-torn world from the Vatican. His Holiness last spoke to the world on Christmas Eve, 1941. In that message he laid down five essential conditions of a durable and just peace, attacking anti-Christian movements throughout the world. The Pope's message will be broadcast over HVJ, "Radio Vaticano," the Vatican radio station, and probably on a frequency of 15.12 megs.

We Apologize

In MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE issue of January 24, we ran a little item telling about a mysterious broadcast over the Berlin short-wave station which frequently made reference to the Kellogg products, Corn Flakes and Rice Krispies. I certainly had no intention of inferring that this propagandist or these references to Kellogg's cereals were in any way inspired, or sponsored by the well-known, long-established and wholly reputable American Kellogg Company. Inasmuch as this point was not too strongly made in the article at that time, I hope this explanation will clear up any doubt that might have existed in anyone's mind.

Voice From Far-Off India

" . . . Tell Bing Crosby that even though we are more than half-way around the world, we still hear his voice. Last night while on watch, we listened to him sing 'Mexicali Rose' and a few other numbers. It was really a very funny sensation sitting there in a rear-gun turret looking down a machine-gun barrel at the Indian Ocean far below and hearing Bing sing . . ."

Pioneer Work Done by Broadcast Engineers in Developing FM's System of Interference-Free Radio Is Now Proving a Boon to the Armed Forces of America

FM Goes to War

WHEN we talk about the many achievements of FM as a new broadcast service for radio listeners, we're likely to overlook the remarkable contributions FM is making to its country's war effort. As a result of pioneer work carried on by broadcast engineers to develop this remarkable new system of interference-free radio, America's armed forces now have at their disposal the most efficient, compact and fool-proof means of group communication in the world.

To understand why FM has been adopted on such a scale by the Army, we should first outline some of the original communications problems that confronted Signal Corps experts when the need for a mechanized army became evident. It's not an easy assignment to coordinate and direct the movement of hundreds of mobile units such as tanks, command cars, reconnaissance patrols, supply and maintenance trucks when they're scattered all over the field.

In fact, just a few years ago it was thought this could be achieved only by using highly skilled operators, sending and receiving code signals, or by one-way communication systems that sent blind blanket orders to all units via radiotelephone. The idea of individual cars and tanks reporting information back or communicating among themselves, even in the thick of fighting, was fantastic.

In the first place, a mechanized division on the march creates such a reception racket with its heavy ignition and the amount of static electricity generated by moving metal parts that ordinary radio—even on a one-way basis—proved to be dangerously unreliable. Furthermore, there was nothing to keep the enemy from "jamming" or garbling messages broadcast by ordinary AM radio.

The merits of FM as a fast, dependable means of two-way communication over limited distances has been demonstrated repeatedly during the past two years through the efficiency of FM radio systems operated by state and municipal police. The Army studied these installations closely and found in them almost all the answers to its problems.

FM Fills the Job

Transmitters and receivers designed for use in a tank must be compact because so little room can be spared. Secondly, they must be rugged because tanks don't always take the smoothest route, and failure at a critical moment could be disastrous. Third, reception has to be clear and strong at all times so that orders may be received and reports instantly radioed back. And fourth, the signals must not be susceptible to intentional interference from enemy "nuisance" transmitters.

Ordinarily, communication is not held over distances in excess of a mile, although greater ranges are quite feasible on normal terrain. The tank operator, unlike police officers in FM-equipped patrol cars, doesn't use a conventional microphone. He wears instead two little disks clamped to each side of his throat in the region of the vocal cords, thus leaving his hands free for other work—such as firing a machine-gun. The disks pick up voice vibrations, and the operator needs to speak at only a normal tone, no matter how much clatter there may be inside the tank. Headphones are built into his heavily padded helmet, and the FM receiver and transmitter are tuned with push-buttons. No special technical skill is required to operate the installation.

Usually a higher-power command station, also using FM, is established on some high ground near the scene of action. This station is in constant communication with not only tanks but reconnaissance cars—such as the little high-wheeled "jeeps" that are becoming so well known—as they scout ahead of the main force. Maintenance trucks can be called up to refuel, service or repair disabled tanks and, when action is spread over a wide area, a system of FM relays can speedily be set up.

The entire arrangement is one of close-knit coordination, flexible and incredibly fast in its ability to get tons of hard-fighting machinery to the place where they're needed most, and to gear them in the teamwork that wins battles. It's just one of FM's several contributions to the winning of this war.

Preview of Tomorrow

There are new and important things being learned about FM today—but behind the guarded doors of war factories and in the secret laboratories of researchers who seek to give us better tools with which to fight. These discoveries can pay unbelievable dividends when peace comes again. They'll mean finer and cheaper FM receivers for American homes, improved and simplified FM transmitters, beamed point-to-point radio communication (with FM) to replace many telephone lines, FM devices to increase the safety of commercial aviation, and myriad other refinements and adaptations of FM radio which we can't even visualize yet.

Reports from the International Red Cross committee in Geneva indicate that John Paul Dickson, Mutual's former voice from Berlin, is still in interment inside Germany. The report said: "Dickson still at Bad Nauheim with members of the diplomatic corps and in excellent health." Shortly before the outbreak of the war, Dickson had asked MBS to discontinue his reports from Germany because "censorship has made them useless at the present time." He had foreseen a break and had made arrangements to leave Berlin, but the war came before he could get out.

Notes About Newsmen

Alex Dreier, who barely did get out of Berlin a matter of several hours before Germany's declaration of war on the United States, has found something more than freedom waiting for him in America. He now has a bride, formerly Joy Leathurby of San Francisco. The two have known one another since childhood, when they lived in the same block in the Golden Gate city . . . Bjorn Bjornson, American newspaperman, is now the Blue Network's correspondent in Reykjavik, on the island where both of his parents were born . . . It is claimed for John B. Hughes, Mutual commentator, that he has had more than one hundred fifty predictions come true within the past seven months. Included was the forecast that the Japs would start a sea war, made several months before Pearl Harbor.



WHAT'S COOKING!

By GEORGIA SCOTT

Children's Lunches

EVERYBODY knows that school-children need nutritious midday meals, and almost every mother who packs a lunch-box for her child sees to it that fresh fruit, sturdy sandwiches and milk are included daily. But almost as important as making sure that the proper vitamins and minerals are included in the child's lunch is to make sure that the lunch is appetizing and attractive.

Children are finicky, and even if they're ravenously hungry they may only toy with a lunch if it doesn't tempt them. There's also the psychological factor of making a child feel proud of his lunch in front of his schoolmates. There's a poignant description of just such an incident in a short story by Katherine Mansfield, where two little outcast children sit apart from the other little girls, who have fancy lunches, unwrapping their heavy sandwiches wrapped in newspaper with big blobs of red jelly staining the wrapping. Many a child would rather go hungry than suffer the pain of having his schoolmates look askance at his lunch.

Little lunch-boxes equipped with a thermos bottle and with partitions for sandwiches and desserts are reasonably priced and are the best possible way to pack lunches. Aside from the fact that the lunch will be kept fresh and sandwiches and cake preserved intact, a child takes pride in carrying one of these neat containers.

Preparing a lunch for one or more children five days a week for some thirty-six or so weeks a year taxes a mother's ingenuity. But there are endless varieties of appetizing things to do with left-over meats, with eggs, with fish, with vegetables, with fruit combinations. You can mince left-over meats like veal and beef and lamb with celery, onion and mayonnaise. Combine crisp bacon with peanut butter. Left-over cooked liver is delicious ground with cooked bacon and moistened with salad dressing. Ground baked ham combined with celery and green pepper is very good. The picture shows a bacon-and-chopped-celery combination which is very tasty and quickly made. You simply crumble some cooked bacon, add finely diced celery, salt to taste, and mix with mayonnaise. The other combination is left-over roast lamb with currant jelly.

There are a lot of nice vegetable combinations and fruit fillings which can add zest and variety to a school lunch. Have you ever tried mixing ground raw carrots, celery and nuts with lemon juice and mayonnaise? A fruit paste of thoroughly mixed chopped dates, raisins and nuts on whole-wheat bread makes a delicious sandwich.



There hasn't been a brand spanking new baby in the Barbour house since Claudia's very young Nicky was born two years ago, and the Barbour house without a baby in it is a desolate place indeed. Jack and Betty are about to change all that, though, for soon THEIR baby will be the heart of the house, and THEY will assume a new importance as the parents of the very prized youngest member.

They seem almost like babies themselves to those of us who have watched them grow up, and though they are such practical young people we can't help anticipating some very funny situations when Jack and Betty have a baby added to their already slightly hurly-burly menage.

We spent an evening with the Barbours recently, my husband and I. It must have been some sort of little family holiday, for every member of the family was there. Mother Barbour, full of gaiety, and Father Barbour simply beaming with pride and happiness. Paul was there, with Teddy sitting on a hassock at his feet, where she could lean against his knees as though to assure herself that at least for this moment he hadn't gone to ferry another bomber far out some place over the rim of the world. He will go again, Teddy knows that, but for this fearfully short moment he is home, safe, and she can lean against him as she watches Hazel—Hazel Barbour Herbert, the eldest daughter, with her twin sons Hank and Pinky and her little daughter Margaret. Hazel is still a widow, even though her family had hoped she might marry Daniel Murray. Claudia, the other Barbour daughter, was there too with her husband, Nicholas

Lacey, and her three children—Joan and Penelope and the very young Nicky. Clifford sat holding his little boy, J. D., and never taking his eyes from the face of Irene Franklin, who, we think, will soon be Irene Barbour. Jack and Betty were holding hands and laughing at some obscure joke of their own. They are terribly impressed with their impending parenthood and refuse to be considered "juniors" any longer.

And there a charred refrain; a remnant of Brahms; and there the gruesome heap of ivories and wires to play it on. A broken pint of old Madeira wine my father's father left behind; a blue and silver evening gown aflutter from an upright two-by-four.

And half a ragged Bible leaf; some words still left unstained that all might see "Thou shalt not covet," so the legend ran, "thy neighbor's house." "Thou shalt not covet," more it read, "thy neighbor's wife; nor his maid-servant, nor his maid-servant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbor's."

The zinnia bed was set to burst abloom; the zinnia bed is three feet under rubble now.

The window sill besmirched with prints of

small boys' hands; I meant to have the woodwork finished new this spring; where is the dirty window sill today?

Where is the sill? Where is the leaded pane; the view it framed; where is that small familiar world which yesterday was mine?

Serene in grace and strength and everlasting glory!

Paul's voice stopped and I think we said "Amen" in our hearts, for this room in which we sat was typical of so many thousands of homes. The same things had happened to the people in this home that have happened to so many others. There have been days of high courage and days of laughter, there had been hours of shining love. There have been the times the chimney smoked and the kitchen sink didn't drain properly and all the children had colds. There were Christmases and birthdays, there have been report-cards, and little gifts made with childish hands. There has been rebellion, momentary estrangements, and sympathetic response to each other. There has been birth, and death has beckoned to some who knew this house.
