# GLORY TO GOD

**T**HE false dawn has come and gone, and the sky is black again. There is no sound, no movement anywhere. Even the night wind is still. But the air is filled with music, with singing, and with prayer! For radio is sending out over the world the voices of men and women in joyous celebration of the Rising of their Savior. Minutes slip silently into eternity. Almost imperceptibly at first, a flush of pink colors the blackness in the eastern sky. A streak of brighter color slits the black curtain, spreads slowly over the whole dome of Heaven. The music hurtling silently through the air swells louder, night flees madly into the west, down the other side of the world, the sun rises in an eloquent hush . . .

It is Easter Sunday.

All over the Christian world, men and women, children and babes in arms are coming together in little groups to marvel anew at the miracle of Galilee, to join in celebration of the Resurrection of Christ, as they have celebrated for the past 1900 years.

At sunrise on Easter Sunday, the Christian peoples of the world are perhaps more firmly united in common bond than at any other single instant throughout the year. So far from weakening, this common bond has been strengthened throughout the ages. And so it is fitting that any one instrument or agency capable of fur-

ther strengthening it should be used to the utmost. Radio is such an instrument, and when the sun rises on Easter Sunday this year—as in years past—a bigger part than ever before will be played by radio. All over America, Sunrise Services will be broadcast to the world. Travelers and expatriates in the far-flung corners of the universe will be united in celebration with their people at home, and with Christian peoples everywhere.

Probably the most impressive Easter service to be put on the air this year is the Wichita Mountains pageant, to witness which more than 100,000 people annually make a pilgrimage over the dusty roads tracking the barren Oklahoma countryside to an isolated valley more than 20 miles from the nearest town. On foot, in horse-drawn wagons, and in automobiles packed bumper-to-bumper for miles over the rutted roads they come, many of them 24 hours in advance, to marvel at the unfolding of America's Passion Play.

Three thousand people participate in the pageant-story of the death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ, in a setting constructed to duplicate as nearly as possible the actual architecture of

His time. The Garden of Gethsemane, the tomb in the garden of Joseph of Arimathea, Pilate's Temple, and the Hill of Calvary—all are faithfully duplicated. This semi-circle of buildings faces a long, sloping hill which forms a natural amphitheater. In front of each building or stage is a battery of hidden footlights remotely controlled. As soon as the satin-robed actors and singers have completed one tableau, the lights are cut and flashed on at another stage for the next step. The whole performance moves with military precision, and is so timed that the concluding tableaux and episodes come just as the sun is breaking over the surrounding hills.

As the sun moves west across the continent on the morning of Easter Sunday, Columbia Broadcasting System microphones will follow it to put on the air a series of sunrise services,

from the Atlantic seaboard to California, from a battleship at anchor in the Pacific, and from the sands of Waikiki Beach in Honolulu. From one of the oldest and largest Sunrise Services in the country will come the first broadcast of the day, originating in the Temple University Stadium at Philadelphia. Here more than 75,000 per-

sons will greet the rising sun with sacred music.

Massed singing by a choir of 10,000 voices will be broadcast during the service in St. Louis' beautiful Municipal Bowl. Memory Grove in Salt Lake City, Utah's memorial to her World War dead, will be the site of the next service. The Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra will play an hour's program of sacred music as the sun reaches California, and from Waikiki Beach a program of traditional Easter music will be played on Hawaiian instruments. Later in the morning the seaman's service on the *U. S. S. Pennsylvania*, off San Pedro, will be broadcast from the quarter-deck.

High-light of the NBC broadcast services will be that originating in the Shrine of the Ages on the rim of the Grand Canyon in Arizona. From the Municipal Theater in St. Louis and from Chicago's Soldier Field, the singing of massed choruses will be put on the air. Mount Davidson, near San Francisco, will be the point of origination of another service.

Never before has so varied and so complete an array of religious services been made available to the people of America. In every part of the land, in the seas bordering it, and in countries over the seas, listeners will thrill again to the world's most thrilling story, the story told in the words: "Lo, He is risen!"

**K**ATHRYN CRAVENS looked straight across the desk and said it.

"I create people. It's my hobby." She stopped a moment in silence. "I suppose that sounds strange. . ."

It did sound strange, but that didn't matter. A quiet eagerness had come into her voice. The interview had begun at last.

We had been sitting there in a CBS office for ever so long—getting nowhere. She had talked and answered questions about herself and her work, but the tall, blond woman remained merely an aggregation of facts, as unreal as a case history.

"The Flying Commentator," she had been called, but there was nothing about her to suggest the trip-hammer speed of news or flying. She talked slowly, placidly. There was no hint of the intense, throbbing voice of her broadcasts.

"News Through a Woman's Eyes" was her program. She had eyes and was a woman. I had to grant her that much. But news? That I could not see. Nothing clicked. Then, to my despairing last question, she answered:

"It may be strange," she said, "to call it a hobby, but I enjoy it, so I suppose it is. I see a person, or hear

of one, who has never had a chance—no education, no manners, no friends. . . and no hope at all. I give him those things, not all at once, but little by little as he can assimilate them. When I'm done, there is a new person I've created by a little kindness and money. It's an expensive hobby—but worth every cent it costs!"

There is little more that she will say about it. Thoughtless words would destroy her "creations," the pride and independence she has instilled in them. It didn't matter. I wasn't writing about them, but about Kathryn Cravens, who reveals herself only when she talks about others. She is a woman with wide interests—but no interest ever in herself. That is why we got nowhere at all when we talked about her. She was bored!

Now, magically, those bare facts, as she had told them, came to life, showed her progress . . . and mistakes . . . step by step to success and happiness that is sound to the core.

She had said, "I have proved to myself that a woman can do anything

if she makes up her mind to do it. Most women don't want to enough."

Why, then, did Kathryn Cravens want so very much to be the first woman news commentator to broadcast from Coast-to-Coast? She wasn't an ex-newspaper woman vocalizing her prose style for radio's big salary. She didn't need the money; didn't, when she began, know even the ABC's of news value. She liked to go to parties and stay up late, but she gave up all that. She didn't have a husband or rival that she must "show." There are no rivals in her field and her husband has admired her will-to-work for all the thirteen years of their marriage.

**S**HE told me those things when she talked about herself, but they made no sense. She gave me the facts of her life. Then, she talked about the bum on the street who didn't quite seem a bum. He asked for a dime and got a new life. It wasn't rash charity, as she told it, but understanding of every person's need for self-respect.

# Life THROUGH A WOMAN'S EYES

RADIO'S FEMININE "FLYING NEWS COMMENTATOR" SEES LIFE AS IT IS—GIVES HELP TO THE HELPLESS!

She talked about her butler, who'd been a fatherless, nameless, no-good colored boy from the cotton fields. Today he's the best servant she ever had because she trusted him. No one ever thought to do that before, or thought that clean clothes and decent food were worth wasting on him.

Incredibly bad typing gave one girl a new world. Kathryn didn't fly into a rage. She asked questions instead. The girl wanted desperately to be a dancer. Typing was her futile way of earning money for lessons. The girl needed much more than dancing lessons. She needed concentration, education, poise . . . and food. Kathryn gave her those things out of her own time and purse, saw her career succeed, saw her marry well and happily. The facts had been bare, had they?

Kathryn Cravens has no trained "nose for news"—but, she has eyes to see—and real sympathy, too!



The facts that Kathryn Cravens was born Kathryn Cochran in Burkett, Texas, a village of 300 people; that her father was a doctor and her mother a postmistress; that Kathryn wanted, at an early age, to become an actress and eventually became one; that radio acting followed stage acting; that news commentating supplanted radio dramatics as her life work?

**E**VERY one of those facts is significant. They are Kathryn Cravens.

A postmistress. Any of us who has lived in a very small town as a child has looked with awe upon her. She, we vaguely realized in those days before radio, was the link with the outside world. Hundreds of secrets were hers to withhold, or tell. Joy, sorrow and comedy passed each day before her little grilled window. And she was Kathryn's mother.

And the doctor—he knew everything, too—people's hopes and despairs, nameless suffering and death. Drama followed his footsteps. When we saw his old mud-spattered car in front of a house, our hearts skipped a beat; our minds whirled with fear and curiosity. And he was Kathryn's father.

Her heritage was drama, curiosity and love of humanity. It was her only

inheritance for a long time. Country doctors are poor and widows of country doctors poorer. Nearly twenty years passed and many things happened before Kathryn was conscious of the worth of that priceless, pennyless inheritance. Poverty, repression, rebellion and finally a wealthy marriage came first. She had to be Kathryn Cochran, Kitty O'Dare and Mrs. Rutherford Cravens before she became the Kathryn Cravens who eyes the news with feminine insight.

Kathryn was eight when her father died. Consternation as well as grief filled the Cochran home. Probating the will of a country doctor is a grim, legal joke. He has too little to leave. Only three of Dr. Cochran's seven children were old enough to fend for themselves and a postmistress' salary could only care for one.

Eight years of struggle and deception followed. (She can laugh at them now.) Her oldest brother, Elbert, was head of the family, and youthfully conscious of it. He was, also, newly married, and newly ordained as minister of the Christian Church. To his home, where card-playing was a sin, came Kathryn, determined to be an actress! Seeing Guy Bates Post in "Omar, the Tentmaker" had changed her young life.

She had talent. Even Elbert, who considered any actress a hussy, had to admit that. It was obvious, too, that she must earn her living as soon as she was grown. So it was that Kathryn took dramatic lessons—a sin—in order to be an elocution teacher—a worthy profession which even straight-laced young clergymen study without getting into disrepute.

At sixteen, she was grown, so she thought, and a trained actress. An

older sister took that occasion to buy Kathryn's share of their father's estate. It was little enough, but it was cash in the hand-bag. With it—and no permission—she went west.

The girl who arrived in Hollywood was not Kathryn Cochran of small Texas parishes, but a blond young Juno named Kitty O'Dare—because she had dared! It was that young and foolish. Bit parts followed mob anonymity and that—despite the name—was all. Perhaps she would have made good if she had stayed, but something was lacking. Acting, it finally dawned on her, wasn't dramatic! She blamed that on pictures. The theater, she was sure, would be different. With an ambitious eye on New York, she returned, after a few months, to Dallas, for more dramatic lessons.

If she had dared, with her name, to take a through train to New York—well, I might not be writing this story. She didn't dare—without more lessons. And, thus, she met a man named Cravens whom she later married.

**S**EVENTEEN is young enough to be amazed that a man so old—thirty if he was a day!—can be one of trip-lets. When "Wuss" Cravens ("wuss" being southern for worst of the three) returned to St. Louis, they corresponded.

Kathryn was getting letters, too, from a Hollywood friend who had "made" Broadway. A special delivery came one night. By pictures and glowing reports, a manager had been induced to hire Kathryn sight unseen.

She did not get to New York. The train she took the next morning was destined, by an impatient fate, to go through St. Louis. "Wuss" Cravens stood on the platform with flowers, candy and a determined look in his eye.

Three hours later they were married!

"And so, they lived happily ever after . . ." would have ended the story for most women. Rutherford Cravens was comfortably, if not fabulously, wealthy. The social position of his wife was assured. But Kathryn had seen that train pull out without her; had thought, with a pang, of the girl who would take her place. Before she would leave the station she wanted to know what would happen to her, now—not to Mrs. Rutherford Cravens but to her, herself. Love and affluence, she knew, would never be quite enough.

Standing there, "Wuss" Cravens made a promise that he has never broken. He swore that he would never do anything but help her work.

Leo Carillo came to St. Louis—so did Richard Bennett, Edna Hibbard and Guy Bates Post. With all of these Kathryn played—and well. Perhaps some people in St. Louis thought her a stage-struck society woman working off her energy and feeding her vanity. There were many such women, but Kathryn knew that she was not one of them—and so did the stars she played with. They offered her parts in their New York productions, but Kathryn couldn't accept—or wouldn't. Her place was in St. Louis.

Like many another actress she was unconcerned, at first, when old patrons went down the street to the "passing fad" of "squeakies." Kathryn Cravens' livelihood was not endangered when the stock company died of starvation, but her life was. She did need, only too truly, an outlet for her energies, and she needed the money—not for herself but for her "people." A chance kindness had become an obsession. She had, scarcely knowing it, a full-grown hobby and an expensive one. She had started "creating people."

Radio and amateur little theaters were poor substitutes for the stage that had died. The number of her radio efforts for KMOX show her dissatisfaction. She did a "girly-girly" woman's program; a negro dialect act in which, like Amos 'n' Andy, she played all the parts. She did "True Life

Dramas"—sugared for what she took to be radio's taste. Then she heard Edwin C. Hill.

She had heard him before, of course, but this night was different. Forgotten sights and sounds and smells welled up out of the past. A village post-office and an old woman refusing to cry. The smell of cooking in a house where a child lay dead—cooking for the other children who must live. The scream of horses in a flaming barn—and of a rancher with third-degree burns. Her back stiffened with pride. She realized, at last, that her heritage was sympathy and humor as well as drama. She felt strong and strangely at home with herself. That was not surprising, because, for the first time, she had found herself.

and drama lay behind front-page print. Three weeks later, "News Through a Woman's Eyes" went on the air from Coast-to-Coast—written and read by an actress! She had no nose for news? She had better. She had eyes to see and sympathy to lead her unerringly beyond the facts that news-trained noses sniff.

**S**HE doesn't ask a reporter's "where, when, how and why," but a woman's "How does it feel?"

How does it feel to be the mother of a murdered boy; of one to be executed that night? How does it feel to survive flood and misery; to be America's most notorious shop-lifter; to be the mayor of a great city, a congressional lobbyist, a famous playwright, a war-torn cripple, a flop-house bum?

She dresses in old clothes to wander through slums, or in Parisian imports to visit the great. A woman's intuition, not a nose for news, takes her by plane or on foot to the source of today's headlines.

She wouldn't leave St. Louis and home for theater make-believe. Some instinct told her that—for her—it was not important enough. But for radio, for this job of seeing life through her woman's eyes, she has moved to New York.

It is more than a job. It is an avocation. Week after week, she gives away her entire salary.

"Creating people" is her hobby—and a real hobby it is!

Kathryn Cravens may be heard Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays on News Through a Woman's Eyes over a CBS network at 2 p.m. EST (1 CST; 12 noon MST; 11 a.m. PST), and later for the West Coast at 2:30 p.m. PST (3:30 MST).

**P**HIL BAKER seems to be the Waterloo of interviewers," your editor wrote my husband. "Not because Baker isn't affable, but they just can't seem to find the story, though it's there. Suppose you try your hand."

My husband, who is an ace interviewer, tried, and came home all steamed up about Phil, pronouncing him one of the most regular guys he'd met in a coon's age. But—when he sat down and covered paper with words on the subject they were just that—words—not Phil Baker. "That's funny," he grumbled, "because Baker wasn't one bit mysterious. But this certainly doesn't show him."

My husband's newspaper called him out of town, so I went to see Baker in an effort to finish the job. He greeted me enthusiastically, "Say, that husband of yours sure has plenty on the ball!" And he made me glow with praise of Jerry's new book. But a slight suspicion popped into my head for a second and then was gone. But it had registered. The suspicion was: *Sounds like you two talked about my husband's interests, not yours.*

I got my appointment to come up to his apartment and meet him and his wife and ask any question I chose.

On the specified day, I'd hardly gotten inside the door before he was trying to get me to have coffee, tea, "some little snack of something"—sympathizing with me about the broken-down furnace at my house, saying, "You must be chilled! Here, let me put this robe over your knees."

**C**AREFUL, I warned myself, or it'll be you he talks about now! So, sternly, I got out one of the lists of questions with which I was going to try to pin him down. It was impudently personal, and if answered, bound to tell something. "Do you," I asked, "carry a spare bill?"

His easy-going smile vanished and he snapped back the hard-boiled truth. "Not more than a dollar or two as a rule, and the reason is, when I'm around, nobody else ever reaches for the check. Maybe there are men who pay their share, but I haven't met them. Why, last night I cashed a check at *El Morocco* for fifty and look—." He fished in his pocket for the three bucks that were left.

anxiously, "let me tell you a funny thing. I can't seem to do one thing to push relatives or personal friends. A stranger, easy. Somebody already in the profession, yep. It was what's sitting here in this chair, inside this suit of clothes. And I said, 'Wise guys, eh? Well, I can make it all right back in the same old way. All I've got is me.' So I went to work developing that property again, and I came out all right," he ended.

Rather! A home in Mamaroneck, one in Palm Beach, this apartment in the East Fifties.

And I'd actually kept him talking about himself for all of *ten minutes!* But, before you get the idea that Phil Baker is a Pollyanna who loves all mankind, let me put you straight.

"Sure, I have enemies. And the queer thing about that," he said unhappily, "is that they're all folks I've tried to help, usually have helped."

"Go on," I urged him. I realized by then you had to let him talk about others to make him talk about himself.

"Well, there were a couple of shows I backed, and I let the interested parties have a free hand, and they flopped. Yet they blamed me, and have never been the same towards me since."

"Simple," I exclaimed, "they're embarrassed at losing your money. How could they feel easy with you?"

"Then there are some of the kids I've worked up to be somebody through my radio programs. Some of them have soured on me." He looked upset about that. "Take ———, one of my early stooges, and plenty funny. (By the way, he's always denouncing stooges these days.) Anyway, I took him out of a ten-dollar-a-week job and I let him do his best, taught him what his best was sometimes. We worked together, ate together, lived together. Pretty soon he clicked and he deserved to.

**KNOW** how he treats me now? When he comes to town he can't spare time to see me. Oh sure, he tells all our friends he 'wants' to look me up, so I call him, but he never calls back. The last time I finally did get hold of him and he made a date, but was to phone at a certain time to let me know where we were to meet. I rushed from some place to be in my room for his call. And I

watched the phone like a high school kid hoping the 'Big Moment' will ring up. He never did call.

"When I saw it was no use waiting any longer I sent him a wire saying: *There comes a time in the life of every genius when he can't afford not to keep appointments. I feel very sorry for you.* After that I went out to get something to eat and I ran into a columnist he'd stood up earlier in the day. We cried into our soup together over him. He can't get away with that stuff long. Nobody's so big he can afford to make others feel small."

Which last is a clew to Phil's character and his apparent elusiveness in interviews. He doesn't think he is the only topic big enough to discuss.

"A number of youngsters I've built up from time to time have grown too big for their boots," he continued, "and now when I see it coming, I fire them. Because you can't play radio against the grain of the other actors, because radio isn't anything but voices. And you can't cover up antagonism in voices when you haven't any scenery or costumes or stage business or smiles to do it with. Get me?"

I got him. A voice is a lone, defenseless thing all by itself.

Incidentally, he thinks, as much as he loves the stage, that radio performers should *not* use costumes and make-up and stage tricks, for that may make the studio audience respond when maybe it's a lousy program to the broadcast audience.

He said again, heavily, "Yes, you can lump all my enemies under the heading of people I've tried to help, and who don't like me for it."

"But," I pointed out, "it goes down easier to be the *giver*. You always reach for the check first. Why, honestly, now?"

**BECAUSE,** he admitted, "I don't like being under obligations to others."

"Then how," I persisted, "do you think those kids feel who have taken favors from you? Crummy, I suspect. For no matter how big-shot they get to be, they always remember you once were their boss. I imagine the airs they put on with you are a bluff to kid themselves into self-assurance."

"I never thought of that," he conceded, but he was still hurt by the episode about his old stooge.

I asked him about his wife next. She'd just left on an errand. "Do you mind if I write something about her too?"

"Lord, no! Write the whole article about her, if you want." (There he was at it again, casting the limelight away from himself.) "Let me tell you," he came and shook his cigarette at me for emphasis, "she's the most remarkable woman I know, bar none."

**FOUR** years ago, she was Peggy Cartwright whom the Schuberts had brought over to play in "Americana." She was making a personal hit but the show wasn't when Phil Baker met her. "So," he chuckled, "I sold the Schuberts a load of apples. I told 'em, 'You know your show's flopping but give me a part in it and I'll make it click.' I wanted to be where I could get acquainted with that girl. She's not easy to know. But I got acquainted. I married her five weeks later.

"A week or so before we were married, I asked her hadn't she better buy herself some clothes, a trousseau, say? She said quite probably, and she let me tag along. She bought seven dresses for eighty dollars! That's all clothes mean to her—nothing. That fur coat that you just saw her go out in is the only thing worth a darn that she has, and I had to force that on her for her birthday."

It was a crisp, clean-cut coat, not one of these lavish indulgences in display. It suits her. She's small, has fair brown hair that goes back from a candidly pretty face. She has a lovely British speaking voice that puts people at their ease, yet keeps them in their proper places. She's cordial but not fraternal. And I don't like trying to make phrases about her, because they sound too glib.

She's not in the theater now. She's Phil Baker's wife. No matter how he tries to soft-pedal himself, she doesn't follow suit. She's utterly absorbed in his children—two here, a third on the way—in his country home, his comfort, his happiness.

**BEFORE** she left she had had to help find Soldwedel's address, then check up on the people they were counting on to help them push Kip. But Phil made finding that address seem like Spring cleaning. She laughed. "It's always like this. He'll find everything but fishing worms in his pockets before it turns up." That settled, she had to assure him that the Coast would get him on long-distance here in town even if he had told them the country house. "When they're trying to get a contract with someone," she told him, "they can think, Phil."

He still looked a little dubious, but trusting—if she said so.

My time was getting short, so I fired some quick questions about small details. "Are you interested in clothes?"

"No," he grinned unabashed, "but I do like to bathe. And I change all my linen every day. I guess that's because my father was in the junk end of the fur business when I was a kid, and came home looking like a coal miner at night. But in thirty minutes he was spotless. I must have inherited the desire to keep clean from him."

If I hadn't steered him off he'd have spent the remaining few minutes on his dad.

I interrupted. "You said your family was poor. How did you like being broke?"

"I was never 'broke,'" he corrected me. "I always had food and shelter. Of course, my mother had only about six dollars a week to feed the six of us, but that was enough!" (He still knows the real value of money.)

He was following up another angle. "My mother has a time these days, since I've become fairly well known. Has a time about hard-up distant relatives cropping up, worrying her to get me to help them."

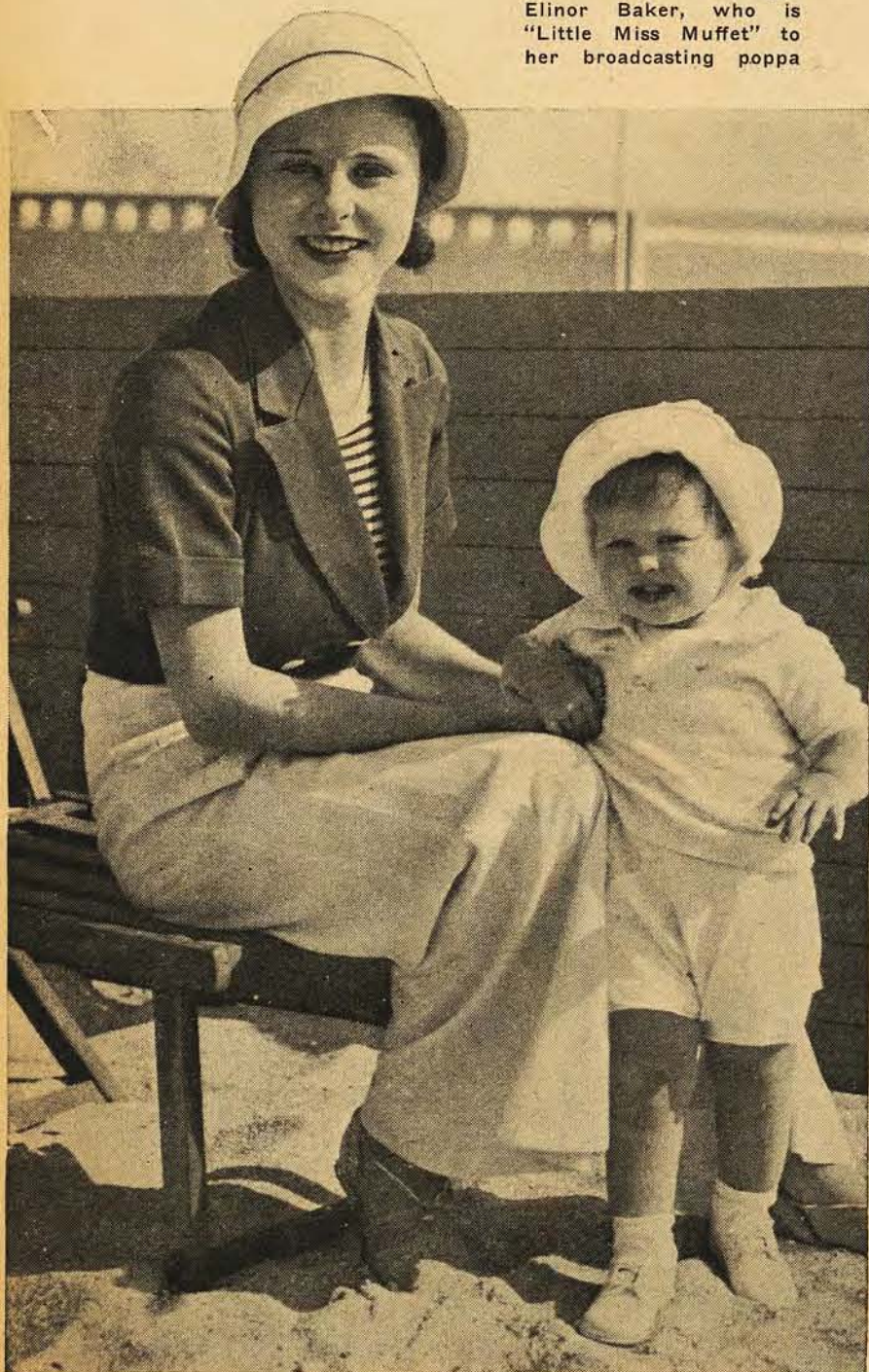
He frowned. "I do my best, but I told you how impossible it seems for me to get them jobs, so I—er—just put 'em on my list of dependents. That's about all I can do. It's an awful trial to my mother, because she knows I can't be a sieve for money to trickle through endlessly, yet they prey on her mind—their troubles. I hate to see her so worried," he ended.

Everything you asked him, it was the same old story. Someone else was the crux of his reply. No wonder interviewers felt he gave them the run-around. But not because he was evasive, and not because he's colorless.

But he's vivid because he's charged with the electricity of his interest in other people's gifts, struggles, tragedies, and shortcomings. He has that God-given trait that any actor, on stage, screen, or air, must have to go over to an audience—the knack of putting himself into the other fellow's shoes, so that they, in turn, will feel, for the moment, *one with Phil Baker*.

# AN ALL-AMERICAN

LAST week I tried to give you a rapid summary of the first fifteen years of my life. I spent those years, you might say, in constantly trying to "do something" and failing. Looking back on them, though, I can see that what I was really trying to do was to find myself.

It is curious that we should use that expression—finding yourself. For that is exactly what the singer, and any other artist as well, must do. Oddly enough, a singer is not born knowing that she is a singer. She has to be told; and it is someone else, rather than any inner voice, who tells her. I will tell you how one singer—Rose Bampton—found herself, and I think you will discover here again a likeness between my life and your own.

When I was fifteen years old my family moved from Ohio to New York State and settled in Buffalo. My father was still working for the steel mill and a better job took him east. My credits were transferred to the high school in Buffalo, which was only a couple of blocks from the house we took there.

That school wasn't like the high schools today. It didn't have a swimming-pool or an athletic field. It was old-fashioned and set in old-fashioned ways; and the most old-fashioned thing about it was its principal, Dr. Babst. I was sure from the start that I wasn't going to like him. He was a tall, cold man—and as rigid and unyielding as his own Victorian ideas. (So I thought.) He did not permit girls and boys to mingle together at school under any circumstances. In assembly the girls sat on one side of the room and the boys on the other. We could not speak to each other in the halls or on the grounds, or even within a given number of blocks from school when on our way home.

I HAD my first quarrel with him at once. In Ohio, if you had a high-enough average in your studies—which meant 90—you didn't have to take final examinations. My average had been 90 and I had never taken an examination. Now, I was told, I would have to take the regents' examinations. That frightened me; and then I found out that if I wanted to graduate as scheduled, I would also have to take something like six subjects in one term and seven in my last. I couldn't get credit for all of the subjects I had

enough. I insisted that I would take the thirteen subjects in my senior year and graduate on schedule, and he shrugged his shoulders and let me do it—perhaps feeling that if I was foolish enough to ruin my health by studying all night that was my own problem.

Then, almost at once, I had another quarrel with him. He traveled in Europe nearly every Summer and brought back statues and antiques and souvenirs on which he lectured in assembly. The talks were interesting, and I wrote a couple of little articles about them and sent them to a local newspaper printed in South Buffalo. I had been doing this for a short while when Dr. Babst happened to see one of my articles. He called me into his office the next morning.

MY DEAR girl," he said, "these little lectures of mine are confidential—for the students! You have no right to write them up professionally!"

He made me feel like a cheap spy of some sort, and again I thought he was only being mean and cruel. What I didn't understand was that he felt as he did about my publishing accounts of his lectures just as he felt the way he did about boys and girls mingling on the school grounds, because his own, personal moral standards were so high. He was not mean or cruel; he was business-like and efficient in his work, yes; but under the surface he had a great sense of the dignity and worth of training young minds. I was soon to learn how much he really loved and sympathized with us—for, as you have guessed by now, it was this same Dr. Babst, whom I hated, who divined that I had a voice and encouraged me to develop it.

It happened in a strange fashion. At Christmas time, we always sang songs in assembly. Because my name happened to begin with a "B," I sat in the

the beginning of my life was one long story of not quite fitting. But, one day, one of the angels got sick and couldn't sing. I was sitting there, and the director walked over to Dr. Babst and they held a whispered conversation. Then the director walked down to the footlights, leaned over, and handed me the part of Mary in the pageant.

SING this for me, Rose," he said. "But I can't sing it," I objected. "I don't know it."

"Sing it," he said. "Go on." Confused, I looked over at Dr. Babst, and he gave me a gentle nod of encouragement. "Yes, Rose," he said. "Sing it for us."

I stood up and sang my way through the role as well as I could, and when I was done Dr. Babst nodded again. "That was very good, Rose," he said—and I had the part. My first part! The first time I had ever actually done anything and succeeded!

And after the pageant he came up to me and asked me, "Rose, would you like to sing at assembly for us some morning?"

Sing at assembly! Someone really thought I was good enough to get up on the stage by myself and sing for the others! If it is the dream of your life to become a singer, as it was the

"No," I admitted reluctantly. "What?" he almost shouted. "You don't know the Bach *Ave Maria*? Why, Rose, you must! It's one of the most beautiful pieces of music ever written. Not know the *Ave Maria*!—why, I've never heard of such a thing! All great singers know it and sing it."

"But, Dr. Babst," I protested weakly, "I'm not a great singer."

And then with the utmost casualness, as though it were something to be taken quite for granted, something he had known all along and was amazed to find I didn't know too, he said quietly, "But you will be, Rose!"

Those first thrilling words of encouragement that meant so much, the first hint that someone really thought I was a singer, came from this man whom I had disliked with all my heart! Such are the strange paths along which we find our way to our life work! No meteor blazes across the sky, no miracle takes place. When you least expect it, from the every-day life close around you today, from a casual friend or even from someone you believe to be your enemy, will come the right word that will set you on the track . . . Watch for it!

As though it were really some mystic word, some open sesame which had been spoken for me, no sooner did I

to Seth Clark, my first voice teacher.

Then it was back once more to—discouragement. I have warned you that a singer's life is one long list of discouragements with, now and then at long intervals, a glimpse of hope. I warn you of it again. My life has been like that, and yours will be too if you hope to sing.

Just before I was graduated from high school, I heard that the Federation of Women's Music Clubs was sponsoring a contest for young singers. Auditions were to be held in Wanamaker's auditorium in New York City, and the winner was to receive \$500. Five hundred dollars to me looked like five million—but so, for that matter, did the railroad fare to New York. I was giving piano lessons to some neighbor children after school to earn a little money for myself, but that wasn't enough to pay for a trip down to the city and pay for hotel and other expenses while I was there.

But my dad came through like the grand man he is. He got together enough money to send Mother and me down to New York. I had never been there and neither had she. We found the auditorium and, in the hall outside, I went into a complete panic. Stage fright!

"I WILL not go in there," I said over and over, my teeth chattering. "I will not go in there and sing!"

"Darling, after all the sacrifice we've made to get here you do want to go in and sing, don't you?" she entreated me, but I was too frightened to move. She had to lead me in almost by the ear.

I sang—and I think if you have followed my career this far you know what happened to me. The prize went to another girl. And there was no second prize! There wasn't even a booby prize! Our fare from Buffalo,

thing like a voice, but it did not alter the fact that once more, for the *n*th time, I had failed. And right then was when I decided that never again would I tell anyone of my plans. If you don't tell people you're entering contests they can't possibly know it if and when you fail.

BACK I went to Buffalo, to my piano lessons for children. Back I went to Seth Clark, my teacher, and to Mary Howard, who was teaching me sight reading. She was the music critic in Buffalo, and had known all the great musicians and singers of her time. At last I knew in my heart of hearts, knew for sure, that a singer was what I wanted to be, what I must be.

But I had come that far only to learn, it seemed, that I could go no farther. For Mary Howard felt that I must go to Europe at once if I was to have a finished voice and a musical background. And Seth Clark, although he realized that it was entirely beyond my means, confessed that he felt much the same way about it. A course of study in Europe, running into years, was regarded as an absolute necessity for every singer. It was the consensus of musical opinion everywhere that singers who got their training in America remained poor singers. I must go to Europe—or fail.

And I knew there would be no Europe for me!

"Rose Bampton," I said to myself, with my heart breaking, "your story ends right here!"

On Saturday, Kirsten Flagstad brings the "Met" season to a close with a broadcast of Wagner's master work, "Lohengrin," one of the most beautiful of all operas. Wagner finished the score of "Lohengrin" in the year 1847, in Dresden. It was the year of his exile from Germany for political intrigue, an exile which was to last for ten years, and before this time, Wagner had heard no more than a chorus of the first act.

As the curtain rises, we find Henry the Fowler, King of Germany, sitting on the banks of the River Scheldt. Around him are knights and nobles of Saxony, Thuringia and Brabant, the Brabantians headed by Frederick of Telramund, his wife, Ortrud, beside him. The King has come to gather an army, but he finds the people torn in dissension. The young Duke Godfrey of Brabant, who, with his sister Elsa, lived under the charge of Telramund, has disappeared. Telramund, who was to marry Elsa, has been persuaded by Ortrud to believe that the girl herself killed the boy. Ortrud, faithful to the ancient gods, is a practitioner of black magic, and she is responsible for Godfrey's disappearance.

Elsa must prove her innocence in trial by combat, and she tells the King of a dream she has had, in which a knight in shining armor came to her aid. This is the famous "Elsa's Dream." The King, impressed, invokes the judgment of God, and shortly there appears, in a boat drawn by a swan, a mysterious knight. He champions Elsa, and defeats Telramund in battle. Act II finds Telramund and Ortrud crouched dejectedly in a corner of the King's palace. They are in disgrace. But Ortrud, crafty and scheming, has not yet lost hope. She argues that the mysterious knight's power derives from his hidden identity, and tells her husband that he could be defeated were that identity discovered.

Elsa comes to the window to sing of her new love, and Ortrud approaches her, makes dark hints against the mysterious knight, hints of magic and the powers of darkness. Elsa defends him, but the seed of doubt has been sown.

On the next day, preparations are made for Elsa's marriage to her defender. The wedding procession moves across the courtyard. A herald has proclaimed the banishment of Telramund, and his Dukedom of Brabant has been offered to Elsa's champion, who refuses. But now Telramund and Ortrud appear and charge the mysterious knight with black magic. The King will not listen, the couple are driven forth. Elsa's mind, however, is filled with doubt. The Bridal Chamber in the palace is the first scene of Act III. The orchestra plays the gorgeous "Epithalamium" prelude, and the curtain rises. The great doors at the rear of the chamber fly open, and the wedding procession enters, singing the familiar "Bridal Chorus." All save Elsa and the knight retire, and Elsa begins to question the knight as to his identity. His reminders of her promise, when he fought for her, to preserve his anonymity, do not dissuade her.

Suddenly Telramund enters, followed by four henchmen, and moves to attack the knight. Telramund is slain, and his henchmen kneel to the champion. Realizing he can no longer guard his identity, the knight decides to reveal himself.

As the second scene of Act III opens, we find the King waiting beneath the Oak of Justice. Elsa, pale and perturbed, approaches, followed by the stern-visaged knight. He justifies his slaying of Telramund, and reveals Elsa's broken vows to the assemblage. He proclaims himself to be Lohengrin, the son of Parsifal of Monsalvat, a knight of the Holy Grail. Now, Lohengrin tells the King, he must leave. The swan is seen approaching as Elsa laments. She is told by Lohengrin that had she trusted him for a year, her brother, Duke Godfrey would have been returned to her. As he steps aboard the swan boat, Ortrud declares that her magic has triumphed, that the swan is none other than the Duke Godfrey. Invoking Divine aid, Lohengrin restores Godfrey to his rightful state, proclaims him Duke of Brabant, and sorrowfully takes his leave. Crying, "My husband! My husband!" Elsa sinks lifeless to the ground as Lohengrin disappears forever.

MUSIC of the MASTERS

THE uncommon opportunity of hearing part of the last act of Richard Wagner's *Parsifal*, in concert form with an excellent orchestra, will be given listeners by the Philadelphia Symphony's broadcast of the "Good Friday Spell," on March 26. The only performance in this country this season of the complete score of Wagner's last work will be the annual Good Friday matinee in the Metropolitan Opera House—not to be broadcast—for which all tickets were sold to subscribers without any box-office offering. Paul Althouse sings *Parsifal*. The rarity with which this music is performed and the sublimity and beauty of its pathos make this an occasion not to be missed.

Several themes around love, renunciation, and salvation preceded the *Parsifal* poem of Wolfram von Eschenbach, the *Minnesinger*, in Wagner's mind, and it took many years for it to reach fruition. First, Wagner projected the idea of a music-drama on the subject of the Emperor Frederick Barbarossa. Then, he drafted a sketch for a play on the theme of Jesus of Nazareth. But it shortly became clear that neither of these subjects were suitable for treatment in his musical idiom.

"I was burning," he tells us, "to write something that should take the message of my tortured brain, and speak in a fashion to be understood by those living today. Just as with my *Siegfried*, the force of my desire had borne me to the fount of the Eternal Human: so now, when I found this desire cut off by modern life from all appeasement, and saw afresh that sole redemption lay in flight from out this life, casting off its claims on me by self-destruction, did I come to the fount of every modern rendering of such a situation: Jesus of Nazareth, the Man."

There is already something of *Parsifal* in this, but it was not until a quarter of a century later that the poem, as we know it, took final form.

THE story is one of those associated with the legend of the Holy Grail. The Castle of the Grail is Monsalvat, to which Lohengrin (in the Metropolitan's broadcast the day after—March 27) returns. There the holy knights guard two precious objects: the spear with which Christ's side was pierced on the Cross, and the Cup from which He drank at the Last Supper, and that received His blood while He hung on the Cross. Only the pure of heart can be of this chosen company, whose mission it is to do good in the world through the miraculous powers conferred on them by the Grail.

The crisis of the opera occurs before the curtain rises. Klingsor, whose ambition to be one of the Knights of the Grail was frustrated by the evil in his heart, has begun to practise a black magic. He has created a beautiful garden and peopled it with seductive young women, through whom he snared the souls of the weaker Knights. Amfortas, son of the old Titirel, who built Monsalvat, one day took the sacred Spear with him to exorcise the Spirit of Evil in Klingsor's garden, but he, too, succumbed to the wiles of Kundry, most beautiful of the maidens in the service of Klingsor. The evil Knight, thus able to gain possession of the Spear, dealt Amfortas a wound in the side for which no remedy had been found at that time.

*Parsifal*, the guileless Knight, who repulsed Kundry, provided the cure and restored Amfortas to health. It is in Act III that this comes about: in the first scene we witness the return of Parsifal to the aged Gurnemanz and to Kundry, who becoming penitent has donned a garb of sack-cloth and seeks to make amends by doing good. The plight of the Knights is told to Parsifal, and after the Spell of Good Friday—the day on which all creation rejoices in the Savior's sacrifice and love—is observed, bells are heard in the distance, gradually increasing in tone, until we are led into the Hall of the Grail. There the miracle is enacted and the Grail shines again. Love and Benediction descend on the Knights and voices are heard from on high offering adoration to the Redeemer.

As you doubtless know, it was Wagner's wish that *Parsifal* never be heard outside Bayreuth, and, as long as the copyright lasted, it never was. The great Richard felt that owing to the solemnity of the subject it required a special stage, a special occasion, a profound atmosphere, and a select audience. Also, its exclusiveness added to the box-office exchequer, and Wagner was not averse to that. But now, due to circumstances over which neither Wagner nor his heirs had control, the noble music can be heard in your home at your invitation with you and your guests as the select audience, and your own pleasure will provide the atmosphere.

THE best of all those youngsters—professionals and amateurs—who tried out during the season's Metropolitan Auditions of the Air will be heard during the grand finale of the series Sunday. Many a heart has beat faster during the past five months as its hopeful owner stepped before the microphone with the stage of the old brownstone house at 39th and Broadway as a goal. Only one or two, or possibly three of these, will trod the boards that have for half a century resounded to the world's greatest voices; but all will have gained immeasurably in experience and understanding of what is ahead for them. None that are talented and have faith in their talent should give up. For success never comes the first time.

Gladys Swarthout, who assumed her first major role at the Metropolitan when she sang *Mignon* a week ago, did not do so well. According to the *New York Times*: "It would have taken a very susceptible person, indeed, to be moved deeply by Miss Swarthout's interpretation. . . . The 'Connais-tu le pays,' and the 'Swallow' duet found Miss Swarthout decidedly out of her element, her singing in them creating almost no atmosphere and leaving the hearer cold."

It is not always possible for a personality that makes itself felt in the cinema and over the microphone to appear at its best on the large Metropolitan stage. Miss Swarthout may grow in her operatic work as she has in her concert work, though her vocal limitations are such that she will never be able to negotiate the greater roles of the repertory with distinction.

## Flagstad Sings 'Lohengrin' In 'Met's' Last

Kirsten Flagstad, the reigning sensation of the Metropolitan, will bring to a close the New York opera season with a performance of Richard Wagner's immortal "Lohengrin" on Saturday, March 27.

Eagerly looked forward to by music-lovers all during the season, the Saturday broadcast will bring the greatest living Wagnerian soprano to the most ethereally beautiful of all Wagnerian opera.

When, two years ago, Kirsten Flagstad made her Metropolitan debut, she was unrecognized in any of the greater operas of the world. Her first performance sent staid New York critics into an uproar of enthusiasm. It was said of her at that time that she "brought back memories of those fabulous days before operatic singing went off the gold standard."

Since then Kirsten Flagstad has gone on to even more spectacular successes than those she enjoyed in her first New York roles, but the critics and audiences alike have exhausted their stories of superlatives. Today the announcement that Flagstad will sing insures a sell-out at the "Met."

"Lohengrin" is one of Flagstad's favorite operas, and she has more than once demonstrated her ability to bring new life to the opera, often the victim of inartistic performances.

Rene Maison, young Belgian tenor, will sing the role of "Lohengrin." Ortrud will be sung by Karin Branzell, gifted Swedish contralto.

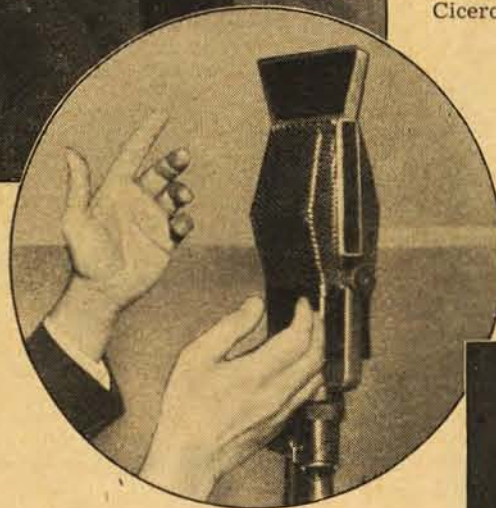
"Sure," said Curren.

# YOUR UNSEEN FRIEND

BY MARY JACOBS

WHEN the barouche of the Viceroy of India, drawn by six prancing horses, drew up in front of the Joachim home in Calcutta, India, Maurice Joachim, whom you hear every Sunday over the CBS network as "Your Unseen Friend, The Voice of Conscience," stared pop-eyed at its splendor. His chums were equally amazed.

The boys couldn't restrain themselves. Excitedly, they crowded around nine-year-old Maurice. "Is your father really going to see the Viceroy of India? To eat at the same table with him?" they asked incredulously. "Gee, it must be swell to have a dad so important."

But to Maurice it wasn't "swell"—it was all very, very puzzling.

That very morning he had seen the local postmaster stick stamps on the end of a rod, which he thrust at a low-caste Hindu to avoid touching him. He had seen paupers arrested for drawing water from the public well. And he had seen boys and girls

actually eating the refuse they removed from the streets. It was all they could get. That they were the lowest caste, Untouchables, he knew. But why were they pariahs, outcasts? Why was it forbidden to talk with them? Why did one pray if he accidentally touched their garments?

It didn't matter that his mother and father explained he was a Brahmin, a member of the highest caste in India, and therefore entitled to a life of ease and luxury, while others, through an accident of birth, were cursed forever.

Inequality — injustice — hardship wherever he went. What was the explanation? Wherein lay the answer?

He went to the University of Calcutta, to Oxford. He specialized in sociology, in psychology, in philosophy. Nowhere could he find a working basis for living.

When the World War started, he was too young to enlist, so he lied about his age and entered service as a dispatch rider. His experiences in German East Africa served only to

intensify his feeling that something horribly brutal and alien was stalking through the world, distorting the vision of men the world over.

The war ended. Back home once again, he entered government civil service, being appointed to the post of deputy magistrate and collector of taxes in the district of Jarbandhur, 140 miles from Calcutta. Now he had his chance: he was the law-giver, with power of life and death over the natives, who groaned under the burden of heavy taxes. But it didn't work.

NEVER collected a tax without feeling it was unjust. I never sent a poor, ignorant soul to jail for thievery without feeling that he was in no way to blame."

So he threw up the job and returned to Calcutta.

Still groping for a solution, he turned to religion. Certainly the fatalistic Hindu belief, with its iron-clad caste system, was partly to blame for the helplessness of the masses.

To him, Hinduism was a religion without hope. So he studied the three hundred religious creeds of all India . . . and eventually embraced Christianity.

"To me," Joachim said, "Christianity, with its hope of the future, with its loving, forgiving God, is the only soul-satisfying belief." And for a long while, he preached Christianity, being the first pastor to speak on a religious program broadcast over the NBC network, back in 1926.

So popular did his sermons become that for six years he toured the United States, talking on social problems, on religious problems, on India and international affairs.

Before the wealthy and the poor alike he spoke, to governors and beggars. One day he'd lecture to a group of a dozen rough, dirty sailors . . . the next day at a private party at the home of a millionaire captain of industry.

AND he discovered something that surprised him greatly. "Invariably," he told me, "whether men were murderers or near-saints, all were driven by and feared just one thing—the voice of conscience."

In his lectures, Dr. Joachim spoke to over half a billion people, and the conviction grew within him that someone was badly needed to help them solve their problems.

"It isn't that I tell people what to do," he told me. "I don't believe any man has the right to decide another's destiny. One is justified only in influencing another to think for himself."

Each one of us has his own court of justice within us, "whose verdict," Cicero said centuries ago, "can not be

disputed. Its sessions are held in the chambers of the heart and mind."

That is why, on the air, in his dramatic sketches taken from every-day problems you and I have sent him, Dr. Joachim is the "Voice of Conscience, Your Unseen Friend," who never does the deciding, but who, through a Eugene O'Neill technique, allows us to see what is going on in a man's heart. And makes the man decide for himself his course of action.

# HE WANTED TIME TO HIMSELF

BY ARTHUR MILLER

ONE day in 1915, Arnold Johnson told a violinist in one of his three orchestras—he had three at the time—that he thought he ought to try to get another job. The violinist was Paul Whiteman!

But that little anecdote is no indication that Arnold Johnson doesn't know talent when he sees it. He does. And then, too, it may occur to you that after all, Paul Whiteman didn't achieve the lasting fame that is his today as a violinist! Violin-playing ability has contributed very little to the spectacular career of the King of Jazz.

Yes, Arnold Johnson knows talent. If Paul Whiteman had had the makings of a great violinist, Johnson would have been among the first to tell him so. He is ever on the lookout for new and promising talent of any and every kind.

At the moment, his protegee—and his pride and joy—is Christina Lind, a young vocalist, unusually pretty and unusually talented. You've heard Christina Lind on Johnson's 1937 Radio Show program, broadcast over WOR and the Mutual network every Sunday at 6 p.m. EST (5 CST; 4 MST; 3 PST), and if you share Johnson's opinion, you're convinced that she's going far in the musical and radio career she is already carving out for herself.

ARNOLD JOHNSON is a veteran. Not until 1930 did he put down his baton and announce that he was through leading orchestras in cafes and night clubs—through for good, and glad of it. He had no regrets. Twenty years of late hours, twenty years of working while others danced, and still others slept, were enough for him. He figured he deserved a lighter schedule—so he went after it.

When he quit tapping music-stands with his baton he began knocking at the doors of advertising agencies. He may have announced that he was through with orchestra work, but like all musicians, he knew that he couldn't hope ever entirely to escape his first love—music. And to tell the truth, he didn't want to! He simply decided it was time to get into another branch of the business.

Johnson pounded on the doors of advertising agencies with one very sound reason in mind: he knew that beyond them was as good a passage-way to radio as any. Regular hours and the time to do other things than just lead an orchestra were what he wanted. In radio he found a medium for his music that would allow him to experience these pent-up desires. Too, radio rejuvenated his life as an orchestra leader. He found new vigor that had been waning while he passed the years working in cafes night after night, while others enjoyed themselves.

Arnold Johnson is still a young man despite his long experience as a working musician. He is a rugged, ruddy man, and he clinches his strong physical appearance with a warmth of character that is immediately noticed. He smiles in a reminiscent way as he tells of his first job. Perhaps—who can tell—he'd like to see those old days back again.

IT WAS in Chicago, when I was fourteen, playing in a chop suey place with a four-piece band! And there is no doubt why he is forced to smile upon this reflection when one remembers that since the age of eighteen, Arnold Johnson has been a very successful orchestra leader.

"I like to be successful in anything I begin," he says, and for that certainly no one can blame him. Unfortunately it has not always been so. Johnson has never restricted his activities to music alone. He has many other interests. In fact, he dabbles in so many

things in addition to music that he could almost be classified as a hard-working businessman. His music comes first, of course, but—

There was the time, for instance, when he produced a play. "The Sap from Syracuse" was its title, and the venture—Arnold's first and last as a play producer—cost him about \$2,500. Johnson will admit, now, that perhaps "The Sap from Syracuse" wasn't of Pulitzer caliber. Although he may have thought so at one time.

"It was panned by the critics," he says with characteristic good nature, "but we sold it to a movie company, and that helped some."

Now that he is firmly planted in radio—there have been three changes in the master of ceremonies post while Johnson has been with his present sponsor—he is realizing the desires that urged him to forsake everything

but radio as a means of reaching his audience.

IN 1936, he bought a 220-acre farm in Redding, Connecticut, which at the end of the first fiscal year showed a deficit of \$9,000. But deficit or no deficit, he kept right on raising fancy poultry and exhibiting his prize specimens in shows.

"Of course," Arnold says, "the first year I had to invest quite a bit of money to improve things around the farm." So you see, he does have hopes of realizing some profits which will make an enterprise of what he really looks upon as a hobby. That's good business—if it works out.

He's much happier since he began radio work, and he has helped others to be happier, too. Arnold had the job of selecting amateurs to appear on his first series of broadcasts, and besides offering them many aids at that time, he has continued his "helping hand" policy to this day.

WHEN there was a change in the program, a decision to use professional entertainers instead of amateur talent, he thought the amount of work required to audition them would be lessened, and made easier. He was grossly mistaken, for he discovered that the number of professionals who are seeking opportunities to go on the air is as great as the number of amateurs.

But amateur or professional, they can rely on sound advice and a helping hand from Arnold Johnson!

THE non-verifying policy of all stations operated by the BBC is a source of considerable annoyance to listeners. This has been overcome in part through the monitoring bureau established by Carroll Weyrich and Barney Ahman of 4310 Evans Chapel Road, Baltimore, Md., who are carefully checking the programs of the Daventry stations the first Saturday and Sunday in each month as follows: Saturdays from 6 to 7 and 9 to 10 p.m. EST (5 to 6 and 8 to 9 CST). Sundays from 3 to 4 a.m., 2:45 to 3:45 p.m. and 4 to 5 p.m. EST (2 to 3 a.m., 1:45 to 2:45 and 3 to 4 p.m. CST). Listeners desiring verifications can obtain them by listening to one of the above schedules and sending complete details with five cents in stamps to Messrs. Weyrich and Ahman.

Another new country may now be added to your short-wave logs. G. W. Rockwell of Halifax, N. S., Canada, writes that "Curacao Radio" broadcast its first program on Monday, March 1, on an announced frequency of 9.473 megs. The station, which was tuned in at 6:36 p.m. EST (5:36 CST) and held until sign-off at 9:11 p.m. EST (8:11 CST), gave the address as Curacao Radio, Curacao, Dutch West Indies.

According to Dr. Durrwang, president of Radio Club Basle in Switzerland, a new low-power station there with the call HBVE has been testing for several weeks. It is owned by the Brown Boveri Company of Baden Aargau, Switzerland, and usually works amateurs on the 40-meter band, but also employs several other frequencies.

Some time ago I noted that ZHI, Singapore, Straits Settlement, had closed down. Replacing it, a new station with an unknown call is working on 6.005 megs. John DeMyer, Lansing, Mich., has been hearing it near 6:45 a.m. EST (5:45 CST), on Mondays and Thursdays.

Short-Wave Service, of France, informs that a new short-wave center will be erected soon for programs and commentaries from the Paris International Exhibition opening in May. . . . The power of short-wave station OXY (6.06) of Copenhagen, Denmark, has been increased to 5,000 watts. Listeners on the Atlantic Coast report it can now be heard regularly on its daily schedule from 1 to 6:30 p.m. EST (12 to 5:30 CST).

All Daventry, England, schedules will change April 27. Watch this column for full details.

The University of Alaska, at College, has been granted permission to erect an experimental station for the purpose of making ionosphere measurements in the polar regions. Frequencies allotted include each even 100 kilocycles from 1,500 to 16,000. Maximum power will be 200 watts.

Sintonia, of Buenos Aires, states that a new station, CXA2, has been completed in Montevideo, Uruguay. The first commercial short-wave station in this part of South America, it has been assigned a frequency of 6.035 megs, but is conducting initial tests on 6 megs. It operates daily from 10 a.m. to 12 noon and from 4 to 10 p.m. EST (9 to 11 a.m. and 3 to 9 p.m. CST). Reports should be addressed to Rio Negro 1631, Montevideo, Uruguay.

West Australia's Wireless News reports that VK6ME, the new Perth, West Australia, station will be on a regular schedule soon. It has been testing on a frequency of 9.59 megs.

R. B. OXRIEDER of State College, Penna., notes that Radio Fort de France, Martinique, last logged near 9.36 megs, has not been heard for about two weeks. . . . The correct call of "La Voz del Alma" in Guayaquil, Ecuador, operating on 9.441 megs and signing off nightly at 10:15 p.m. EST (9:15 CST), is still in doubt. For quite a while a half-dozen different calls were being employed with the same slogan for each. The call in use at present sounds like HCODA.

PCJ, now broadcasting from Hilversum, Holland, with augmented power and a new type aerial, is being heard with signals easily comparable to Daventry, England.

Juan Coquell Storer of Santurce, Puerto Rico, informs me that the power of COCQ (9.75) of Havana, Cuba, which with its 3,000 watts is already being heard in nearly every part of the world, will soon be increased to 26,000 watts! . . . The Colombian government is re-organizing its broadcasting set-up. All short-wave stations must use more power and furnish better modulation or go off the air.

SINCE March 15, W2XAD (15.33) of Schenectady, N. Y., has been operating daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. EST (9 to 5 CST). . . . The Swedish short-wave station nearing completion near Motala will have a power of 1,500 watts. . . . Roy DeMent, Plainview, Texas, notes that CT1AA (9.65) of Lisbon, Portugal, is now on the air on Sundays from 7 to 9 p.m. EST (6 to 8 CST). . . . Soviet transmissions that have been puzzling were probably from one of the new stations listed by Egyptian Radio: RBO (8.31), RPK (7.42), RKA (6.96) and RYS (6.75). These were launched to relay speeches and news in connection with the Spanish war.

HIX, of Trujillo City, is now testing with the following new calls and frequencies: H11X (6.34), H12X (11.96), and H13X (15.28). Excellent strength is shown on the latter two frequencies.

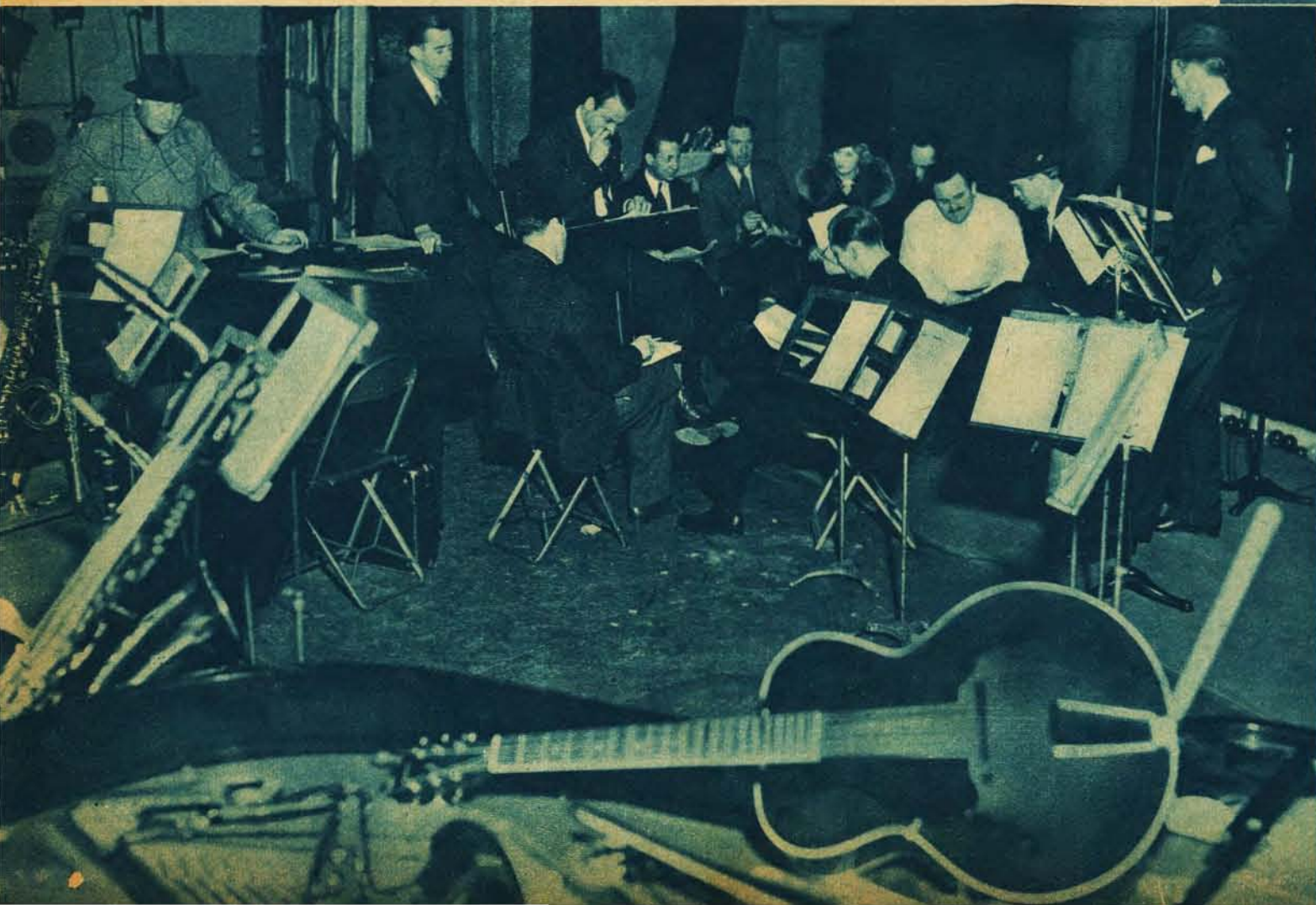
