

5:43P.M. We asked Mr. Wagner not to touch anything in the JOE: house. We told him that after his wife had been returned 2 and our men could move safely about the neighborhood. The 3 house would be gone over for physical evidence. Two men 4 came out from the office and a stakeout was placed on the 5 6 house. The note was taken downtown and photographed. Dean Bergman lifted several clean prints from it. However, 7 comparison with those taken from Mr. Wagner eliminated 8 them. The maid, Betty Jo, was contacted, but she could tell 9 us nothing. In the meantime, Sergeant Jay Allen of the 10 11 Crime Lab prepared a shoe box as directed by the abductors 12 note. Dummy packages of money were placed in the box, and the container was wiped clean of all fingerprints.
