THERE was a time when anyone who spent most of his waking hours thinking about classical music was looked on as something of a stuffed shirt, who would cringe visibly at the mention of a hill-billy tune or a "whodunit," and perhaps make a fetish of untidiness and long hair. Nowadays he's just as likely to look like Terence Gibbs of the CBC's Toronto studios who, with his bow tie, short hair and boyish appearance, could pass for a producer of jive and hep-cat revues. Actually, Gibbs is responsible for producing some of the CBC's most important programs of serious music—the CBC Symphony Orchestra and CBC Opera Company productions, some CBC Wednesday Night broadcasts, and the *Distinguished Artists*

series on Sunday nights. But when he isn't buried deep in an operatic score or plans for a big concert, when he's really relaxed with his feet up, as likely as not he is tuned in to something as unclassical as *Rawhide* or *Prairie Schooner*.

He has crammed a lot of musical experience into his 31 years, beginning with piano study at school in England, where he was born. Between his graduation and the outbreak of the Second Great War he spent a year at Wye Agricultural College in Kent, and then found himself a private in the

British Army. Later he became an officer in the Eighth-Eleventh Sikh Regiment, serving in Burma and India until 1945. In his spare time he gave informal lectures on music appreciation to the troops, continued his music study through books and records, and decided that music, rather than agriculture, would be the field for him after the war.

"My worst wartime experience," he recalls, "had nothing to do with battles. I became ill in Burma and they put me in (Please turn to page 2)

a hospital ward with a radio that poured forth nothing but 'hot' tunes from early-morning temperature-taking until 'lights out' at night—for four months! I think that ordeal delayed my recovery. I like jazz, but in its proper setting."

Back in England after the war he studied piano, composition and theory at the Guildhall School of Music in London for two years, and soon after was appointed assistant artist manager of the Decca Record Company there.

"Recording had been virtually at a standstill during the war," he said, "and the Company was anxious to build up a large repertoire of classical records, using their latest development—full-frequency recording. This is a method which captures the harmonics as well as the fundamental tones, making the recording much closer to the original musical performance than had previously been possible. The job took me on a period of continent-cruising with a recording unit, seeking and engaging the finest musicians and instrumental groups, among them the Paris Conservatoire Orchestra, singers of the Vienna State Opera, Holland's famous Concertgebouw, and the London Philharmonic. I spent about 30 hours a week recording. Many performances were put on disc right on the spot, while others were done in London when the artists went to England for concert engagements. One of the work I supervised was the opera *Orfeo* by the Glyndebourne Opera Company. And one of my first programs, after joining the CBC in 1948, was the same opera!"

Gibbs thinks public taste is becoming enormously enlightened and good music is no longer being regarded as entertainment for the chosen few. The CBC Symphony Orchestra he says, is filling a very big musical gap by programming works of the elder contemporaries—and has had an enthusiastic response.

Too Bulky Newspapers.—The present size of the Sunday journals goes back to the shortage of paper during the war . . . I expect that during that time the editors discovered that something they had been thoughtlessly quoting for years was in fact true, that "brevity is the soul of wit." Anyway they seem to be able to get everything there is to say into the present twelve pages, and get it there so that I do not have to excavate for it . . . Everything seems to get coverage, and get it succinctly, with economy of their time, and mine.—Stanley Maxted, on BBC.

The Winnipeg Drama

New Year Sees Beginning Of Series Of "Superior Scripts"

WITH the New Year, the Winnipeg Drama series, under new direction, launches a series in which adaptations of classical and modern authors of the top flight, and Canadian writing new and old, will play a prominent part.

Speaking of his plans for 1953, Emrys Jones, CBC producer and director of the series, said: "We begin

the New Year with some superior scripts, which, we hope, will set the pace for a stronger and more interesting program in this weekly half-hour series."

Definitely scheduled for January are the following:

January 8 to January 22 inclusive:

A series of three short stories of the Deep South by William Faulkner, adapted for radio by Dr. Margaret Stobie of Winnipeg.

Jan. 8—Grandmother Millard and the Battle of Harrykin Creek. (See program note, Page 6).

Jan. 15—Shingles for the Lord.

Jan. 22—Go Down, Moses.

(See succeeding issues of the Times for program notes).

Margaret Stobie, who is adapting these plays to the celebrated American novelist, is an Albertan, born in Vermilion, and educated at the University of Alberta (B.A.), the University of London, England, and the University of Toronto (M.A., Ph.D.). She is a specialist in Middle English and Chaucer, and is the author of a textbook widely used in the United States, *An Outline of Middle English Grammar*. Her articles in scholarly journals, such as the publication of the Modern Languages Association, are chiefly on the same subject. Dr. Stobie has done a good deal of work on CBC, as writer, actress, and book reviewer. She was a professor of English at the University of Manitoba for some years.

Other plays now under consideration by Mr. Jones for early 1953, but not yet definitely scheduled are:

(1) Two or three of Shakespeare's plays, each to be presented in a series of three or four half-hour episodes.

(2) A series of six plays by W. G. Hardy of Edmonton, Canadian novelist and writer of short stories. Each play will deal with the impact of some great event in very early history on the life of the man in the street.

(3) Revivals of original plays by two well-known Western Canadian authors, Gwen Pharis Ringwood and Elsie Park Gowan.

(4) An adaptation by M. H. Scargill of the Icelandic Saga of Gunnlaug and Hrafu under the title, *A Poet's Love*.

Winnipeg Drama is a weekly presentation of the CBC, originating in CBW studios on Thursday nights (CBW, CBK, and CBX 10:30 p.m. local time). Speaking of it, Mr. Jones says:

"To this series, as indeed, to all

such radio programs, the entire staff of the station contributes in one important way or another. The "front line" production team, bringing this program to the microphone is made up of the following regular co-workers: Emrys Jones, producer and director; Derek Nelson, technical operator; John Mestery, sound and special effects; and Ken Dougan, announcer.

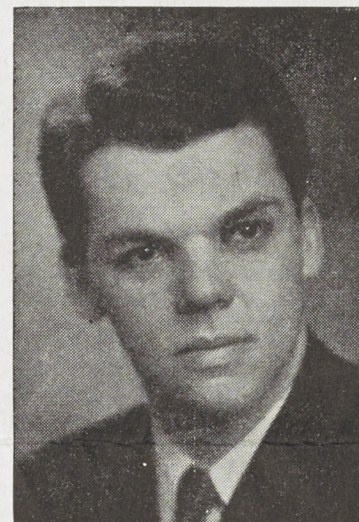

Prairie Farm Forums

Provincial Secretaries Report Opinion In Canada's Greatest Farm Territory

Of the 675 million bushels of wheat produced in all Canada last year, the prairie provinces produced 654 million. Total grain production in these provinces in 1952 is estimated at 1,300,000,000 bushels.

This is a part of the world where agriculture still reigns supreme. Even in Alberta, the total yield from all the province's fabulous resources of oil, coal, and gas, amounts to less than half the revenue from agriculture. Aggregate prairie agricultural revenue in 1952 ran over two billion dollars.

In a country like this, the men who speak for the farming population are important people. The prairie farmers have a number of representatives, in parliament and in their own organizations. In radio, they have their National Farm Radio Forums, and they have three provincial secretaries who summarize forum findings each week for the listening audience.

The prairie secretaries are: John K. Frizzell of Manitoba, David R. Robinson of Saskatchewan, and James R. McFall of Alberta. Mr. Frizzell lives in Winnipeg, Mr. Robinson in Saskatoon, and Mr. McFall in Calgary. Each Monday night, following the 25-minute National Farm Radio Forum discussion broadcast, they report forum opinions on the previous week's broadcast to listening groups in each province. In January they will report on three discussions: January 5—The Cost of Marketing; January 12—Where Are the New Farm Leaders?; and January 19—Embarrassing Surpluses.

Farm Forums are simply groups of neighbours who gather together on Monday nights to hear the CBC Forum broadcast, study and discuss the topic, decide how their mutual problems can best be solved, and follow up with appropriate action. They are a joint project of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Canadian Association for Adult Education, and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. This is their thirteenth season. Floyd Griesbach of Toronto is the National Farm Forum secretary. Local forum secretaries register their groups with the Provincial Farm Forum office and report forum opinions each week on a pad provided. They also arrange times and places for the weekly meetings.

John K. Frizzell, Manitoba provincial forum secretary, is a farm manager, lecturer, and general assistant in the faculty of agriculture at the University of Manitoba. He is a native of Duval, Saskatchewan, and a graduate of Moose Jaw Normal School. After three years teaching, he went to the University of Saskatchewan for his agricultural degree, graduating B.S.A. in 1942. Four years army service in Canada, England, and the Con-

A program of French Canadian music and a vocal and instrumental ensemble from Vancouver are added.

Winter.

Repeat of Lloyd Roberts' word-sketch of wintertime on a Canadian farm first broadcast by CBC in 1949; J. Frank Willis, producer; from Toronto. Cast: The farmer—John Drainie; his wife—Ruth Springford; others—Budd Knapp, Grace Webster, Billie Mae Richards. Music by Godfrey Ridout, conducted by Samuel Hershenson.

In Roberts' sketch, with which Producer Willis combines an important musical score, winter is seen through the eyes of a Canadian farm family in the Ontario back concessions. Beauty and hardness are set side by side as the farmer's winter day progresses through the round of chores and pleasures, with each detail of the arduous work unsparingly told against the background of stark natural beauty. For three seasons of the year man makes his demands of the soil, reasonably sure that it will reward his labour of seedtime, cultivation, and harvest. Then comes winter, when the

earth sleeps unmolested, protected for a time against the gnawing of the human insect. Work continues, but now concerns the fruits of the past year's soil, and preparation for the new cycle starting with the spring. Lloyd Roberts, born in Fredericton, N.B., is the son of Sir Charles G. D. Roberts, famous Canadian author. He has always been, like his father, an ardent outdoor man, carrying on a family tradition of canoeing and camping. He has lived most of his life in Ontario, but has travelled from the sub-Arctic to the Blue Mountains of Jamaica. He lived for some years on an old farm in the Northumberland Hills near Cobourg, Ontario.

continent followed, and on his return he worked as agricultural representative at Wynyard, Saskatchewan, for two years. He was appointed provincial farm forum secretary in September, 1952. He is a member of the Agricultural Institute of Canada and Manitoba Institute of Agrologists, and president of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada and the Redboyne Artificial Breeding Club.

Saskatchewan having contributed a native son to Manitoba as provincial secretary, Manitoba contributes one of her own to Saskatchewan in the person of David Robinson. Mr. Robinson was born at Belmont, Manitoba, but moved to the Wadena district in

Saskatchewan when quite young. He went through high school at Buchanan, Saskatchewan, and then took his agricultural degree at the University of Saskatchewan, specializing in horticulture. He was graduated in 1928. For ten years he worked in the university's extension department, directing winter courses in Saskatchewan youth training schools. Two years in the army followed, after which he returned to the extension department as a horticultural specialist. Mr. Robinson has been Saskatchewan forum secretary for six years. He is married and has three children.

James R. McFall is a thoroughgoing Albertan, whose early boyhood was spent in southeastern Alberta. He attended the Raymond School of Agriculture in the early '20's, and went on to the University of Alberta, graduating Bachelor of Agriculture in 1927. He went back to farming with his father and brothers after graduation, and during the winters of 1937-38 and 1938-39 assisted in the department of extension, University of Alberta, with Dominion-Provincial youth training. In 1938 also he worked under Dr. F. A. Wyatt in a soil survey program. Mr. McFall joined the staff of the Dominion Experimental Station at Lethbridge in 1940 as supervisor of agricultural improvement associations, continuing this work until 1945 when he took his present position as secretary of the Alberta Federation of Agriculture.

Bridson To East

BBC Writer Will Prepare Programs On Colombo Plan Under Commonwealth Arrangement

D. G. Bridson, the BBC's assistant head of feature programs, has begun a three-months' tour of Ceylon, Malaya, India and Pakistan. His journey is the first fruit of the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference held last summer in London, at which delegates from the national broadcasting organizations of Australia, Canada, Ceylon, Great Britain, India, New Zealand, Pakistan and South Africa

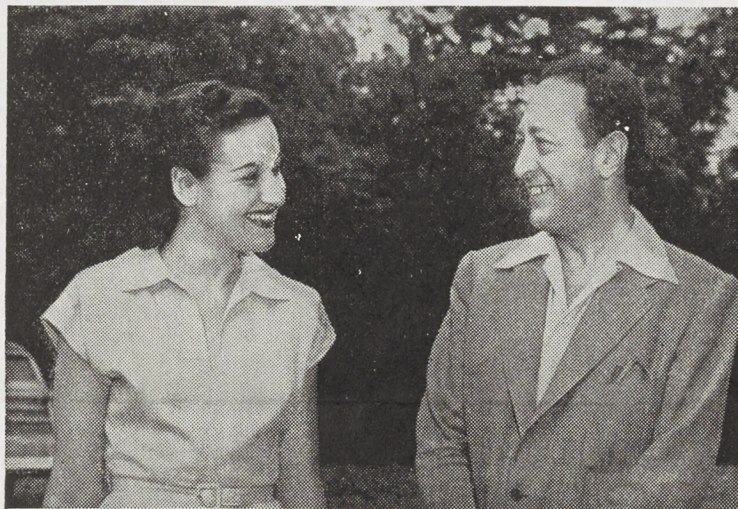
discussed the possibilities of closer integration and interchange of programs. (The CBC's representatives included Charles Jennings, assistant director general of programs, and R. S. Lambert, supervisor of school broadcasts.) Bridson's visit to the four countries, where he will be joined by Loftun Hyde, one of the Australian Broadcasting Commission's commentators, marks the initial step towards providing a service of Commonwealth programs, and is being jointly sponsored by the ABC and the BBC. The outcome will be three feature programs on the Colombo Plan as it affects India, Pakistan, Ceylon and Malaya. These will be heard in the spring in the BBC's Home and Overseas services, and transcribed versions will be made available to other countries. Bridson, a North Countryman of Manx origin who has been on the BBC staff since 1935, is one of that organization's principal feature writers.

Suspense Series To Do Two-Part Version Of Dickens' Classic

A famous and controversial mystery story, left unfinished by Charles Dickens, is being completed by a group of modern mystery-writing experts for a two-part program on successive broadcasts of *Suspense* early in 1953. "Ever since Dickens' death in 1870," says producer Elliott Lewis, "writers have speculated on how he intended to end *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*. No one, of course, will ever know, but I thought it would be interesting to try to develop a logical ending, in key with the rest of the story. We will present it in two parts in order to retain as much of the original Dickens flavour in the radio version as we possibly can."
