

ON a rainy day in April Thom Benson of the CBC went up on the spar deck near the bow of S.S. Thunderbay to get this picture (right) of grain unloading operations at Port McNicol. On Sunday evening, in the first of a summer series of Canadian documentaries, Benson will present the story of shipping on the Great Lakes. He travelled 2,000 miles on the Lakes this spring gathering interviews and sound-effects for the broadcast. Its route confined to the upper Lakes because it is too big for the Welland Canal, The Thunderbay unloads its cargo at the foot of Georgian Bay for trans-shipment by rail to Ontario mills and Atlantic ports.

Benson recorded the sounds of loading and unloading operations at Superior, Wisconsin; Port Arthur, Fort William, Midland and Hamilton. He travelled with cargoes of wheat, iron, ore, coal, and package freight. The handling of the cargoes, the ships that carry them and the men who sail the ships, all came under his scrutiny as the material was being gathered on a tape-recorder.

At the shipyards in Midland, Benson and Kenneth Chapman, recording engineer, recorded the sounds of shipbuilding and the voices and opinions of the builders. They found the answers to several interesting questions, such as, "Why are ships' keels always laid north and south?" and "What causes the explosive noises from a ship's hull at sundown." The hazards of weather and navigation are gone into by a senior captain of the Lakes, who has been a fresh-water sailor for more than 50

years. Modern techniques used to overcome these hazards are also investigated. Actual conversations between ship and shore radio stations were recorded.

School Broadcasts

During the National School Broadcast series "Our Canadian Painters" in January, the National Gallery of Canada offered a silk screen reproduction of a Canadian painting to the school in each

province submitting the best scrapbook on the broadcasts. According to Fred Laight, CBC school broadcast producer at Winnipeg, the Manitoba award, just announced, goes to Grades VII and VIII of Bannatyne School, Winnipeg.

Mr. Laight also said that Manitoba school broadcasts, and especially "It's Fun to Draw," were to be the subject of a television program from Paris by the French school broadcast authorities, and might be on Paris radio later.

THE GREAT LAKES. Throughout the summer in place of the *Stage* plays, the CBC will present documentary broadcasts compiled in various parts of the country by three of the CBC's actuality men—Thom Benson of Toronto, Bill Herbert of Vancouver and Norman McBain of Montreal. Tonight's broadcast will tell the fascinating story of modern freighters and shipping on the Great Lakes. Equipped with a tape-recorder, Benson travelled more than 2,000 miles of fresh-water highways, making trips on wheat and iron-ore, coal and freight carriers. Every aspect of life and work on the Great Lakes will be examined in his hour-long documentary. Next Sunday there will be a program about a transcontinental express train, and on the 28th a feature about the annual music festivals held in towns and cities across the country. After that there will be documentaries on the Canadian aircraft industry; birds of Canada including birds songs recorded at the Delta Waterfowl Research Station in Manitoba; the Caughnawaga Indians; the Port of Vancouver; forest-fire prevention; and many other subjects. The series will continue until September 27th.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of June 6, 1953.

Garden Chores in June

1. Keep the cultivator going during the month of June. The chief purpose of cultivation is to kill weeds and to prevent more weed seeds from germinating.
2. After weeds have been eliminated cultivation is only necessary after rains. Keep the surface from crusting.
3. Mulching with rotted sawdust, rotted manure, chopped straw or peat, will conserve moisture for growth of plants.
4. Warm weather plants may be given extra heat by planting in sandy loam rather than heavy clay, providing shelter on the north side, and using south-facing slopes.
5. Provide supports for such plants as peonies and delphiniums before they come into bloom.
6. Sow perennial seeds (sweet williams, pinks, columbines, etc.) in a cold frame during June. Protect with half lath shade until seedlings develop.
7. Make a small nursery area for perennial seedlings so that a stock of selected plants may be built up for future use.



He was popular, too, and had horizons unlimited. Then, in rather gruesome circumstances, he met Luigi, the beggar, filthy, brash, even more arrogant than the Bishop, with no background, no education, no money. They hated each other, but an odd attraction drew their paths parallel. Older and better educated, the Bishop nevertheless learned from Luigi.

Phillip Nimmons' incidental music is original, pure imagination of what may have been the style of the time before Palestrina and Monteverdi, when musical history is a blank.

Tricks With Tones

"A single tone is much more complex than it sounds," says James Fasset, CBS music commentator, "and some of the familiar noises we hear each day are hardly recognizable when played in a new context." In a recent broadcast he gave listeners an idea of the make-up of familiar noises and tones. They heard a single tone played successively on various orchestral instruments: the flute, tuba, and piano, all of which have different overtones; then on the oscillator, which has no overtones. He experimented with these tones, sounding them three octaves higher or lower, and demonstrating changes in quality as well as pitch. Everyday sounds—the crowing of a rooster, mooing of a cow, crying of a baby, barking of a dog, sound of a bicycle bell, and playing of a hurdy-gurdy—were heard. Then these familiar sounds were heard three times lower or higher in pitch, becoming strange and, in some cases, menacing, proving that electronics can do tricks and introduce a new and complex world of sound.

Americas Hear Coronation.—Radio listeners in Mexico, South and Central America were able to hear the major part of the Coronation actually broadcast June 2 by tuning in on shortwave to the CBC International Service. Four hours of the English-language commentary were relayed, including the procession to the Abbey and the Coronation Service.

HOMER'S ODYSSEY. A radio adaptation in serial form of the celebrated Greek classic; scripts by Mac Shoub; from Montreal. This replacement for the commercial serial *John and July*, while it may be startling to some listeners, is defended by the author of

the scripts, who says that "there never will be a more exciting or poignant set of love portraits." Matthew Arnold (1822-1888) celebrated English poet and critic, speaking of Alexander Pope's (1688-1744) translation of Homer, suggests that these verses were as popular in Athens as Mother Goose rhymes in Canada today. "They were some of the first words a young Athenian heard," he says. "He heard them from his mother or his nurse before he went to school, and at school, when he went there, he was constantly occupied with them . . . His language was as familiar to Sophocles, we may be quite sure, as the language of the bible is to us." Homer is the earliest surviving Greek writer, living probably in the 8th or 10th century B.C. The *Odyssey* is a romance of the return of a wanderer, Ulysses (the name is a corruption of the Latin form of the Greek Odysseus), who, turning homeward after the Trojan war, is driven off course by unfavourable winds and spends nearly ten years lost and in captivity in unknown lands. He returns home to find his wife Penelope still faithful, and to rid her of her unwelcome suitors. The insight, delicacy, and truth with which Homer describes his hero's relations with the opposite sex may startle soap opera followers. Speaking of this, E. V. Rieu says in an introduction to a translation of the *Odyssey*: "The princess Nausicaa is a peculiarly attractive figure to modern readers . . . His picture of her is as fresh and lovely now as when it was painted three thousand years ago."

Calgary's Symphonies.

Would you be so kind as to let a native Calgarian express herself in your letter column?

My mother, Mrs. Elaine Dudley Smith, was the first violin teacher in Calgary, coming from England and the Royal Academy of Music in 1908. My own musical life has grown with that of the city, and orchestral development began with my mother conducting her own string orchestra in annual concerts. I have always been proud of the varied accomplishments my hometown has shown. The latest achievement is that of the Calgary Symphony Orchestra appearing on the CBC. It, too, is very gratifying.

However, somewhere along the line in the advance publicity, something very important was completely overlooked. That was the fact that the gap between Calgary Symphony of 1939 and Calgary Symphony of 1949 was not an empty one, but had been bridged in a very worthy manner.

I believe recognition should be given where due, and I would like to make this my personal tribute to Jascha Galperin, who recognized our need, and began to train a young symphony, which grew from babyhood, in five years, to a capable senior body. This was the Mount Royal College Symphony Orchestra, and when it matured, Mr. Galperin achieved a gracious blend of experience with youth by inviting members of the original C.S.O. to join in.

The result was that when Clayton Hare arrived in 1945, he found a fully fledged symphony ready to his baton. The mantle of the Calgary Symphony fell on its shoulders in 1949, with but a changing of directors and handing over of properties.

In conclusion may I say that the CBC Times is most interesting reading and helps us never to miss hearing the best broadcasts.—Mrs. Dorothea W. Langmo, Calgary, Alta.

Huddersfelder Remembers.

I would like to express the pleasure that came to an old "Huddersfelder" last Tuesday night per *Coronation Grandstand* broadcast. CANADIAN SYMPHONIES. Saint John Symphony Orchestra conducted by Dr. Kelsey Jones. From Saint John, N.B.

This is the first and only full-scale symphony orchestra in the Maritime provinces. For many years a small group had been interested in forming a symphony. An ensemble of 20 or more players had been organized and gave a few concerts about 25 years ago, but while a symphony was often discussed no concrete action was taken since the demise of this ensemble. This was the situation in 1950, when two young musicians moved to Saint John to teach music—Kelsey and Rosabelle Jones—fresh from a year's advanced

study in Paris. Dr. Jones was born in South Norwalk, Connecticut, 30 years ago, and he met his wife, also a pianist, at the Mount Allison Conservatory in Sackville. Within a few weeks of their arrival a committee was set

up, and 42 of the best instrumentalists in the area recruited. Rehearsals began in September, and the first concert, to a sell-out audience, was given on December 12, 1950. The orchestra, which now has 50 or more members, played three concerts in its first season and six each in its second and third. It gave its first CBC broadcast on the Maritime network at New Year's.

LA BOITE A CHANSON. A French network program recreating the gay atmosphere of the Parisian "boite," presenting an orchestra which has all the characteristics of a typical bal-musette or guinguette dance band, and a different singer each week. To obtain its rich, mellow and rhythmic effects, conductor Maurice Durieux relies for the most part on a guitar, the flute, the 'cello and a typical French chromatic accordion. Accordionist Pietro Rossi, a composer of songs and music for the accordion, came to Canada from Europe last fall after a successful career in entertainment spots of Belgium and France. The singers are well-established disreurs and fantasistes as well as newcomers to the CBC. One of these newcomers, Margot Leclerc, will be heard tonight. The songs heard on the program include the newest hits of the Paris boites and many songs of the past few years

which are still high on the popularity list. The program is recorded for rebroadcast to Canadian troops abroad. Marcel Henry, producer. From Montreal.
