Mental Health

LAST November, a few weeks after arriving in Canada, I had a chat with Marjorie McEnaney, who supervises the CBC's mental health and human relations radio broadcasts. She told me about the nature of the programs, how they began with Len Peterson's *In Search of Ourselves* dramas and have since branched out to explore a variety of subjects within the general framework. The conversation got around to witchcraft and a script I had recently written about witch doctors in a tribe of American Indians. We discussed the enveloping influence of witchcraft on medicine, particularly psychiatric medicine, through history, even down to recent times. The script was broadcast under the title *Of Time and Mind*.

Out of the research for this script grew the idea for a broader historical treatment, a study of personalities who formed the vanguard of their times in the field of mental health. It was decided to devote four broadcasts to the subject and entitle it *Battleground: the Fight for Mental Health*. (This series starts Monday, September 27, on CBC Dominion.

In the first script I had intended to write about Johann Weyer, a 16th-century physician, but the

more I read about Weyer, the more difficult I found it to escape the brooding personality of his teacher, Cornelius Agrippa. A haunted lonely figure, physician, advocate, theologian, Agrippa spent the latter half of his life struggling to stem the witch-hunting hysteria fostered by demagoguery, ignorance and superstition. We called this script *The Witch's Hammer*.

There was no question about the subject for the second script—*The Liberator*. Philippe Pinel, phy-

sician-in-charge of a great mental hospital in Paris during the French Revolution, stands out in the psychiatric history of the period. He was the first man to remove the chains from mental patients and treat them as human beings.

The treatment of Sigmund Freud's contribution to psychiatry was not an easy one to consider. Quite soon we decided to restrict our dramatization to the early years of Freud's life. (Please turn to page 8)

THE ILIAD.

Radio adaptation of Homer's epic in 13 episodes, by Mac Shoub; Rupert Caplan, producer; from Montreal. Cast: John Colicos, Mary Douglas, Eileen Clifford, George Barnes, Susan Fletcher, Kenneth Culley, Richard Gilbert. Music composed, arranged and conducted by Neil Chotem.

The adaptation opens with the famous scene in the Greek camp, where thousands of the besieging armies are being destroyed by the arrows of the archer-god Apollo (dying of disease, in short) because Agamemnon, Greek leader, has offended the god by keeping one of his priest's daughters captive. Trouble follows when in return for giving up the girl, Agamemnon demands another young beauty owned by his mighty champion Achilles.

The Iliad and its sequel The Odyssey constitute the greatest epic of classical times and establish Homer (if such a person existed) in the first rank of the world's poets. The tale has much to do with excursions by the gods and goddesses of the Greek cosmology into the affairs of men. The Trojan war starts because three goddesses, Hera, Pallas Athena, and Aphrodite, compel Paris, Prince of Troy, to decide which of them is most beautiful. He chooses Aphrodite when she promises him the most beautiful woman in the world (Helen of Troy, wife of Menelaus, King of Sparta).

TRANS-CANADA MATINEE. The Matinee is extended to an hour—including the brief news bulletin—from now on. Many former contributors will be heard, and some new ones. The extension marks Matinee's second anniversary. It was set up following repeated requests from women, speaking individually and through their organizations, for more adult listening in the daytime. As a three-quarter-hour program, it won a First Award at the Columbus Institute's annual contest last spring. Matinee continues to be incorrigibly amateur, drawing many of its ideas and performers from among listeners themselves. Programs come from many parts of the Dominion. A daily feature is the news commentary, done this week by Jean Edmonds of Winnipeg—who was roped in when she came down to the CBC studios to complain about an afternoon program. Her news commentaries will continue through November and December. Daily also this week are songs by Joyce Sullivan. Eustella Langdon of Toronto will be heard today in the Cooking School, telling about a new quick-cooking recipe for bread; and Eileen Marrett of Jamaica will be heard in talks about her country recorded last summer during a visit to Canada. BATTLEGROUND, The FIGHT FOR MENTAL HEALTH. (See article Page One). Scripts by Charles E. Israel; Marjorie McEnaney, producer. From Toronto. This inaugurates the eighth season of mental health broadcasts on CBC. Israel is an American

writer with extensive experience in movies, radio and TV, who came to Canada last year, drawn by "the imaginative quality of Canadian broadcasting." His series will be followed in this period by ten programs by Len Peterson under the title *In Search of Ourselves*, starting October 25, and by six dramatized pieces on physically handicapped persons by George Salverson under the title *Return Journey*, starting January 3. Other series to follow are six programs by Rita Greer Allen called *As Children See Us*; and a group of dramas by Elsie Park Gowan dealing with Family Courts in Canada.

Philippe was first married to Ingelburge, princess of Denmark, a lady remarkable for her beauty as for her virtue, but developed such an aversion for her on his wedding day that he

divorced her to marry Agnes, despite threats of excommunication.

The principal delegates of each country—usually the foreign minister or a major figure from that country—outline their main positions on the big issues of the day in what is known as the general debate. The setting is a small backwoods village, and the story is of the tragic disappointments of a lonely little schoolgirl who encounters hostility wherever she goes because the townspeople think her grandmother is a witch. Stevie Briggs was seen in Pride's Folly on Broadway. Adele Newton makes her fourth appearance on this series. Ethel Remy has appeared in 25 Broadway stage performances, including The Women, Our Town, and Chicken Every Sunday.

province to Saskatchewan's already-great transmission unit, Station CBK (540 kc.). Established in 1939, CBK was one of the first of the CBC's system of high-powered transmitters. It soon demonstrated its powers as a station of phenomenal coverage, attracting listeners throughout Saskatchewan, in the borderlands of Alberta and Manitoba, and far down through the central plain of the United States. Its 467-foot tower, rising at Watrous, in the centre of Saskatchewan's fabulous wheat country, became a landmark to rural people for miles around.

The CBC's Regina studios occupy the second floor of the Exner Building,

1840 McIntyre Street. Facilities for program origination include a main studio 23 by 12 feet, an announce studio 17 by 9 feet, and a control booth 12 by 7 feet. The latest equipment available has been installed in studios, control booths, and maintenance shop. Teletype service has been installed to bring Saskatchewan farmers up-to-the-minute reports on agricultural developments both provincial and national. Dave Innes, the CBC's Saskatchewan farm commentator, is in charge of this section and is heard Monday to Friday on the CBC Farm Broadcast (12:15 p.m. MST).

Others heard regularly from CBK are the CBC morning commentator for Saskatchewan, Jean Hinds, speaking to women at home; sports commentator Frank Filchok of Regina, who contributes regularly to network programs such as CBC Sports Page, and contributors to the series Report From The Provinces. These include Chr's Higg'nbotham and Don McGillivray, Regina newspaperman. Programs of this nature are produced in the CBC's Regina studios by CBK's senior producer, John A. Wilson.

With the Regina studios in operation, the CBK transmitter at Watrous will be fed directly from the provincial capital. Previously, CBK's studios have been in the CBC Building at Winnipeg.

Heading the CBC organization in Saskatchewan is R. H. Roberts, manager of the Regina studios, a veteran broadcaster formerly of Winnipeg. With him as technical supervisor is another CBC veteran, R. L. Punshon, formerly chief operator at the CBW transmitter at Carman, Manitoba, and before that chief operator at CBK, Watrous. Mr. Roberts' staff in Saskatchewan will total approximately twenty.

Miss Rose Cooper, secretary of the Club, who is also a music teacher, auditions from 300 to 400 young performers each year—violinists, pianists, accordionists, vocalists, elocutionists, etc. She also takes a keen interest in the "good deed" aspect. Good deed awards, Miss Cooper says, are given for acts of special heroism, such as life-saving; acts of extra thoughtful kindness, such as aid to needy people, help to the injured or troubled adults or children; or extra devotion to mem-

bers of one's own family, like helping a sick mother, looking after young children, and so on.

When the Club concluded its 1953-54 season last April, Mr. John Bruce, Club director, estimated that possibly 5,000 talented young people had been auditioned for the program, and more than 2,000 actually presented on the air.

A number of "graduates" of the Good Deed Club have made their mark in the musical world, among them Donna Grescoe, well known violinist, and Ted Komar, professional accordionist heard frequently on CBC from Winnipeg. The Good Deed Club Choir and Ensemble took first place in their respective festival classes last season.

Each season nine scholarships of \$50 each are awarded for junior and senior performers in the various classes. Children receive scholarship certificates, and cheques are sent to their music teachers to cover further studies for them. For good deeds, young members get prizes of wrist watches and gold star pins.

Working with Miss Cooper on the musical side of Club work are Harold Green, pianist, and Olga Irwin, soprano, both well known in Winnipeg. Alfred Parr is the CBC producer.

When I first went to interview Dr. Clarence Hincks for the fourth script, So They May Live Again, I found him a warm, friendly, modest person. But it was his modesty that made the shaping of the material difficult. Dr. Hincks stands out as one of the latter-day pioneers of mental health. In fact, the phrase "mental health" originated with him. He has organized clinics, bettered conditions in Canadian mental hospitals, and set up the administration of the Canadian Mental Health Association, as well as securing single-handed funds for its initial operation.
