



FELLER'S BASEBALL Firsts"

"MANY'S THE TIME I QUAKED WITH FEAR WHEN A PINCH-HITTER CAME UP TO FACE ME. MANAGER PAT TEBEAU OF THE CLEVELAND SPIDERS STARTED IT ALL ON JUNE 7nd, 1892 WHEN HE ORDERED JOHN JOSEPH DOYLE TO PINCH-HIT. DOYLE WAS BASEBALL'S FIRST PINCH-HITTER, HE DELIVERED IN GRAND STYLE BY SLAMMING OUT A SINGLE."



"I DON'T KNOW WHERE WE PRO PLAYERS WOULD BE TODAY IF IT WEREN'T FOR THE COURAGE OF CHARLES C.WAITE, FIRST BASEMAN OF BOSTON IN 1875. THE BOYS WERE REALLY TOUGH IN THOSE DAYS AND CAUGHT BAREHANDED. IT TOOK A LOT OF NERVE ON WAITE'S PART TO COME STROLLING OUT ONTO THE DIAMOND WITH A BASEBALL GLOVE, THE FIRST OF ITS KIND. THE GLOVE WAS FLESH COLOR."

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IT'S ALL IN THE GAME

A WEIRD throw, a circus catch, or just a ball player's odd habit makes the break that wins games and championships. Baseball history is full of such oddities from the time the game was first played in 1839—when Abner Doubleday gave America this brand-new national pastime.

An unbelievable catch by "Wee Willie" Keeler of the Baltimore Orioles enabled Baltimore to nose out Boston in 1894 to climax a wild pennant race.

Right field on the Baltimore grounds gave visiting outfielders nightmares. Directly behind it was a high fence, sloped at a 65 degree angle. Starting midway between the fence and the infield, the outer pastures ran downhill.

The two teams battled down to the final inning without a score. Then, Boston made its bid. With a single, a sacrifice and a base on balls, the visitors appeared to be in position to win the ball game and the highly coveted pennant. Jake Stahl, one of the longest hitters on the Boston club, waved his bat confidently at the plate, as the two runners moved cautiously along the base paths.

The Baltimore pitcher delivered a blazing fast ball . . . and an instant later the resounding crack of the bat brought the big crowd to its feet. On an ever-rising line, the ball sailed out into right field. Keeler, one of the fleetest men in the business, was off with the crack of the bat. Seeing the ball was going over his head, Willie leaped up on the slope of the fence, going higher along the incline; his eye never leaving the ball. Then, before the crowd realized it, Willie had the ball in his glove, and was perched on the top of the fence. So great was his momentum, however, he could not stop running after the catch, and plunged over and fell outside into the street.

Seldom in baseball history had a ball player received such an outburst of applause as greeted Keeler when he climbed over the fence and tossed the ball to the infield.

Clark Griffith, who now owns the Washington

Senators, was considered one of the brainiest pitchers ever to unnerve a batter. As a hurler for Cincinnati in 1901, he proved his mettle in a critical game against the Senators. The Washington club, needing a run to tie, had men on second and third, with the dangerous Al Selbach at the plate.

Griffith's best line was taunting batters, and unnerving them further with his slow, deliberate motions on the mound. When Selbach stepped into the batter's box, Griffith opened his heckling barrage:

"I'll bet you couldn't hit this next pitch with a board, Al!"

Then he delivered one high and wide. The overeager Selbach swung and missed. Griffith kept up his steady chatter from the mound. Each time he fired the ball only after long preparatory intervals. Finally the count was three balls and two strikes. Now thoroughly aroused, Selbach was straining to knock the cover off the ball.

Smiling calmly, Griffith eyed Selbach and said: "All right, slugger, let's see you hit this one!"

And then he deliberately tossed the ball underhand toward the plate. Selbach, in his eagerness to hit the slow delivery, fell to his hands and knees before the ball reached the plate, and was called out on strikes.

Back in 1937 a rookie pitcher named Red Lynn made his big league debut with the New York Giants. As the youngster nervously strode out to the mound, the veteran catcher followed him.

"Look, kid," the burly backstop said, "just don't be nervous. There's nothin' to worry about. Watch me and I'll flash you the signals—one finger for a fast ball an' two for a curve."

The rookie nodded, the umpire cried, "Play ball!" and the game was on. The catcher squatted behind the plate and signalled for a fast ball. The rookie's first pitch sailed six feet over the backstop's head. Once again the signal was for a fast ball and the next pitch was even wilder. The big veteran tugged at his mask, pounded his enormous

mitt and for the third time signalled for the fast ball. The rookie's third pitch sailed past the receiver and bounced off the protective net behind home plate.

The crowd booed as the catcher trotted out to the mound for a confab with his jittery battery mate.

"Calm down, kid!" he said. "Don't be so nervous. You remember the signals—one finger for a fast ball, two for a curve."

"Sure, I remember them!" the frightened rookie gulped. "But, please, sir, I do wish you'd call for that two-finger curve all the time. I just can't seem to grip the ball with only one finger!"

Outfielder Jimmy Slagle's penchant for chewing tobacco made him the memorable hero of an eighteen-inning contest between Chicago and Philadelphia during the 1902 season.

It was the eighteenth inning with Philadelphia at the plate, a runner on first base and two men out. The score was tied at 1 to 1. In this tense moment, Jimmy Slagle felt a fresh "chaw" of tobacco was just the thing he needed to relax his tightening nerves.

Just as he jammed his huge right hand into his back pocket for the tobacco, he heard the crack of the bat. The ball sped its way on a line to deep left center, and he broke into a frantic sprint. Then, to his horror, he discovered that his right hand, still trapped in the back pocket, refused to come out. A quick jerk failed to release the hand, and Slagle, racing on, leaped, stuck up his left hand and caught the ball. Then he pulled out the plug of tobacco, and began to munch happily as he trotted in. The crowd stood up to give him a thunderous ovation.

Mike Kelly, one of baseball's immortals before the turn of the century, and hero of the legendary phrase, "Slide, Kelly, Slide!" figured in many a single-handed break.

While catching for the Chicago White Stockings in a game at Cincinnati in 1886, Kelly found his club's seemingly certain victory threatened by a late Redlegs' uprising. Two men were out in the last of the ninth, Chicago was leading, 3 to 2, and what might be the tying run was on first base.

Kelly's pitcher, John Clarkson, wound up and delivered. There was a resounding smack of bat on horsehide, and the sphere went whistling on a line out toward right field. It was a clean drive, nearly to the fence, but the base-runner did not watch the ball. The Redlegs' third base coach frantically waved him on as the Chicago outfielders scrambled to retrieve the ball.

It was here that Kelly rose to true greatness. As the ball was relayed in from the outfield, he tossed aside glove and mask, as though the ball had been "flied out" and the inning was over. The runner, seeing Kelly trot off the field, slowed his pace as he rounded third.

At that moment, the ball came winging into home plate on a straight line. With his bare hands, Kelly caught the ball and tagged the openmouthed runner between third and home for the final putout!

Another ball player had a habit of missing trains. Only his magnificent plays afield saved him from the fines slapped on him.

For missing a train in Boston, during 1897, Outfielder Bill Lange of Chicago had been assessed a \$100 fine. Apparently not having learned his lesson, Lange missed another train the next day and arrived in Philadelphia too late for the game. Result: another \$100 fine.

With \$200 due to come out of his paycheck in an era when players' salaries were far below the present scale, Bill Lange was anything but happy when he took the field for the game with Washington.

But Lange didn't have much time to brood. The game went nip-and-tuck, with Chicago holding a one-run lead all the way to the !ast half of the eleventh inning. Then Washington began to threaten, by getting two runners on base. After that the ever-dangerous Selbach came to the plate.

On the first pitch, Selbach smashed a ball that appeared to be going far over Lange's head. The outfielder, a strapping lad of some 225 pounds, dug his spikes in furiously and headed for the centerfield fence. The boards splintered as he slammed into the fence. One panel crashed outward. But from the wreckage crawled Lange holding the ball in his fist. As the crowd roared its tribute of applause, Lange bellowed to Manager Cap Anson:

"Fines still hold, Cap?"

The overjoyed Anson shook his head.

"Not after that catch, son," he said. "But I'd like to see the same kind of hustle down at the depot the next time we pull out of town!"
