





#### FRANCE'S LINE RENAUD ON U. S. DISC DEBUT

Charming French chanteuse Line Renaud (pronounced "Leen Rayno") makes her American disk debut on the Capitol Label with two enchanting songs, a ballad "If I Love" and a bouncy music hall-type number "Pam-Pou-" Both were composed by her multitalented husband, one of France's leading tunesmiths, Louis Gaste (pronounced "Gastay"). Assisting delightful Line is Les Baxter, his chorus and string orchesty.

Vivacious Line was born in the city of Armentiëres in France. As a tot she was bitten with the singing bug; but her mother objected, so Line would march out very much under cover to perform at amateur contects. Quite frequently, however, she would wind up the winner and have to do a lot of explaining with the prizes she'd taken home.

In school, during her teens, she decided that more than anything else in the world she wanted to travel, so she diligently studied Engish and hairdressing, assuming she would become a beauty operator on a foreign-bound boat. But to her great fortune, she got the opportunity to audition on radio in Paris. And it marked the beginning of her singing career, for she was immediately presented with 20 different shows.

In addition to her successful radio and night beformances, she became the recipient of two awards as a result of her recordings released in France. The awards, similar to the American Academy for motion pictures, are made by a jury in France, comprised of leading music figures. Then last year while she was appearing at the famous Moulin Rouge in Paris, comedian Bob Hope heard her. Instantly impressed, Hope arranged for her to work on his TV show last February. Columbia's new collection. "An Evening With Altistic Cooke At The Piano," will no doubt come as a surprise to many will no doubt come as a surprise to many and a familiar with Cooke only as the international symbol of the discerning broadcaster and perceptive Manchester Guardian reporter, also as host, friend and guide on the Ford Foundation's "Omnibus" program, which can be seen weekly over CBS Television. In his whistling Mr. Cooke achieves, according to expert George Avakian, some true jazz solos. Said jazz trumpeter Buck Clayton, who happened to stop in at the studio as Cooke was recording "She's Funny That Way,"
