

The Big Bandstand with Bill Ward - Bill Ward's selections take us back to The Big Band Era, originally broadcasted live on KCBS in the 1940s and 50s; KMRE is happy to host this program weekdays at 4pm.

Chuckanut Radio Hour - Variety-style radio show seasoned with contemporary literature and dished out with a nostalgia-inducing aroma of the golden age of radio, every Saturday night at 6pm and a rebroadcast from the CRH library on Sundays at 9pm.

On the Level - Rick Dubrow uses his 30+ years of experience in the building industry and environmental activism to help you make your home and lifestyle more healthy and planet-friendly broadcasting every Saturday at 10am and again on Sunday nights at 8pm.

Bay Street Blues Hour - T-Bone brings you the best blues from the 20-50s Saturdays at 8pm.

KMRE Comedy Hour - Will digs deep into the KMRE library to bring the funniest original comedy programs from the 30-50s such as; Mel Blanc and Martin and Lewis shows.

NW Sounds capes - Recorded here at KMRE, NW Sounds capes brings you interviews and live performances from local Bellingham artists, every Saturday and Sunday at 7pm.

Carrington 78 Collection - Digitally restored 78s range from early 1900-50s history of jazz music; tune in weeknights at 9pm and hear the scratchy, monophonic sound that is music history.

KMRE Kids - Programming with children in mind, KMRE brings you three hours of music, performances from local kids and radio serials: such as Superman and the Cinnamon Bear. Saturday morning from 7-10am.

Swing Chronicles - Popular music program that looks at the history of jazz music through a focus on the Swing genre, weekdays at noon.

Radio Entertainment Network - An hour show featuring the best in old time radio. Produced in cooperation with the Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound, it is broadcast weekday evenings at 11pm.

Sherlock Holmes - The classic Sir Arthur Conan Doyle stories featuring Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce: the greatest Holmes and Watson ever! We have over 250 of these episodes in our library. This famous mystery series is broadcast every weeknight at 10pm.

Thomas Jefferson Hour - An hour of commentary on culture, government and the world at large with America's third president, every Saturday at 4pm and again on Sunday Morning at 9am.

Books Alive - A series of dramas based on books from various famous authors, Agatha Christie, Armistead Maupin, DH Lawrence, Edgar Allen Poe, John Steinbeck and more. Runs 12am to 1am.

Classical music, Poetry and Great Stories - Classical music every Sunday morning from 8am to 2pm, with hourly poems and 2 short stories.

Midnight Mystery Players - Our in-house radio drama troupe, producing re-enactments of the famous radio plays of the past. Broadcast every Sunday evening at 10pm.

Evening Serial - Every weeknight from 8-9pm we present a variety of classic radio programs:


AMRE Profile: Jim Darling

Board Member/ Executive Director Port of Bellingham

"My first exposure to radio and electronics was through my grandfather," says AMRE board member Jim Darling. "He was a radio buff and worked on everything from radios and TVs to locomotives. In fact I still have an old Victrola gramophone of his. I have these images of my grandfather dragging the radio out onto the front step of their craftsman-type home and having all the neighborhood out. Everyone brought their own gallon jug of beer from the local tavern and listened to the fights on Saturday nights. I can remember my grandfather always talking about that and the sense of community that radio provided."

Jim is a third generation Washingtonian. "My dad was a corporate executive so I grew up watching the corporate world," says Jim. "That helped me decide a long time ago to spend my career in public service." He went to college at the University of Illinois, and worked in city government for about 20 years where he received his Masters in Public Administration.

Jim and his young family returned to the Northwest in 1991, where he joined the Port of Bellingham as their Operations Director. In 1993 he was appointed Executive Director. "The Port of Bellingham is a trust agent for publicly owned assets like the marinas, the marine terminals and the airport," says Jim. "But it's also one of the only public agencies that traffic in the private economy. This creates a unique set of challenges for us and we have to be very careful how we protect these public assets, and at the same time move forward and be aggressive about being

an economic engine to stimulate the economy not only today, but for many years to come."

Seeing the big picture, whether it's Bellingham's waterfront development project or the Museum, is something Jim feels strongly about. "It's not about us, it's about the future," says Jim. "The decisions we make today shape the future of this community. Whether it's transportation terminals or airports or the waterfront development, they all shape the community in fundamental ways that will affect the area forever."

Jim also believes young people should be encouraged to seek a career in the public sector and devote themselves to public service. "This is an important job and it has a big impact," he says. "We need people dedicated to making the community a better place for everybody, not just one group or organization. It's daunting yet very rewarding, too."

Jim does a lot of reading, especially books and articles that speak from an historical prospective to these far reaching issues. "The Devil in the White City, by Eric Larson is a great example," says Jim. (About how architect and Fair overseer Daniel Hudson Burnham managed thousands of workers and engineers to pull together the monumental 1893 Chicago World's Fair on an astonishingly tight two-year schedule.)

"I'm intrigued by stories of enormously ambitious events and how people move them forward. Everyone struggles through at the time but if you keep the vision alive and you see the big picture, at the end of the day, it all works out."

Jim has been a fan since first visiting the Museum's earlier location on Railroad Avenue. "I used to go into the old Museum a lot and tinker-around with Jonathan's radios," laughs Jim. "When the Museum moved to Bay Street and started to become the institution it is today I was pretty interested. So when I got approached to join the board it was an easy decision."

"Jim's ability to see the bigger picture makes him the kind of board member we need," says Jonathan Winter. He shares our vision and understands our long term goals. We're proud he's part of our team."

"I think of the Museum not only as a community asset, but also a national asset as well," says Jim. "I find the collection fascinating; not only from a technology aspect, but the fact that something like this can actually come to life, especially for younger people."

As for the Museum's future, Jim sees two big areas of interest and priority:

"Funding stability is vital," says Jim. "The Museum is doing a fine job of that now, but taking it to the next level in terms of resources to do even more is fundamental."

His other area of interest is education, particularly with teenagers. "High school kids are often fascinated with current technology but don't fully grasp the thread of invention and discovery that got us to where we are today," says Jim. "If we can get young people to come to this Museum and experience how we got to this point, hopefully they'll be inspired to take technology to the next level. 'Where do we go from here?' is the question I'd like to help instill in these kids." M


