

SPECIAL GUEST BIOS

NORMAN CORWIN - writer, director, producer, actor

Norman Corwin has deservedly been called radio's poet laureate. Much of the material he wrote and produced for radio ranks with the very best creations for stage and screen. "Discovered" by CBS vice-president William B. Lewis in 1935, Corwin was soon given his own network show. Called Words Without Music because its minimal budget prevented the use of music, the series attracted extraordinary attention. This led to a new series with a bigger budget - a variety show devoted to Americana called <u>Pursuit of Happiness</u>. Later came <u>26 By Corwin</u> broadcast in 1941 which ranged from a lighthearted look at radio ("Radio Primer") to the somber "Psalm for a Dark Year". Corwin was selected to prepare a special program commemorating the one hundred-fiftieth anniversary of the Bill of Rights. By the time "We Hold These Truths" aired, the United States was at war and the broadcast became "a national manifesto of its war aims." In similarly eloquent fashion VE day was celebrated with "On a Note of Triumph" which so caught the mood of the American people that it led to a best selling book edition and record album. A few months later the equally moving "14 August" commemorated the surrender of the Japanese. Another Corwin special, "Word from the People," marked the dedication of the United Nations. Among the many other Corwin programs were comedies, fantasies, satires and excursions into history, folklore, opera, poetry and documentary. Perhaps, the most popular and often repeated of all Corwin radio dramas was one of his first - a playful holiday offering entitled "The Plot to Overthrow Christmas. Using a sort of "footnote" voice along with a narrator, it was both an experiment in and a comment on the medium of radio. It will be a joy to see it recreated at our convention this weekend by the man who epitomizes the golden age of radio at its creative best.



BURGESS MEREDITH

Some may remember Burgess Meredith as the feisty manager in the first three Rocky films; others may recall his delightful portrayal of The Penguin in the Batman TV series; still others will never forget the meek bookworm he played in the classic 1959 episode of The Twilight Zone, "Time Enough at Last." Meredith began his acting career as a stage actor in the thirties which led to his great triumph in Winterset (1935) in a role written especially for him by playwright Maxwell Anderson. His radio career also began in t. early thirties when he created the role of Red Adams (later changed to Red Davis), predecessor of the popular soap character, Pepper Young. On March 4, 1937, he played a feature role in the Columbia Workshop broadcast of Archibald MacLeish's classic verse play, "The Fall of the City." In 1939 he teamed with Norman Corwin as "master of ceremonies" on Corwin's ground-breaking Pursuit of Happiness series. He later appeared on Lincoln Highway, CBS's big Saturday morning dramatic show, and starred in the first broadcast of The Theatre Guild on the Air, "Wings Over Europe" on September 9, 1945. Meredith's radio work spanned the gamet from Hamlet (1937) to the host of We, the People (late forties). He also appeared as a featured guest on several of Orson Welles' <u>Campbell Playhouse</u> broadcasts. He entered television during its early live period in the fifties appearing on such dramatic showcases as Robert Montgomery Presents, Lights Out and General Electric Theater. He earned an Emmy as best supporting actor for his portrayal of lawyer Joseph Welch in the docudrama, Tail Gunner Joe in 1977.



SPECIAL GUEST BIOS (cont.)

ELLIOTT REID

A radio veteran whose career spanned three decades, Elliott Reid appeared as Melvin Castlebury, friend of Billy and Betty on their 1935 children's series. He was a supporting cast member in a number of Orson Welles productions including "Seventeen" and "Pickwick Papers" on The Mercury Theatre on the Air and "The Patriot" and "The Magnificent Ambersons" on the Campbell Playhouse. He played on The March of Time in such roles as King Farouk and he appeared on a number of radio's most popular soap operas including Pepper Young's Family, Lorenzo Jones (as Nick), and Carol Kennedy's Romance. His other radio credits include "The Mighty Show" and "Treasure House." He later starred as Philip Cameron in the final years of Against the Storm and was one of the last hosts of The U.S. Steel Hour for the Theatre Guild on the Air.


RICHARD WILSON

A long time friend and associate of Orson Welles, Richard Wilson appeared in the classic "War of the Worlds" broadcast of The Mercury Theatre on the Air. He became a member of Welles' radio repertory company as an actor and production assistant after working with Welles in his federal theatre project. Wilson went to Hollywood with Welles to work on a production of Joseph Conrad's Heart of Darkness (which never materialized) and stayed to become part of one of the finest films ever made, Citizen Kane. He spent the rest of his career working as producer, director and/or in some other executive capacity on numerous films, mostly for Paramount. His credits include Al Capone, Pay or Die, Three in the Attic, Man with a Gun and Invitation to a Gunfighter. He was also involved in the production of the highly popular Ma and Pa Kettle film series. Wilson's devotion to radio continues to the present day. He is active in efforts to save old acetates of programs so that future generations will be able to experience and appreciate the wonders of radio. A Look at the Past

Old-time radio conventions were held in Connecticut starting in 1971. It was in 1976 that The Friends of Old-time Radio was formed. The first two years from 1976 to 1977, the conventions were held at the Holiday Inn in Meriden, Connecticut. The next four years it was held at the Holiday Inn in Bridgeport, Connecticut. This is the 9th year it is being held at the Holiday Inn – North in Newark.

- 1976. Jackson Beck and Raymond Edward Johnson were present at this one-day convention and have been just about every year since. Jack Beck, Evie Juster, James Maloney, Lee Stanley and Don MacLaughlin starred in "The FBI in Peace and War." Ham O'Hara provided the sound effects. One hundred sixty fans and guests were present. Members of the original committee were Julie and Larry DeSalvatore, Ann and Peter Greco, Lora Palmer, Joe Webb, Stu Weiss, Carol and Bob Witte.
- 1977. Rosa Rio provided organ music and would so for several years. "Our Gal Sunday" and "The Shadow" starring Mandel Kramer and Grace Matthews were presented. Ed Blainey provided the sound effects. Warren Somerville directed. Other new guests present were Court Benson, Fred Foy, James Monks, Vicki Vola and Blair Walliser. Ken Piletic joined the committee.
- 1978. Performed were "The Romance of Helen Trent" starring Alice Reinheart; "Front Page Farrell" and "Counterspy" were also performed. Some new guests present were Lee Allman, George Ansbro, Ira Ashley, Bob Dixon, and Betty Wragge. Bob Prescott senior and junior helped Ed Blainey with the sound effects.
- Award was given to Ken Piletic. Anthony Tollin came for the first year and presented a Shadow slide show. Performed were "Joyce Jordan," "Mark Trail" starring Jackson Beck and "Yours Truly, Johnny Dollar" starring Mandel Kramer and Don MacLaughlin. Also present were Ralph Bell, Ward Byron, Bill Griffis, Art Hanna, Peg Lynch, Ted Mallie, Ian Martin, Ted Malone, Arnold Stang and Sybil Trent. We began getting more fans from all over the country and Canada. Bob Prescott and his two sons, Bob and Pete were now doing the sound effects.
- 1980. Performed were Cinderella from "Let's Pretend" with Arthur Anderson, Gwen Davies, Don Hughes, Evie Juster, Bill Lipton and Sybil Trent. Jay Hickerson presented the first of several sing-a-longs. Also presented were "Strange" hosted by Walter Gibson and "Death Across the Board" from Inner Sanctum hosted by Ray Johnson. Also present were Fran Carlon, Betty Tyler Karp, Rita Lloyd.
- 1981. The conventions were now being video taped by Ken Piletic. They had up to this point just been audio taped. Bob Burchett was our unofficial photographer almost every year. Re-created were "My True Story," and "Nick Carter" with Lon Clark and Charlotte Manson. Arthur Tracy entertained us with songs for the first of several conventions. New guests present included Nancy Douglass, Elspeth Eric, Teri Keane, Ann Loring, Arnold Moss, Bill Owen, Sidney Slon and a special appearance by Kenny Delmar.
- 1982. The convention was now in Newark. Re-creations included "Aunt Jenny," and "The Green Hornet" with **Dwight Weist**, **Ezra Stone**, **Jack Beck** and **Lee Allman**. Some new guests present were **Don Buka**, **Jack Grimes**, **Abby Lewis**, **Dick Osgood**, **Frank Papp**, **Ruth Russell**, **Terry Ross**, **Jane Ward**, **Florence Williams** and **Alice Yourman**. **Terry Ross** now handled the sound effects. Karen Hickerson entertained us for the first of several times with a few songs.

- 1983. The convention now lasted 2 days. From now on we have had about 45 dealers. Parley Baer was our first West Coast guest. Re-created were "The Brave Little Tailor" from Let's Pretend directed by Arthur Anderson with much of the original cast; Anthony Tollin directed "The Shadow" with Ken Roberts, Margot Stevenson, Gertrude Warner and Jack Beck. Some new guests present were Joan Bishop, Nancy Coleman, Helen Coule, Cliff Carpenter, Ruth Duskin, Bob Guilbert, Pat Hosley, Ernest Ricca, Karl Weber and Miriam Wolfe. Rosa Rio and Ted Malone put on a musical program. Anthony Tollin began coordinating the re-creations, something Joe Webb had done up to this time.
- 1984. Re-created were "Mr. District Attorney" with Dwight Weist and Vicki Vola and "Grand Central Station." Coming from the West Coast were Frank Nelson and Veola Vonn. Eddie Layton provided the music. Some new guests present were Margaret Draper, Helene Dumas, Edith Meiser, Stella Reynolds, Adele Ronson, Joe DeSantis and Arthur Peterson.
- 1985. At our 10th annual convention Bill Robson and Lucille Fletcher watched a re-creation of "Sorry, Wrong Number." One of the highlights was the re-creation of "The Lone Ranger" with many of the original cast performing. Also re-created was "Superman" starring Jackson Beck. Leta Beemer Peterson, widow of Brace Beemer, received a posthumous award for Brace Beemer. Some new guests present were Lee Alan, Tony Caminita, Humphrey Davis, Tom Dougall, Fred Flowerday, Jim Fletcher, Ernie Winstanley, Whit Vernon, Rube and Liz Weiss.
- 1986. Willard Waterman attended from California and starred in "The Great Gildersleeve" with Shirley Mitchell and Louise Erickson. Also re-created were "The Aldrich Family" with Ezra Stone and much of the original cast. Gilbert Mack entertained us with songs and chatter. Also re-created was "The Whistler." Other new guests present were Vivian Della Chiesa and Sara Seeger. The Dave Warren Players made their initial of many performances with "Tom Mix."
- 1987. Barney Beck and Ray Erlenborn now worked with Terry Ross on the sound effects. We did our first of 3 Gateway to Hollywood re-creations. Winners were Carolyn Senter and David Zwengler. Joining us from California were John Archer, Les Tremayne and Bill Zuckert. "The Thin Man" was re-created with Les Tremayne in the title role. Also re-created were "Young Widder Brown" with Les Tremayne and Adele Ronson and "Big Town" with Frank Carlon, Mason Adams and Dwight Weist. We started giving donations to worthy organizations. Some new guests were Eric Arthur, Judith Bublick, Laurette Fillbrandt, Joseph Kahn, Joseph Nathan Kane, Elaine Kent, Joyce Randolph and Bob Steel.
- 1988. The convention now began on Thursday evening. About 600 people attend the convention. Arnold Moss was featured in the re-creation of "Cabin B-13." Carlton E. Morse attended from California and watched the re-creation of "I Love a Mystery" with Bob Dryden and Alice Reinheart. Also from California were Bob Hastings, Jackie Kelk and Richard Wilson., Jackson Beck was featured in another re-creation of "Superman." Arthur Anderson directed a third episode of "Let's Pretend." Robin Fields and Bill Daugherty entertained us. Some new guests present were Jeanne Harrison, Bob Hastings, Hildegarde, Jackie Kelk, Robert E. Lee, Jan Miner, Larry Robinson and Joan Shea. During the evening festivities on Saturday, we were interrupted by an updated version of "War of the Worlds."

CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

The Friends of Old-time Radio held its 14th Annual Convention from October 19th - 21st, 1989 at the Holiday Inn - North, Newark, New Jersey. Celebrities present who received awards were: Lee Falk, Earl George, Jean Gillespie, Ross Martindale, Charlie Mullen, George Ward, Charles Woods and Margaret Whiting. Other celebrities present were Arthur Anderson, George Ansbro, Barney Beck, Jackson Beck, Judith Bublick, Fran Carlon, Lon Clark, Nat Dickerson, Bob Dryden, Louise Erickson, Ray Erlenborn, Lee Erwin, Joe Franklin, Ruth Franklin, Bernie George, Bob Hastings, Ed Herlihy, Dick Hyman, Raymond Edward Johnson, Teri Keane, Robert E. Lee, Ann Loring, Gil Mack, Charlotte Manson, Arnold Moss, Bill Owen, Stella Reynolds, Ken Roberts, Adele Ronson, Terry Ross, Sidney Slon, Bob Steel, Margot Stevenson, Ezra Stone, Sybil Trent, Dwight Weist, Sam White, Florence Williams and Betty Wragge. The guests socialized with fans, participated in panels and workshops and re-created 5 radio shows.

The convention began on Thursday with cocktails and dinner. 96 fans and guests attended

and talked informally throughout the evening.

Friday began at 9:00 with the opening of the dealers room. 45 dealers were present during Friday and Saturday. 206 people attending dinner with another 89 in the afternoon. Workshops and panels included: Gateway to Hollywood with auditions following; A tribute to Jack Benny and Mel Blanc was presented by Larry and John Gassman, Walt Mitchell and Mary Lou Wallace; The Dave Warren Players presented Duffy's Tavern and Tom Mix; Raymond Edward Johnson presented a stirring reading of "Wentworth's Day" by Lovecraft; Robert Taylor talked about his book, "Fred Allen;" Jack French presented a panel on The FBI and Radio. After dinner an award was given to Joe Franklin for his 40 years on radio. Nick Carter was re-created with Lon Clark and Charlotte Manson. A panel on growing up in radio concluded the evening. 


