Recently was screen-tested by M-G-M studios...From Radio Guide, August 7, 1937: Child actress Sybil Trent came to "Let's Pretend" as Sybil Elaine; changed her name...From Radio Guide, Sep 4, 1937: Jackson Beck plays the part of Paul Harvey in the Myrt and Marge sketch. It was about one episode of "When a Girl Marries" that, according to Higby, went completely to "Hell." Trouble began when one actor made a slip and the sudsy-weepy dialog that was supposed to have been heard built into a snow-balling gag. The initial mistake was followed by a period of silence punctuated by explosive giggles. The following is the unrehearsed script.

That's too bad," Ann said. (she stared hard at her script but strangled on the next line.) "Coming so soon after - (whoops, she was off again in laughter) - the house burned down." "That's not the worst," Rosemary tittered wildly on. "I'm afraid he'll have another nervous breakdown." (They both convulsed at this.) When Jeanette Dowling entered the scene, she began firmly enough. "Thank goodness, Kathy, I've found You. I have dreadful news. But when she heard Rosemary's voice tremulous with merriment, ask "Why, Mother, What is it?" she let out a roar of laughter. "It's little Sammy," she chortled. "The doctor says he won't live through the night." Disaster piled on disaster, while hilarity mounted. In the control booth the director had thrown his script in the air and was sagging forward, head on desk, shoulder shaking convulsively. The engineer had slumped out of sight...Then came Mary Jane Higby's turn bravely. "Irma, I must talk to you." (She caught a glimpse of the contorted faces of the cast). "Harry," she wavered, "Harry-," then with a loud guffaw, "Harry's in jail." Miss Higby said the cast shrieked out woe upon woe, until each actress came to the end of her part and collapsed with tears streaming down her face and limp with laughter...With the ruin of a serial before him, the poor announcer vainly tried to cope with a commercial about chocolate chip cookies...The next day the cast learned a new sponsor had been listening to the program... To this day, Miss Higby said, the cast never heard a word about the program from either the agency, sponsor, or the most astonishing thing of all, from the listeners.

## Dwight Weist: 'Man of 1,000 Voices' Was Radio Mainstay

Dwight Weist, radio's ubiquitous "man of 1,000 voices," has died while on vacation in Rhode Island.

The Associated Press reported over the weekend that Weist—whose impressions ranged from Adolf Hitler to Franklin D. Roosevelt—was 81 when he died of an apparent heart attack last Tuesday on Block Island.

A former president of the New York chapter of the Screen Actors Guild, Weist maintained homes in Manhattan and on Long Island.

An inveterate performer whose career spanned both the earliest and waning days of radio ("The March of Time" in 1931 and the last network soap opera "The Second Mrs. Burton" in 1960), Weist was a master of dozens of accents which he placed in the mouths of aged and ageless characters.

On "March of Time" alone his impersonations ranged from Hitler to Rooseveit to labor leader John L. Lewis to New York Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia.

He was the original "Mr. District Attorney" when that program first aired in April, 1939.

Never identified by name, the hard-nosed prosecutor was heralded as"Champion of the people, guardian of our rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Based on the career of racketbusting New York Dist. Atty. Thomas E. Dewey, "Mr. District Attorney" ran through the early 1950s on radio with others later taking over the title role. It became a short-lived TV series in 1951.

Weist also portrayed Police Commissioner Weston on the mystery series "The Shadow," was host of "We, the People," an anthology of human interest stories and an announcer of such shows as the quiz game "Grand Slam."

He did voice-overs for Pathe newsreeis during World War II and in 1948 was host when "We, the People" became the first series to be simulcast on both network radio and television.

Weist also was the announcer for TV's "Search for Tomorrow" and the voice of many TV commer-

Woody Allen cast him in two films, "Zelig" and "Radio Days" where he was seen announcing the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Weist was a co-founder of the Weist-Barron School of Television and Commercial Acting in New York, one of the oldest in the nation.
