

Anne Hummert, who had a photographic memory, was renowned in the industry for her ability to remember each intricate twist of every one of their creations. At a time when doctors and lawyers were making \$5000 a year a less, The Hummerts were making \$100,000 a year from their enterprise. At one time they had as many as 18 separate 15-minute serials running at a time for a total of 90 episodes a week. Their first was "Just Plain Bill" which hit the airwaves in September of 1932.

Hello Again is \$15 a year and is published 6 times a year. The first issue appeared in April of 1970.

Registration
