McFarland; Broadcasting on the Short Waves, 1945 to Today by Jerome S. Berg 190 photos, appendix, notes, bibliography, index; 496pp. hardcover (7 x 10) 2008; Price: \$65.00

Description

Short-wave broadcasting originated in the 1920s, when stations used the new technology to increase their range in order to serve foreign audiences and reach parts of their own country that could not easily be covered by regular AM stations. The early days of short-wave radio were covered in *On the Short Waves*, 1923–1945: Broadcast Listening in the Pioneer Days of Radio, published by McFarland in 1999. This book picks up the story

after World War II, focusing on the stations themselves and the environment in which they operated. A companion volume, Listening on the Short Waves, 1945 to Today, focuses on the short-wave listening community.

The heart of the book is a detailed, year-by-year account of the short-wave bands in each year from 1945 to the present. It reviews what American listeners were hearing on the international and domestic short-wave bands, describes the arrivals and departures of stations, and recounts important short-wave events. The book also introduces readers to the several categories of broadcasters—international, domestic, religious, clandestine and pirate—and to private short-wave broadcasting in the United States. It explains the impact of relay stations, frequency management, and jamming, and describes promising short-wave technologies. It also addresses the considerable changes in, and challenges to, short-wave broadcasting since the end of the cold war. The book is richly illustrated and indexed, and features a bibliography and extensive notes to facilitate further reading or research.

McFarland; Listening on the Short Waves, 1945 to Today; by Jerome S. Berg ISBN 978-0-7864-

Description

The discovery and development of short-wave technology during the 1920s and 1930s permitted radio stations throughout the world to transmit their programs over long distances, even worldwide, for the first time, and the thrill of hearing broadcasts from faraway places produced a dedicated American audience. Developments in short-wave broadcasting and short-wave listening from their inception through the war years were covered in *On the Short Waves*, 1923–1945: Broadcast Listening in the Pioneer Days of Radio, published by McFarland in 1999. This book picks up the story in 1945, describing the resumption of organized short-wave listening after the war and its development in the years since. The companion volume, Broadcasting on the Short Waves, 1945 to Today, focuses on the world's short-wave stations.

Written from the standpoint of the serious short-wave enthusiast, this book begins with an examination of the broader short-wave listening audience. It then presents in detail the histories of the major North American short-wave clubs and reviews the professional and listener-generated short-wave literature of the era. It also covers the DX programs and other listening fare to which short-wave listeners were most attracted and the QSL-cards they sought as confirmation of their reception. The book presents a chronology of the short-wave receivers available and discusses how changes in receiver technology impacted the listening experience. It also addresses the important role that computers have played in the short-wave listening of recent decades. The book is richly illustrated and indexed, and features extensive notes to facilitate further reading or research.

Description

In this revised, expanded and corrected edition, the acclaimed *Encyclopedia of American Radio*, 1920–1960 (Booklist Editors' Choice; "recommended"—*Library Journal*) offers even better coverage of the performers and programming on American radio from its inception to its golden age. This work is the definitive source for scholars of communication, social and cultural history and the popular arts, as well as devoted fans of radio history.

New entries include information on such fascinating topics as gender discrimination in radio; holidays on the airwaves; husband and wife teams; minstrel shows, vaudeville, and burlesque; Scopes "monkey" trial broadcasts; and super heroes. Also included is additional information on broadcasters of the twenties, thirties, and forties, as well as on unique entertainers ranging from astrologists and musical saw soloists to yodelers and whistlers. Description

Entries recount occasions, practices, or decisions which left indelible marks on broadcasting (listed by date of occurrence); the debuts and cancellations of programs; and births and deaths of important people in radio history—not only headliners but also less recognized individuals, from radio executives and producers to writers, sound techs, engineers, consultants, hawkers and impersonators.

Included for each show are the premise it was based upon, the producers, host, announcer, vocalists, orchestra conductor, writers, and sponsors, and the air dates and ratings. Biographical sketches are provided for 177 individuals.

The Friends of Old-time Radio held its 33rd Annual Convention from October 23 – 26 at the Holiday Inn, Newark, New Jersey.
