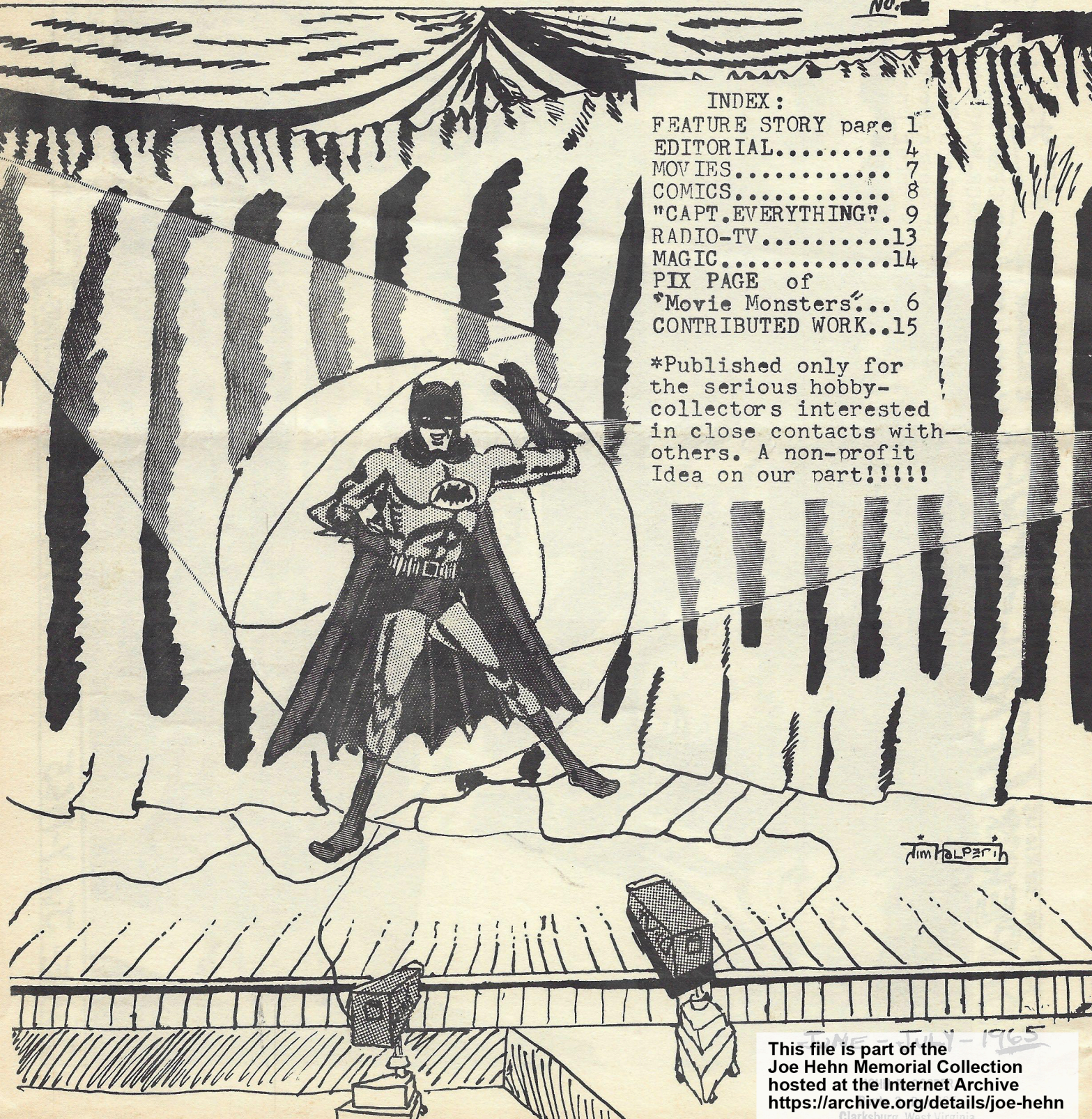

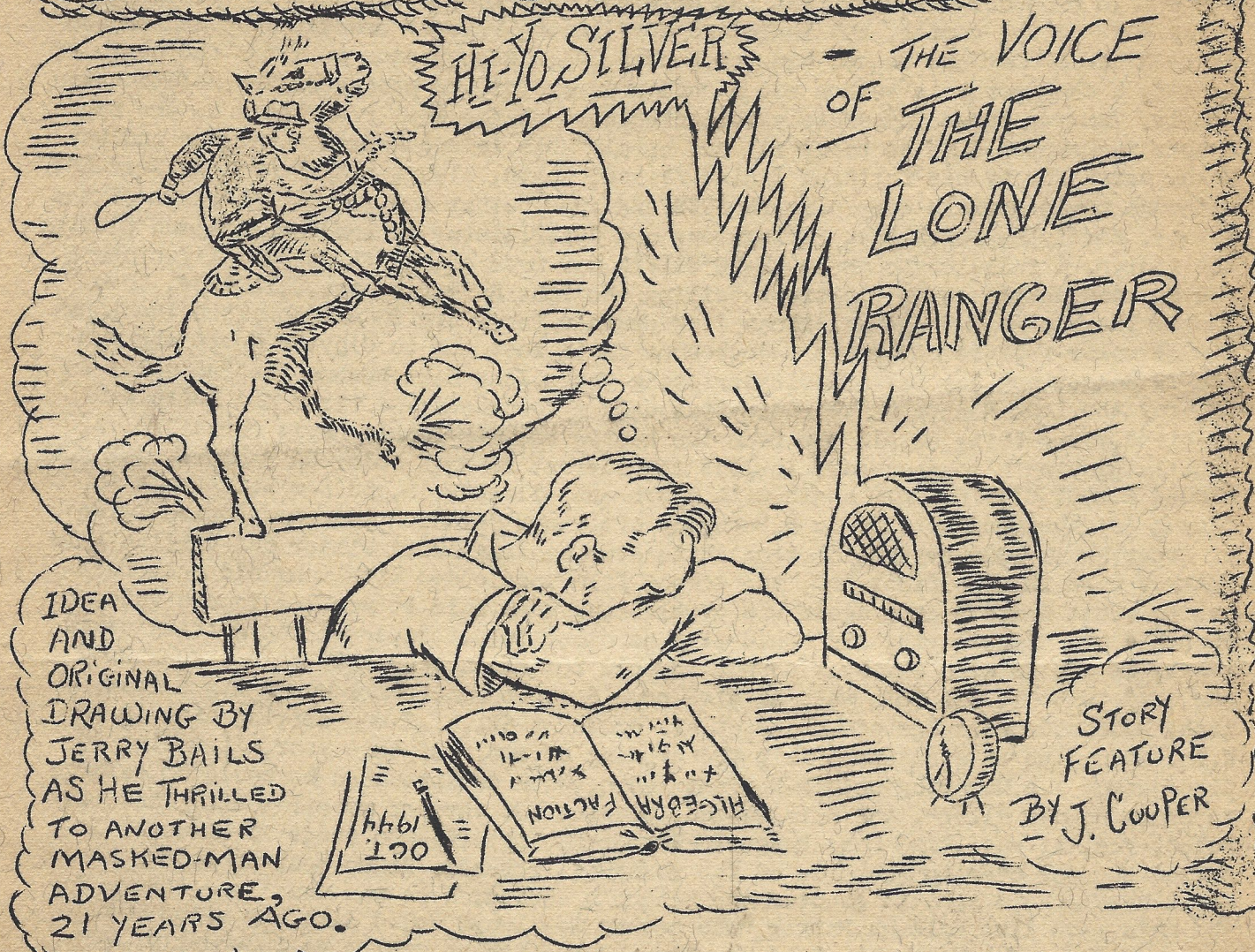

IN MEMORY OF BRACE BEEMER

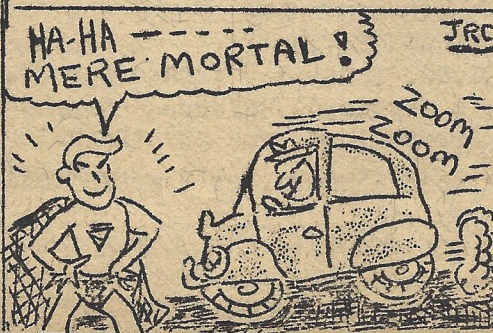
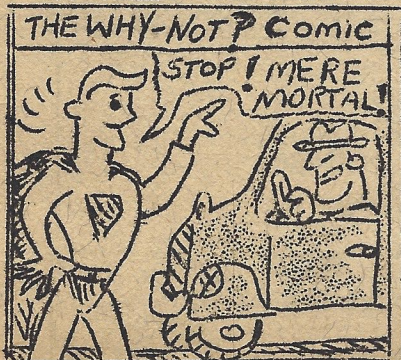


BRACE BEEMER died March 1., 1965. He was quietly playing a deck of cards in the form-solitar. Brace was living quietly in retirement with his wife and 3 daughters on a ranch, raising horses in Oxford, Michigan. He had started in radio back in Indianapolis and had come a long way on a big white stallion, behind a microphone and black mask. As the famous radio voice of the mask-man, Brace Beemer had many friends the world over, although many also did not know what he looked like. However they knew that deep friendly voice.. "For he was.. the Lone Ranger!" He was as real as Santa Claus, Kilroy, Father Time, or the Easter Bunny, Mr. Beemer will go on living as the original Lone Ranger, fighting crime, bringing justice to the old west, long after space ships invade every part of the wild-frontier. Only an hour before his death, thousands of Detroit fans saw him on a tape interview with Bill Kennedy over OKLW-TV, Windsor, Ontario. He was known the world-over..... George Trendle, onetime part owner of WXYZ radio in Detroit, thought-up the whole thing with the aid of a radio-script writer by the name of Francis H. Striker. Using the music of old recordings on the show and the theme of Rossini's "William Tell Overture" song, the Lone Ranger program was an instant success when aired the ever famous first time, January 20th, 1933. Screen stars had been many on the show, one being John Hodiak who filled in as sound-effects man. The show was so good, it was piped to Cincinnati, then to New York, to Columbus, etc. which started the Mutual Network hook-up.... Beemer was working on the show and quit to go into a more expanded career he thought when Earl W. Graser took over as the Ranger, but was

killed in a vile auto crash April 8., 1941. Beemer had come back to the show as a narrator & announcer now and then, and as lady fate would have it, he was with the show & agreed to continue again as the voice for the masked-man. (Frank Striker, whose name appeared on the Lone Ranger comic-strip, also died in an auto accident, a terrible head-on smash Sept. 4., 1962 at the age of 58.) Some say George Seaton, now a film producer-director, was the original Lone Ranger on radio in the very first early days of the series, but there are conflicting reports exactly when Seaton had started and Beemer and Graser had taken over. When Beemer came in after the death of Graser, a changeover in voices was a sudden worry for the producers. The solution was simple. The two shows immediately following each change were re-written so the Lone Ranger was supposed to be badly ill and hardly able to speak over a whisper and was being cared for by his faithful Indian friend, Tonto, always played by John Todd. And although movie serials were made in 1938 and 1939, other actors got the parts of the heroes. Namely Lee Powell, Bob Livingston and Chief (Victor Daniels) Thundercloud playing the Indian. A full-length movie, HI-YO * SILVER was made of the first serial footage & had Raymond Hatton as an old-timer telling the Lone Ranger story.... In 1954, Lone Ranger Inc. was sold to Texas oilman Jack Wrather for a big \$3 million. Then the LONE RANGER color-feature movie was made. Beemer again lost out to Clayton Moore who was the TV Ranger and Jay Silverheels depicting Tonto. John Hart became the 2nd. actor to portray the Lone Ranger on TV, but after only a few shows was fired and Moore was re-hired, Moore being an old pro from the hectic rough-&-tumble movie serial roles, usually playing a tough crook. In 1958 the current Eastman color UA feature, THE LONE RANGER & LOST CITY OF GOLD again with Moore and Silverheels, and now being seen in many a neighborhood theatre on a Saturday afternoon "kiddie" program. Bonita (wife of owner Wrather) Granville, onetime child star, Academy Award winner and villain Lyle Bettger were in this first one, the second film was loaded with many old western actors... but Brace Beemer again was overlooked. Many said it was his famous voice that had him "type-cast", and could play no other role. Because he was getting up in years, it always also was felt he was too-old for the movies & TV roles. John Todd was said to be in his 80's when he died some 6 years ago. Beemer was a big 6 foot, 2 inch, 200 (hundred-pounds of muscle at his death at 62..... I was driving high in the W. Va. mountains on a business trip the evening of Feb. 2 of this year, listening to disc-jockey J.P. McCarthy on WJR-Detroit radio, when he announced he would be talking to Brace Beemer "live". And sure enough, pouring out through my car radio, that ... voice, yes, it was.. "The Lone Ranger!" Beemer was interviewed about 20 minutes. I pulled the car over to the side of the road and listened. Brace went on to say he would hardly have time to go over the Ranger's script, as it was usual procedure for the main pros like Raleigh Parker "who seemed to always sound like his sinus was acting up" and Jay Michaels, "who usually had the job as saying so innocently.. Why that's the Lone Ranger.." on the final line of the script's episode right before the mighty far-off... "Hi-Yo-Silver.. Awwaayyyyyy!" Brace went on to say that he was an official commissioned "Texas Ranger" and that being bestowed on him by Governor of Texas-Stevenson at the time, and has never been revoked, and he could go right out & arrest an hombre and put him in the cooler, and do it as an official acting Texas-Ranger of Texas. He said the first few broadcasts he was on had a man being shot by the Lone Ranger and the crook had died from the silverbullet wound. A great many letters of complaint came in and it was at that time, the Lone Ranger never again shot to kill, but only to disarm or the like.... Brace went on to say & talk about in the first shows Fran Striker played the part of the Lone Ranger's brother.. Reed. And the original story of how gallant Rangers were ambushed by the Cavendish gang, all left for dead, all except one died. During the nite, an Indian came upon the bodies, found one to be alive and 3 nights and 3 days later after being cared for by TONTO in a nearby cave, the Ranger awoke and recognized the Indian who had he himself saved from drowning when they were small boys. The Ranger says... "your name is Tonto and you called me Keno Sabay." And Tonto says, "That right, and you still Keno Sabay-it mean "Trusted Scout." They discuss how they must dig six graves, bury all of the identify of the one surviving Ranger, and he must go out and capture the crooks, all crooks, concealing his face... and making a mask from the shirt that belonged to his late brother. Finding a wild white-stallion, calling it Silver, the mask-man, his

"faithful horse Silver" and "faithful friend TONTO" set out to capture the mean ole Cavadish gang, which they did in but a few episodes and have not quit chasing the "bad-guys" since, known only as..The Lone Ranger!...Beemer said that over 3,000 recordings were made by Fred Flowerday and some 46 new episodes were produced at last, now in syndication on many radio stations. (WJR-Detroit 7:30pm EST on Sun. Eve.) Other thrillers of past radio-days GREEN HORNET, SERGEANT PRESTON OF THE YUKON and others created by Striker and Trendle, can yet be heard including another favorite of ours..THE SHADOW. Although most of the shows, especially the earlier ones were "live"..such professional talent hired for the top ABC show where it moved later, did make a fluff of their lines now and then, doing a live show at 7:30pm for the East coast, a half-hour later another show "live" for the midwest and again another half-hour later for the west-coast "live", did tell on the actors. Beemer recalled with a chuckle the nite John Todd was doubling (which the actors did for parts on every show) as an Englishman on a stagecoach being attacked by Indians and was supposed to say, "I think I'll chance a shot you know.." When given the cue by the director from another room over an earphone set, Todd heard the cue and said.. "Ah, I think I'll chance a cue, you know!" and just about broke up everyone during that "dramatic" spot. The same nite while the show was being broadcast to the west-coast & in giving a special Safety-Talk during the last part of the show, Beemer ended his public-announcement tag with "and remember kids, don't fluff! Whereupon John "Tonto" Todd almost rolled onto the floor with laughter. Many time they would have to cover if the "live" show went wild, which only pros fitfully can do...as another episode when the Lone Ranger and Tonto were searching through baggage in a hotel room, finding nothing, the masked-man says... "Nothing here, let's get back to camp!" And "Tonto" Todd, becoming suddenly lost in the lines of his part, forgetting that the drama is taking place upstairs in a hotel room..hesitates and then yells... "Get up up Scout!" His horse was not supposed to be up in the hotel room too!I can even now hear the story that has become a classic, how the mask man came to be, how his faithful friend Tonto saves him, the legend of his "big-horse Silver" and after all these years, it brings a tear, a lump in the throat, a tingle at the back of the neck and as a line now and then as I listen to those old programs may seem a bit awkward since childhood days have faded & around me things do look a bit more different and real in perspective, but things do look wonderful again when thinking of the work it was involved in each program, the prestige of a "live" broadcast, it had to be right the first time, couldn't be "dubbed", and when the Lone Ranger spoke, you know it was Beemer, there was no doubt, it was all in fun, we know it, and it was magic entertainment. It was the finest! By radio standards, If the Lone Ranger rode into the sunset every listener's imagination painted the "perfect" beautiful sunset, unlike anything any TV artist with brush could put together today. We all knew this radio hero, each of us, the way we wanted to, the way we individually saw him. He was our "faithful-friend" for fun, to relieve the boring long winter evenings (before tv), to help dad concentrate about something, something during WW-2 besides rationing, Hitler, or Tojo. Brace Beemer was that kind of "friend", then in the role of the masked-man.DJ McCarthy told Beemer how he wished he had lived in those radio days as a radio-announcer and wanted to be the player that gave that important question at the end of the program all of us waited to hear. Beemer laughed & said, "go ahead!" So.. McCarthy..like we have heard it so many times before..said with excitement.. "I'd like to thank that mask-man, for saving my life, the town, and the bank's money...but

where did he go? " And Boomer, kinda like he had done so many times before over the last 17 years (up until the final live show Sept. 3, 1954) and slightly off-mike, gave that famous tag-line cry... "Hi-Yo-Silver, Awayyyy!" They both laughed in the background, and the interview was over. Boomer had come out of retirement to make a few commercials for a Detroit area auto dealer, using the Lone Ranger cry & voice and he said on the interview that he could easily go right back anytime into the role as the Lone Ranger without any trouble. But since the final show, he was not called on any further for his God-given talent. He had appeared with a circus on a white stallion as "The Lone Ranger & Silver of Radio", but extra work was short and far between, mainly then it was said, because of his too famous voice, it would just fit into anything but a leading part and yet still would be noticed, so was again & again turned down by casting departments..... Little did I know, that it would be only 1-month for Brace Beener to live, while I listened to that interview. And there are no tapes of it, because it was "live", just like Brace used to work in those glorious old-radio-days. Maybe scientists will invent a machine to bring back all kinds of sounds that have been lost traveling away from earth out in space. But, no matter... many collectors have captured already many grand sounds & have filed them away on tapes for years to come in their bulging old-radio libraries which certainly represent a great cross-section of programs, Americana of years gone by..... "Yes, Virginia....." even sadly though Brace Beener died, his great voice and the Lone Ranger yet ride over the airwaves and TV antennas... between the music called rock-and-roll, darting here and there over the horizons and through the clouds of.. thundering clouds of rolling dust... upon the great horse Silver... Brace Beener still lives to enchant thousands of young boys and girls with those great radio programs like so many times they did this writer... yes, we still happily say... "The Lone Ranger Rides Again..... Hi-Yo-Silver, Awayyyyyyy!" (END)*

Never Another Judy Judy Holliday Is Dead

LOSES BATTLE AGAINST CANCER

NEW YORK, June 7 — Judy Holliday, the intellectually brilliant actress who won an Academy Award playing dumb blonds, died early today in her sleep at Mt. Sinai Hospital after a five-year battle against cancer. She would have been 42 on June 21.

Miss Holliday underwent cancer surgery in 1960 but the disease was recurrent. Her attorney, Arnold Krakower, said she "put up a gallant fight to the very end."

The actress, whose real name was Judith Tuvim, entered Mt. Sinai May 26 when her case was believed to be terminal. She is survived by a son, Jonathan, and by her divorced husband, David Oppenheim.

I.Q. OF 170

Miss Holliday was a precocious New York high school graduate with an I.Q. of 170 when she set her sights on a stage career. She got a job as a backstage switchboard operator with Orson Welles' Mercury Theater, a job she later portrayed so hilariously in "Bells Are Ringing" on Broadway.

Her warm, witty personality caught the attention of Betty Comden and Adolf Green when they formed a group of young hopefuls into a nightclub show entitled "The Revuers."

The group also made films, and while in Hollywood Miss Holliday got a contract which kept her waiting for six months for a one-line role in "Something for the Boys."

SMALL PART

She returned to New York and landed a small part in "Kiss Them for Me" which won her critical raves and the Clarence Derwent Award. This led to her casting in 1946 as Billie Dawn, the dazzling but stupid blond in "Born Yesterday" as a replacement for Jean Arthur, who became ill during the show's pre-Broadway run.

"Born Yesterday" catapulted

Miss Holliday to stardom, a four-year run on Broadway and the subsequent movie which won her an Oscar in 1950.

MANY FILMS

A number of films followed including "The Marrying Kind," "It Should Happen to You," "Phfft," and "The Solid Gold Cadillac." In 1956 she opened in her second great Broadway musical, "Bells Are Ringing" with Sydney Chaplin, and later made a movie version. The play won her the Antoinette Perry Award.

Then she returned to Hollywood for "Full of Life" and did one more Broadway show, the play "Hot Spot," in 1963. She had been inactive since then. She often spoke of a desire to do "serious drama" but said she was afraid she was one of those people whom "you see walk on the stage and you laugh."

Blosser's 'Freckles' Is 50 Years of Age

Incredible as it may seem to his fans, Merrill Blosser created the comic strip "Freckles and His Friends" in 1915 and continuously has drawn it and has written its continuity for 50 years.

Blosser's "Freckles" is the oldest regular comic strip still piloted by its creator and the only one to reach its Golden Anniversary under the personal direction of its original artist and writer.

600 Papers

The cartoon strip has remained unaffected by wars, depressions and moon landings while keeping up with modern teen-agers through five decades. "Freckles" is available to 22,000,000 readers of more than

600 daily and Sunday newspapers, distributed since it was "born" by Newspaper Enterprise Association.

Boyish At 73

Although he will be 73 on May 28, Mr. Blosser retains boyish enthusiasm and whimsicality and expresses them in his work. He says his comic characters

keep him young. Incidentally, he was expelled from high school for drawing caricatures of his faculty members. Soon after, he won a contest and a trip to Washington, where he met President Theodore Roosevelt. "Bully!" boomed Teddy, when the youngster drew a caricature of him.

After a year at Blue Ridge College, Union Bridge, Md., he sold a cartoon to the *Baltimore American* and quit school. He worked briefly on the *Wheeling* (W. Va.) *Register* and a year for the *Cleveland Plain Dealer* before joining NEA in May, 1915.

Blosser never sent his cartoon kids to war, but his cartoon efforts in behalf of War Bond sales earned him a personal citation from Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau.

The boyish septuagenarian and his wife now live in a Blosser-designed home in Arcadia, Calif., a suburb of Los Angeles. He likes the outdoors, football games, long automobile rides, fine art (he's a collector of paintings)—and kids.
