Walt Disney out in his Hollywood studios for the past 28 years, since releasing to the excited public the perhaps masterpiece of all full-length cartoon feature movies, "Snow White and the Seven Drawfs" in Dec. of 1937, has pretty much held the crown of all winner and champ for producing the art type of cartoon entertainment for the theatre screens. There will be no deny in this from any reader-huh? But, do any of you remember the little animated undertaking by a brother team of Max and Dave Fleisscher from a brand-new cartoon studio not in film-capitol California, but across the United States down in Florida, Miami, among the oranges and sunshine? This was a undertaking by these two gentlemen that thought If Disney could make his millions from pen and ink creations on cellouoid, then why couldn't they? And well they might have thought this. The

two of them had originally slaved away for Disney during the long working hours spent on Snow White, and with this valuable background behind them, the two brothers had just opened a new modern animated-studios in Florida and had come up with what was expected to be an Idea that would outdo-Disney and his Drawfs. Radio was very prominent during the late 30's. Two famous airway singers, Jessica Dragonette and Lanny Ross were hired as the important voices behind the cartoon characters. Two song-writers, Leo Robin and Ralph Rainger were called in to write original music and the wheels started to turn to what was expected to be a major competitor to the big Disney cartoon-film world. The Fleischer boys knew what real work was all about in those days with Disney. Walt was said to know how he could get extra overtime from his men, by just dropping hints how lucky it was for them to be working for Disney the master. That was the days before the real-thugh unions that are present now. And in Florida, for some reason, the Fleischer boys found it not like the Hollywood --atmosphere. The film was released December 21, 1939, almost to the day, just two yrs. after Disney's Snow White. Paramount Pictures realizing that R.K.O. had a good thing going for them with their deal with Disney, grabbed up the chance to release all of the Fleischer product, and looked forward to a rich and long happy relationship. But production ran a little longer than was expected. There was much money involved in the equipment that was not all paid for, and even before the movie was released to fanswho were looking for anything like another "SNOW WHITE" the undertaking seemed like a bad Idea. Still, in the days when theatre-operators and distributors, thought the holiday season was the time to make money (but not now-they think) novie-goers have no time away from Christmas trees and color TV sets during the holidays) the film was released with not too much fanfare or advance advertising or ballyhoo, and yet to all concerned, the movie did rather fair. However, not all reviews were alike. Many thought it should have contained a more original story (Snow White sure wasn't original) and

as the songs were plesant and original with a bit of tanderness,

they were not quite up to the Disney quality. The sound quality was also

(Movies) (background) Gulliver's Travels-part 2 questioned, although Disney & Fleischers both used the up-to-date Western Electric sound. Now, let's set this straight. There was just too much comparison to the big Disney movie that was sucha tremendous success. And the crities were very rude, hot although all of them, mind you. The film did quite well. But, not as well as the Floitcher boys and Paramount would have wanted. One more feature length cartoon adventure was produced by the studios. HIPPITY HOES TO TOWN, another cute and quite original production, but it too did not have the advanced advertising program or an exploitation drive as the Disney product always had. Disney was also in the comics, his name was on the theatre cartoons, his program was on radio, If you will think about it, Disney's name is everywhere that entertainment is. And Paramount could not give Fleischer this much of a helping hand, which was needed in any form. With the two features doing only medium success at the boxoffice, and quickly forgotten, the boys started turning out cartoon-shorts in color for the theatres. About that time in the early and mid 40's, SUPERMAN color cartoons were produced for theatres at the Miani studios. If you happen to have a print in your film collection, especially the color copy in 16rm sof now available to some TV stations (but for some reason not booked anymore) notice the very excellent drawing of the heroe in the flowing red cape, background detail and overall good artwork. It is tops. That is exactly the kind of artwork that was seen in Gulliver's Travels. I have pretty much painted you a sad picture thus far of the Fleischer Brother's production, However, as I said in the beginning, the reviews of critics were mixed. Some also thought it to be another cartoon-feature masterpiece. I for one agree. As Disney releases SNOW WHITE every 7years to the public, figuring new crops of fans (as well as other Disney creations ( I do not know why this Fleischer nasterpiece was discarded to TV in the package of old movies by Paramount. Although Gulliver's Travels was re-released a few times, it did not have again the needed advance exploitation and was always picked up cheaply for a double-feature program in the theatres, and eventually faded away to now turn up on local television channels perhaps in your home town. If you get the chance to watch this movie locally, especially in color, do so and then see for yourself If this is not another"Disney", that for perhaps the reasons that I have named here, It would have been another all-animated-feature lenght masterpiece. True, there has been a feature here and there imported from Japan, Italy, England, etc. But, nothing to match this. The tale of the English sea captain shipwrecked among the little people of Lilliput is yet timely -- though over 200 years old. For Jonathan Swift wrote it in 1726 to point out the very foolishness of war. Captain Leruel Gulliver's ship is caught in a storm and sinks, but he is washed up on the bank of the tiny people of Lilliput. Producer Fleisher (Max-that is) used the sound of hitting a big elephant skin drum with a baseball bat to give the storm scenes. On a balcony(2) at the King's palace, Prince David of Blefuscu is with Princess Glory of Lilliput planning their wedding. The two kings though (3) are quarelling over what songs are to be sung and soon a war breaks out from their misunderstanding. Things get pretty rough as three spies (4) are called in to do away with all "good-guys". Gulliver has not awaken(5), and is placed on a large sled with 100-wheels, bind him with hundreds of ropes and take him to the court-yard(6), the little people are startled when Gulliver breaks his many ropes with ease. As(7) war is being declared and battles start, our heroe is suprised at what is going on, steps into the thick of the battlefront, quickly smashing all cannon, gathering up all warships like toys in a bathtub, and one of the most memorable scenes ... thousands of arrows are shot at him, sticking to his shirt-sleeve like thousands of straightpins, he easily wipes them off with a big brush of the other hand, and soon the armies are left without anything to fight with. The spies, "Snitch", "Sneak", "Snoop" have meanwhile confiscated Gulliver's pistol and are about to shoot him with his own weapon, when the good prince David appears in a flurry of fists (like any good heroe should) and saves (8) Gulliver from harm. With Gulliver in cornand, peace is declared, king's are forced to shake hands by the big giant, the prince and princess are married, and Gulliver is given a new boat to sail home. In Swift's original book, Gulliver goes on to adventures with magicians other larger giants than himself, bigger monsters, etc. I will not soon forget the great movie undertaken by the Fleischer Brothers. Look for it on your local TV screens-If you are lucky! It is truly professional entertainment! It is a classic! No, It is not another Disney. rather it is the first and last Fleischer Brother's novie great!







# CE CONTINUE DE LA CON

### MASTER MAGICIAN-MASTER SHOWMAN


A little unknown writer who had a vast imagination for the unknown and the very different was born in 1874. His very real name was Erich Weiss. But, within a span of only 30 years, his newly aquired stage name of Harry Houdini, was known throughthe world. Houdini an American, took his stage name from the famous Frenchman of the magic world. Robert Eugene Robert



Houdin, a famous conjurer noted for his wonderful optical illusions and the fact he made no claim that his devices were supernatural. Houdini died in 1926 at the age of 52. Of a bursted appendix, on Halloween nite. Some reports say due to many over exercised stomach stresses, and some say it was due to the fact Houdini would invite anyone to hit him in the stomach as hard as they wanted to in testing his wonderful storich muscles he had developed over the years doing breath-holding exercises, etc. But, as a child, Hoadini read all the books possible available on his heroe, magician Houdin. So he set himself a goal, that he would be the most famous magician in the world, doing magic with large illusions, and telling the public also that his feates were "tricks", and not supernatural. Houdini added an "i" to Houdin, and did become the world's most famous magician. Houdini. .. He had taken a job while very young with a locksmith in the east, tickering around with the locking devices until he was so professional, he was makeing good money on the side with bets, that he could not be locked up in any compartment, or duped by any lock or set of handcuffs. He got so good, that he had taken a job, with a sideshow doing simple tricks and escapes. It is true that he met his lifelong wife at this time, and was married, recruiting "Bess" into his magic act as his assistant and going on the road with his program of ledgemermain. Soon his showmanship became wildly known in his escape acts featured within his show. His boasting that he would give anyone \$1,000 If they could contain him in any jail or handcuffs was being accepted everywhere, and he would accept them on stage with gusto without trouble. His vaudeville background was tremendous experience for Broadway and in 1925-26 he opened at the National Theatre in New York City with a three-hour show ... Starting in showbusiness with his brother Hardeen, Houdini married comedienne Bessie Raymond and broke away from his brothers act, going alone through honky-tonk towns and with a circus, winding up with Dr. Ton Hill owner of a big concerteco. and a shownan in his own right who taken Houdini under his wing and soon made a big name of him. And whide in the west during a show, a famed Jessee James gangsters turned-honest and then a sheriff rushed up to Houdini and snapped a set of handcuffs on the performer during his act on stage. Remembering his days of picking open his mother's cupboard locks, doors, safes, etc., within six-minutes, Houdini was free and a pro at escapes he was dubbed from then on everywhere. Magic was going great guns, in fact there was magicians performing everywhere, ald around him, in USA and overseas. He found that out while playing in Europe in 1900 and in Paris in 1901. His brother Hardeen was asked to come overseas, and Houdini and Theodore thought up a cunning plan that was the forerunner of the so-called "feuds" that Charlie McCarthy vs. W.C.Fields had going, same as Benny & Burns & Allen & Cantor, Crosby against Hope, etc. It was simply "show-business" and as no one knew they were putting on an act of quarelling among themself, it made big-headlines in the newspapers and brought a lot of free valuable publicity...Six years the brothers played "opposide" each other in theatres in the same village or county, but both bringing in full-houses each performance.

That was the "Golden Magic Era" as some say, it was the days of Thurston, T. Nelson Downs, Arnold DiBiere. But, Houdini and brother Hardeen held their own wonderfully. In 1907, Houdini came back to America, with his brother. Both of them were booked for 40 weeks in vaudeville. Newspapers told how in Kansas City, while playing a show on stage, Hardeen had hired a detective to rush on-stage and clamp a special handcuff without a keyhole on Houdini. Houdini was not foiled and escaped with the use of sweaty wrists, rubber-like flexible fingers, and upon his release from the stage, gave his brother a "blast" that made all the papers. The exact thing both Houdini and Hardeen wanted done in the first place. Another time while Houdini was escaping from a straighjacket suspended from the roof of a skyscraper, a publicity stunt for some 15,000 people watching from the sidewalks, Hardeen went through the crowd passing out cards announcing that the real show to see was the famous magician "Hardeen" now playing across town in another theatre. The crowd didn't know actually who whey were watching, Houdini or Hardeen by that time...but they went to see both ragicians, and again both brothers did very well at the boxoffice. .. In 1916, Houdini played the old Hippodrome in New York. He featured a 10,000 lb.elephant, suspended in midair over a huge tank of water. At a snap of his magic fingers, the elephant then suddenly disappeared, leaving his packed-house of startled audiences wide-eyed with disbelief. During World War I, he joined up with entertainers and put on camp-shows for the soldiers. After the war, he again toured the major cities for the big Keith vaudeville circuit. Then he figured it was time for a full evenings show of 3-top hours of magic, and bpened on Broadway at the National Theatre. Only two magicians since Houdini have attempted this. Blackstone and Milbourne Christopher, but their shows were not as elaborate as that Houdini presented or their illusion productions as giagantic. In 1913, Houdini's nother died. He wanted very much to cormunicate with her, If it was possible, after her death. Disguising himeslf, he would go to the many spirit-fakers, and while there would be serious in trying to reach his beloved nother, but would always come away disgusted after exposing the stupid tricks used in the dark seance, luminous paint, wired bells, etc. by the seance workers. Many said he paid \$1,000 for a super-fine skeleton key, used in his escapes, and including the one made from the English prison under watchful eyes of Scotland Yard. The key, made from his plans, by an unknown key-maker. His famous Broadway show ran for over 4 months.) But, nothing was as important to him until his death, next to his wife, Bess, perhaps, than his wide open secret, that he would expose every faker in show-business who proclaimed supernatural powers, or could talk to the dead. After failing to sincerely do this in every way possible, using every means known and visiting every so-called "real" seance-worker, in hopes to talk with his deceased mother, Houdini waged a bitter war against all fakes. One Ratean Bey was doing an act of being buried "alive" under a ton of dirt on the stage of Hotel Astor in N. V. He would stick knives and needles through parts of his body and this Egyptian then would be vovered with dirt on stage for 15 minutes while in a self-imposed trance. He then attempted to be sealed in a netal casket and be lowered into the Hudson River, but as soon as the casket went under the water, he signaled for his assistant to bring him up which they did, and for some reason this was not attempted again. Houdini read of this and was determined to show this man a fake. Houdini could by this time already hold his breath for over 4-minutes, practising in his bathtub and his head under water. Houdini sent out the word that he would do this "trick" and if he failed he said "It will be the will of God and my own foolishness". He was now 52 years old. Sealed into a professionally made metal-casket, lowered into the pool of Hotel Shelton in N.Y. in 1926, Houdini stayed in the casket, underwater for one and a half hours, over 30 minutes longer than the Egyptian fakir. Soon, little by little, the fake seance-workers and super-fakirs dissapeared before the exposing drive of Houdini. Houdini appeared in novies, he was always the master shownan, and not easily a lost for words. (One time while doing the razor-blade trick, placing the blades and string into his mouth, he asked a fresh kid on stage to look into his mouth and tell the audience what he saw. The kid blurted-"rotten teeth!" And quickly Houdini shot back"Quiet, before I turn you into a furry rabbit."And The audience thought he could?) He gave some magician friends a lock-closed, saying he would try to come back after death and unlock it on Halloween hite-If there was life after death. So far-he has failed proving exactly what he felt, said his last -days.

As we are rushing to rake a deadline with our publication, word that BLACKSTONE has passed away reaches us. This is sad. One of the last "big-time" magicians was Harry (Bouton) BLACKSTONE. His close association with everyone in magic will be missed. A local girl here in Clarksburg toured with the BLACKSTONE show in the 1940's and was the "floating lady", she has a wonderful collection of pics with her beside Harry doing escapes, or even being the victim of many the various illusions. Harry was getting up there in years, though it catches up with all of us eventually, he will be one performer all through out showbusiness that will be missed, he was active in his interests until the end. I heard of his death, listening to PAUL HARVEY's newscast, on radio-not TV....LU BRENT of Carden, New Jersey, doing a show in upper Pennsylvania, but I will keep our correspondence"private" and say no more, only that LU is also doncerned with the good quality magic acts. I was suprised to know his offset-job on his advertising was done right here in Clarksburg some years ago ..... JACK CHANIN] a real pro, doing a Lecture and Show in San Francisco, always doing a good job ... . remember spookologist BILL NEFF, I understand he is seriously ill...he is from Indiana, Pennsylvania, the same place movie star Jirmy Stewart hails from, and Bill has sent me pies before showing Jirry helping Bill with his "magic-act" many years ago......JOSE FAMADAS, of Flushing, New York, sent ne souvenirs from the World's Fair which was successful with everything, except drawing the crowds: JOSE sends along a folder from the General Cigar Magic Hall, that has magician MARK WILSON featured, and who appeared there regularly, with other nagics...also received a publication from the All-INDIA Magic Circle, a Bulletin published in India, but features a story of SOCAR the nacician appearing in Egypt, including a picture spread that is pretty magnificient. Also received a program folder from VIRGIL & JULIE showing then being presented for the booking of the "Brooklyn Academy of Music", plus some other catalogs and material ... Lou Tannen's TOP HAT, still a good array of magic and items for sale .... Can you remember the first time you ever saw a magician and is it the first time you really wanted to be just like him? Well, that is really what happened to me! I'll never forget the act, except, for the life of me, I can't remember his name. (That shows you I was watching the "tricks" and not the performer..) The act started with a Flower-GARDEN of feather bouquets, from the foulard. He got all of them out of the silk except the last one, and half-way out, he slipped and although I am sure he didn't mean to do it, he had it sticking half-way up in the air, as he tried to quickly grasp it again and pull it all the way out, flinging it into the floor, with the others, as they stood up in a pretty array of colors. Using spring-flowers all over the stage, pulling then from production boxes, from the air, under the tables they came, etc., they were all over the place. The kids in the audience yelped that they wanted him to thwow then into the audience for them to have. Then the performer grabbed the next effect, holding it center stage, down-close...he snipped off the rose buds from the "ROSE-BUSH" he held. Here is showbusiness...and here he flipped then into the yelling nob of kids in the front rows. Upon a pass of the "ragic-hand", low and behold, came the blooming of new buds on the bush. However, let us not bypass the smart Idea of using real buds to throw to the audience. You see, our performer had used "real" buds attached to the prop and when he "snipped" off the buds, he was in reality cutting off real flowers, and what the audience got, was real buds, and you can be sure, the audience thought they were seeing again real buds appear on the bush, as they hysteriously came by some wonderful power. This is not only good magic, but smart shownanship in one small instance... But, too bad I can't remember the chap's name. His act however, was so good, he weturned the same place, the next year, And that is something as important as anything else.... JOE HAINES who makes cards and operates a going ragic shop in Gincinnatti, Ohio, appeared for the benefit of a Health Society there in that city a few weeks ago, and was tops. Being slyly introduced as a traveling salesman, he quickly gets into his act, without use of a nike, grabs his suitcase, acts as if he is going to show some samples of hardware, and before one knows it, is knocking then over with some quick rope and card effects that only a pro could handle best. One wise-guy from the audience tried to get rough. Again only as a pro would do, brother HAINES slowly turned the heckler into a good assistant, making use of him to win the audience! Great! AND WHAT SHOWS HAVE YOU DONE? How can the promoters possibly make any profit with the latest films on the Clay waltz over Patterson? They are showing then all over the nation two days after the closed TV and radio broadcast ... in West Germany, sexy grandnother Marlene Dietrich is too much for them, her wonderful legs have been banned from all magazines by the government, and can't be seen on the covers.... Its kinda sad to see once-favorite BETTY DAVIS doing those "shock"films after the wonderful roles delivered years ago ... Mary Pickford was asked in Peris If she thinks her movies valuable. She said she had not so long ago gone to a storage can and upon opening it to view a reel of film from an old movie release of hers, that you seen the FU MANCHU film revival of the old thriller starring Christopher Lee? Business so good that there will be sequels coming.... Old timer CHESTER CONKLIN of the Keystone Kops, now 80, plays a cowboy in "Big Hand for Big Lady" with Henry Fonda. ...JOHNNY WEISMULLER (who will always be the oroginal TARXAN to me anyway) and a great swirning star of the 1920's, setting more world records and winning more championship natches than any swirner, voted into the newly organized Swirning Hall of Fane, a unanimous choice!...two more James Bond movies with Sean Connery wanted in the lead role "Diamonds Are Forever", "On Her Majesty's Secret Service"....the special TV show on the Bond craze, a joy, and Alexander Scourby narrating is always superb... and how about that Salute To Stan Laurel? I wish there had been more film-clips of the famous clown and his heavy-friend. Dick Van Dyke hosting was very good, and he will in time, become one of the all-time great TV comedians...he's that almost/right now!....Nancy Ames wanted for movie roles, on the "TWTWTW show not so long ago, her husband is Triain Boyer, don't get wise with him as he is a professional hypnotist! ....Kinda funny about George RAFT, being found guilty then getting off for \$2,500 on admitted charge of federal income tax evasion, the 70 year old dancer, turned movie tough guy, found the feds were tough too in claiming he knew his bookkeeper made an error in a stock loss claim in his income reports of 1961..... Bob Hope is getting the nod again to host the spring Academy Award presentations, they've now decided its best to go with a winner, than gamble on some other like in the past a few times and ended up in tragedy before the cameras "live".... (remember a few years ago the show ran short i hour and Jerry LEWIS hosting, had all the "big" stars padding for time by dancing the jitterbug on stage of the Pantages Theatre in their evening clothes, drawing plenty of protest)....On the set of the new TARZAN novies, Producer Weintraub and Director Robert Day say the 14th Tarzan, former sports star Mike Henry and 14th that is since 1918 on the screen, feels himself as in his role, "the James Bond of the Jungle"....AUDIE MURPHY on the set of his new western movie, was told by his director to be in the background acting natural and not draw any attention away from a sexy girl that was to walk closeup-camera in dripping tight blue-jeans from right to left past Murphy. Whereupon Murphy blurted out for the ho-ho and ha-ha's of the crew standing all about, "No one would notice me in that scene even If I was tap-dancing with a large pink-elephant: ".... The story elsewhere on the Western Stars brings back the memory of the personal appearances of such big names in that era paying personal-appearances all over the country. Just here in our city of Clarksburg, we had BILL ELLIOTT and SMILEY BURNETTE on the stage of the local 2nd run novie house appearing within a month of each other during the 40's. Sniley did a 1-hour show that was pretty funny, the main thing I can remember was him saying how old he was getting and how he could climb the curtain fast as a squirrel if he wasn't getting so old now, or maybe he still could, If there was a big enough peanut that is at the top of the curtain after he got up there."In those days (before TVcorn) that was a funny joke! When Bill Elliott appeared here later, the big question was asked of him(after he asked for questions).. "Just how fast can your twirl both your six-gunns?" Bill answered by doing just that in a white-blaze of spinning cold steele! With that Wild-Bill brought the house down, every kid in the audience (as well as the Dads) knew he was truly a western-heroe just like he appeared on the big silver screen after really doing that tricky feate! The EAST SIDE KIDS appeared here also, there was ALDO RAY and others. The Big-Bands of the 40's played 1-nite theatre dates. But, probably no other stars or big-names, including top politicians to stop off here in Clarksburg, W. Va. had a bigger turn out than those glorious western stars:



The conics world is all excited about the fact at last, TV has recognized the comic strips for a series, other than the animated cartoon-series for the home-screen. BATMAN is being filmed for a TV series to be seen starting around January 12 of the coming year. It was thought to be such a foolish Idea to involve the 4-color heroes in such a high-budget thing as a big TV series, but the response of Man from "U.N.C.B.E" shows the public will accept hokie If served upward, not downward to the thrill-seekers, who enjoy a little "tongue-incheek" excitement If on a good budget, with some good actors, and good plots. The DC stables have given the o.k. for ABC and the National Publications attempt in bringing top-notch adventure by "live-action", not cartoons. Trus, the Fleisher SUPLANAN films are absolutely top-notch. If you have never seen these (see story elsewhere on the Fleisher Brothers novie-studios) then be on the look-out for them, produced back in the middle 40's, they involved top artwork, not the quick-zip work now used on TV and movie cartoons. The Detective heroe of night, will lock horns with some of his old & worthy opponents, Cat Woman, Penguin, The Riddler, and most naturally, one of the all time "bad-guys" of pen and ink, the Joker. (I wonder who has a nose and jaw to play the Joker?) Batran will be played by Adam West (let us all give him a salute at onetime) who was seen in not too successful movies as "Tarmy And The Doctor", "Soldiers In The Rain", "Robinson Crusoe On Mars". But, you will remember him moreso as the young Sgt. Nelson on the "Detectives" TV-show with Robert Taylor. In this series, I truly thought he gave himself a good account of "things to come". Many a series show was built around his acrobatics and acting, which showed ruch promise. I am completely tickeled-to-death that he has the starring role. Burt Ward is a new face, and will be the face of Robin, "Boy Wonder". Batran's sidekick, is said to be a avid fan of the judo and acrobatic sports. Many episodes are in the can, and it is understood that the team are trying to not use any doubles in their stunt-segments. This might soon be over-ruled by the studios. (Jack Mahoney of Range-Rider TV series did his own falls) It is interesting to note that Alfred-the-butler will appear. After being disposed of in Batman panels, Alan Napier will bring Alfred back to life. A new housekeeper will be in the Bruce Wayne house, Madge Blake will play a Mrs. Cooper (ahen-no relation) but she will not know Bruce and Dick are the rasked duo, as Alfred does. Neil Hamilton, an old screen leading man from the 30's, will play Police Cormissioner Gordon, with Stafford Repp as Police Chief O'Hara and Michael Fox as Inspector Bash. The first show has funnyman Frank Goshin playing The Riddler and Jill St. John as Molly of the Molehill Mob. The program is klated for a two-a-week... Wednesday and Thursday and in color. We are promised the Batcave, Batmobile all with nuclear power sources. It does sound good. We can hardly wait .... SUPERMAN is to have that Broadway show that opens March 16. Charles Strouse and Lee Adams who wrote the songs in "Bye Bye Birdie" have wrote the music and lyrics. A funny bit had Johnny Carson reading an ad in Variety, asking for a husky, novable guy that could sing, dance and not be completely musclebound, with blue eyes. Some reports say other shows will be forth-coming on the many conic-book heroes. Captain America would be great, but as Republic tried a serial in the middle '40s, starring Dick Purcell, they used everything of the costume including Capt.'s shield, but did not incoporate the wings-like-effect attached on the side of the head covering. (We expect to do a special story-feature on novie-serials soon and certainly will include the conic-book favorites with story and pix). Dan Flagg which is think is one of the top strips by Don Sherwood, is being filmed for TV with Robt. Taylor in starring role, LITTLE ABNER was bought by network as a cartoon series for next year, before a single line was drawn for a pilot film. It is expected that the great Fearless Fosdick will have much exposure within the series. Big Mike Henry, a former Los Angeles Rans bootball player is the new TARZAN for novies and TV series, and has been complaining already that portraying the ape-man is harder than backing up the line, with so many things happening now to him, being clawed by a lion, bites froma not-so-tane Cheeta, etc .... Probably the best Idea that comic-book publishers have come up with for a long time, is the original comic-reruns and reprints now in giant form at the newstands. BATMAN for instance has his 80-page giant issue for a

25¢ piece and incoporates 4-full length stories, plus a re-print of a 8-page Batman Sunday color syndicated story that appeared for 8-straight-Sundays in 1946. Bob Kane was doing much of the art then, and the duo are fast after the Catwoman. This is a wise thing to do. They have also SUPERMAN with a giant 80-page (continuted on page 19)



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A Look BACK --- I really feel that someone should say a bit of something for the nice-guys that make up the world of old-time-collectors of the radio shows of the golden-era, the 30's-40's-early 50's.

Because there seems to be a rash of "hustlers"

now and that is the reason I think it is time to point out the facts here. Everyone knows a segment or small excerpt of any good show of merit is a collectors' item. You might find it anywhere. I happened to have captured a bit of the TOM MIX show with Curley Bradley and Leo Curley in 1950. This and only one other small segment is all that remains of this top "kid" show that had some pretty good writing and acting for a day-to-day grind. I know for a fact, that one fellow has offered this segment I originally "captured" to another collector for \$10. This is pretty outrageous. I have never paid for a single piece of program tape, nor have I ever sold for cash any from my many reels here. It is one thing to trade a tape for another iten that you want for your collection, comic, film, magic prop, but when you start, there is no stopping. And let's keep this as a hobby, not a here-today-andgone-tonorrow bund of collectors and fans. I personally respect this naterial and these tapes more than that! I hope all of you do the same. If you wish to let me in on a "deal" where someone offers you a program for a ridichlous amount of money, I will be glad to make note of it here. I am sure many of you would almost pay such a price for a valuable piece of material that you want. But, not only would you be then going against all copyright laws in making aprofit from this great hobby, but you would then be hurting all of us, by setting a "sale-price" on screething that really should be traded openly to all of us, for a even trade in value in return by the way of another good radio show of walue. Not money .... Did you notice Norris Goff as the storekeeper on the first Andy Griffin TV show. He was of the old Lun & Abner radio show, I almost forgot this mention. Good to see and "hear" him after all these years....JOHN TODD, who was the voice of TONTO during the long run of the radio LONE RANGER show on radio those many years, was the voice of the weird-laughing narrator on HERMITS CAVE program. John did many voices not only on the RANGER show, but the other shows, as did so many other radio-actors in those days. A good "voice" would scrietine appear on as high as a dozen shows during the week..... Everyone is raising the question, what happened to Curley Bradley? And from one collector comes the most startling news that BILLY FAIRFIELD on the old JACK ARMSTRONG show was the one and the same DICK YORK now appearing on the BEWITCHED TV show each week on ABC....TOM MIX (who we want to do a special story on next issue) was really a U.S. Marshall and the reason for such an exciting background for the radio show. Ton really starred in a movie where he participated as a swordsman, wearing knee- high idueling boots and dandy-duds. Upon seeing the finished feature, he said "It made him sick, he would now go back to westerns", which he did, to boxoffice success.... We also want to do a special story on Charlton E. Morse sometime in the near future, His scripts for the ever popular I LOVE A MYSTERY and ONE MAN'S FAMILY shows were classic writing. And it is suprising with the tender reality of Maruly-indicents for the Barbours that Morse was a bachelor.....the grind of day-to-day wirting "scap-operas" for Elaine Sterne Carrington was a life, I believe I could take. She lived in an attractive house near the waters of Long Island Sound, lying down dictating her lines, stretched out one big couch, Monday through Thursdays from 10 in the norming, until perhaps at Midnite. She wrote WHEN A GIRL MARRIES the same time she was keeping up ahead of the scripts for her other successful 5-times-a-week PEPPER YOUNGS FAMILY. Spending Friday, Saturday and Sunday away from writing, after writing 20,000 words a week, Elaine did live probably the scriptwriter's dream-life....ln 1934 some of the radio shows we were listening to: in the afternoon, EASY ACES, JUST PLAIN BILL, ROMANCE OF HELEN HRENT, the kid shows around 5pm were, SKIPPY, SINGING LADY, JACK ARMSTRONG, ADENTURES OF FRANK MERRIWELL (which didn't ever catch up with Jack), LITTLE ORPHAN ANNIE, and BOBBY BENSON(who made a comeback over Mutual around the early 1950's), at nite we then thrilled to AMOS & ANDY, THE GOLDBERGS, MYRT AND MARGE, JUST PLAIN BILL (re-run), RUTH ETTING singing, PICK & PAT, FIRST NICHTER, JACK BENNY, EDDIE DUCHIN -for Pepsodent, and one kid show that glued 'en to the radio-sets, BUCK ROGERS in 25th CENTURY, and sponsored by COCOMALT that was also broadcast 2 times "live", to the East coast and then an hour later at 7:30 EDT to the West coast. How many did you hear? To be honest, I did not hear them all, I'm not that old! But, oh, those valuable old tapes of mine!

A LOOK FOREWARD-Yes, Radio was great! And television, some will say is the W greatest thing though that has happened! You not only have an instant re-play on tape of a"live"show, somewhat as you did during the radio days, but you can also have yourself that show in "color" and even edit the mistakes out to have a nice smooth running-dull show. If any of you were so lucky to see the bits and parts of the boo-boos that BOB HOPE made and were all clipped out of his upcoming TV-SPECIAL, and then were gathered together and spliced together and shown on the JOHNNY CARSON show a few weeks back, you can see how wonderful a show can be when it is really. "live". The fluffs and jokes among the actors and actresses and side-men (which were edited out) were the funniest of anything that hit the air on the "finished" show. They were not "dirty". They were just funny in a clean-and-wonderful way. What was adlibbed after the blown-lines, by Hope and others were hilarious... I can remember seeing the Abbie Lane show with Cugart live, where she came slinking down the stairway, slipped and fell the rest of the way to the bottom, in a tight skirt that kept her from making a graceful landing. This was funny, I hate to admit, but for benefit to Cugart and Abbie, they got front page headlines and as they were being interviewed on PERSON-TO-PERSON that evening by Ed Murrow later that nite, everyone turned in to see Miss LANE with her lovely leg front-and-center, wrapped to the knee from her injury... Two very large ladies were re-united on the stage of the TRUTH OR CONSQUENCES TV show in 1957. It is my belief that host BOB BARKER is one of the most sharpest and cleaver m.c's on TV, but that day the "live" show should have been taped. The foreign talking guests, stood on each side of the TV studio stage. Upon seeing one another and being introduced by BARKER, the "little" ladies stood absolutely still, yelling tearful greetings to each other. BARKER prodded then on, until at long last, which must have seemed to be all of 5 ninutes, they suddenly rushed at each other, throwing their arms around each other for a big hug, tripping, falling flat on the floor, moaning, crying, stagehands rushing to their aid, becoming entangled, falling also the the floor in a heap, the cameras swinging madly toward the ceiling, trying to get away from such a sight, the studio audience roaring with suprise, BARKER being chased by the monkey that also suddenly goes beserk, the norkey called "EHUIAH" who used to sit atop a stool and blow that silly buzzer, the cameras come back on BARKER, he does not know it, he is seen helping pick up the ladies, and you see four stagehands carry off the ladies like they are dead-soldiers, BARKER realizing he is on camera, can't say anything, just waves goodbye and hunches his shoulders. This was so funny, I am sure I will never quite forget it, nor will the other people at the TV station on-duty with me that day. We laughed so hard, we could hardly make a station-break. Now, anything of this kind can't be caught. And "Caught" it was then, Anyone that has heard the classic breakup of newscaster LOWELL THOMAS, and his announcer DICK NOEL, knows what a truly wonderful and honest funny mistake can be. THOMAS, a top radio man, who hates TV, and one of the developers of CINERAMA, is so business-like, so really good at newscasting. Then when you hear this tape, one can't help but laugh at and with this pair. That too was radio "live". Now, all is cut-and-dried ... even with TV. In 1951, all shows on radio that were network, except a few, went "transcribed" and soon died radio as we knew it. Oh yes, TV is wonderful. COLOR-TV, I wouldn't be without it. And they say, ALL top shows next year will be in color on network, what with local stations going color too how can anyone say TV doesn't give you the utnost. Utnost in canned laughter, an overloading of "situation-comedies", some good, many so bad, this year comedy is in, westerns and action holding their own, comedy coming on stronger. The cycle is at it again. Perhaps the only show that has suprised everyone is GET SMART, the take off on UNCLE (which is movie-serials-gone-TV) and tops for that type of entertainment in color. ANDY GRIFFIN in color, but without Don Knott (from Morgantown, W. Va.) just couldn't be the same, but is still good. LUCY, RED SKELTON, DICK VAN DYKE, are worthwhile, sometimes so is DANNY KAYE (when he has situation-comedy writers, and not always his wife doing his scripts), SMOTHERS BROTHERS I'm not too sure of yet, a most ridichidussformat is MY MOTHER THEE CAR, but some scripts, editing, and Jerry VanDyke and Ann Southern's voice are wonderful-with color yet, BEWICHED at times so good, but why not color? And the others, I night just be able to do without. But, that is one man's opinion. I was going to go into the rating-system networks use, but that is TOO RIFICULOUS.:

you new collectors missed this work of theirs in the 30's and 40's. There is a good question and answer page and one asks "What is Clark Kent's hobby?" The other is "In what magazine did SUPERMAN first appear?" Well, we know the answers are Clark's big hobby is certainly not Lois Laine, but collecting clocks. Also Action comics had the -Red and Blue heroe first. Whereas the Marvel groupe features a giant 72-page comic, DC will give you added fun in 80 pages. One can hardly understand how it was possible to buy a big manoth 64-page comic during the 30's-40's, scaling down eventually to the 52-page issue, and now 32-pages for not 10¢, but 15¢. White the politicians in Wash.D.C. explained the high-cost of living, a cup of coffee now for log, newspapers from 3¢,5¢ to 10¢ and 12¢ each nowadays, I always stunned everyone with the staggering statement that I would fully realize the high-cost-of-living only when the 5¢ bottle of coke went up, the 25¢ admission at the local theatre was a thing of the past, and conic-books would be no longer one-thin-dire. Well, I have lived in only a few short years to see all three cone to pass. It makes me feel so old ... I can't but help to say something after all this time of the quality of comics now on the newstands. I am certainly not a working artist. I do this all as a hobby. (and it shows) but I have thousands of comics from the golden-age-of-comics here. Probably a collection to rival anyones. I did enjoy the Fiction-House artwork, for the simple reason, each panel contained a lot of intricate sketching. Much of the DC material in artwork was good, stories fairly good in those days. Although BATMAN, Detective, Action art and stories were the best, and carried the big-circulation nod for DC. I never perticularly liked Simon & Kirby, as they were so cartoonish. However, the Captain America art including Syd Shores later work with Al Attision I though showed much sweeping action & excitement. Captain Marvel was as funny to me as he was thrilling. Later came THE BARKER, Spirit, Lady Luck by Nordling for Quality. Artwork and story matter wonderful escape. Cole's PLASTICMANat first was fun, later dragged in story & art(as everything seems to do). I really feel Jack Kirby and those fun, yet exciting stories he does for MARVEL in FANTASTIC FOUR are as good as anything around nowdays. Next issue, more personal views and a story on Wally Wood as the below on Fieldstein.

AL FIELDSTEIN --- first and last of the great EC creators.

You could always pick out those bold, strong stories and covers of artist AL FIELDSTEIN's work for EC. His covers of space ships zooming toward earth, labs with monsters crawling around, or a spinning planet in a death dive toward the sun, were strong and powerful. It made you want to grab the magazine off the counter, or off the rack and quickly see what the "teaser" cover was begging you to buy. Here is a scratch-pad full of info on this cartoonist. Born in Booklyn Oct. 24-1925, he won a 3rd place Jon Wanameker Art Contest at 8. Won a World's Fair poster contest in 1938, went 3-hours a day to high school and Music & Art in Manhattan, worked for \$5 a week inking for other artists and did this only on weekends and after school, studying at BC at day, getting a scholarship to Art Students League at nite, enlisted in AAF at 17 in 1943, married his high school sweetheart Claire, by a JP in Blytheville, Krk. Al drew cartoons for field newspapers. ville, Ark. Al drew cartoons for field newspapers, painted rurals for service clubs, decorated planes, flight jackets & orderly rooms with squadron insignias went to work after the service with EC writing scripts & doing original art, working on scripts at last & doing only couple art stories, editing mostly EC's "Shock SuspenseStor" He has 2-daughters, Leslie and Susan, lives in Merrick, L.I. Hobbies are woodworking, tropical fish, photography, painting in oils and paying off the nortgage. He is a rather nodest built Rellow average size and upon seeing him for the first time, one could hardly expect such great talent!!!

## SOGGEROSH HEROGS - "THE WESTERNS"

I don't intend to bore you with the background of the western movie feature. You all probably know the John Wayne's big break was his "Ringo" role in STAGECOACH, that the westerns made more money in the 30's,40's-50's and everytime, than any other type of film. You can fill us in on William S. Hart's silent glance, and Ton Mix and his wonder-horse "Tony".! This is not the story on the "super-westerns", but this is the page of nostalgia on the notion picture commonly known around the studio during those years mentioned, as the "onter-series", the "sagebrush-fodders", or the Series-Westerns. How many of you plunked down your 20¢ or quarter at the local 2nd run theatre-house on a Friday evening, Saturday afternoon natinee and ate up the antics of "Wild Bill Elliott", his buttoned-on shirt, two bony handled six-guns turned "backwards", that bottom lip curled under-or-Charles Starrett and his 2-ton side kick, Sniley Burnette (a regular on TV's PETTICOAT JUNCTION), or the many others of that era? You were one of millions! These cheap little features were turned out by the hundreds, made many heroes of many stars, and quickly would return all costs many-fold for each studio. Locally here, they were always paired with a "B"class feature on a Fri-Bat. double-feature program that would include a serial too. It made such "wonderful entertainment" --- in those days -- before TV anyway ... ! So, let's quickly look at the 12 "series-Western" stars pictured. A movie ad like the one displayed, was proof of sure fire-entertainment at the "picture-house". We knew, ROY would sing a song or two, the "heavy" would shoot a couple of "good-guys", a run away wagon with the protty girl would take place, a stagecoach would be heldup, and from out of the rocks and "woods" coming over the hill, would appear the heroe racing at breakneck speed on his "faithful-horse" throwing hot-lead and then making the crooks run for their lives. The star would go into the local bar, "only" to spot a crook there, ask for "rulk", get a horse laugh for being a "sissy" and proceed to clean out the joint, which wonetimes would carry out into the dusty street, over the wooden sidewalks, under the horse's hoofs, and the villian would most likely wind-up cooling off in the watering-trough. Then getting back the cash previously stolen from the bank, or perhaps the pretty girl's stricken father, or from a burning ranch-house, the funny co-star kissing the town's old maid, and the heroe kissing his horse, passing up the moon-eyed leading lady, being asked to just "please" stay around for awhile ... with a sorry-man ... the two saddle their steeds, waves all around, and ride into the sunset, out of town, with THE END superimposed on the last few film-frames. It happened everytime. We knew it would be just like that. And loved it! If just by chance, Gene Autry would have tripped geting onto Champion, fallen flat on his puss and broken his 5-and-10 guitar, his horse throwing a shoe killing the funnyguy, Gabby, Pat, or Sniley, Champion coming down with mouth and foot rot and forced to be put out of his misery, and the movie ending there, we would have left the theatre in shock! We could not have forced even a snile. We probably would have ended up on a head-shrinker's couach, It would have been too much to bear. Those was the days of the "good-guys-always-win!" Now, today on TV, the novies, on Broadway, everwhere...the guy in the "black-hat" wins everything now! Dale Robertson appeared in a small role in a RANDOLPH SCOTT series-western, Dale winding up with a big crontract and eventually his own TV show from response of the fans who saw him in this one film: ... BOB STEELE now on TV's "F-TROOP" as a regular, started making movies in 1928 and has over 500 movie parts to his credit. Gene Autry's early movies gave him enough loot that he saved and invested to buy a chain of TW-radio stations, professional ball-teams and various business deals with his name on them. CHARLES STARRETT's masked "Durango Kid" series were probably my personal favorites. I have a full collection of stills from every picture of his, he now lives in retirement since his Columbia work, doing an occassional bit such as the "saddlebum" part on a BUNSMOKE show on ty-last season... TEX RITTER's films are still seen on TV, his singing of HIGH NOON there in the feature movie that won an OSCAR helped get min into the western-singers Hall of Fane, Clayton Moore and Jay Silverheels rode to fame on TV and two feature novies in color as LONE RANGER and Tonto, Roy Rogers' real name is "Ernest Sly"afailing health now at 53, Rocky Lane & Rex Allen were the last two of the "series-heroes", they almost came too late. Bill Boyd was a glamour boy, before being Cassidy. He bought up all rights to his films, leased then to the new TV, made a mint. Autry & Rogers couldn't get theirs And Boyd as a burbling dude to fool the crooks in SUNSET TRAIL, is THE funniest western!













RANDOLPH SCOTT is living proof that cowboys are made, not born. He is a native Virginian (Jan. 23, 1903) and a graduate of the University of North Carolina. After college, he wandered around Europe for a year, then went west to join the Pasadena Playhouse. By 1931 he was in pictures—his debut, Sky Bride. Last seen in The Captives, Randy's current film is Shoot-Out at Medicine Bend. He's married to Pat Stillman, has a son Chris.

BOB STEELE was born in Pendleton, Oregon, in 1907. His movie-director dad made some movies of him and his twin brother for future family reference. They turned out so well Pathe bought them, and then featured the thirteen-year-old boys in a dozen more. The brother, Bill, quit the act after high school to study medicine. But Bob went rolling along the plains of Hollywood. Steele's latest release: The Savage Horde.

REX ALLEN, straight-shooting hero of films and ABC-TV's Frontier Doctor, was the cowpoke son of a cowpoke. A mail-order guitar changed his life—he switched from rodeo to radio, where he starred on National Barn Dance show. Later, Arizona-born Rex made his film debut in Arizona Cowboy. He composes most of his own songs and spends his spare time traveling. Rex is married to ex-actress Bonnie Linder and has two sons.

TEX RITTER hails from (you guessed it) Texas. Born and raised in Panola County, he was corralled at the University of Texas for a spell, then headed north to Illinois to get his law degree at Northwestern. Tex found singing more exciting than pleading cases, so, with his guitar for campany, he toured the country and eventually became a triple-threat movie, radio, and record star. He was on your screen last in Col.'s Apache Ambush.

CHARLES STARRETT is a notive of Athol, Mass., and was graduated from Dartmouth, where he played varsity football and starred in theatricals. Then he tackled Broadway. Charles started out by putting on short plays at Wanamaker's department store. This ultimately led to a career in provincial stock companies. A role in Claire Adams brought him back to Broadway and resulted in a film contract with Columbia studios.

ROY ROGERS, fought his way up from poverty to become "King of the Cowboys." Born Nov. 5, 1912, in Cincinnati, he grew up on a farm in Duck Run, Ohio. He quit high school in his second year. Later as a cowhand on a New Mexico ranch he learned to ride, rope, and shoot. He then moved farther west where he heard about a studio audition for singing cowboys. He was hired, and his movie career was launched. Roy's wed to Dale Evans.














GENE AUTRY, hard-riding hero of his own radio and TV show, was practically born in the saddle in Tioga, Texas. "America's fa-vorite singing cowboy" punched cattle, worked as a telegrapher, strummed a guitar, and sang western ballads between dots and dashes. Will Rogers heard him once and encouraged him to keep at it. Gene hit radio, clicked in films, and soon became a rodeo champion. He's 50 and happily married. ROCKY LANE and his horse Black Jack are synonymous with action and excitement. Both manage to overtake the deperadoes with zest, and their films and in-person shows of the rootin' and ridin' variety are a treat to Western fans. Rocky began his movie career doing parts as a romantic lead; his serial role of Red Ryder quickly zoomed him to stardom, and a series of fast-shootin' Republic films was the result. He's Indiana-born and bred.

BILL BOYD has a following of millions who share with him the adventures of Hopalona Cassidy, a stalwart western hero recently rejuvenated by TV. It would amaze many to discover how popular Cassidy is and how unknown, in comparison, is Boyd, who fairly surrendered his career as a romantic lead in order to make nearly 70 films in the Hopelong series. Born in Ohio and educated in Oklahoma, Bill, 59, loves entertaining children.

JAY SILVERHEELS, better known as "Tonto" to The Lone Ranger enthusiasts, utilized his athletic prowess to land work as an extra in movies—thanks to the encouragement of veteran sportsman Joe E. Brown, who eyed the lithe, 170-pound Indian athlete in a game of lacrosse, which Jay learned from his father on their Ontario Reservation. Before films and TV came along, Jay had pursued wrestling and boxing—and was champion at both.

CLAYTON MOORE fancied athletics when only 8. At 14 he formed a trapeze act, big-timed it at the 1934 World's Fair. Once in Hollywood, after a few lucrative posing stints, his tall, lean stature and clean-cut features seemed tailor-made for outdoor heroics. Westerns he loved. After hiding through several films, he won the coveted role of The Lone Ranger on TV, followed it with the movie. Face masked, pistols ready, Hi-Ho Silver!

WILD BILL ELLIOTT started out prefty tame doing parlor dramas at the Pasadena Play-house. He graduated to the great outdoors when another Wild Bill (this one Hickot) became cinemortalized, and has done more than 70 Westerns since. Bill's other major enterprise is the Eliott-Steiner rodeo, most elaborate show of its kind in the country. He and his wife Helen trailer-travel the rodeo circuit, otherwise live in Westwood.

## AOVIE of the Week (?)

This RKO horror picture is the most exciting piece of pseudo-scientific nonsense to scare movie-goers since Frankenstein. 

Probably one of the finest science-fiction movies of all time, that did not come right out in every few seconds and scare the wits out of a person with the sight of the "monster" strangling a victim, was "THE THING", early 1950 novie from the old RKO studios. In case you don't remember who played the "monster", it was Jin "Matt Dillon" Arness, with the growl of a lion dubbed on the soundtrack. The pix shows the heart-stopping sequence in the passageway at the film's windup, when the heroes wire-up an electric shock that burns the "beast" to cinders, in the pix of the cast awaiting the kill, on the left, is actor Kenneth Toby, a red-haired ball of fire now appearing with Sarny Davis, Jr. on broadway in "Golden Boy". His role is of the dirty-mouth prize-fite manager. This broadway show I saw last year & was in the audience when Sarry care out after the show in a curtain call and told the audience "The cast, crew and show would be around for a long time!" Now, you know the story, it is a big broadway hit ..... Probably the big science-fiction show of the 1930's on radio, was BUCK ROCERS. In the pix, the cast show tension on their faces, which comes out over their voices on the airways, to the listeners, a show that was sponsored for many years by Cocomalt, broadcast two times "live" each weekday evening (one to the east coast, one time to the west coast) went into the comics, on to the comic-books and at long last, died off, for the big and unbelieveable reason that was said to be this...the readers just could not ever believe the too-fantastic plots. This was naturally before the men-in-space age of the 1960's. When the sputnics started to spine toward the moon, John Glenn's trip up among the stars, and such, then BUCK ROGERS mane stirred again for a possible comeback. It just didn't happen, and Flash Gordon and Brick Bradford widl just have to carry the load.....STEVE ALLEN was quite funny on TV and radio, before his NBC and ABC hour-long shows. His stint as host of the first TONITE program late at nite, & his bour shows on CBS daytime back in 1950 gave Steverino the polish needed for his current hosting of IVE GOT A SECRET. But before this however, Allen was knocking then dead on the west coast with a dj show that involved \$1,000 bet and a big bit of great showmanship including singer FRANKIE LAINE. He actually wrote 50-songs a day, for 7 straight days, and won the bet against Laine, who sang many of them. With a skinny chin, he was a riot on that CBS daytime show, can you remember? For instance, master of the quick sight-gag, Steve is talking of neatness of tablemanners, with a very & important guest. They are sitting at a table covered with dishes, tablewear, and a bright checked tableclothe. After 5 minutes of witty dialogue, the guest gets up and leaves. Allen then is starting to introduce the next thing on the program and also he starts to get up from the table, walks away from the table, suddenly the dishes and tableware are swept onto the floor with a crash, and a longshot shows the table cloth was tucked into his belt, Allen using it as a napkin, it is hanging in plain slight. a good quick sight-gag, that came without a bit of warning, after everyone expecting the "polite" lesson was finished. Moviestar George Murphy was elected to office in politics lately, Ronald Reagan, Gary Merril and Eddie Albert thinking of running for office too, so Allen thought he could pick up something good in California. Everyone got panicky, CBS officials ran an old SECRET show on the West coast, thinking they'd be forced to give "equal-time" to Allen's opponent. After Steve learned he could not qualify this year, everything is back to normal again-almost. Steve wants to try again next term! --- There are reports that Brace Beener (the late -great voice of the Lone Ranger on radio) was the 4th on radio to play the masked-heroe of the west. (Note our feature story in #1.-Heroe-Hobby issue). No real facts though. His own "Silver" was offered to the local Michigan zoo, but was turned down. Upon hearing of this in the newspapers, hundreds of fans wrote to Mrs. Beerer in Oxford, Mich, and asked to "buy" the white-stallion. But, she will keep him on the Beener ranch-"forever" she said!... Now quickly: Tell ne the names of the Seven Dwarfs: That was the question asked by all radio quiz-masters in 1937 and 1938, after the Disney masterpiece hit the screens. The feature is released every 7-years to a new generation of ticket-buyers and seen again by millions of oldsters. Next year it was planned to go again, but Disney may place it as a special on his color-TV show, instead. I class it as another true-classic! Cornedy took it on the chin for the Danny Thomas Special the other nite. Everyone else looked out of place with such slap-stick material-except the 3-STOOGES. Moe Howard's other 2 brothers, (and former 2nd-bananas, ) Curley & Shemp, who both died years ago, probablystill have Heaven shaking from their laughter from watching their old pal's old corn!

(LETTER TO THE EDITORS) I have taken this complete page-usually devoted to nice things and bad things about us and our little publication-to print the many letters and messages received here, and this time. you will notice that the following letter from Charles Sexton of Dayton, Ohio (who also has an ad on the back ad-page) is pretty much devoted to RADIO and the golden era of that medium. I do not intend to do this every issue, but give each person a chance to a few lines in print in the future. However, Charles' letter was so interesting, I am sure all of you will get a big kick out of his comments "when Radio was King!"

Doar JOHN: I received HH#2 today and just finished reading every word: I particularly enjoyed the section on preniums offered by the kid serial. I had and can remember the 1946, 1947, and 1949 Code-O-Graphs from the Captain Midnite and Tom Mix shows. The Tom Mix Signal Arrowhead, especially. And I can also remember the most terrifying message I ever received one night over the radio. It read: MIDNICHT DEAD. It was Friday naturally, and I worried myself sick till Monday to find out If the good Captain was really done for.

I can also remember trying so hard to convince myself that all of these items were really as wonderful as they appeared to sound on radio. For instance, TOM MIX offered a magnetic ring once, and I can remember an episode where he was locked in a jail cell and was able to use the ring to drag the heavy iron keys off the dirty sheriff's desk and over to the cell so he could let himself out. All I could ever pick up with my ring were my mother's bobby pins and then only If I held the ring not more than two inches away. I also became a bit suspicious of CAPT.MIDNIGHT when I discovered that I could work the 1949 Code-O-Graphs wwith any sharp stick or instrument as easily as that the "master key". And If I could, then Ivan "Fish Face" Shark and his daughter, Fury certainly could too.

But my biggest dissapointment came, I think, in the late forties, when I bought a hard-bound book titled "Joyce of the Secret Squadron". It had to do with, naturally Joyce Ramsey of Capt. Midnight's famous Secret Squadron. (or did they call her Ryan?) It was an interesting book as I recall and it stirred my imagination as much as did the radio show. One thing, however, shook my faith severly... On the dust jacket of the book was an inset of the person who played Joyce on the radio show, and the startling photo was almost too much for me to comprehend. Now all of us who did receive that little booklet which came with the Gode-O-Graphs, knew that Joyce was a young, pretty young blond, the Miss America of the Junior set. Staring back at me from the dust jacket, however, was a rather old (probably at least 30) drab, dark haired brunette. My world had been fully shattered.

I also remember Capt. Midnight offering a Shake-Up-Mug which was yellow with a blue top and was used to make a milk-shake type concotion with Ovaltine. Many of the other premiums come to mind but that's enough rambling about that. Would like to see more of this and hope your readers and yourself can even include much more in the very near future.

Midnight came along with his radio show and since the give-away was such a good thing with ANNIE, since it was shaped like Little Orphan Annie at that time and offered on her radio show, a new rug was then manufactured and offered on the Midnight show. Premiums were certainly the best way to gauge the listening public in humbers. A certain number of orders for a premium, (was advertised a certain number of times) and those orders received were multiplied a certain number of times, to get the total of all listeners for a given show. A real response from all over the U.S.A. and a heck of a lot better than the silly rating systems now available. Not only did Capt. Midnight offer the shake-up rugs, but also the Code-O-Graphs and Club Books to good response. Ovaltine, along with General Mills, Ralston Purinta Company and Tootsie-Roll(SWEETS CANDY CO.) were pretty much regarded as the top advertising buyers of the Kid-shows. They stayed on those not for weeks, or months, but for years, And it was worth it. then; Bless'en;

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
