The Many Faces Of Grandpappy Spears

The visualization of radio characters has been a subject of much fascination; as evidence, witness the profusion of publicity photos and motion pictures featuring radio performers that appeared during the 1930's and 1940's. L&A and their associate characters, while often left up to the listeners' imaginations...part of the great appeal of radio...were depicted visually literally from their first weeks on the air until the show's demise, and then afterward. In this series of articles, created by Uncle Donnie Pitchford and Squire Rex Riffle, we will be exploring these various depictions of the L&A characters.

In this issue, we concentrate on that cranky old varmint, Grandpappy Spears.

The all-time prize for description of Mr. Spears goes to the fertile brain of Publicity Director Rex

Riffle, who submitted the following: "Grandpap wears old-fashioned black high-topped shoes, usually with cloth pants and a blue work shirt; when the top button of his shirt is open, you can see the top of his long johns underneath. He is very, very thin and wiry, standing not much taller than five feet. Most of the time he walks using a thick cane that has a "pistol-grip" top. He is slightly stooped over and usually wears a sort of Indiana Jones-style hat ... an older one that has seen better days. He has solid white hair, which he wears long, reminiscent of the 1800's, a very thick and full mustache drooping far over his lips, and a Van Dyke-like pointed beard ('the ole billy goat!')!"

Longtime L&A fan David Miller once said that he saw Grandpap as looking like the character of Fred Ziffel on TV's "Green Acres," while our teenaged correspondents in Harrison, Arkansas, James & Janet McMurrin, state: "We see Grandpap as thin and only a little taller than Abner. He is wiry with thinning white hair, and a small beard...almost a goatee."

As with most of the characters, commercial depictions of Grandpap began with the 1932 series of Oscar Plaster photos from Waters/Pine Ridge. Elderly resident Cling Wilhite was generally considered to be the

real-life Grandpappy Spears, so he also posed for pictures in character. He was again photographed in 1936~(#1), in the formal attire he wore to the ceremony that changed the town's name. Mr. Wilhite died in 1938 at the age of 82.

Also in 1936, Grandpap made his first appearance in ink-wash form in that year's Lum & Abner Family Almanac (#2). A cartoony, beardless version of Mr. Spears appeared in the Jot'Em Down Store Party Book

(1939) (#3).

The character of Grandpap did not appear on the silver screen until the fourth L&A movie, SO THIS IS WASHINGION (1943). In this film he was portrayed by actor Danny Duncan(#4), who was familiar to the radio listeners as the voice of town marshal Uncle Henry Lunsford. With some changes in makeup, Duncan again hobbled through the part in PARINERS IN TIME (1946).

As for modern-day versions of Milford Avery, both cartoonists Kurt Jensen and Gary Stivers have incorporated the old coot into their privately-published comic strips (#5 & #6, respectively). Our artistical Prez, Uncle Donnie Pitchford, says he has never been completely happy with his mental picture of Grandpap, but he hitched up his britches anyway and gave it a try in last December's Journal (#7). It is interesting to note that virtually all of the different ver-

sions of Grandpappy Spears bear a strong resemblance to each other, a fact not often found with the other characters. Perhaps everyone's mental picture of a vinegary old codger is about the same; the only really noticeable difference among all of Grandpap's depictions is the size of his beard!!

...let's see what's going on down in Southern Illinois. Well, as we look in on the home state of our vice - prez, Singin' Sam Brown, we find the television viewers of that area still buzzing about the recent evening of Lum and Abner programs offered by WSIU, Channel 8.

As we reported in our December, 1988 issue, Sam was hard at work promoting the 1986 AETN (Arkansas Educational Television Network) documentary, "Laughter Never Dies", a one-hour program tracing the history of Lum and Abner. WSIU, a PBS affiliate in Carbondale, Illinois (located on the campus of Southern Illinois University), expressed an interest in airing the documentary plus two Lum and Abner movies during their "Festival" fund-raising programming.



Irv Coppi of WSIU contacted Sam, and soon the wheels were in motion to secure the necessary broadcast tapes from AETN. Once this was accomplished, air time was scheduled. The final touch was the invitation extended to Singin' Sam and our esteemed members, Charles Thurman and the Abner-in-residence himself, Kurt Jensen (unfortunately, Ed "Lum" Frost was unable to attend, now living some distance from his partner Kurt). It seems these three "varmints" were asked to appear on WSIU during the "pledge breaks" aired between and during the L&A programs!

WSIU personality Jay Pearce called the evening of Friday, March 10, 1989 a "Lum and Abner Festival". Scheduled programming began with the AETN special at 7:00, followed by two Lum and Abner motion pictures, "Dreaming Out Loud" and "So This is Washington". Society fellers Brown, Jensen and Thurman took turns throughout the evening's pledge breaks appearing with Jay Pearce, lending their support to the PBS cause, introducing the volunteers who manned the telephones, and discussing both Lum and Abner and the NLAS.



Charles Thurman informed the audience of the goings-on of our annual conventions, Kurt shared his career as an Abner impersonator (illustrated with photos of Kurt and Ed Frost), and Sam offered the viewers the first on-air appearances of two pieces of original NLAS art (a color drawing by Bobb Lynnes and the 1982 watercolor by Uncle Donnie).



Our special guest for this year's event is MR. WENDELL NILES, one of the all-time great radio announcers. He appeared on the 30-minute L&A radio programs in 1948-50, usually delivering the commercials for Frigidaire refrigerators ("The first name you think of is the right one to buy!"), but his radio credits go far beyond Pine Ridge. For eight years, he announced for none other than the Bob Hope Show ("Use Pepsodent twice a day, see your dentist twice a year"), later moving with the show to television. He was also the original announcer for Gene Autry's "Melody Ranch" radio program, for "healthful, refreshing Doublemint Gum." And th-th-that's not all, folks! Just a partial list of the other radio programs using his talents would include the Burns & Allen Show, the Charlie McCarthy Show, 'My Friend Irma," the Al Pearce Show, the Joe Penner Show, 'Meet Corliss Archer," "Our Miss Brooks," and countless others.

Mr. Niles has almost as lengthy a list of TV shows to his credit, and has either narrated or appeared on-screen in approximately 30 motion pictures. In case you haven't already guessed, this is a man who is definitely worth coming to meet! (He also

has his own star on the Hollywood Walk Of Fame, an honor that even Lum & Abner themselves have never had!)


