TERMS: All prices are <u>NET</u>. Payment must accompany <u>all</u> orders. New York State residents must add 6% sales tax. THESE PROGRAMS ARE NOT CLEARED FOR RADIO BROADCAST AND NO BROADCAST RIGHTS ARE STATED OR IMPLIED. THESE PROGRAMS ARE INTENDED FOR THE PRIVATE USE OF OUR CUSTOMERS.

RATES: One hour: \$5.50 (5" reel, 600 ft.)

Two hours: \$9.75 (7" reel, 1200 ft.) SPEED: 3 3/4 ips

Three hours: \$14.00 (7" reel, 1800 ft.)

HIGHEST QUALITY SCOTCH AUDIO TAPE IS USED FOR ALL DUBS.

SOUND QUALITY: Unfortunately, there is no standard procedure for stating and obtaining the sound quality of these radio programs.

We use the following terms and descriptions:

EXCELLENT: Broadcast quality, but may contain an audio skip or very slight hiss or hum. Generally just as nice as you might have originally heard it on the radio.

VERY GOOD: Contains a minor defect (audio scratch, station drift.

/ERY GOOD: Contains a minor defect (audio scratch, station drift, slight distortion, hiss, hum), but not enough to impair enjoyment of the show.

GOOD: Contains enough hiss, hum, surface scratch or other defect to make pleasurable listening a chore.

FAIR/PCOR: Contains serious defects and is not recommended to any but a serious diehard of that particular show.

MAILING INFORMATION: All orders generally filled within 48 hours of receipt. Larger orders may take longer. Ordinarily, orders are shipped via the special 4th class rate for sound recordings. If you wish your order to be mailed via FIRST CLASS MAIL, please add \$1.00 PER TAPE. For AIR MAIL, please add \$1.50 PER TAPE. Canadians, please add \$1.00 PER TAPE.

ALSO: The term "complete" usually means just that - nothing missing. It may also be used for a small number of programs with portions of the opening/closing/commercials missing. If the story is intact and the amount missing is not excessive, the term "complete" is used. Note that sustaining, syndicated (sold to individual radio stations), and AFRS programs generally do not contain commercials.

FINALLY: The running times of these programs are understood to be approximate, and may vary several minutes.

Bogie plays the intrepid Sam Spade as he solves a series of murders revolving around a jeweled statuette of a falcon. CBS (30 min.)

ADOPTED DAUGHTER: August 4, 1939 broadcast in vg/exc. sound with J.C. Penney comm. "The story of a courageous young wife and her fight for home and happiness." Little Jenny and Roger are leaving for New York and the World's Fair. Jack and Gerry are at the train station to see them off. (15 min.)

ADVENTURES OF ARCHIE ANDREWS: Aug. 9, 1947 This program is now complete and in excellent sound w/Swift's Premium Franks comm. Mr. Andrews attempts to take a bath despite interruptions from Archie, the telephone and a broken water pipe. (30 min.)

ADVENTURES OF ARCHIE ANDREWS: December 13, 1947 broadcast in excellent sound with Swift's Premium Franks comm. Archie and Jughead go shopping for Christmas presents, but as usual, complications ensue! NEC (30 min.)

AGAINST THE STORM: June 2, 1940 broadcast in vg/exc. sound w/Ivory Flakes comm. which plug the 1940 Pontiac giveaway contest. Mrs. Allen and her daughter Siri discuss Philip and Christy's decision not to buy a house; later, Siri and Philip discuss matters over lunch, NBC (15 min.)

AL JCLSCN: Nov. 1, 1938 Lifebuoy Show in vg/exc. sound. Al sings "Help Me" and "Avalon" and talks with Parkyakarkus about politics. Guest Connee Boswell sings "Lullaby in Rhythm." Al talks with guest Gail Patrick about fashion, then the cast stars in "She Was a Southern Belle, But She Didn't Ring True." CBS radio from New York (30 min.)

ALDRICH FAMILY: Feb. 20, 1940 broadcast in exc. sound with Jello comm. Starring Ezra Stone as Henry, who decides to raise carrier pigeons in order to make money. He places a want ad for pigeon coops in the newspaper, but neglects to tell his father about it! Harry Von Zell sells the Jello. NBC (30 min.)

AMOS 'n' ANDY: April 3, 1939 show in vg/exc. sound with Campbell Soup comm. This is Andy's wedding day to Madame Queen. Bill Hay announces. CBS (15 min.) AMOS 'n' ANDY: Feb. 12, 1946 show in generally good sound with Rinso commercials. The Kingfish gets a job selling "health shoes" and he convinces Andy to buy a pair. (30 min.)

ARCH CBOLER'S PLAYS: "Big Ben" vg sound (runs a trifle slow) c. 1962 An
African chief plans to kill the infant son of the woman he feels is responsible
for his own son's death. He will strike when Big Ben (a clock) strikes
midnight. The clock ticks relentlessly . . . (25 min.)

ARCH OBOLER'S PLAYS: "Alley Cat" Excellent sound An updated version (1970)

of "Cat Wife" Syndicated First show of a new series. (30 min.)

ARMSTRONG OF THE SBI: "The Deadliest of the Species" VG/exc. sound with Wheatles comm. This show ran on ABC from Sept. 5, 1950 to June 28, 1951. Jack has grown up and works for the Scientific Bureau of Investigation. This episode deals with an investigation into illegal drug traffic. ABC (30 min.)

BABY SNOOKS: Nov. 4, 1943 Maxwell House Coffee Time show in vg/exc. sound. John Conte sings "What Do You Do In the Infantry?" and "No Love, No Nothing." Guest is Marjorie Henderson, a lady detective who has been following Frank Morgan for the past week. Last week, Daddy got into a fight with his neighbor, and this week, the neighbor is suing for the loss of two teeth. Guess who the star witness is! (30 min.)

BENNY GOODMAN: Oct. 13, 1937 show in vg/exc. sound from the Manhattan Room of the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York City. "The King of Swing" plays "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree," "Moonlight on the Highway," "Whispers in the Dark," and "Avalon." Martha Tilton sings "I've Got that Old Feeling" and "The Moon Got in My Eyes." CBS (30 min.)

BIG TOWN: "Death Rides the Highway" 1940 Excellent sound with Rinsc comm.

Starring Edward G. Robinson and Ona Munson. "Illustrated Press" editor Steve
Wilson takes his campaign against reckless driving to the airwayes. (30 min.)

BIG TOWN: "Every Eight Hours" 1940 Excellent sound Starring Edward G. Robinson
and Ona Munson. Sally Parker, an old friend of Steve's, comes to him with a
problem - her husband Donald has disappeared. Investigating, Steve finds him

dead - the victim of a hit-and-run driver. (25 mih.)

BLACK CASTLE: "Escape to Death" Dec. 16, 1943 broadcast in vg/exc. sound. A sneak thief is imprisoned by a mad scientist and is changed into a gorilla! All voices by Don Douglas. Mutual network. (15 min.)

BOB AND RAY: May 31, 1956 Show #912 in vg sound. Bob and Ray talk about their summer vacations, interview a vacation counsellor, present "The Trillionaire," their version of the famous television show, interview a man who guesses contents and a registered sleepwalker, and present "The Life and Loves of Linda Lovely." (30 min.)

BOB HOPE: Dec. 7, 1948 broadcast in excellent sound with Swan Soap comm. Guest is Bing Crosby. After a "Swan's Eye View of the News," Bob and Doris Day go on a Christmas shopping spree. Doris sings "My Darling, My Darling." In the sketch, Bing and Bob travel back to the 17th century. Bing sings "A Little Bird Told Me." NBC (30 min.)

BOB HOPE: vg/exc. sounding show of undetermined date. Bob talks about the flu, Santa Anita and traffic. Margaret Whiting sings "The Gypsy in My Soul." Guest Jack Webb and Bob do their version of "Dragnet." (25 min.)

BOLD VENTURE: Starring Humphrey Bogart and Lauren Bacall. Excellent sound. In Havana, Shannon and Sailor get involved with a shipment of arms for a revolution Summaries are sung in Calypso by King Moses. Complete with beautiful girls and murder by a fighting cock. ZIV syndication. (30 min.)

BOSTON BLACKIE: "Mrs. Boston Blackie" Starring Richard Kollmar. vg/exc. sound.
A woman claiming to be Mrs. Boston Blackie turns out to be a blackmailer - and ends up dead. With Mary as the prime suspect, Blackie investigates! (25 min.)
BREAKFAST CLUB: Oct. 2, 1947 "Guest Star" program in excellent sound with Don McNeill and the gang. Eddie Ballantine and the Crchestra play "Exactly Like You," Patsy Lee sings "Only a Paper Moon." Jack Owens sings "Put Your Little Head on My Shoulder." (15 min.)

BROADWAY IS MY BEAT: Starring Larry Thor as Detective Danny Clover. Exc. sound. Milburn Jeffries has a problem - a dead girl has been found in his apartment and his story doesn't check out with the bellboy, his alibi. AFRS (30 min.) BUCK ROGERS IN THE 25th CENTURY. Enjagles 4112 control

BUCK ROGERS IN THE 25th CENTURY: Episodes #1-12 from 1939 in excellent sound. These programs are all complete with Popsicle commercials. The first episode concerns Buck's origin and how he came to be in the 25th century. In subsequent episodes, Killer Kane and Ardala with Black Barney their prisoner steal Dr. Huer's new gyro-cosmic relativator and set up secret headquarters under the ruins of ancient Philadelphia. Buck and Wilme two the state of the secret headquarters under the

ruins of ancient Philadelphia. Buck and Wilma try to track them down. (3 hours) BUCK ROGERS: Final episode of the series in excellent sound with Post Cereals commercials. Date unknown. This program has one of the longest and most exciting fight scenes ever broadcast between Buck and Killer Kane. Buck finally subdues Kane and returns to Earth. Mutual network. (15 min.)

BULLDOG DRUMMOND: "Drummond vs. the Nazis" 1943 Excellent sound with Horton's a murder, but uncover a fantastic mystery instead: (30 min.)

BULLDOG DRUMMOND: Episode #11 in excellent sound (from original disc). Capt. Drummond is called to the race-track by a jockey who needs his help. Drummond arrives at the track - but the jockey has been murdered! (30 min.)



BULLDOG DRUMMUND: Episode #12 in excellent sound (from original disc). "Death Loops the Loop" Capt. Drummond and Denny visit a seashore resort and find the carnival owner dead on his roller-coaster. Their investigation leads from murder to smuggling. (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN; Oct. 9, 1943 broadcast in vg sound with Swan comm. Gracie goes to the beauty shop and finds guest Jack Benny sitting in the next booth. Jack says he'll do anything to keep this incident out of the paper - so Gracie proposes that George be the regular singer on Jack's program! CBS (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: Cct. 10, 1944 AFRS re-broadcast in vg/exc. sound. George tries to buy the only vacant lot in the neighborhood from neighbor Joe Bagley, but he doesn't want to sell. George tries to get in Bagley's favor by being nice to his niece. (30 min.)

BURNS AND ALLEN: Maxwell House Coffee Time show in vg sound. George buys roses for Gracie but neighbor Joe Bagley gets all the credit. This is an unusual show in which Gracie has a severe case of laryngitis (for real), but suffers through the entire program anyway. (25 min.)

CAMPANA SERENADE: Sept. 4, 1943 broadcast from Hollywood in excellent sound with Solitaire Make-Up commercials. Starring Dick Powell, Martha Tilton and Lud Gluskin's Orchestra. Musical selections include "In My Arms," "You'll Never Know," "And the Angels Sing," "Blue Skies," "It's Always You," and others. Henry Charles announces. CBS (30 min.)

CAPTAIN MIDNIGHT: "The Phantom Rustlers" Excellent sound with Ovaltine comm. No close. Capt. Midnight has deliberately crashed his plane so that the gang of rustlers will believe he is dead and become overconfident. In a secret hideout, "The Chief" talks to Art about Capt. Midnight's demise. Then, Kate Pringle arrives at the hideout and she and "The Chief" make plans for future rustling activities. Meanwhile, Capt. Midnight and Ichy and the Secret Squadron prepare a trap! Mutual network. (15 min.)

CAPTAIN MIDNIGHT: "The Jewels of the Queen of Sheba" March 28, 1948 Excellent sound with Cvaltine comm. Yesterday, by means of his pocket locater, Capt. Midnight ordered Ichy, Joyce and Andy to continue toward Lake Tohiba in spite of the mysterious plane that was following them. Today, pilot Andy Maxin tries evasive tactics, but to no avail. After Andy is shot in the leg, Capt. Midnight takes up the battle! Later, Capt. Midnight tells his gang of the legend of the Queen of Sheba's ring. Complete with a secret code message! (15 min.)

CASEY, CRIME PHOTOGRAPHER: "Holiday" Nov. 25, 1948 Excellent sound Sponsored by Toni Home Permanents with Bill Cullen doing the selling. A former safe-cracker who's gone straight asks Casey for help - he's being forced to pull a safe job for a mobster. CBS. (30 min.)

CASEY, CRIME PHOTOGRAPHER: "Wanted, A Gun" Jan. 19, 1950 AFRS #32 in excellent
sound. A man buys a gun to protect himself from a jealous husband who is being
released from prison. Later, the husband turns up dead and the gun turns out
to be the weapon. (30 min.)

CBS NEWS: ON A NOTE OF TRIUMPH May 8, 1945 Excellent sound CBS broadcast on the day of triumph ending World War II in Europe. A forceful, frank documentary that doesn't mince any words. Written, produced and directed by Norman Corwin and narrated by Martin Gabel. Very well done and highly recommended. (60 min.)

A study of the techniques, the possibilities and the improbabilities of tape recording. Two tape recorders in a CBS workroom discuss how programs are edited - Howard Ampex explains the tricks of the trade to Jerrold Ampex, a mere newcomer. (25 min.) CHANDU, THE MAGICIAN: Chapters 1-12 (Monday, June 28, 1948 - Tuesday, July 13,

CHARLIE CHAN: "The Escaped Musician" Excellent sound (from disc) Charlie helps Ronnie Post, a young musician involved in a burglary and murder, to escape from the police. (30 min.)

CHARLIE CHAN: Episode #2 in excellent sound. Chan reports to Police Commissioner Williams on his findings in the murder of Deacon Jessup; Lee Chan is ordered

to follow Dennis Rand. Syndicated. Complete. (15 min.)

CHARLIE McCARTHY: Oct. 1, 1943 AFRS show in vg sound. Ray Noble and Jim Ameche welcome Edgar and Charlie to New York. Mortimer tells Edgar about his experience in the subway. William Gaxton and Victor Moore star in a comedy skit about horses. Roy Rogers guests as Charlie has stolen his horse! Roy sings "Water." Broadcast from New York. (30 min.)

CHARLIE McCARTHY: Sept. 9, 1945 AFRS #111 in excellent sound. Bergen has lost his memory, so Charlie, Mortimer and Ray Noble take him to a psychiatrist (played by guest Keenan Wynn). June Kilgore sings "There's No You." (30 min.)

CHARLIE McCARTHY: Sept. 23, 1945 AFRS #113 in excellent sound. Edgar talks with Charlie about saving money and buys a magazine from Mortimer. Guests Anne Baxter and Keenan Wynn star in the skit that has Bergen trying to buy a train ticket to New York. Anita Gordon sings "In the Middle of May." (30 min.)

CHARLIE McCARTHY: Oct. 14, 1945 AFRS #116 in excellent sound. Edgar and Charlie talk about their recent fight and Edgar talks with Mortimer about eyeglasses. Anita Gordon sings "June is Bustin' Out All Over." Guest Hildegarde and Charlie go shopping for a gift for Bergen. Hildegarde sings "I'll Be Yours." (30 min.)

CHARLIE McCARTHY: Nov. 4, 1945 AFRS #119 in excellent sound. Charlie has gone on a hunger strike because Bergen has cut his allowance. Mortimer talks about his poor memory and recites a poem. Anita Gordon sings "But I Did." Guest Elsa Maxwell gives Charlie a going-away party and she presents him with a painting.

Ray Noble's Orchestra plays "Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe." (30 min.) CHARLIE McCARTHY: Nov. 11, 1945 AFRS #120 in excellent sound. Show originates from Oklahoma and guest is Gov. Robert S. Kerr. Charlie and Edgar talk about oil; Mortimer talks about shaving. Charlie and Anita Gordon visit the Capitol Building and Charlie pretends he's Governor. Ray Noble's Orchestra plays

"Oklahoma." Anita sings "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning." (30 min.) CHARLIE McCARTHY: Nov. 18, 1945 AFRS #121 in excellent sound. Charlie is running a rental library and he has been circulating Edgar's high school diary. Edgar tells Mortimer about hypnotism. Anita Gordon sings "I'll Buy that Dream." In honor of Thanksgiving, the cast presents "The Courtship of Miles Standish," with Charlie as John Alden, Edgar as Miles Standish and guest Margaret O'Brien as Priscilla. (30 min.)

COLUMBIA WORKSHOP: "Air Raid" 1938 vg/exc. sound Broadcast at 2 a.m. (!)

No open/close. The story of an air raid. (30 min.)

COMMAND PERFORMANCE: 1944 AFRS #95. Excellent sound. Starring Dinah Shore ("Shoo Shoo, Baby"), Lulubelle and Scotty ("Down By the Railroad Tracks"), Fats Waller. Gloria Jean, the "new" Jerry Colonna, and Abbott and Costello (doing their famous "Who's on First?" routine). (30 min.)

CORLISS ARCHER: "Jealousy" Excellent sound from 1954 Starring Janet Waldo as Corliss and Sam Edwards as Dexter. Dexter jumps to the wrong conclusion when he meets Corliss and another boy in the soda shop. (25 min.)

DATE WITH JUDY: Nov. 3, 1949 broadcast in vg/exc. sound. Starring Louise Erickson as Judy, John Brown as Mr. Foster and Richard Crenna as Cogie Pringle. Judy

helps Oogie and his band get a job on the radio. ABC network. (30 min.) DIARY OF FATE: "The Entry of Tyler White" Program #17 in excellent sound. Fate explains how a stray dog and a cigarette lighter contributed to the demise of confidence man Tyler White. A Finley transcription. (30 min.)



DICK THACY: "The Case of the Low Hi-Jack" 1948 vg sound. Dick and Pat are pinned down behind their car under Sy Heavy's barrage of bullets. ABC (15 min.) DIMENSION X: "Destination Moon" 1950 vg sound (speed is wavey). Taken from George Pal's screenplay. An American spaceship takes off to reach the moon. NBC (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "To the Future" May 27, 1950 good/vg sound. A couple touring in Mexico is approached by a strange man who is convinced that they are fugitives --

from the year 2155! (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "The Martian Chronicles" Aug. 18, 1950 Exc. sound. The story of the launching of the various expeditions to Mars, the fate of the first three, the colonizing of Mars after the fourth, the wonderful houses on Earth that do everything for their occupants, the impending war on Earth that calls most of the Martian colonists home, a family that escapes and remains on Mars, and the house on Earth which sits atop atom-blasted rubble with no one to serve. (30 min.

DIMENSION X: "Dr. Grimshaw's Sanatorium" Sept. 22, 1950 vg/exc. sound without close. A fantastic sci-fi thriller! Private detective John Doherty is involved in an auto accident with a hearse and finds that it leads to a fantastic tale of an ex-Nazi scientist who has discovered a method of turning fully-grown

adults into midgets five inches tall! (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "And the Moon Be Still As Bright" Sept. 29, 1950 Exc. sound. Three expeditions to Mars have landed and disappeared within 24 hours. The fourth expedition lands and discovers that the Martians have been wiped out by an epidemic of chicken pox! (30 min.)

DIMENSION X: "Dwellers in Silence" July 19, 1951 good/vg sound. The men who colonized Mars return to Earth twenty years after the atomic war to find an old scientist living with his surprisingly youthful family! (30 min.)

DUCTUR MANNING, PROFESSIONAL WITNESS: "The Northeast Room" vg/exc. sound. Ruth Emery asks Dr. Manning for help. Her sister Doris is being executed tomorrow for murder. Ruth wants Manning to prove that Doris was insane when she committed the crime. Dr. Manning only has six hours: Syndicated. (30 min.)

DUCTUR PAUL: July 27, 1954 vg/exc. sound. Sunday evening -- Paul and his mother discuss Mr. Cooper's recent finds regarding Chris' accident; Elizabeth and

Raymond talk about Carlotta. NBC network. (15 min.)

DCUBLE CR NOTHING: May 2, 1951 Excellent sound with Campbell's Soup comm. Host is Walter O'Keefe. Tonight, it's two contestants from Vancouver, B.C. vs. the World! (contestants from other cities). The Grand Slam Question is "How much does each ashtray in the Stork Club cost?" NBC network. (30 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: Excellent sound. As usual, Archie's in love again - this time with singer Peggy Lee. She's coming to the tavern, so Archie's bought a new suit (for \$11). Peggy sings "What More Can A Woman Do?" and "You Was Right,

Baby." AFRS (30 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: "Pierre, the Singing Dog" Excellent sound. No opening. Archie has big plans for Pierre, the singing poodle. He wants to put the dog on the radio, and if Duffy won't be the sponsor, he'lll get Cavendish the Undertaker. No commercials. (25 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: Jan. 1944 show in vg/exc. sound. AFRS #24. Archie has written his life story, and he wants guest star Ida Lupino to star in the movie version.

Ed Gardner as Archie and Shirley Booth as Miss Duffy. (30 min.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: Nov. 9, 1945 vg/exc. sound. Eddie, the tavern's only waiter, quits. As a replacement Archie hires Maxie Rosenbloom, but Maxie turns out to be a little rough on the customers (he used one to mop the floor with). (30 mim.)

DUFFY'S TAVERN: June 5, 1950 Excellent sound with Blatz Beer comm. With Fathers' Day just around the corner, Archie feels left out. So, he decides to get married -- to a girl he hasn't even met! (30 min.)

EDDIE CANTOR: Nov. 25, 1942 "It's Time to Smile" show sponsored by Ipana and Sal Hepatica. Excellent sound with Campana commercials. Story of an army post on the American frontier and the lieutenant's girlfriend who stows away on an Indian mission.


