## WRITE-A-FIGHTER CORPS

EVERY day radio reveals some new and potent factor for the common good. One of the most recent that held our attention is the Jack Armstrong program that originated the Write-a-Fighter Corps idea, and which also serves as a "bulletin board" for WAFC news flashes.

Organized just a few months ago, the WAFC has gone far beyond its original intention—the solemn pledge of each member to write one letter a month to a friend or relative in America's armed forces. Today, its members are not only writing their letters faithfully but are collecting tons of scrap metal, hundreds of pounds of waste fats, silk stockings, and waste paper, as well as raising thousands of dollars in war securities. In addition, they are collecting knives, radios, phonographs and records—even novelty jewelry for our fighters to use as a trading exchange in foreign lands.

What appeals to us especially in this whole idea is the fact that the WAFC serves as a powerful antidote for keeping boys and girls from hanging around dimmed-out street corners while their parents are working overtime in defense plants. Jittery from a siege of juvenile delinquency, the nation can well take heart at this surging, ever-growing border-to-border drive of Jack Armstrong's radio-born idea that keeps America's youth busy. For youngsters with time on their hands—and little or no parental guidance—are those whose names crowd juvenile court dockets.

WAFC boys and girls are turning purposefully toward the light instead of darkness because, once again, radio has found an answer to their vital need for constructive work.





**K**EY to Greer Garson's portrayal of Marie Curie, the great woman scientist, were notes written in the margins of Madame Curie's family cook-book.

The first was a recipe for gooseberry jelly. Second told about her discovery of polonium, and third announced the appearance of daughter Irene's first tooth. "In these three items," Miss Garson says, "I had a perfect picture of the devoted housewife, the brilliant scientist making a routine report of her great discovery, and the proud young mother." Combined, they spell Madame Curie as Greer will play her on the screen.







**G**ARY COOPER once narrowly escaped death in an automobile accident. His mother and father sent him to the back country in Montana to recuperate, and that's where he learned to become a cowboy. Some years later, as a newly rich movie star in Hollywood, he purchased a bright-yellow, custom-built, low-slung Duesenberg for \$18,000, and he's been fond of classy cars ever since. He likes the horse as a means of locomotion and autos for pleasure driving.

It should be the other way around, but in Gary Cooper's life many things are reversed. He's a crack marksman, but doesn't like to shoot for pleasure either. He stands for hours at a time shooting at a target, but doesn't get a great kick out of killing. Things western are not romantic to him—they are just necessities by which people live. For instance, he thinks wearing chaps is an affectation unless you happen to be riding through sagebrush country where your legs are liable to get scraped unless you have them on.

### Dana Andrews Hit Movie Stardom Road Via the Gas-Station Route

DANA ANDREWS' goal in life was opera, but like many another talented young man he lacked the money to reach it. As a means to an end he was wiping windshields and filling tanks at a gasoline station in Van Nuys, Calif., when he was spotted by a friendly customer named Stan Toomey, who with complete nonchalance began to take over Dana's career. At first young Andrews was stubborn about sticking to his ambition to become an opera singer. For that was why he had left his job as an accountant in Austin, Texas, and come to California. But after several months of disappointing try-outs, he gave up, and Toomey, who was sure that Dana had what it takes to become an actor, financed a course in dramatics at the Pasadena Playhouse. He was playing bits at the playhouse when Sam Goldwyn signed him to a contract. But instead of putting Andrews in pictures at once, Goldwyn left him in training, let him play leads at the playhouse for almost a year before he called him to the studio for a small role in "The Westerner." After that came the part of Joe Lilac in "Ball of Fire." Then, in 1940, 20th Century-Fox bought half of Dana's contract with Goldwyn. Those who saw "Crash Dive," starring Tyrone Power, will remember Andrews in the role of "the other man," who almost stole the picture from the experienced Mr. Power. While all this was happening in Dana's career, Toomey was backing him, and altogether the sum amounted to around \$8,000 in the young Texan's behalf. Now the two are partners and Toomey draws a percentage of Andrews' salary. When Dana finished "The North Star" he began work in "Up in Arms." Happily married, and the father of two children, Dana at present is a threat to every leading man left in Hollywood.

LIKE her famous brother Guy, Rose Marie Lombardo was born in London, Ontario, Canada. Guy gave baby sister her name by playing *Rose Marie* at the opening of his program from the United States while his parents listened in Canada on the night she was born. Now at seventeen Rose Marie is songstress on his "Three-Ring Time," broadcast over CBS on Monday evening at 10:30 EWT. Youngest of the Lombardo clan, Rose Marie makes a face every time Guy tells her right age. Once he caught her telling someone she was twenty-one and made her go back and report the truth. She was only eight when she won her first singing honors in the annual musical festival at the university in London, Ontario. Brother Guy was sure that Rosie had won by trading on his name until Mother Lombardo proved that all contestants were identified by number only. After that, sister convinced famous brother further by winning prizes at the same festival three years in a row. Then, seven years ago, Guy moved the entire family to Greenwich, Connecticut, and Rose Marie divided her schooling between the Sacred Heart Academy and Greenwich High. But although Rose Marie had proven to Guy that she really had a voice, she had to convince him that he needed a girl vocalist. His Royal Canadians had been successful for years without one, and he could see no reason for the addition. Finally, on her sixteenth birthday, in November, 1941, Guy allowed Rose Marie to sing one song on his radio show. Mail from listeners to that single song won the day, and he took her on a theater tour. When the Lombardo orchestra opened at the Starlight Roof of the Waldorf-Astoria, Rose Marie was a regular member of the troupe. Take Over War Jobs for the Duration

AMERICA'S manpower problem today is in great measure a womanpower problem. As able-bodied men are steadily inducted into military service, the jobs they leave must be filled by women and minority groups—but mostly by women. It is impossible to continue offensive warfare without making use of more of the nation's unused womanpower. By the end of 1943, it is estimated, 17,400,000 women must be at work in all essential industries. And any job a woman takes which releases a man for military duty or heavy industrial service is a war job.

Typical of thousands of American women who have already answered the call to fill men's jobs are Lois January of radio and Wynne Gibson, prominent feature player in Hollywood, pictured on these pages at their war jobs. For the duration, both girls have tossed glamour into the discard, rolled up their sleeves and pitched into jobs that will help fight the war and win the peace.

Every morning, except Sunday, Lois leaves her New York apartment at 4:30 and is on her way to CBS' WABC studio. An hour later an engineer throws a switch, and her voice, sending cheer and song to countless servicemen, goes on the air. For a full hour she gabs with servicemen, plays records of the best popular music. Because soldiers and sailors asked her to do it, she often adjusts a headset and sings along with the recorded music. She has sung with every important orchestra in America, but the men in the orchestras didn't know it. For her songs are heard only by troops, men at naval bases, Coast Guard stations and on lonely watches. If a soldier wants a tune that reminds him of his girl in California, or another requests Lois for a song that his mother in Maine always liked, she sings them.

Her daily mail speaks eloquently of the joy she is bringing to thousands of servicemen through her radio program. Letters by the hundreds come, too, from grateful mothers throughout America, who recognize the good work (Continued on Page 60)

# Case of the Speeded-Up Record

## David Harding Again Matches Wits With Scheming Nazi Agents

**B**EHIND the guarded, massive doors of one of the big Government buildings in Washington, D. C., a group of twenty high officials sat around a conference table. It is best, perhaps, not to mention their names or positions, but it will reveal nothing to the enemy to say that these men were high in the war councils of a nation at war. Each man, in his own way, listened carefully to the sober words of the gray-haired Secretary.

"Gentlemen," the Secretary said, "we are at war, and one of the grave dangers facing us is the existence of enemy professional spies and saboteurs.

"In this connection, the work of one man has been especially outstanding. I propose to bestow upon him a special 'cover-all' commission. He will not work exclusively with any one of your departments but will be a composite picture of all of them, operating alone—cooperating with you whenever it is necessary. I refer to a man you

all know very well—David Harding."

The Secretary nodded to a big, straight-shouldered man at the far end of the polished conference table. The man arose and there was an unmistakable military air in his bearing. He ruffled the papers he held in his hand and read from them in a crisp voice. It was a report on Harding.

"David Harding, age thirty-nine, height six foot one. He has been in the undercover service of this Government for eighteen years. His loyalty to his country is monumental. For many years he has been assigned to investigate the most delicate and involved international problems. The results he has obtained have been brilliant . . ."

Moments later, Harding, a tall man with the build of a football player and the intent, intelligent face of a scientist, was shown into the big conference room. His appearance, his manner and his voice suggested power, (Continued on Page 57)

From Chicago came ten identical latchkeys. The donor, with an understandable passion for anonymity, enclosed a card signed simply, "From a glamour girl."

Lewis hoped to get a lot of keys but he was totally unprepared for this Niagara of metal. So was the Washington post office. For days fifty to sixty sackfuls came in every twenty-four hours. At the last weighing it totaled 92,000 pounds (forty-six tons). And the pile assayed high in nickel and copper, badly needed. This metal is now moving into a brand-new Government refinery (location a military secret) where the nickel and copper will be recovered.

The tremendous success of the key campaign reflects the intense devotion of Lewis partisans. There are other commentators with bigger followings, but none with more loyal listeners. His fans, estimated at about three million, glue their ears five nights a week (7 p.m. EWT) to 155 stations of the Mutual network.

The words in the du Pont citation best describing the Lewis attributes are "aggressive" and "independent." In 1939 when he was just getting a good start in radio, the dynamic Lewis charged into the capitol demanding representation for radio in its press galleries. He got action, too. Both houses approved changes in rules that had endured for eighty years. Today radio reporters have the run of the capitol, and recognition in the White House and all other Government departments comparable to that accorded to newspapermen, thanks to Lewis.

Lewis is at his best when slashing at red tape, exposing special privilege or attacking unfairness. While on a lecture tour in the corn belt last winter he exposed a widespread disposition of ration authorities to hamstring farmers' operations by gasoline restrictions. He complained to the Office of Defense Transportation, which promptly took action to the effect that rubber and gasoline were more liberally allocated to carry out vital farm food production activities.

The day after the suspension of gasoline sales in seventeen eastern states he broadcast eye-witness descriptions of Government cars being used for Christmas shopping, party-going and other private affairs in Washington. He mentioned time, place and license numbers. Use of official cars for other than Government business at any time is forbidden by law.

Lewis had long been a gadfly to Washington bureaucracy and time and again had exposed bungling and viciousness in high places. Years before he got into radio as a newshound he scented irregularities in the Government's air-mail contracts with private companies. After touring the United States he amassed a pile of information and turned over 490 pages of evidence in 1934 to the Black investigating committee. In 1936 he uncovered espionage activities involving a retired Navy officer. The latter was convicted.

Lewis is that rarity—an American born in Washington who made good there. He belongs to the fifth generation of Washingtonians on his mother's side; the third on his father's. He traces his ancestry back to Mordecai Lewis, the Revolutionary War financier. He is directly descended from the sister of General George Washington, Betty Washington Lewis, wife of Fielding Lewis of Kenmore, Fredericksburg, Va. He was born April 30, 1903, the son of Fulton and Elizabeth (Saville) Lewis. He married Alice Huston, daughter of Claudius Hart Huston, then chairman of the Republican National Committee, on June 29, 1930. The Lewises have two children, Alice Elizabeth, age ten, and Fulton III, six.

Except for a period at the University of Virginia, Lewis has lived in Washington all his life. He began his reportorial experience on the *Washington Herald* in 1924. He joined *Universal News* service in 1929 and for nine years headed its capital bureau, for three years writing a column, *The Washington Sideshow*, which was widely syndicated. He resigned in 1937 to gamble on radio—starting out at \$25 a week. Today he gets one hundred times that.

He has been consorting with politicians all his life and he is popular with them. In a poll of the members of Congress (Continued on Page 61)

## 5,000,000 KEYS TO VICTORY

FULTON LEWIS, JR., is probably the only man in America who has jingled five million keys in one pocket and one thousand dollars in the other.

He got the \$1,000 from the Alfred I. du Pont Awards Committee in March together with a citation proclaiming him the radio reporter of the year. In passing over such celebrated commentators as Raymond Gram Swing, H. V. Kaltenborn and Lowell Thomas in favor of a comparative youngster for its first award (it is to be made annually), the committee mentioned its "recognition and appreciation of initiative in the aggressive, independent and meritorious gathering, interpretation and presentation of news through the medium of radio."

This is the same medium that brought him the keys—quite possibly five million keys to victory. Lewis made ten brief appeals on his broadcasts over the Mutual network to listeners. He asked them to send in their spare keys—the metal they contained, he said, was critically needed in the war effort.

The response was overwhelming. More than fifty thousand individuals and organizations engulfed him in an avalanche of metal. Civic and fraternal organizations, schools, city and county governments from every state and many provinces of Canada united to give their support to the campaign.

The keys came from everywhere. They turned up in the most unexpected places. The San Diego

zoo sent a big batch. Its monkeys are so smart, an official wrote, that they quickly learn to pick the locks on their cages. Hence the locks—and the keys—have to be changed often.

A self-confessed burglar from Ogden, Utah, accompanied his ring of keys with a bag of his professional tools.

"I have been reformed by your broadcasts," the second-story man wrote. "So here's my burglar kit, too. Seriously, the work is getting more and more risky. And besides, it looks as though the Army may get me soon."

Many fans turned in keys long cherished for their associations. A southern lady sent the key with which her parents as bride and groom unlocked the door to their Georgia plantation mansion and with which they again locked it fifty years later after their friends departed from their golden-wedding celebration.



## "The Constant Nymph"

WHEN a brilliant man, who has known the tender love and devotion of one woman, becomes infatuated with another who's determined to make of him a social lion, there's bound to be trouble. In "The Constant Nymph" Lewis Dodd (Charles Boyer), an idealistic composer, goes to the Swiss Alps to visit Albert Sanger (Montagu Love) and his four daughters. Among the peaceful surroundings of the Sanger home, Lewis composes a piece that is truly beautiful. Tessa Sanger (Joan Fontaine), who always has loved Lewis, is happy over his success until the whole household is disrupted by her father's death, and Charles Creighton (Charles Coburn) and his daughter Florence (Alexis Smith) arrive from England to look after the children. Lewis becomes infatuated with Florence's cold, strange beauty and, to the despair of Tessa, he marries her. Determined to push her brilliant husband socially, Florence succeeds only in destroying his love for her. At last Lewis realizes that Tessa is his real love. With her to inspire him, he composes a symphonic poem whose rare beauty expresses their great love for each other.

WHAT MOVIE-GOERS CAN EXPECT: Splendid acting by a superb cast in a beautiful love-story, woven from dreams and a depth of understanding that surpasses ordinarily human emotions.

## "The Fallen Sparrow"

HERE is a tough-talking, realistic melodrama of love and espionage laid in New York City, with some vivid references to Kit McKittrick's (John Garfield) past adventures as a veteran in the Abe Lincoln Brigade of Republican fighters in Spain's civil war, and how he fared at the hands of Nazi agents when he was finally imprisoned. Upon his return to America, Kit, an American of wealth, recovers his health on an Arizona ranch. Well again, he returns to New York to find out who murdered his friend, Louie Lepetino, a detective. In his search he has constantly to evade and outwit enemy agents operating in America. Continually on guard, Kit is even suspicious of his lovely girl companions—Maureen O'Hara, Pat Morison and Martha O'Driscoll—whom he suspects of being enemy agents. When the last murder clew falls into his hands, Kit turns one of his fair ladies over to the FBI. We won't tell you which one, but let you guess as the story unfolds. Those familiar with the Hughes novel will find that none of the tense interest of the book is lost in the screened version of this powerfully plotted tale.

WHAT MOVIE-GOERS CAN EXPECT: An ace mystery thriller, guaranteed to be wholly lacking in dull moments. Thrill stacks on thrill, with John Garfield at his best as the kingpin.

ONCE again Pat O'Brien perpetuates the name of another great figure in the history of American sports—Frank Cavanaugh, the football coach who trained the famous teams that came out of Holy Cross, Dartmouth and Boston College. In 1917, at the age of forty-one, Cavanaugh enlisted in World War I as a private, and using the same principles of strict discipline and fair play that had marked him on the gridiron, he worked up to the rank of major. After the war, Cavanaugh again pursued his love of football, coaching at Boston College and Fordham University. In August of 1933, just before he died, this man, who had for so many years exemplified clean sportsmanship, uttered his last words to his own sons: "Fight for what you believe in, and believe in three things—love of God, love of country and love of family." Today, Cavanaugh's six sons are in the armed forces of America, and his only daughter, Sara, is a member of the women Marines. Never before has a motion picture showing a man's devotion to his country been more significant.

ONE of the dizziest—and funniest—comedies of the fall season, "Let's Face It," which was a huge success on the Broadway stage, loses nothing and gains much in its adaptation to the screen. Both are naturals for the roles of the two carefree youngsters, very much in love and forever hampered by the fact that they never can scrape up enough money to get married. Hope, in soldier role, is stationed near Betty's farm, where she devotes all her energy—and what energy!—to reducing obese dowagers who come from the city to regain their youthful figures. HERE'S a picture that wields the lever of fantasy with irresistible charm. It's alive with a tolerance that humans are sometimes—but not often enough—gifted with. Rich in emotions with which we are all familiar, laughter and pathos wage an even battle as the story unfolds. Don Ameche as Henry Van Cleve, a rich man's son, plays the role of a self-convicted sinner who doesn't wait to be sent to the lower regions but as an aged Casanova makes application of his own volition immediately after his death. In the antechamber of hell he offers his credentials to the devil (Laird Cregar), tells the story of a half-sinful, half-virtuous, and wholly beguiling Henry Van Cleve. # SHORT WAVES

## BBC's Bow Bells Ring Again; OWI to Build Two New Transmitters

ACCORDING to "London Calling," the ringing of Bow Bells from Dick Whittington's church—a little more than a stone's throw from St. Paul's Cathedral—was the interval signal for all BBC services in the days before the war. When invasion was threatened and the ringing of church bells was prohibited, Bow Bells went off the air to be replaced by the tick-tock, later augmented by a brass quartet playing the three notes, B, B, C, at frequent intervals. The order prohibiting bells being rung has been lifted—and Bow Bells are again being heard in the General Overseas Service of the BBC. St. Mary le Bow Church was seriously damaged in the blitz on London in December, 1940, and the bells, which had fallen, were found lying in a heap of rubble at the entrance of the church. The present church was completed in 1680.

## Recording Studios for Broadcasts

Although not itself a short-wave station, WOR in New York City is intimately connected with the production of short-wave programs originating in this country, since thousands of broadcasts short-waved from this country and from short-wave stations overseas have been recorded in WOR's elaborate recording studios. The WOR recording studios could well be called the "Crossroads of the United Nations" these days what with so many information bureaus of our various allies making recordings there. Recently records have been made for bureaus representing the Greeks, Norwegians, Poles, Belgians, Australians, Czechs and Chinese. The most recent is a record called the "Belgian Congo at War," a dramatized account of the Belgian Congo's war effort, which will be offered free to every standard and short-wave station in the country.

## OWI's Radio Expansion Plans

Construction of two fifty-kilowatt short-wave transmitters, which will be the first to go into operation under the Office of War Information's plan to expand American international broadcasting facilities, has been begun in New Jersey on the grounds formerly occupied by the transmitter of Columbia Broadcasting System's key station WABC, according to E. K. Cohan, CBS director of engineering.

Realizing the urgency of putting its expansion plan into effect at the earliest possible moment, the OWI selected the CBS site because of its ideal facilities, which include a specially constructed transmitter building ready to receive the new equipment.

## New Australian Station

A new Australian high-powered short-wave station will be in operation by Christmas. This will be the most powerful transmitter in the Commonwealth, and will provide radio service to all parts of the world. The Australian Broadcasting Commission is already featuring sixteen short-wave programs daily, and broadcasts news in English, Dutch, French, Chinese, Japanese, Malay, Thai.

Lucy Monroe Finds Patriotic Rallies Are Exhausting but Very Satisfying

**L**UCY MONROE has no regular radio program of her own, yet almost anywhere you turn to on the dial you are likely to tune her in. And she might be singing the *Star-Spangled Banner*, or, perhaps, she might be leading some huge soldier or defense-worker audience in a community sing.

Miss Monroe is a kind of ambassador of patriotic hymnology. She tours the country, visiting the camps, the industrial plants, groups of Americans anywhere who are devoting their working hours—and more—to the war effort. She brings them a message of unity. She is a spirit of courage and hope. She sings, and she makes her listeners sing, in this way doing her stint for the upkeep of the nation's morale.

The mere statistics of her travels, those of the people who have listened to her sing are ample proof of the value of her work. Some time ago she was appointed the director of patriotic music for the RCA-Victor Corporation. For a space she worked also under the auspices of the Treasury Department. That was pre-Pearl Harbor. Now she is still carrying on under the RCA-Victor aegis. But her labors are all dedicated to the sustaining of war morale.

For instance—since figures are impressive—at the Glenn Martin plant in Baltimore, she sang before 165,000 workers. At Soldiers' Field, Chicago, 100,000 persons were present on "I Am an American Day."

About such staggering throngs of people Miss Monroe has much to say.

In the first place, she finds it thrilling to sing for them. She feels the tug and heave of humanity en masse, she responds to it as only a sensitive artist and musician can respond—giving thrill for thrill, singing out her heart, expressing the words of the pieces she offers in the most forceful, articulate and dramatic manner.

Her biggest excitement comes when she hears the roar of thousands of voices echoing her own efforts.

"There is no trouble in getting such groups to sing," she told the writer the other day. "In fact, it's a hard job to keep them from doing it. I feel like some informal cheer-leader egging mankind on to better and better achievement. That is the way I react to it all now."

Miss Monroe has appeared at many notable functions, including several at the White House. She has sung for distinguished visitors to this country; in short, she has just about run the gamut of audiences in the brief period of a few months.

She has seen many things in her unusual calling. In the South, as an illustration, she tells of great gatherings of whites and Negroes lustily giving vent to their vocal urges in perfect racial—as well as musical—harmony. She has seen the worn faces of laborers in the plants light up at the first tinklings of musical sound. She has seen joy unbounded expressed in the dynamic response of soldiers, sailors, marines, Waves, Wacs, Spars and

all those in the service to the singing of songs they know and love.

In a short time Miss Monroe will go to Hollywood to make a series of shorts for Columbia Pictures. Of course, each one will represent some aspect of the work she is doing now. And she figures that the people she will have sung for, counting the in-person appearances, the numerous radio appearances and finally, the movies, will reach numbers previously unheard of.

Miss Monroe has done much work on the concert stage and in opera. She is well known in both fields. But, as they say, she heard a call. She answered it, and now she is doing just what she wants to do.

"If you ask me," she said, "there is nothing in the world like this sort of thing I'm doing. I never suspected the comfort and the satisfaction that were in it. It's a full-time job. At the end of a tour I am exhausted, perhaps, but not downed. I wait for the next assignment just as eagerly as if I were awaiting my turn to sing Tosca, or Mimi, or Violetta. Anyway, I'm happy."

To this reporter, it seemed that Miss Monroe had found her heart's desire. There was something big and mystical and religious in the way she spoke. Selah!

## POPULAR MUSIC


**S**CARCELY a line is printed these days without some mention of Frank Sinatra. This corner has done its share of plugging him. One would think that everything had been said, but somehow the young man has the ability to make news. His latest stunt is appearing with symphony orchestras in the very strongholds of the "Three B's." To date he has sung with the Cleveland Orchestra, the National Symphony and the Philharmonic-Symphony (at the Lewisohn Stadium). By the time you read this he will very likely have played soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra and who knows how many more of the nation's top musical organizations.

It seems to me that serious musicians and music-lovers are becoming aware of a thing called "popular music." They don't snub it the way they used to. They reason that a form of entertainment that can draw such huge audiences, that can drive thousands frantic with its magic—or whatever it is—must have something. And right they are.

You can't thumb your nose at an avalanche, you know. There must be something too forceful, too human and too insistent to be denied in the so-called "popular music" for it to have such a hold on numberless people. Perhaps it lacks the sophistication, the form, the scholarship, the intellectual aspects of a cultural art, but one may not overlook its immediate appeal, its simple and direct message to so many listeners.

Critics have raved and ranted over the subject of jazz—let's say—for years. The latest party line is that it has outlived its usefulness, in so far as the serious composer is concerned. I don't think so. The serious composer had better turn to the people; he had better learn what it is that the people want. And he had better give it to them in his own terms, in his own style and manner. What I am trying to say is that we still have a folk-music developing right under our noses, a folk-music that we cannot afford to kick around with airy or pedantic phrases.

# FREQUENCY MODULATION

FM Broadcasters Ponder Post-War Problems,  
Petition FCC to Change Call-Letter System

**L**AST month this page discussed at some length whether the broadcast band now assigned to FM (from 42 to 50 megacycles) would be large enough to accommodate all the additional noise-free, full-fidelity stations expected on the air after the war. It was pointed out that the probable rush for station licenses might easily overcrowd the forty channels earmarked for FM.

The broadcasters themselves have now taken a hand in the matter. Meeting at New York, the national association of FM stations (FM Broadcasters, Inc.) weighed two post-war alternatives. The first is to transfer the entire FM band from its present place in the radio spectrum to a new and shorter wave-length, below 100 megacycles. This, of course, would make all present-day FM receivers useless, since the stations would no longer be operating within their tuning range.

The second plan is to continue the FM band just where it is but to extend its limits so that more channels may be included.

The station owners and engineers debated these possibilities at some length and finally came to an agreement. They decided that the FM channels already being used are quite ac-

ceptable, but there definitely aren't enough of them to meet future expansion.

They intend to let the Federal Communications Commission know how they feel. Getting the extra space in the ether, however, may not be so easy. It would probably have to come from a television band right next door to where FM now operates. The FCC has failed to indicate how it feels about this proposal.

## Queer Call Letters?

Another outcome of the FM broadcasters' session was the drafting of a petition to ask that the FCC change the type of call letters being assigned to FM stations. As FM listeners are well aware, the present method uses a combination of letters and numerals—such as W75NY or K49KC.

The first letter—either "K" or "W"—indicates whether the station is east or west of the Mississippi River. The numerals show on what channel the station operates, and the final letters (or letter) designate the city in which it is located. (W75NY is in New York; K49KC, in Kansas City.)

The FM broadcasters are not very happy about this call-letter arrangement—and never were, although it has now been in force for over two years. Furthermore, it hasn't proved particularly popular with FM listeners, who find the identification of their favorite FM stations harder to remember than the conventional three- and four-letter combinations assigned to ordinary broadcast transmitters.

Another trouble—and one which bothers the FM broadcasters a great deal—is the unfortunate fact that a station can spend much time and

money building up a reputation associated with its call letters. Then, as sometimes happens, Washington may decide that the station should shift to another channel. This means its call letters—or rather the numerals that are part of them—undergo an automatic change so that those numerals conform to the new channel assignments. Listeners are immediately confused and think it's another station. It is even possible for a newcomer—taking over the channel just vacated—to cash in on all the public reputation the older station had worked so hard to build up in the minds of its listeners.

The FCC has previously argued there are not many more three- and four-letter combinations left that start with "W" or "K." (Under international agreement, all U. S. broadcast stations must have call letters beginning with either "W" or "K.") Despite the thousands of possible combinations, only about 950 have actually been assigned to ordinary broadcasters. The rest are used by ships, commercial shore stations, police and fire departments, airports, coastal shipping, relay transmitters, commercial television and a number of other services.

The FM broadcasters reason that some of these stations—notably the ones that have no necessity for the public remembering their call letters—might be able to use the more confusing letter-and-numeral arrangement and thereby free ample and normal-sounding call letters for FM.

No official action has been taken on this petition, and it is not likely—even if Washington shows a favorable attitude—that any changes will be attempted before the end of the war.

## More, the Merrier

Mounting interest over the post-war importance of FM is reflected, incidentally, in the fact that eleven more groups have joined FM Broadcasters, Inc., during the past month. In April, twenty other new members were taken in. This means that FMBI's membership (now at fifty-five) has more than doubled since last spring and gives clear indication of the increased number of stations we may expect on the air after the war. (Only those who operate or intend to operate FM stations are eligible to belong.)


FMBI's latest members come from such widely scattered cities as Detroit, Cleveland; Ashland and Lexington, Kentucky; St. Louis, Salt Lake City, Los Angeles, Louisville, Washington, New York, and Portland, Maine. If you live in or near any of these—and do not yet enjoy FM service—the chances are good that you'll have it a few years hence.

## W75C on Full Time

After an extensive period of experimental broadcasting, W75C in Chicago, FM outlet of the Moody Bible Institute, has received a provisional license and is on the air daily from 11 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Its present Sunday schedule is reported as from 8 a.m. to the time of local sunset.

Although war-time shortages limit its power to 1,000 watts, W75C has plans to install a 50,000-watt transmitter as soon as conditions permit. The station is one of five frequency-modulation outlets now serving the Chicago area.

Transmitting equipment for both W75C and the Institute's regular station, WMBI, are located at Addison, Illinois, nineteen miles west of Chicago.

## Jimmy Durante-Garry Moore Show

**T**HE lights in NBC's silver studio in New York's Radio City are slowly dimmed. A short collegiate-looking man with a crew haircut steps in front of the curtain, stares at the audience from behind an exaggerated frown. Then he smiles and says, "Ladies and gentlemen, I am Garry Moore. We've got a whiz-bang show. Xavier Cugat's orchestra, Garry Moore, vocalist Georgia Gibbs and Garry Moore. Garry Moore and Amazon Hope Emerson, and that very funny fellow, Garry Moore. Tonight we're on the ball. We've rehearsed the show 6,689 times."

At that point he pauses for breath and a raucous voice from the rear of the studio bawls out, "What's that number again, Junior?" As Garry repeats the number, Jimmy "Schnozzle" Durante dashes down the aisle and onto the stage, shouting, "Ye Gods! I've been drafted!"

But that's only the beginning of the warm-up for the Durante-Moore show, heard Thursdays at 10 p.m. EWT. From that moment on, the audience joins in. Cracks and insults fly. The weekly funfest is on. Durante explodes about every fifteen seconds. Garry, master at the art of ad-libbing, throws in his two cents' worth. The orchestra dead-pans in bewilderment. And when Toodles Bongshnook, Garry's secretary (Hope Emerson), bounces out of the wings, there are murmurs to the effect that it's every man for himself. Only sane moments in the show are when Georgia Gibbs begins to sing. Then Garry, Hope and Jimmy retire briefly backstage into a what-is-the-next-antic huddle. Soon as Georgia's song is ended, they're back again, hurling insults and gags at each other.

At the end of the show, Jimmy, Hope and Garry raise eyebrows in unison as if they are amazed that a half-hour could pass so quickly. The cast saunters into the wings. Before the audience can move from their seats, Garry dashes from behind the curtain, snarls at those in the front row and screams, "The show's over! Why don't you go home?"







coolness and decision. There was that about him which inspired almost instant confidence in his listeners.


"Sure would be swell," he muttered, and left in a hurry.

A success on stage and screen, she turned down a proffered lead in Cole Porter's "Something for the Boys," now a Broadway hit, to stick to her war job on the radio—that of entertaining servicemen, more than 3,000,000 of them, who are just shaking the sleep from their eyes at 5:30 a.m., when she goes on the air.

Lois' agent thought she was demotivated when she turned down the role, for he knew she had been waiting a long time for just such a break. Her answer was simple: "American boys are giving up their lives and careers in this war. The least I can do is give up a role I wanted to bring a bit of extra cheer into their lives." Which statement pretty well qualifies little Miss January as one heroine on the American home front.

Out in Hollywood, Wynne Gibson, who has appeared in films produced by all the major companies, has a fine reputation in all movie casting-offices. Now as soon as a picture role is completed, instead of dashing off for a vacation that she could well afford to take, Wynne wipes off her make-up, dons the coveralls of a war worker and reports for duty at a plant which makes precision instruments.

When the day's work is done, whether in factory or movie studio, Miss Gibson joins her company of "Minute Women" who operate casualty stations and field ambulances and manage booths at Victory House in Pershing Square in Los Angeles. In addition to these duties, her organization maintains accommodations for fifty soldiers over every week-end. At present this same group is working with United Seamen Service to provide similar accommodations for merchant seamen.

As a patriotic American citizen, and one who doesn't believe in sitting back and letting others accept responsibility on a vital war job, Wynne Gibson, too, deserves the title—Heroine of the Home Front.

Pour two tablespoons fat into shallow baking-pan. Cut potatoes into one-half-inch slices and place close together in pan. Brush tops with remaining fat. Roll corn flakes into fine crumbs; combine with cheese, paprika and salt; sprinkle over potatoes. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 degrees F.) about fifteen minutes. Yield: Four servings (five slices each).

### Branburgers

- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 1 cup All-Bran
- 1 pound ground beef

Beat egg slightly, add salt, pepper, onion, parsley, milk, catsup and All-Bran. Let soak until most of the moisture is taken up. Add beef and mix thoroughly. Shape into twelve patties. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) about thirty minutes or broil about twenty minutes. Yield: Six servings (twelve two-one-half-inch branburgers).

### Refrigerator Ginger Cookies

- 1 cup molasses or dark corn syrup
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups vitamin-fortified wheat flakes
- 2 teaspoons baking-powder
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ginger

Heat molasses or corn syrup to bubbling and add shortening. Remove from heat; cool well. Sift flour, salt, soda and spices together; stir into molasses mixture. Add vitamin-fortified wheat flakes; blend well. Knead and shape into rolls about one and one-half inches in diameter; wrap in waxed paper, covering ends so that dough will not dry out. Store in refrigerator until firm. Cut in thin slices and bake on ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) eight to ten minutes. Yield: Eight dozen wafers (two inches in diameter).

conducted by the Columbia Survey organization he was voted the best network commentator by a count of two to one. Three years ago the National Junior Chamber of Commerce picked him as one of the ten most promising young men in the nation. Last December, when he rounded out his fifth year on the air, William Shepherd, president of that organization, paid tribute to Lewis for his record of public service and enlightenment.

Big, bluff, blond and hearty, his voice and stance are full of assurance. He charges into his office a couple of hours before his broadcast and bats out his 2,200 words of copy with rarely a minute or two to spare. He subscribes to no news service; prefers to gather his information first hand. He has excellent pipelines. He is a terrific telephone addict and many of his calls go right through to Washington bigshots.

On election night, back in 1940, he telephoned fourteen national political leaders, including Jim Farley and Herbert Hoover, while on the air. A Federal communications rule kept him from putting their voices directly on the air. But he repeated immediately the gist of their comments on how the election was going.

Since the outbreak of the war Lewis has toured the uttermost reaches of the nation, reporting dozens of times from war plants and other locations where he developed his own unusual news stories.

The Lewis mikeside manner is intimate, friendly and direct. Often there is a confidential note in his voice—as if he were letting listeners in on a secret. And sometimes he is. He never pontificates, as is the failing of so many commentators, and he does

not pose as an expert on global issues. His meat is the home front.

His hobbies are woodworking, fishing and farming. The Lewises spend much of their time at the country home they built in southern Maryland. Lewis expects sometime to persuade broadcasters to permit him to do most of his broadcasts from this retreat.

Here he gives thought occasionally to counterpoint, harmony and composition. In his early years his family expected him to make his mark in the musical world. He actually had two musical comedies produced. Occasionally he turns out humorous sketches for newspaper gatherings in Washington.

Currently he is occupied with some loose ends of his key campaign. One of the more baffling problems concerns a girl named Pat, who failed to hear from her boy friend, Bill, on her recent twentieth birthday. Bill meant well. He bought Patricia a nifty compact and sent it to her with all his love in an accompanying note—or so he thought. Actually he enclosed his gift and message in a box of keys he sent Lewis. The blunder was discovered only after the wrapper, which might have identified the sender, was destroyed.

Perhaps you can help Lewis with this one. A letter came recently from a lady living in Rochester, N. Y. She wrote:

"I think I must have sent you the key to my trunk. Would you mind looking through your collection? It's a small, flat one."

To that routine add some twenty-eight combined "behind the scenes" production brains, mix well with fifty-fifty portions of inspiration and perspiration of hard work, preparing for every sixty minutes the program is on the air each week, and you have the recipe for "Lux Radio Theater's" success. Show will be back on the airplanes Monday night, September 13, at the same hour, 9 p.m. EWT. If present plans work out, the opening show of the 1943-44 season will be "Random Harvest," with Greer Garson and Ronald Colman, who starred in the screen version of the James Hilton story. But whatever the opening program may present, listeners can expect a fine performance when "Lux Radio Theater" returns to the airplanes. For when C. B. pulls the strings that's a foregone conclusion.

# "BIG COOP"

He simply looked sad and the expression on his face showed that he figured all was lost. A public unused to such elemental performance, was delighted, and thereupon Cooper became a star.

One of his earliest appearances was in "It," in which he served as manly scenery for Clara Bow, a wonderful creature who had that certain something which later was to be variously described as "oomph," "ping," "glamour" and the like. Cooper ostensibly had nothing but an inability to keep from blushing when confronted by a lavish display of feminine beauty. Clara was known as strictly high power and Gary's lunge on the scene was immediately seized upon by press-agents, who built an offstage romance for the two of them. Until this time, Hollywood cinema ladies had always gone for the suave, greasy-haired Latin type of Valentino vintage. Promptly it became vogue to have in tow a rugged man of the West who could be counted on to trip over a white bearskin rug at cocktail parties. In those days everyone in Hollywood knew everyone else, and in short order people began to talk of the sensational romance between Lupe Velez and Gary.

"My Garee!" was an exclamation frequently heard as Lupe gave interviews to fan-magazine writers at the Brown Derby. Pictures galore were made of Gary and Lupe. There was something cavemanish and excruciatingly primitive about the romance that intrigued movie-goers, but with no offense to Lupe, pictures showed evidence as time went on that Gary's face was wearing an expression of confused boredom. He went to New York, and from there to Africa to hunt big game. When he returned, the Lupe romance was a thing of the past and he was thereafter seen largely in the company of Dorothy (The Countess) di Frasso, a relationship that could hardly be seized upon as romance by the most zealous of romance-manufacturing press-agents.

Women have always found Coop exciting, but his intimate friends will tell you that this is not because, as they think, he is six feet five inches tall and romantic as all-get-out, but simply because as a non-talker he is a wonderful sounding-board. A good listening type, he is somewhat nauseated by silly chatter, and this dislike was mainly what kept him out of a state of matrimony until he met Veronica Balfe (known briefly on the screen as Sandra Shaw), a society girl whom he married in 1933. Veronica, it was assumed, would not be too successful as Mrs. Cooper because she would surround him with a perfect house and a disciplined life well staffed by perfect servants. She did just this, and in 1937 a daughter, Maria, was added to the family scene.

An imaginative movie-goer can picture Mrs. Cooper saying, "Now, Gary, you simply cannot wear cowboy boots with a dinner jacket." The thought is amusing, but all legend to the contrary, the son of Judge Charles Cooper, formerly on the Supreme Court bench in Montana, graduate of a grammar school at Dunstable, Bedfordshire, England, and later a student at Iowa's Grinnell College, is not and never has been the bear-in-the-china-shop he has been pictured.

Like many another rugged, outdoor man, Gary Cooper likes the cultured atmosphere of a beautifully run home such as his mansion in Bel Air. For such conversation as he indulges him-

self, talk of shotguns, fishing and childhood memories of days on a Montana ranch are a delight, and no man who hasn't a common interest finds Cooper anything but boring. Yet he is not a lion bound in a gilded cage. It is safe to assume that periodic rumors about Gary's interest in this leading lady or that are just that—periodic rumors. Wishful thinking by gossip-mongers and impressionable young ladies will hardly change the status quo.

You'll find Gary most often with his wife in the company of such people as Claudette Colbert and her husband, Commander Joel Pressman, Barbara Stanwyck and Bob Taylor, the Jack Bennys and other solid citizens. They have a small social clique such as you'll find in any American suburb, which Hollywood is—with a Duco finish.

Gary is not a teetotaler, nor is he a party man, and experts on this phase of an actor's life could be a little confused at the sight of him showing up at Mocambo the other night and spending the evening on the right side of a glass of milk. His favorite hang-over story concerns a happening when Coop was on location in "For Whom the Bell Tolls." The cast and crew, including Coop, spent a large night at the "Bucket of Blood," a local night-ery. Next morning Gary showed up at breakfast a trifle shaky, but he firmly ordered ham and eggs, a small steak, toast and coffee. A photographer with a newly acquired greenish look sat down beside Cooper, gazed glassy-eyed at this array of food and said to the waitress, "Just bring me two aspirins and a pistol."

"A pistol?" the numb waitress asked. "Yeah," growled the cameraman, "to shoot Cooper with!" Coop roared with laughter and thereafter buttonholed all in sight to retell the story.

IN PERSON, Gary Cooper has much the same qualities of the average American—and to those who aren't aware of it the average American is not a filibustering senator. Cooper smokes endless cigarettes without knowing that he does when he's worried or thinking about something. He has a strong faith in things American, and does not demand that these all be connected in fact or fancy with Washington's day. With a considerable fortune to protect from ravages of war, he invests to the saturation point in war bonds. He'll gladly show a set visitor how to twirl a six-shooter in expert fashion, and then look sheepish if he sees a visiting soldier watching him, even though now past forty he is not by any stretch of the imagination, despite picture roles, rugged enough to stand the gaff of this young man's war.

Cooper loves to dance, but he isn't a good dancer. This is not one writer's opinion—photographs prove the fact.

The one man most qualified to utter the final words in any verbal portrait of "Big Coop" is Sam Wood, director of "For Whom the Bell Tolls." Sam, the most-respected director in the business, has this to say about the star of 1943's most-discussed picture.

"He worries you when a scene is in progress. Competent actors with him go through their business and it appears as though Cooper is completely dead-panning it. That night's rushes in the projection-room tell a different story. Whatever the feeling of the scene, it's there in Cooper's eyes or in a barely perceptible movement of the mouth. It's not underplaying—it's simply a complete absorption of the role to the point where even a minimum of the usual gestures and tricks are unnecessary.

"As an actor or a man, Hollywood will never have another like him."
