EDUCATIONAL STATIONS, WSUI, STATE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA, AND WOI, IOWA STATE COLLEGE ARE ON THE FRONT FOR NATIONAL DEFENSE. THEIR PROGRAMS REFLECT THE SPIRIT OF THE TIMES, THE PROCRESSIVE LEADER-SHIP DISPLAYED BY EDUCATION'S OWN RADIO STATIONS.

NATIONAL DEFENSE ON WSUI:

THESE PROGRAMS, ACCORDING TO DIRECTOR CARL MENZER, ARE ALL RE-LATED IN SOME MANNER TO NATIONAL DEFENSE:

AMERICAN'S DEFENSE FRONT - CAPTAIN E. O. CULVER AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY SCIENCE AND TACTICS GIVE THE ANSWER EACH TUESDAY OVER WSUI. THE PROGRAM, SUPERVISED BY COLONEL H. H. SLAUGHTER, DEPARTMENT HEAD, REPORTS STATE AND NATIONAL NEWS, PER-SONAL ITEMS OF IOWA MEN IN SERVICE AS WELL AS NEWS FROM ARMY CAMPS AND POSTS, RECRUITING CENTERS, AND DIVISION HEADQUARTERS.

AMERICA GOES FLYING - IN ORDER TO KEEP ABREAST OF THE INDUSTRY'S EXPANSION AND NEW DEFENSE DEVELOPMENTS, WSUI BRINGS "AMERICA GOES FLYING" EACH TUESDAY EVENING. CONDUCTING THE PROGRAM IS "OBERT SMYLIE, WHO HAS JUST GRADUATED FROM THE CIVIL PILOT TRAINING AD-VANCED AND CROSS COUNTRY COURSES UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE ARMY AND NAVY AIR CORP.

AMERICAN LEGION - IT'S THE"AMERICAN LEGION" SHOW AIRED THE FOURTH THURSDAY OF EACH MONTH BY REPRESENTATIVES FROM VARIOUS AMERICAN LEGION POSTS THROUGHOUT THE FIRST IOWA LEGION DISTRICT.

AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY - THE "STAR OF SERVICE" IS THE BASIS FOR A SERIES OF PROGRAMS BY THE "AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY". THE FIVE POINTS OF THE STAR INCLUDE: REHABILITATION, AMERICANISM, CHILD WEL-FARE, EDUCATION, AND COMMUNITY SERVICE.

THE AMERICAN HERITAGE - IN THESE DAYS WHEN THE AMERICAN TRADITION IS UNDER FIRE FROM THE FOUR COBNERS OF THE EARTH, IT IS OBVIOUSLY APPROPRIATE FOR A STATE UNIVERSITY TO REMIND THE PUBLIC OF THE POSITIVE RELIGIOUS, POLITICAL, AND CULTURAL VALUES OF THE UNITED STATES. THEREFORE, WSUI HAS SCHEDULED EACH TUESDAY A VITAL PROGRAM, CURRENT COMMENT - DEFENSE AND IOWA'S PART IN THE PROGRAM ARE GIVEN A PROMINENT PLACE IN PROFESSOR C. WOODY THOMPSON'S "CURRENT COMMENT" OVER WSUI EACH WEDNESDAY.

EDUCATION SPEAKS - "EDUCATION SPEAKS"--AND ITS VITAL VOICE IS HEARD BY WSUL LISTENERS. THIS PROGRAM, SPONSORED BY THE IOWA STATE TEACHERS ASSOCIATION, IS A SYMPOSIUM OF NEW IDEAS AND METHODS FROM THE LEADING EDUCATORS IN THE COUNTRY, AND IT PRESENTS POSSIBLE CHANGES AND THE AD-VANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF OUR MODERN EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM.

SANDERS OF THE SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM.

MCCARTY OF THE COLLEGE OF COMMERCE DIRECTS A ROUND TABLE DISCUSSION ON THE CUSTOMS, CLIMATE, RESOURCES, AND HISTORY OF A LOCATION PLAYING AN IMPORTANT PART IN THE WORLD'S NEWS.

ALSO RELATED TO THE DEFENSE PICTURE, OF COURSE, ARE THE 6 DAILY NEWSCASTS CARRIED OVER WOI, IN WHICH WE GIVE FULL DETAILS ON HAPPENINGS IN WASHINGTON AND ELSEWHERE IN THE DEFENSE PICTURE.

"LEST WE FORGET" A TRANSCRIBED DRAMATIZATION SERIES BASED ON AMERICAN HISTORY, IS INDIRECTLY RELATED TO DEFENSE AND GREATER UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROEQUMS INVOLVED IN IT.

"FARM FACTS" IS A DAILY AGRICULTURAL INFORMATION PROGRAM-++45 MINUTES IN LENGTH---WHICH WOI HAS BROADCAST FOR SEVERAL YEARS. THIS SERIES, FOR WHICH SAM RECK IS EMCEE, HAS INCLUDED AN ENORMOUS AMOUNT OF MATERIAL ON THE FOOD-FOR-DEFENSE DRIVE OF THE U. S. DEPARTMENT OF & CRICULTURE.

RADIO-EDUCATION FOR TEXAS

THE TEXAS STATE LEGISLATURE HAS APPROPRIATED FUNDS TO ESTABLISH AND OPERATE A DEPARTMENT OF RADIO AND SPECIAL EDUCATION. HEADING THE NEW DEPARTMENT IS JOHN W. GUNSTREAM, DIRECTOR OF THE TEXAS SCHOOL OF THE AIR, A COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM WHICH HAS BEEN USING THE RADIO STATIONS IN TEXAS. CREATION OF THE DEPARTMENT MAKES IT THE FIRST OF ITS KIND IN THE UNITED TATES.

THE NEW DEPARTMENT INAUGURATED ITS 1941-42 SERIES OF CLASSROOM BROADCASTS ON OCTOBER 6. THE SERIES WILL PARALLEL THE FIVE MAJOR COURSES OF THE TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOL CURRICULUM. (I.E. LANGUAGE, ARTS, SCIENCE, SOCIAL SCIENCE, VOCATIONS, AND MUSIC)
