W H A FOSTERS THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE

LIKE OTHER STATIONS W H A, AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN, RE-CEIVES A FLOOD OF SPOT ANNOUNCEMENTS, INTERVIEW COPY, AND STOCK SCRIPTS UNDER THE "NATIONAL DEFENSE" LABEL. SOME OF THESE ARE USED AS RECEIVED, A NUMBER ARE RE-WRITTEN, AND MANY CANNOT BE USED. WITH NUMBEROUS AGENCIES SUPPLYING SUCH MATERIAL THE QUANTITY RECEIVED IS GREAT, AND THE QUALITY IS NOT ALWAYS GOOD.

IN THE BELIEF THAT IT IS THE DUTY AND PRIVILEGE OF EVERY RADIO STATION IN THE UNITED STATES TO WORK TOWARD A GREATER APPRECIATION OF AND SUPPORT FOR THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE, W H A IS OFFERING A SERIES OF PROGRAMS WITH DEFINITE OBJECTIVES IN RELATION TO NATIONAL DEFENSE.

IN-SCHOOL LISTENING --- THE STORY OF AMERICA

IN RESPONSE TO SPECIFIC REQUESTS FROM SCHOOLS FOR HELP IN THE TEACHING OF DEMOCRACY AND AMERICANISM, THE STATION IS THIS YEAR (1941-42) PRESENTING "THE STORY OF AMERICA," THE BULLETIN DESCRIBES 11:

"THE ADVENTURE OF UNCLE SAM---THAT'S THE NEW SERIES OF SOCIAL STUDY PROGRAMS OFFERED BY THE WISCONSIN SCHOOL OF THE AIR FOR INTERMEDIATE AND UPPER GRADE TEACHING OF AMERICAN HISTORY AND DEMOCRACY.

VIVID NARRATION, HIGHLIGHTED BY DRAMATIZED EPISODES, TELLS THE STORY OF THE DYNAMIC GROWTH OF THEREEN COLONIES INTO OUR MIGHTY NATION OF TODAY. EACH OF THE EIGHT UNITS FRATURES LIVES OF FAMOUS MEN WHO SHAPED HISTORY IN THEIR TIME. FOR THE FIFTH AND SIXTH GRADES THIS OFFERS STIMULUS TO FREE AND WIDE EXFLORATION OF SOCIAL STUDIES AND DIRECT CORRELATION WITH REQUIRED LITERATURE, ART, AND MUSIC STUDY. FOR THE UPPER SHADES, IT PROVIDES MOTIVATION FOR INTENSIVE DRILL AND REVIEW OF FACTUAL MATERIAL."

THIS IS NO HYSTERICAL, FLAG WAVING SERIES. INSTEAD, IT IS A CARE-FULLY ORGANIZED AND LOGICALLY PLANNED PRESENTATION OF BASIC CON-CEPTS WHICH THE RISING GENERATION NEEDS TO HELP IT UNDERSTAND WHAT IT IS THAT IS NOW BEING "DEFENDED." WITHOUT THIS BACKGROUND THERE CAN BE NO LASTING SUPPORT FOR THE DEMOCRATIC WAY OF LIVING.
