THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE

"THE SUCCESS OF THE KWSC SCHOOL OF THE AIR FEATURE, THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE, CAN BE CREDITED TO THE BELIEF THAT GOOD ENTER. INMENT IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF EVERY CHILD'S EDUCATION."

THIS QUOTATION FROM THE SPRING, 1942, SCHOOL OF THE AIR MILLETIN OF KWSC, THE RADIO SERVICE OF THE STATE COLLEGE OF WASHINGTON, EXPRESSES A FACT WHICH DEVELOPED FROM THEORY.

THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE IS ONE OF THE 5000 WATT STATION'S TEN WEEKLY FEATURES WHICH ARE DESIGNED ESPECIALLY FOR RECEPTION IN THE SUBLIC SCHOOL CLASSROOMS OF THE NORTHWEST. SCHEDULED FOR PRIMAR GRADES, THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE IS HEARD EACH MONDAY AGTERNOON FROM 2:00 TO 2:15.

SEVEN SCHOOL SEMESTERS AGO KENNETH YEEND, DIRECTOR OF THE STATION, AND OTHERS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PLANNING OF THE KWSC SCHOOL OF THE AIR ASKED A QUESTION OF PRIMARY SCHOOL TEACHERS, PRINCIPALS, AND SUPERINTENDENTS. WHY, THEY ASKED, CANNOT A RADIO PROGRAM WHICH OFFERS STIMULATING ENTERTAINMENT BASED UPON STORIES FAMILIAR TO CHILDREN HAVE REAL EDUCATIONAL VALUE? THE EDUCATORS REPLIED THAT IF CHILDREN SHOWED CONSIDERABLE INTEREST IN A DRAMATIC STORY-TELLING PROGRAM IT WOULD BE EDUCATIONALLY JUSTIFIED. ANY WAY IT WAS WORTH A TRIAL.

IT GOT ONE. THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE WENT INTO PRODUCTION IN SEPTEMBER, 1939, WITH LADY MAKE-BELIEVE FURNISHING CONTINUITY TO A SERIES OF FIFTEEN DRAMATIZATIONS OF CHILDREN'S STORIES. TEACHERS FOUND THEIR PUPILS EXCITEDLY ATTENTIVE; THE YOUTHFUL LISTENERS GREW TO KNOW LADY MYKE-BELIEV, AND TO LOOK FORWARD EAGERLY TO HER WEEKLY VISITS WITH DRAMATIZE! STORIES, THEY WERE FASCINATED BY THIS FRIENDLY LADY WHO COULD MAKE THEIR FAVORITE CHARACTERS STEP FROM THE PAGES OF THEIR STORYBOOKS TO LIVE AND TALK FOR A GUARTER OF AN HOUR.

ON FEBRUARY 16, 1942, THE FIRST PROGRAM IN THE CURRENT SE ES WAS PRESENTED. "EPAMINONDAS" WAS ITS TITLE, A SKILLFUL TREATMENT OF THE FAMILIA TALE. LADY MAKE-BELIEVE HAS RETURNED TO THE "LAND OF THE STORY-BOOK PEOPLE"; THE OLD WOMAN IN THE SHOE HAS GONE BACK TO HER OWN LARGE FAMILY FROM THE YET LARGER RADIO FAMILY. NOW THE CHILDREN ARE TAKEN TO THE SCENES OF THEIR FAVORITE STORIES ON A MYTHICAL MAGIC CARPET. PROGRAMS

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INCLUDE: "THE TINDER BOX," "THE WILD SWAN," "ALADDIN AND HIS LADD"
"FERDINAND THE BULL," "PINNOCHIO," "ENCHANTED STAG," "PUSS IN BOOTO,
"ALI BABA AND THE FORTY THIEVES," "TOM THUMB," "THE NIGHTINGALE,"
"SIMPLE SIMON," "GOODY TWO SHOES," AND "THE ADVENTURES OF PRINCESS MADELLE."
BASED UPON THREE YEARS OF EXPERIENCE AT EDUCATIONAL STORY—
TELLING, THE SERIES PROMISES TO BE BETTER THAN EVER.

EACH OF THESE SEMESTER PROGRAM SERIES HAS CLAIMED A SIZEABLE AUDIENCE. FROM THE CHILDREN COME APPRECIATIVE LETTERS, VALENTINES, CHRISTMAS CARDS, AND DRAWINGS THEY HAVE MADE TO PICTURE THE STORIES. TEACHERS WRITE OF THE INTEREST SHOWN BE THEIR PUPILS AND SUGGEST STORIES SUITABLE FOR PRESENTATION.

"THE LAND OF MAKE-BELIEVE IS THE MOST POPULAR PROGRAM IN OUR SCHOOL," SAYS NORMAN JANNEY, PRINCIPAL OF FRANKLIN GRADE SCHOOL IN PULLMAN. "AT PRESENT OUR LISTENING AUDIENCE INCLUDES OUR EIGHTY PRIMARY STUDENTS, MOST OF WHOM ARE FAMILIAR, IN VARYING DEGREES, WITH THE STORIES PORTRAYED. THE METHOD OF PRESENTATION OF THIS PROGRAM IS EXCELLENT FROM BOTH THE TEACHERS! AND STUDENTS! POINT OF VIEW. IT IS A WELL-DIRECTED DRAMATIZATION WITH A VERY INTERESTING INTRODUCTION THAT IMMEDIATELY CATCHES THE HIGHLY IMAGINATIVE FANCY OF YOUNGER CHILDREN.

THE GREATEST VALUE OF THESE PROGRAMS COMES FROM THE MOTIVATION THEY GIVE TO CLASS ACTIVITIES. DEMONSTRATIONS, DRAMATIZATIONS, AND OTHER GROUP ACTIVITIES NATURALLY FOLLOW INTERESTING PROGRAMS. EXTENSIVE LIBRARY READING OF DESIRABLE MATERIAL IS A NATURAL OUTGROWTH."

BUT THE TRIBUTE COMES IN THE PROVING OF A THEORY. EDUCATORS SAID THAT EDUCATION BY MEANS OF ENTERTAINMENT WAS WORTH A TRIAL. AND SIX SEMESTERS HAVE SHOWN KWSC THAT IT CAN BE DONE-4AND THE STATION OF THE STATE COLLEGE OF WASHINGTON CAN DO IT.

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WAR EFFORT ON WOSU

STATION WOSU, WHICH IS THE BROADCASTING STATION FOR OHIO STATE UNIVERSITYLISTS A VERY LARGE NUMBER OF SIGNIFICANT PROGRAMS RELATING TO THE WAR EFFORT. AMONG OTHERS IS A SERIES BY DOCTOR HAYES ON "ECONOMICS OF THE WAR," A SECOND ENTITLED "KEEP THE HOME FIRES BURNING," WHICH GOVERS THE ACTIVITIES OF OHIO WOMEN IN WAR TIME, AND STILL ANOTHER ENTITLED "OHIO AT WAR."

THESE THREE PROGRAMS CONSTITUTE A MAJOR CONTRIBUTION TO THE PROSECUTION OF THE WAR AND CONTAIN INTERESTING IDEAS FOR ALL EDUCATIONAL BROADCASTING GROUP STATIONS. IN ADDITION, RADIO PROGRAMS FOR SCHOOLROOM RECEPTION HAVE BEEN CHANGED OVER IN PART TO A DIRECT CONSIDERATION OF EDUCATION AND THE WAR. AMONG THESE ARE INCLUDED PROGRAMS SUCH AS "OHIO BUILUS A NATION," AND A "NEWS REVIEW" PROGRAM. PROGRAMS ON THESE TWO SERIES WILL BE OF INTEREST TO SCHOOL BROADCASTING GROUPS.

WNYC IN ACTION

New York's municipally operated radio station, WNYC, is making increasing efforts to bring residents of America's Largest City authoritative reports on war and defense activities from British experts via direct BBC programs and newly transcribed BBC features. WNYC authorities feel that New York residents can garner useful information—particularly concerning civilian defense from London sources in the Air-Raid Area.

THE FIRST DIRECT OVERSEAS BROADCAST FEATURE CARRIED ON A REQUER SCHEDULE BY THE CITY STATION IS THE BBC "Answering You" SERIES WNYC IS AIRING EACH SUNDAY. MEANWHILE THE CITY STATION IS MAKING INCREASED USE OF TRANSCRIPTIONS MADE FROM BBC SHOWS OF PARTICULAR VALUE TO METROPOLITAN LISTENERS. THESE INCLUDE "BRITAIN SPEAKS," HEARD THROUGH WNYC AT 8 P.M. EACH MONDAY, AND "WOMEN OF ENGLAND," A SERIES FEATURING REPORTS ON HOUSEHOLD "BLITZ" PROBLEMS BY MARGARET BIDDLE, WIFE OF OUR AMEASSADOR TO ENGLAND. THE LATTER SERIES IS BROADCAST BY WNYC EACH FRIDAY AT 8 P.M.
