AGRICULTURE IN WAR ON KWSC

IN ADDITION TO THE USUAL GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS AND SPOT HOUNCEMENTS, THE VICTORY NETWORK SHOWS, AND OTHER FEATURES AVAILABLE TO RADIO STATIONS, KWSC, THE 5000 WATT EDUCATIONAL OUTLET OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON, IS CARRYING SEVERAL SPECIAL, LOCALLY-ORIGINATED SERIES, DORDING TO KENNETH YEEND, DIRECTOR. THE IMPORTANCE OF THE RELATIONAL BETWEEN AGRICULTURE AND WAR, IS RECOGNIZED IN THE STATIONAL PROGRAMMING POLICY.

THREE DAILY AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMS CONTAIN MUCH INFORMATION RELATED TO WAR FARM PRODUCTION IN THE CAMPAIGN FOR VICTORY.
