NAEB Functions Transferred to Washington

On March 6, all NAEB member services except the network and publications will move from Urbana to Washington. Servicing of present members, membership and general promotion, billings, handling of routine requests for information, liaison with other organizations, committee relations, etc., will be handled from the Washington office.

For convenience, mailing lists, stocks of publications, etc., will be maintained in Urbana with publication and bulk mailings made from there. The Urbana staff will consist of Bob Underwood and his network crew; Betty McKenzie, publications editor; and some part-time secretarial assistance.

Members are requested to direct all questions, suggestions, and miscellaneous matters, not pertaining to the network or publications, to the Washington office.

Network Inaugurates New Programs

Beginning March 29, the Network will inaugurate a new service to members under the general title, Special of the Week. Each week Network members so requesting will receive a half-hour program (in addition to the regular shipment). The plan is to have about three of every four special programs originate in Washington with one show a month featuring talks, interviews, etc., with prominent figures on subjects of national interest.

Ed Burrows, chairman, Network Acceptance committee, is beginning to build a backlog of programs of the latter type which will come from member stations as they obtain such talks and interviews. In the event a Washington program is not available during a given week, a program from the backlog will be used. All of the Specials of the Week will be packaged at WUOM under present plans, and notice of the content of each special will be sent with the cue sheets.

In addition, beginning March 29, network members will receive Report from Washington. This will be either a five-minute or fifteen-minute program of background news or commentary; the exact length

has not been determined as yet. These programs will be packaged in Washington under the supervision of O. Leonard Press and will be sent by airmail to network headquarters in Urbana for distribution.

The content of both series should be good for about three weeks after the initial recording. Thus, all members will have an opportunity to get it on the air before it becomes dated. These new programs are a part of the additional service promised to network members at the time the network fee increase for 1961-62 was announced.

Network Needs In-School Submissions

A reminder to Network members: Submissions for the next in-school offering should be made within the next two weeks.

Full information regarding submissions and submission forms may be obtained from Network Head-quarters in Urbana. Since this program service depends entirely upon the support of network members, we would like to have a large number of submissions.

How Much TV For Education?

Just what does education need in the way of television channels, now and in the future? This is the question the NAEB hopes to answer in a project it has undertaken under Title VII of the National Defense Education Act.

The survey has the blessing of the FCC, which has announced as its No. 1 problem the proper allocation of TV spectrum space. Without specific evidence of education's needs, the FCC has indicated that education might be seriously slighted in any redesign of the TV allocation system.

Piloted by Vernon Bronson, former director of radio-television education for Dade County (Fla.), the project will start with a nationwide survey of educators to determine ETV space needs. This phase is expected to be completed by May.

The second phase (which will be completed by

September) will be an engineering study of allocations to meet the indicated needs and will be conducted by Jansky & Bailey, Inc., NAEB's engineering consultants.

Grants and Awards

The Ford Foundation has granted nearly \$60,000 to the Southern Regional Education Board to encourage ETV in 16 southern states. The grant will be used over a three-year period to help development of statewide networks.

- 3M of Canada has granted \$10,000 worth of videotape to the Metropolitan ETV Association of Toronto.
- A grant from the Ford Foundation will allow Canadian educators to visit ETV stations throughout North America prior to a national ETV conference in May in Toronto.
- The NETRC has announced receipt of nearly 2 million dollars from the Ford Foundation to equip new ETV stations with videotape recorders.

Capital To Have ETV Station

Washington, D. C., expects to go on the air on UHF over Channel 26, under the administration of the Greater Washington Educational Television Association Inc.

GWETA, organized in 1953, has been actively programing over a commercial station, reaching more than 50,000 children in 18 school districts throughout

the metropolitan area.

The breakthrough looking toward an ETV station came with a grant of \$50,000 from the Old Dominion Foundation. In announcing the grant, Monroe Bush, of the Foundation, said: "There is an urgent need for an educational television station in Washington. The Old Dominion Foundation, recognizing this, congratulates the Greater Washington Educational Television Association for its careful persistence in pursuing this goal. The experience gained by the association, through limited in-school telecasting on commercial stations, will prove invaluable. The plans that have come to a head are completely realistic.

"For these reasons, the Foundation is glad to be able to make a grant of \$50,000 to assure the early

establishment of an independent educational station. We are confident that the Greater Washington community will meet the challenge of this opportunity with the sort of continuing financial support that is essential."

The \$50,000, plus additional funds which GWETA is expecting from other sources, is for capital expenditures, and will be used to purchase used UHF equipment. The Washington group also has leased a tower in nearby Arlington, Va., the only remaining tower in the area suitable for wide-range broadcasting.

GWETA hopes to be ready for in-school programing when the new school term begins in September, with minimum programing of four hours a day, five days a week. In addition, sample programs

for adult viewing will be broadcast.

Operational financing will be provided by the schools. Currently participating schools are supporting the program over the commercial station to the extent of \$60,000 for only half an hour a day, and Mrs. Edmund Campbell, president of GWETA, hopefully anticipates that they will be able to support an extended program of \$150,000.

THE PRESIDENT'S SAY

Some wag has said that a camel is something created by a committee; right now I feel like a committee created by a camel. I have been recently subjected to a series of mild buffetings and kicks, nudges and shoves, and just generally stepped upon. What is more, I brought it all on myself.

In my innocence, I addressed a friendly little communique to the membership a while back inviting people to write and tell me if they would like to be on an NAEB committee, and, if so, to list their preferences in order: 1, 2, 3.

It was my feeling, I explained, that there were many who were willing to serve but were often inadvertently overlooked. Evidently, many agreed.

I expected a modest response; certainly I was not prepared for a mail return of about 90%. Not only did you answer the questionnaire with indications of your preferences, but almost a fourth of you appended letters indicating the reasons for your choices, recounting your background, or indicating why you should be chosen.

Actually, I was pleased and warmed by this wholehearted response. This had been a call for assistance ("not honor or glory . . . a lot of hard work") and, as

always, the NAEB responded.

But this reaction, while helping to place more information at my disposal did make the task of selection more difficult and time-consuming. More than ever I wanted not only to get the best people to do certain committee jobs, but I wanted, so far as possible, to give them the jobs they preferred. This careful sifting and winnowing has taken many days—and nights. Obviously, the results will not please everyone; there are not enough assignments to go around to give

a job to all who offered their services and certain committees were "over-subscribed" by as much as 40007.

This year, in order to insure a continuous flow of new blood into the committee system, while yet preserving continuity of experienced personnel, I am initiating an arrangement of staggered terms for committee members. After the initial two years, members will serve three-year terms, with three new members being chosen each year to replace three members who rotate off. The small numerals opposite the names on the committee list indicate the length of terms for each appointee. In general, these terms relate to the service record of individuals, with veteran committeemen being assigned the shorter terms. Committee chairmen are subject to reappointment and replacement each year.

Three committees, because of the "ex-officio" composition of the membership, do not come within the "stated term" system: the Executive committee (chairmen of TV and Radio Boards and the president), the Grants-in-Aid committee (chairmen of the Radio Network, Radio Planning, and School Network committees), and the Awards and Citations committee (composed exclusively of those who themselves have been awarded citations.)

It is my belief that the arrangement of fixed terms will provide for a regular infusion of new blood, prevent any tendency toward ingrownness, and development of special empires or group monopolies; it is my hope that the membership will welcome this plan as a means of affording greater opportunity for wider participation in the work of their association.
