



dut that's only the beginning, because the Hall of fame is more than a musuem of nostalgia. THE MUSEUM OF BROADCASTING

The Museum of Broadcasting, located at 1 East 53rd Street in New York City, is the first American museum dedicated to the study and preservation of the more than 50-year history of radio and television broadcasting.

Through the cooperation of all the networks and of public broadcasting, the Museum maintains a rapidly-growing collection of significant radio and television programs from the 1920's to the present, professionally selected, cataloged, and indexed.

Holdings range from broadcast speeches by all the Presidents of the United States since Warren G. Harding to the comedy routines of Bert Lahr and Bea Lillie, from both radio and television productions of classical drama to a fully-indexed file of vintage commercials, from Judy Garland's radio debut at the age of 12 to a television appearance by Arturo Toscanian at the age of 84.

Visitors to The Museum of Broadcasting enjoy easy access to this collection, selecting program material from an extensive computer-generated file of index cards and then reserving time to monitor their selections at one of our custom-designed broadcast consoles. The Museum also maintains a library of rare radio and television scripts, as well as books and periodicals on broadcasting.

The Museum of Broadcasting is open between 12:00 Noon and 5:00 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays. The public is invited to visit during these hours to see a videotape with Alistair Cooke which introduces the Museum and includes selections from our collection. Visitors may then choose radio and television programs to monitor in our Broadcast Study Center -- a \$1.00 contribution is suggested. Annual memberships affording free, priority use of the Museum's facilities are also available.

During the morning hours, the Museum is reserved for use by classes, and we are pleased to arrange with colleges and universities for lectures and seminars on the premises for as many as twenty-four students at a time. The Museum also plans to sponsor a number of special programs, bringing our members together with people who have new insights into broadcasting's history, effects and promise.

The boys perform numerous routines including "Who's On First?", and we'll also hear from Jane Wyman, Verna 0 Felton, Mel Blanc and others. ** Groucho Marx is on hand with more of his 1972 L Carnagie Hall concert.

JUNE 19: (BROADCAST TIME: 6-8 PM). It's an hour's worth of Fred Allen as he stars in TOWN HALL TONIGHT from NBC on 6/21/39. Fred and his "Mighty Allen Art Players" troup climax the program with "A Crisis Boards The Showboat". ** And speaking of a crisis, a large one usually crops up on THE ALDRICH FAMILY, and tonight's episode is no exception. Henry (Ezra Stone) has been invited to a party...but where is the party being held? Of course, Henry ends up involving half of the townspeople in his search. When Cosmo Topper begins telling his wife about his troubles with those haunting spirits George and Marion Kirby, she promptly L hires a psychiatrist to analyze him...but those "helpful" Kirbys decide to come O to Topper's rescue! ** THE JOHNSON'S WAX PROGRAM WITH FIBBER McGEE & MOLLY C has Fibber coming down with a strange illness...which conveniently strikes him A while Molly is confronting him with some household chores which he must perform. The broadcast is from NBC on 9/26/39. **THE JELLO PROGRAM from NBC on 1/2/38 has Jack Benny and the gang welcoming a group of unusual guest stars, and "unusual" is putting it mildly. Andy Devine is featured in this show, as he was one of Jack's cast of regulars at the time. ** Mike Nichols and Elaine May will also be heard.







<u>JUNE 24:</u> (Thanks to Robert Abend II, East Syracuse) The radio chronicles of Sam Spade
conclude (for the present) with "The Prodigal Panda Caper" from NBC's version of THE ADVEN-
