



LATE DEVELOPMENTS: At a news conference in Hollywood; on Sept. 21, ventriloquist Edgar Bergen announced his retirement at the end of 1978. On his death, Charlie McCarthy will be given to The Smithsonian Institution They have been "partners" for 56 years. McCarthy took the opportunity to needle Bergen, insisting he has no talent. / NBC-TV has announced that the chimes are returning! The NBC Chimes, absent from airwaves since mid-1975 will be heard many times each week at the beginning of major network specials, movies, Big Events, and the new NBC Theater. The chimes not only have a major place in the tradition of NBC, but also have a broader historical distinction. They were the first purely audible "service mark" ever registered by the U.S. Patent Office. Two-and-a-half years ago the readily identifiable audio signature was temporarily retired after almost 50 years of service when NBC introduced a new corporate identification program; but returned shortly thereafter on some of the owned NBC televison stations. Network President Robert Mulholland first suggested bringing the chimes back at this time. No decision to return them to the radio network has, as yet, been made.

But Florence, his wife, becomes suspicious when Amy is able to describe in detail much of the Morton house, which she's never seen, claiming Jack told her all about it. That might he alips into the

Right behind him is Florence. 10/3/74 (R: 11/22/74) THE GOLDEN BLOOD OF THE SUN - A young American trying to sell land in a Mexican sum resort is labeled a jinx by his company - it rains every weekend he's at the resort and no customers show up. Because he's considered a jinx, Peter Barlow is ordered by his boss to fly to Mexico City to look at some property his company is interested in purchasing. Opening what she thinks is a piece of fan mail to her handsome husband, Claudia Harmond, bedridden with a weak heart, reads a love note, signed hargo, which ends, "I will go along with your plan to put her out of the way". Thoroughly frightened and helpless, Claudia refuses to eat or to take her medication, certain she will be poisoned. She becomes even more frightened when her husband fires her nurse and lies about why he did so.

10/10/74 (R: 11/24/74) THE DOLL - Professor Eric Douglas, an anthropologist, tries not to show his jealousy when a young woman, Laura Fletcher, (whom he secretly loves) whose father he knew well, announces she is going to be married. To stop the ceremony, Douglae has his servant, a woman from a tropical island make a voodoo doll in the image of Laura. The doll seems to cast a spell when Laura and her fiances go to a justice of the peace - Laura becomes violently ill and cannot go thru with the marriage.

10/14/74 (R: 11/29/74) A SCAFFOLD FOR TWO - Lawyer Charles Farnsworth, his plane grounded on a remote island, is swamped with hospitality by Franklyn Bennett and his seemingly smotionally unbalanced children. One child, Mayetta, tells Farnsworth there's going to be a hanging - of her cousin Conrad - and invites the lawyer to watch it. Conrad, it seems, had been acquitted of murder by a mainland jury and now a group known as the Redressors of Injustice plans to give another "trial" and then hang him.

10/17/74 (R: 12/11/74) THE LAST ESCAPE - Because a middle-aged escape artist's trade no longer attracts large audiences. The Great Ferlini, 49, plans to have himself handcuffed, tied in a canvas bag and dumped in a trunk into the middle of a lake. Word of such a feat draws a crowd and provides an opportunity for his young wife - and her lover - to make sure The Great Ferlini gets head-

lines, not as an escape artist, but as a corpse.

10/21/74 (R: 12/13/74) MIND OVER WATTHEW - Watthew Parker, a 40-year-old bachelor, succumbs to the charms of Wildred Cavanagh, 20, and marries her. Mildred, he discovers, has a powerful succonscious mind, so powerful it cures warts on his hand and dispels all her own aches and pains. Then he learns that she has a numb area on her right arm and that it doesn't bleed when cut. Why, he wonders-unless she's a witch.

10/23/74 (R: 12/15/74) SEE NAPLES AND DIE - A U.S. Senator, about to be nominated for President, must decide which of his lives - public or private - is the most important. The defiant daupter of Sen, Henry C. Winstead announces her plans to marry Vittorio Tedesco, living in exile in Maples, Italy, after being cited for income tax invasion by one of the Senator's subcommittees.

Tedesco knows he can destroy the Senator's chances for the Presidential nomination if he goes thru with the marriage. His price: forget the tax rap and let him return to the U.S.

10/24/74 (R: 12/17/74) A CACE FOR AUGIE KARD - Am old and apparently half-insane convict gives fellow immate Augie Karo a vial of powder which, he claims, can put a man to sleep for several centuries - and thus prevent the police from mabbing him if he breaks out (i.e. it will provide a hideout for him). Augie doesn't believe a word of it until a chance to go free is suddenly and mysteriously arranged for him.

10/28/74 (R: 12/20/74) POSSESSED BY THE DEVIL - Michael Damon, son of a minister, is brought into a hospital emergency room with a depressed fracture of the skull that should have mangled his brain. But, according to an aging and slightly tipsy cleaning woman, a malign spirit, surrounded by a cloud of black smoke, jumped from another patient to Nike, who immediately becomes healthy again - or does he?

10/29/74 (R: 12/21/74 & 1/10/78) THE BLACK ROOM — A man forced to live in a locked and lightless room for days on end learns the secret of survival when all hope seems lost. The Man abducted by Mr. Zee and Mr. Kay is not really expected survive in The Black Room without light or diversions — all the others have died or gone insane. But for 26 days The Man survives, relying on a very small mouse with whom he shares his limited rations, and Mr. Zee must decide whether to release him so that he may share his secret with The Others.

10/31/74 (R: 12/22/74) THE DEMON SPIRIT - Based on S. Anski's classic play "The Dybbuk". A young and talented student of the Talmud turns to a secret body of occult doctrine, the Cabala, to conquer death itself. The student, Simon, returns from a successful search for a miracle worker who can evoke evil spirits to do his bidding only to be told that the hand of his bethrothed, Leah, has been given by her father, Sender, to a youth who will inherit great wealth. Simon resolves that the wedding will never take place - even if he must resort to the evil skills he learned from the miracle worker.

11/4/74 (R: 12/27/74) BURY ME AGAIN - A train wreck survivor plots to become the world's richest "dead" man. Jerry Horton, one of the few left alive in a horrible train wreck, switches wallets with a dead fellow passenger who had, before the tragedy, bragged about the value of his life insurance. After assuming the dead man's name, Jerry carefully instructs his wife, by phone, on how to collect the insurance, all \$150,000 of it. Everything goes well until the insurance company demands the dead man's body be exhumed.

11/6/74 (R: 12/28/74) TERROR ON THE HEATH - Convinced that he is the reincarnation of a 19th century killer, a man lives in fear of reverting to his former life. Intrigued by a book on famous 19th century killers, Dave Matson becomes convinced he's the reincarnation of one of them when he finds a daguerrotype which bears a striking resemblance to himself. Encouraged in his belief by Bob Ripple, an expert on the period, Matson fears he'll revert to subconsciously motivated criminal behavior. Matson's wife Jan asks Or. Beckwith, an authority on reincarnation and the occult, to conduct an experiment to disprove her husband's belief.

11/7/74 (R: 12/25/74) HOW EBERHARD WON HIS WINGS - A timid bankteller is so good to everyone that angel's wings start to
grow between his shoulder blades. Because of his wings,
Eberhard Edwards becomes the butt of so many jokes that his wife
vows to help him get rid of them. She decides he must commit at
least one of the seven deadly sins. He tries them all, but each
time fails to be sinful enough. Finally, they both agree that
He who gave them to him is the only one who can take them away.
11/11/74 (R: 12/29/74) WAVE OF TERROR - A Polynesian queen in Hammii

11/11/74 (R: 12/29/74) WAVE OF TERROR — A Polynesian queen in Hawaii forsees death and disaster if her son marries the daughter of a white plantation owner. Danny Makahini and Liz Bradley, who met while attending college on the mainland and plan to get married, return to their homes in Hawaii only to be told by their parents that such a union is unthinkable. Neither Danny's mother, Queen Lilliolani, nor Liz's father, a very wealthy and powerful plantation owner, believe in intermarriage. Queen Lilliolani forsees tragedy for all — even as she speaks a great tidal wave heads for the islands.

11/12/74 (R: 12/31/74) I MUST KILL EDNA - Murder is on the mind of a 40-year-old man who marries a 50-year-old woman for her money, then falls in love with an aspiring young actress. Soon after he marries a millionairess 10 years his senior, Chester Masefield falls in love with Sue Ellen Quackenbush, 23, whose aim is a career on the stage. Now Masefield has a young woman for excitement and romance and a mature woman for stability and financial

security. But it can't last - Sue Ellen won't stand for it.

11/14/74 (R: 1/3/75) THE 36th MAN - A very kind, very humble shopkeeper on New York City's Lower East Side is chosen as one of
36 saintly souls who will prevent the destruction of this sinful world. Shopkeeper Harry Cohen is looked upon with suspicion
when he announces the Lahmed Vovniks have chosen him to take the
place of their dying 36th member. Old Jewish legend says that

Sailing home from a vacation in the Caribbean, a New Jersey couple and their seven-year-old daughter, Susie, become fogbound, becalmed and lost in waters once infested by pirates. in the family mansion virtually as servants catering to his every demand. 11/21/74 (R: 1/18/75) THE DEATH WATCH - A game of poker and a pocket watch with chimes figure prominently in whether a man will live or die. Charles Fleming, betrothed to Claire Willoughby, learns that she has been given by her father, an inept gambler, to one Count Dravanescu in payment for a gambling debt. A card shark, Fleming challenges Dravanescu to a poker game, beats him and wine back Claire. But he also accepts a gold pocket watch that must be wound by 6:00 PM daily or its owner will die. Soon after, Fleming forgets to take the watch with him and realizes he can't get to it before 6:00 PM.

11/25/74 (R: 1/19/75) THE SIGHTING - A man from a flying saucer implants a tiny device in a earthwoman's brain so he can forever read and guide her thoughts. Sarah Hughes sights a flying saucer but is forbidden by her husband to mention it. The next day a man from the UFO, realizing Sarah is an understanding earthling, hypnotizes her and implants a tiny device in the base of her brain - with it he will be able to read and guide her thoughts from great distances, light years away. Her husband notices the change in Sarah immediately, but has no idea what to do - except to seek the advice of a psychiatrist.

11/26/74 (R: 1/21/75) COURTYARD OF DEATH - A story how Rasputin, the

11/26/74 (R: 1/21/75) COURTYARD OF DEATH — A story how Rasputin, the notorious Russian monk in the court of Nicholas II, defied the death plots of his many enemies. Rasputin, a monk of peasant ancestry with hypnotic powers that helped stem the dread "bleeding" disease from which the young heir to the throne of Nicholas II and Alexandra suffered, rouses the wrath of a doctor, the head of the secret police and the richest man in Russia because of his debauchery and alleged dealings with the German enemy. All three plot to kill him, but find, for reasons they don't understand, he

won't die easily.

11/28/74 (R: 1/25/75) THE AARON BURR MURDER CASE — A filmed recreation of the Aaron Burr-Alexander Hamilton duel becomes a real shooting when the actor cast as Hamilton dies. Director Maximillian Parradine is making a motion picture on location of the historical duel between Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr. After the shots are fired, George Rivers, cast as Hamilton, falls to the ground dead because Tony Bellows, portraying Burr, evidently did not fire the prop pistol, but a real one. Bellows swears his innocence and the policeman who finds the pistol believes him — inscribed on the weapon are the words, Aaron Burr.

12/2/74 (R: 2/12/75) THE DICE OF DOOM — An inveterate gambler always loses until he kills a man and the devil provides him with a new pair of dice. Aristocratic Rudolph Schroll, his country at war, buys a commission in the army, then kills his superior officer when ordered to lead a charge against an impenetrable enemy position. Saved from execution by a roll of the dice given him by someone he thinks is a priest, Rudi, always the gambler and too often a loser, finds the dice bringing him fame and fortune. But the priest — or is he the devil? — has no intention of allowing Budi a lifelence string of lumbur male.

But the priest - or is he the devil? - has no intention of allowing Rudi a lifelong string of lucky rolls.

12/4/74 (R: 1/29/75) A BRIDE FOR DEATH - A poet, visiting relatives in the country finds love - and tragedy - in a house nobody believes exists any more. Poet Eric Miller, horseback riding, comes upon a well-kept Victorian house in which young Julia Sandford, wearing clothes of the '20's lives. She invites him in, hoping he has news of her fiancee missing in action in World War I. Eric's relatives think he is dreaming because the house, now badly run-down, has been lived in for the past 50 years by a recluse who's "lost her marbles." Nevertheless, Eric continues seeing Julia - until her fiancee returns and acts like any

spurned lover.

12/5/74 (R: 2/1/75) THE BODY SNATCHERS — Robert Louis Stevenson's classic story of how a man, hoping to become a doctor, is doomed to a career of providing cadavers for other medical students. Told by a medical student that he can get an education as a doctor if he has a strong stomach and does what he is told, young Cameron Fergus finds himself involved in the procurement of cadavers for research. His job is to pay off the grave robbers and to make sure there is a constant supply, even if it means murder. Gulled and lulled into a life of crime, he can find no way out — except in alcohol.

12/9/74 (R: 2/2/75) THE FATAL CONNECTION — A young couple inherits an ancient empty New York City brownstone with an 1890's telephone that completely changes their lives. Hal and Norma Glenford move into the brownstone once owned by his robber baron great-grandfather. Only one room is furnished — in 1890's style, complete with telephone. In fun, Hal calls on the phone for a hansom cab. It arrives. Norma used the phone to ask that the whole house be decorated in 1890's style. Next day it is. But then comes a call from an associate of Hal's great-grandfather, warning that an angry client has threatened to kill him.

12/10/74 (R: 2/5/75) THE DAMNED THING - Based on a story by Ambrose Bierce in which a retired professor, living in the mountains, is killed - but nobody can agree on how it happened. Covered with a sheet, the body of Prof. Hugh Morgan lies cold and rigid on a hand-hewn table in the mountain cabin he built himself. His wife says he was shot, his mistress (an uneducated mountain girl) says he drowned, an Indian guide says he was snake-bit.

But a young newspaper reporter insists Morgan's death was caused by that "dammed thing."

12/12/74 (R: 2/8/75) IS THE LADY DEAD? — A millionaire businessman who never takes no for an answer refuses to accept the fact that his wife of two weeks is dead. Concerned only with piling up a fortune, millionaire Barney Kreuger has never married — until, while driving in England, he falls in love with Rachel, whose car he hits. Married just a week, the two return to the U.S. Seven days later Rachel is dead — for reasons unknown. A man who, in business, has never accepted no for an answer, Barney vows that Rachel will live again — even if it costs him his many millions.

12/16/74 (R: 2/9/75) STEPHANIE'S ROOM — The room in which she spent her childhood holds a strange attraction for the wife of a fast-rising executive who always puts his job first. After short stays in Chicago and Los Angeles, ad executive Tom Miller and his wife Stephanie move to New York where Tom is sure he'll make it big. A desire to visit the house in which she grew up sends Stephanie to surburban Crestwood. There the present owner's wife allows Stephanie to see her old room. She keeps returning -strangely, the room has more attraction for her than either her husband or

his career.

12/18/74 (R: 2/11/75) CHARITY IS NEVER DEAD - A hospital staff must decide if they have the right to deceive a dying woman in order to make her happy. Minutes after Mrs. Margaret Chandler meets her long-lost grand-daughter, Charity, in a department store, the building is destroyed by a boiler explosion. Mrs. Chardler's back is broken and she is also blinded. Charity suffers amenda. The hospital staff is uncertain whether Charity is really Charity and must decide whether she should be allowed to stay with the older woman as she dies.

12/19/74 (R: 2/15/75) THE HOUSE OF THE VOOCOO QUEEN - Doug and Helen Fenton leave New York to take possession of an old, beautifully located New Orleans mansion inherited from an uncle they never knew. But someone else apparently wants the house and seems intent on scaring the Fentons out. This month the old ARKANSAS TRAVELER, BOB BURNS, wends his merry way down memory lane. Born Robin Burns at Van Buren, Arkansas on August 2, 1896.

As a young man Burns drifted across his homestate gathering folk songs and tall tales which would later make him famous. A nimble musician, he played mandolin with The Silvertone Cornet Band in his home town.

One night while rehearsing in a local plumbers shop, Burns was inspired to create a new musical instrument by joining a few pieces of pipe along with a large funnel, to be played trombone-style. He called his new "bassy sounding" instrument - the BA-ZOO-KA - and it became his stock in trade.

Burns set out touring with carnivals and backwoods vaudeville troupes and gradually gained a name for himself in the world of comedy. In the mid 30's he made some appearances in films, but he had his heart set on a career in that highly popular entertainment medium called RADIO.

He headed for New York, determined to appear with RUDY VALLEE on his famous FLEISCHMANN HOUR that had launched so many radio careers.

Burns had a homey, country comedy delivery and the agency that booked talent for the Vallee program saw Burns as a possible competitor for WILL ROGERS who had his own show at the time. On Burns' first appearance with Vallee, he did a routine dealing with homey comments on the political scene, ala Will Rogers. The famous Oklahomian was killed in a plane crash shortly thereafter and Burns made some radical changes to his act - and went "hill-billy".

When Bing Crosby took over as permanent host of THE KRAFT MUSIC HALL he asked for a side-kick and Burns seemed like the ideal man for the job. Originally signed for twenty-six weeks - his stint stretched on to six years!

Several times Burns tried to get a show of his own, but it wasn't until 1941 that he picked up a willing sponsor, Campbell Soups.

On September 16, 1941, on CB5 Bob Burns' show, THE ARKANSAS TRAVELER made its debut. A program of folksy comedy and music. Vocalist Ginny Simms was heard frequently, as was character actress EDNA MAE OLIVER. Others who appeared regularly were ANN RUTHERFORD

and SHIRLEY ROSS.

Ouring the 1944-45 season the team of MANTAN MORELAND and BEN CARTER were featureed. Burns continued on the air through 1947. Various characters were introduced including a girlfriend, "Sharon O' Shaugh-nessy" played by the delightful ANN THOMAS.

Burns often carted out his musical invention the bazooka, and his audiences never seemed to grow tired of it.

During World War II, the Army developed a new weapon to lauch armour-piercing rockets and it was christened 'the bazooka'.




The Arkansas Traveler's journey ended on February 2, 1956 when Bob Burns passed away. He left many fond memories.



PART 5 - The Human Voice Is Transmitted

The spark transmitter used in wireless in 1900 sent out signal energy for less than one-thousandth of the time during which it was supplied with power. This inefficiency led PROFESSOR REGINALD FESSENDEN of the University of Pittsburgh, in 1902 to the continuous-wave system and to devise ways of radiating energy continuously instead of in short groups. Incorporated in his system was a high-speed alternator developed by a Swedish engineer at the General Electric Company, ERNST ALEXANDERSON.

Fessenden successfully superimposed the human voice on the continuous wave through the use of a microphone from a telephone and thereby "modulating" or varying the wave with the voice.

At this same time, in 1903, the Danish inventor VLADEMAR POULSEN designed an "arc" transmitter capable of generating continuous waves and carrying the human voice.

An improvement on receiving apparatus was necessary to receive signals carrying the voice. In 1902, Fessenden invented an "electrolytic detector" to replace Marconi's coherer detector.

The electrolytic detector was a small platinum wire, the tip of which came in contact with a weak solution of mitric acid. This became the forerunner of the "crystal" detector in rectifying the incoming high frequency signals to low frequencies which could be heard in headphones and produce audible sounds of speech.

The "cat whisker" wire came in contact with a mineral such as galena, silicon, or carborundum...but we'll talk about crystal sets later in the series and find that they were quickly replaced by the electron tube, whose history we'll also trace.

Getting back to basics, Poulsen's electric arc transmitting system was to be proven impractical, and in 1906, Fessenden's system made wireless history on Christmas Eve, from a "radiotelephone" station on Brant Rock, Massachusetts. Ships as far away as the Virginia coast heard Fessenden "broadcast" a violin solo played by himself, the reading of verses from the Bible, and a phonograph recording of the singing of Handel's Largo. Fessenden signed off with a wish for a Merry Christmas and the promise to broadcast again on New Year's Eve. He did so, and throughout the New Year numerous developments critical to the establishment of "broadcasting" took place.

The use of wireless to broadcast music and speech was proven beyond a doubt...and on January 18, 1907, Dr. LEE deFOREST was granted a patent on the audion. This was to be broadcasting's Aladdin Lamp.



THE USE OF LOUDSPEAKERS

The operation of a loudspeaker may be divided into

two steps:
(1) The loudspeaker receives electrical energy from the radio set, and by means of a system of electromagnets, converts this into mechanical energy, causing a diaphragm or cone to vibrate.

This diaphragm, or cone, sends out sound waves into the air, which finally reach the ear. The more violent the air disturbance the speaker sets up, the louder
