Hello, out there in Radioland!

IF YOU'VE SEEN THOSE TV COMMERCIALS for property in Sunny Somewhere, you'll be amused to know that the very first commercial on radio was for real estate! Back on Aug. 28, 1922, the Queensboro Realty Company purchased 10 minutes of time on WEAJ, the experimental station of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., New York. The sponsor spent \$100 to tell of the advantages of living in Hawthorne Court, a dwelling in Jackson Heights.

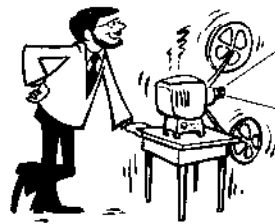

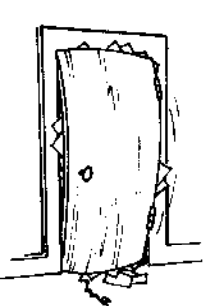
SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 22nd

We pay tribute to Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll, creators of radio's all-time favorites in a program devoted to their special talents and featuring some Amos 'n' Andy milestone broadcasts including their first half hour program from October 8, 1943; their 25th anniversary broadcast from Feb. 14, 1954; and the final Amos 'n' Andy show, the Music Hall program from November of 1960.

The all-star, spectacular tribute to Glenn Miller continues with on-the-air appearances by Benny Goodman, Milton Berle, Marion Hutton, Joe Besser, Johnny Johnston, the Goodman Sextet, Ed Sullivan, Fred Waring, Allan Jones, Guy Lombardo, Lloyd Nolan, Eddie Cantor, Diana Lynn, Brian Ahearn, Bill "Bojangles" Robinson, Kate Smith, and others. This is truly a spectacular program, presented some six-months after Miller disappeared.

The Barbour family was an institution during the good old days of radio and the characters created by Carlton E. Morse continue to bring joy to radio listeners even though the last chapter of the last book was presented on May 8, 1959.

The first One Man's Family program was heard on April 29, 1932 on only three N.B.C. stations in San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Seattle. Within a few weeks, N.B.C. added the other stations in its West Coast network to the list and on May 17, 1933 the series was heard on the full network, coast-to-coast.

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Barbour arrived in San Francisco (from Bulleton, Ohio) on May 7, 1879. They brought with them a twelve-year-old son (Henry) and a seven-year-old daughter named Isabel.

In 1893, the young Henry Barbour attended a Garden Party at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco. There he met a lovely young lady named Fanny. Three years later, on the tenth of May, Henry and Fanny were married. A year from their marriage, a son was born; they named him Paul. And then in 1900, Hazel Barbour was brought into the world. Twelve years passed for Henry and Fanny before two important events occurred. In 1912, Henry founded the Henry Barbour Stock Brokerage House and Fanny brought forth the twins Claudia and Clifford. A fifth child was born to the Barbour parents in 1917 when Jack arrived on the scene. Thusly was the Barbour family established.

Paul Barbour fought in World War One where he met and married Elaine Hunter, an American Army Nurse in 1918. A week after their wedding, Paul's plane was shot down in France. A short while later, Elaine died from the results of a flu epidemic without ever seeing Paul again or meeting Henry and Fanny Barbour. Paul returned from Europe with a slight limp and something approaching an anti-war attitude.

In 1931, Claudia married John Roberts (who subsequently died two years later) and gave birth to a daughter, Joan, in May of 1933. Claudia remained single until 1935 when she met and married an Englishman named Captain Nicholas Lacey. In 1938, Nicky and Claudia had a baby girl who they named Penelope. Two years later, Nicky Junior was born.

Hazel Barbour married William Herbert in 1932. They had twin sons (Hank and Pinky) a year later; a daughter (Margaret) was born in 1936. Hazel's husband died in 1940. Hazel later remarried a man named Dan Murray in 1945. Although Hazel's elder brother Paul never remarried, he did adopt a little girl named Teddy Lawton.

Clifford Barbour married Ann Waite in 1937 but she died after giving birth to a son in 1938. Clifford named his little boy Andrew. In 1942, Clifford married Irene Franklin who was subsequently killed in a car accident in 1946. Clifford remained single until after he moved to Scotland where he remained happily married to his new wife Mary.

Jack Barbour, the youngest son, married Betty Carter in

1936. The first of their six off-spring was born in 1942. A second daughter followed in 1943 and a third arrived during 1944. During 1948, Jack and Betty were blessed with triplets.

Father Barbour retired from his brokerage house in 1938. His remaining years were spent helping to raise his grandchildren and helping his own children whenever possible.

World War Two brought sadness to the Barbours. Claudia and Nicky were passengers with their two first-born children on a Scandinavian ship when the Germans torpedoed it in 1943. Enroute to a concentration camp, Nicky Junior died. Nicholas, Claudia, and Penelope weren't released and reunited until late in 1945.

A complete Barbour family tree, including the names of all the actors and actresses who portrayed the characters on the show may be found in an excellent radio reference book, "The Big Broadcast (1920-1950)" by Frank Buxton and Bill Owen. It's published by Avon and is available in paperback for \$3.95.

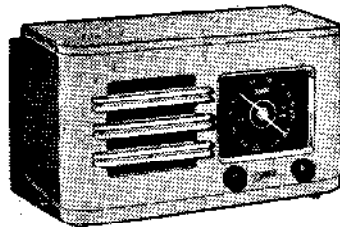

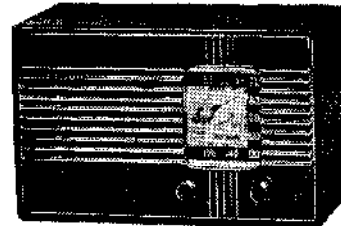

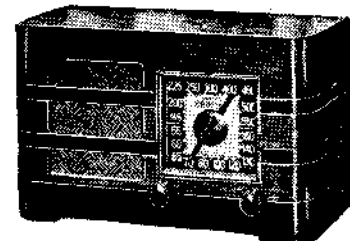
