We'll have one central telephone number where you can reach us before, during or after our various programs. If you want to participate on the air or if you wish to call for information or just to chat about the things we enjoy together, just give us a call. The number will be announced on the air in September and we'll publish it in the NEWSLETTER next month.





After finishing six weeks of classic comedy, the Memory Club is set for September with another mini-series. It's a musical month from Warner Brothers, plus a special month-end feature from the Hollywood studio whose name is synonymous with the highest quality in musical entertainment: Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer.

The Warner Brothers' Studio was famous in the thirties for its street films and gangster pictures, filled with low characters and hightension situations. Warners liked to keep their stock company of actors busy, and in addition to the city dramas, they produced a flock of "low-life" comedies in the early part of the decade. Frequently, these brief and impertinent comic features starred the young James Cagney, who had made a great impact on audiences in PUBLIC ENEMY. Cagney's energetic mannerisms and distinctive voice were ideal for playing the cocky, self-assured sharple who thumbs his nose at the Establishment and gets away with it. HARD TO HANDLE (1933) is one of the best of the "low-life" comedies, directed by Mervyn LeRoy. who also gave us the classic LITTLE CAESAR and GOLD DIGGERS OF 1933.

If, after seeing HARD TO HANDLE, you'd like to see how LeRoy handles a musical, drop by the Memory Club again for PAGE MISS GLORY (1935). The leading lady in this amusing spoof of beauty pageants is Mary Astor, who was to skyrocket to infamy with her performance of the wicked woman in THE MALTESE FALCON, Pat O'Brien heads up this cast, taking time off from his co-starring roles with fellow Irishman Cagney (this same year, Cagney and O'Brien made a picture for Warners called THE IRISH IN US). Romantic chores are handled with boyish finesse by Dick Powell.

A marvelous link to the next paragraph is therefore provided, as Dick Powell is also the star of STAGE STRUCK (1936), one of those engaging Warners backstage musicals with the plot you know and love so well. The picture was directed by the innovative choreographer Busby Berkeley, the man who taught the camera how to dance. Since Berkeley invented this type of movie, you can rest assured that STAGE STRUCK's musical numbers will be in the dezzing tradition of his classics 42ND STREET and FOOTLIGHT PARADE. (Purists will insist that Lloyd Bacon directed the latter two pictures, but who watches the Warners musicals to follow the story?) Joan Blondell, gold-digger par excellance, is Powell's musical partner in this extravaganza.

Wrapping up the month of September is an M-G-M feature starring one of the most popular musical teams of the thirties: Jeanette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy. They first appeared together in NAUGHTY MARIETTA; and M-G-M, finding the combination lucrative, built a series of costume love-musicals around the duo. The pictures had interchangable plots, but boasted of distinctive and distinguished music. MAYTIME (1937) may well be the finest of the series, with Jeanette as a retired operatic singer relating the story of her love affair with Nelson Eddy. The major flaw of the MacDonald-Eddy pictures was Nelson Eddy's rather wooden screen presence, but under Robert Leonard's direction, he turns in a credible performance. Still, the actor to watch in MAYTIME is the incomparable John Barrymore, as Jeanette's manager. He steals every scene; it's a joy to watch him work, MAYTIME, based on the Sigmund Rohmberg stage musical, includes the classic "Sweethearts" in the score,

Caroll Naish, Alan Reed HEN the clock strikes twelve noon in Chicago, it's the bewitching hour for countless youngsters—and their grateful parents. Why? Because that's when master enchanter Uncle Johnny Coons takes over at Station WNBQ with his wonderful, walloping Noontime Comics. With a grin and a wink, Uncle Johnny sets in motion a gala session that has small fry doing backflips and shouting with joy. And, wherever he goes, Uncle Johnny's antics get amazing results. Recently, for example, when 1500 youngsters and their parents jammed Chicago's Eighth Street Theater, Uncle Johnny kept order single-handedly, and at the same time autographed 1500 pictures, handed out 1500 colorful pennants and dispensed cheer. At one point, however, a three-year-old miss, unmoved by her mother's comforting, kept wailing, "I wanna go home." Finally, Uncle Johnny, in his own magical way, whispered in her ear—and a rainbow smile replaced her torrent of tears. What he said, however, is still a secret between Uncle Johnny and his devoted little fan.

Grownups are usually at a loss in trying to explain Johnny's magic charm. To them, his program—which features old-time, silent comedies along with Johnny's narration and jolly humor, his funny hats and candy-coated chuckle-is amusing and entertaining, but hardly cause for the adoration he receives. Perhaps the biggest reason why Johnny captures the little ones' hearts is because they think of him as a playmate instead of an entertainer. For instance, on the show, he eats his lunch right along with them, and he always talks with them-never down to them. And his bulging mailbag proves this. In pour jellystained notes with sinudgy scrawls—from all over Illinois and parts of Indiana and Wisconsin—saying, "I love you very much. Please keep your show on forever and ever." Parents, too, write their praises, many of them stating, "The only time my child sits still is when he watches your show.

The remarkable young man under the funny hats was born John David Coons, Jr., in Lebanon, Indiana. His first and only ambition was to be an actor, but his parents wanted him to study medicine as had his father and two brothers. Johnny, however, knew what he wanted and, he determined, if he was going to keep people in stitches, it would be from laughing—not operating. So, during high school, Johnny hired himself out to clubs and schools as an amateur magician. After attending the Alviene Dramatic School in New York, he played the Midwest with a magic show, landed a role in the Broadway play, "Bright Honor," then toured with the road company of "Dead End." Next came minor movie roles. While in Hollywood, Johnny happened to attend a radio show. Minutes before the show was to start, an appeal was made to the audience for someone who could step in for the missing lead character. Johnny volunteered—and kept the part.

Returning to the Midwest, Johnsy continued to work in radio. He had his own show, in which he played the part of an Indiana sage called Abe Martin. This led to many good roles in daytime serials such as Ma Perkins, The Road Of Life and The Guiding Light. Then, in 1948, when television began to hit its stride in Chicago, Johnny was ready and waiting for a show of his own. First he had a cartoon and chatter show, next a puppet show, then, big-

gest and best of all, came Noontime Comics.

The vivid imagination Johnny displays on his show overflows into his private life, which is taken up with his comfortable home in Wilmette, and his family—wife Tasma, a former nurse; and sons Ricky, 8, and Tommy, 4. The Coons household sports an extensive model railroad which Johnny operates with the help of Ricky and Tommy. Comes summer, however, and the trains are abandoned for fishing trips. Quite naturally, Ricky and Tommy are two of Uncle Johnny's most ardent fans. But, although they watch him regularly with great approval, they refrain from boasting about their dad. Instead, that pleasure is reserved for Uncle Johnny's TV nephews and nieces who love him so dearly and wholeheartedly.

#### Hit Musical at Blackstone
