Television vs. Vaudeville

ONCE the backbone of America's entertainment industry, vaudeville is making a comeback and Television may be the scapegoat. With regret, Chicago TV critics note the opening of an eastern seaboard show patterned after the productions of New York's Palace Theater. Jugglers, tight-wire artists, impersonators, magicians, called in from all quarters of the globe, will join in an hour-long show, headed by Milton Berle.

Chicago is not worried about Berle holding up his end of the show. They remember him for the wonderful job he accomplished here only recently in raising funds for research on heart diseases. They are worried about the revival of vaudeville in relation to television.

Television, most Chicagoans feel, can best serve this large metropolitan region by showing more dramas, better dramas, more forums and educational features, if stations are seeking larger and more satisfied audiences.

When "Your Right to Say It" was recently televised, thousands of Chicago and suburban video fans acclaimed the move. This summer, hundreds of prospective buyers viewing the TV coverage of the Republican and Democratic presidential conventions, will spur the sales of receivers here.

They are looking to television as a medium for even better shows than radio is producing. With malice toward none in the vaudeville profession, TV fans feel the old-time acts are best on stage, not on a telescreen.

Two years ago poorly directed TV

shows could be excused, stations were in the experimental stage, budgets low, personnel hard to get. Today, TV is one of the most important things in Chicago and will continue to move ahead only if treated properly.

With television spearheading its electrical appeal to the public, the first national TV show will be held at the Chicago Coliseum September 18 through September 26, under the sponsorship of the Electric Association, comprising over 600 leading companies of the industry.

Already three Chicago television outlets, including WBKB and WGN-TV, both already in operation, as well as WENR-TV, who expect to be in operation in September, have agreed to originate many of their video programs right from the show's specially constructed stage studio.

In addition to the televising of the programs, it is planned to pick up many of the exhibits for Chicago's TV audience which is multiplying in rapid strides.

CUBS PLAY SUNDAY

Sunday the Chicago Cubs wind up a two day encounter with Brooklyn, to be televised from Wrigley Field by WBKB and WGN-TV. The Cubs next appear on television June 29 when they play St. Louis.

THIS MONTH WE BEGIN BY QUASHING A RUMOR that seems to have sprung up surrounding the sequel Universal Pictures is planning as a follow-up to its current and immensely successful shark-suspense thriller. Contrary to popular expectations, ESTHER WILLIAMS is not returning to the screen to star in MILLION DOLLAR JAWS. But Esther is appearing this month at the MEMORY CLUB, in Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's 1953 Technicolor production, EASY TO LOVE. Van Johnson appears opposite Miss Williams for the fifth time in this lavish musical production, and his competition is provided by Tony Martin, with Carroll Baker lending support.

Esther Williams, unlike many of Hollywood's glamour girls of the forties, did not seek a career in motion pictures. Born in a suburb of Los Angeles in 1921, her first job at the age of eight was counting towels at the neighborhood school swimming pool in exchange for free swimming privileges. Swimming was little Esther's all-consuming interest; after she attended the 1932 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, she decided that she wanted to be a member of the Olympic swimming team. She won several local swim championships, including the Pacific Coast Championship, which earned her a place in the 1940 Olympics to be held in Finland.

Unfortunately for Esther, World War II caused the cancellation of the 1940 Olympic Games. She enrolled at the University of Southern California for a time, then quit school to take a job at the I. Magnin Department Store as a stock clerk and part-time model. Show-business promoter **Billy Rose** saw her there, with the result that Esther received a co-starring role with **Johnny Weismuller** in Rose's San Francisco *Aquacade*.

MGM executives, ever on the hunt for new talent, saw Esther at the Aquacade and offered her a screen test, thinking she would be marvelous in competition with Sonja Henie's ice escapades at 20th Century-Fox. But Esther turned them down, and quit the Aquacade to marry her college sweetheart.

MGM was not one to give up easily, however, and Esther was signed to a contract in October of 1941. Her first role was to have been a straight lead opposite

T seems almost as if you listeners really owned and operated WLS all these years. Take back in 1933. One of you sent in a check about Christmas time and said "Take some Christmas cheer to children." So we did-and by 1935, were calling it "Christmas Neighbors Club" buying radios for children's wards in hospitals everywhere. Even had one delivered by dogsled in Alaska, as we recall it. And since then, every December, you listeners send your donations so we can go shopping for things children's hospitals, orphanages and children's wards need. Seems like you sent in over \$247,000 during the thirteen years of the Christmas Neighbors Club. . . .

And that's just about the way it was with "Little Brown Church of the Air." They'd had those terrible tornadoes in Southern Illinois and Indiana, and in those days (1925 it was) there wasn't so much of Red Cross disaster funds and the like. Almost before we got around to asking, you began sending in checks, urging us to help those folks in the tornadostricken areas. And we got to broadcasting about it and before we quit. you'd sent in \$216,000 which still stands as the most money ever contributed to a single cause through a single radio station anywhere-be-

cause that's the kind of folks you are. And do you remember, we thought it proper to have a religious program to thank you for your donations and to tell about the work that had been done. And you liked that program so well, you asked us to continue it and so Samuel R. Guard started "The Little Brown Church" that Dr. Holland now conducts every Sunday.

. . . Let's see, it must have been 1934, the second year of the great Chicago World's Fair, when Homer Griffith, "The Friendly Philosopher," thought we ought to take a few needy youngsters from a Chicago tenement district to see the World's Fair. We got on the air-and you listeners thought we ought to take all of them. The Cook County Bureau of Public Welfare asked us to take about 10,000 kids to the Fair. We put the problem up to you listeners . . . you sent in over \$3,000, a number of companies gave candy and other needed items . . . and we wound up taking 9,177 youngsters to the Fair, all because you thought we ought to . . .

AND it was in May, 1934, that the \$10,000,000 Chicago Stock Yards fire almost caught our veteran market man, Jim Poole—and did burn his office. We got on the air in a hurry, broadcast direct from the scene, and scotched the rumor that the big packing houses had been destroyed. Jim began broadcasting from the stock yards in 1925. You listeners liked him so well and said so in countless letters, that he became nationally famous as the Dean of Live Stock Market broadcasters—and continued until he retired in 1943.

And so many other folks that you listeners loved and told us so in your letters. Like Rube Tronson with his

Texas Cowboys, who entertained over WLS and drove all around the countryside in a great big car to play for your entertainments everywhere. Red Blanchard, just a bright-eyed youngster then, was one of those "Texas Cowboys." Remember how you took to Lulu Belle right from the start. when she started on WLS in 1932, without ever a minute of previous radio experience?

You listeners were the reason the National Barn Dance stayed on. Lots of folks thought it was a little too undignified. But when Sam Guard, director of the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, saw your letters . . . the Barn Dance quickly became an established WLS program. And again in 1932, you had taken up all the tickets for six months in advance for the studio broadcast . . . and so we had to move to the Eighth Street Theater to accommodate you. Your requests for pictures of talent became so numerous in 1930 that we decided to get out the first "Family Album" to answer this need. Remember how, in those days, the Family Album had a middle section devoted to a complete "Index of Stations by Call Letters and by Kilocycles"?

IT was only natural in 1932, when World's Fair folks wanted a yoke of oxen to take part in the groundbreaking for the Agricultural Building, that we asked you listeners for help. And in a few days time, you had located and offered us, not one but forty yokes of oxen. Remember how you used to send in your requests for the Little German Band that Oscar Tengblad directed and how you sent in old German tunes to supplement the stock we had gotten from across the ocean? That must have been about the same time that Hal O'Halloran got famous for always being ready to sing "Asleep in the Deep" anytime a program broke down and we needed a quick fill-in.

Hal, along with Jack Holden, Check Stafford and the Georgia Wildcats, all went up in a plane in May, 1933. to "scoop" Chicago with an overhead broadcast of the colorful opening of the World's Fair. You liked that, you told us.

DUKE ELLINGTON has signed a contract with Musicraft and will begin recording for his new company in September, upon expiration of his contract with Victor... BUDDY RICH and his ork are recording for Mercury...

Benny Goodman's ART LUND is stopping every Beegee stage show. His singing is okay and his build is terrific. He was an All-American and a boxing champ in college . . . Neatest stunt of the year was that worked by WOODY HERMAN's publicist. He staged a contest—the winner gets Woody's whole band for an entire evening, to play wherever he wants it to! . . .

VAUGHN MONROE has bought that airplane and the model's a honey. He's waiting for delivery. Incidentally the quartet (discovered by this scribbler) with Vaughn's band has expanded to a quintet. MARY LEE, ex of the Norton Sisters and the Lee Sisters, has joined them. They're known as THE MOON MAIDS...TEDDY WALTERS, once the "assistant Sinatra" on the "Hit Patade" (hired to stand by in case Frank got ill at air time), is recording for ARA, H'wood disc firm.

AT THE END OF WORLD WAR II, GLENN MILLER'S MUSIC was still very popular and very much in demand, although Major Miller had disappeared over the English Channel almost one year earlier. Reissued recordings and broadcasts by civilian and AEF Band alumni on the reactivated NBC "I Sustain The Wings" series helped to meet part of the demand. But the fans also demanded personal appearances, so for this reason the Glenn Miller estate decided to carry on with Glenn's postwar plans: to continue the band on a permanent basis.

In January, 1946, the band made its debut with Tex Beneke as leader. Beneke was a logical choice, since he was Glenn's star sideman from civilian band days. The band, as the civilian band, had a high caliber of musicianship, which can be attributed to the high caliber of musicians, several who had previously played with Glenn. The band also had many good arrangements from arrangers such as Jerry Gray, Bill Finegan, Norm Leyden and a young Henry Mancini.

The band stayed together for four years, but ties between Tex and the Miller estate were severed for the main reason that Tex and several of the arrangers wanted to update the Miller style, something they believed that Glenn would have done.

In 1956, due to the success of the movie *The Glenn Miller Story* the band was reorganized once again, although **Ray McKinley** was the new leader. Ray had played with Glenn as early as 1932, when they were both sidemen with **Smith Ballew**, and had also been in the AEF band. This band, too, was a swinging outfit, featuring good musicians and McKinley's imaginative drumming.

December, 1966, saw Ray leaving the band and clarinetist Buddy DeFranco taking over. Buddy played with the Tommy Dorsey and Charlie Barnet bands of the 1940's. It was at this point that DeFranco tried to modernize the band, an experiment that didn't work too well.

At the beginning of 1974, DeFranco left, turning the band over to "Peanuts" Hucko who, after a few months, turned the band over to trombonist Buddy Morrow famous for his recording of "Night Train."

This was not the latest change in leadership. In March of this year, Morrow left for personal reasons and turned the leadership over to another trombonist, **Jimmy Henderson**. Jimmy has played with the **Hal McIntyre** and **Dorsey Brothers** bands and has led his own band for 20 years in the Los Angeles area.

36 YEARS AGO THIS MONTH: Harry James was at Chicago's now-defunct Hotel Sherman in The Panther Room; Benny Goodman in New York's Waldorf Astoria; Glenn Miller on a road tour; and Artie Shaw at the Cafe Rouge of New York's Hotel Pennsylvania (the next October Shaw was on the west coast with his "Frenesi" band and Miller was at the Cafe Rouge).

October, 1939, also found Charlie Barnet at the Los Angeles Palomar Ballroom. On October 3, he broadcast over CBS from the Palomar, and the next night, while the band was playing, the ballroom burned to the ground, destroying the band's musical instruments and a good part of the arrangements. (Just a few days after this incident, Charlie and the band recorded "Are We Burnt Up" to commemorate the incident!)

HERBERT MORRISON and Charles
Nehlsen thought they were going
on a routine broadcast when they flew
to Lakehurst. N. J., to record a description of the Hindenburg's arrival.
Then saw it burst into flames and
made one of radio's best-known
broadcasts—flew the record home for
airing on Dinner Bell the next noon
—and within 48 hours, heard their
record played on 125 NBC stations.

That was a year after the most severe winter on record—the winter of '36—when storm and blizzard warnings came almost every day and when our warnings kept many a school child safe at home.

You helped us stage the first Illinois statewide Rural Sports Festival in 1936, too—you as listeners, 25,000 of you in person, and all the farm organizations in the state, too.

You helped us dedicate our new 50,000-watt transmitter in Tinley Park, in 1938, the same year Ervin Lewis came as newscaster and Don Kelley as our first sportscaster.

REMEMBER how you turned out for our picnic at Noblesville, Ind., in 1939? 65,000 of you. That was the year we broadcast from a one-man submarine trying to cross Lake Michigan under water-and that same year, we furnished talent (Reggie Cross and Howard Black) and engineer Tommy Rowe to help Zenith's first television broadcast, using modern electronic methods. The pictures were received 18 miles away. And that same year, you sent us feathers from 41 states to stuff a pillow that was given away as a prize on "Smilea-While."



Let's see—it must have been in September, 1937, that the opening of Chicago schools was delayed by an infantile paralysis epidemic. Our facilities were offered to the Chicago Board of Education and three or four fifteen-minute programs a day were put on by teachers to help the pupils get a start at home while waiting for the schools to open. That same year, we started "School Time," which has developed and grown ever since.

And then it was wartime—we lost a lot of folks to the services—and two favorites, Aunt Em Lanning and Henry Burr, went to their reward. And you wanted us to find out about your boys, so our microphones started traveling—Great Lakes—Camp Forrest, Tennessee—Camp Grant—Scott Field—Fort Custer—Chanute Field. Arthur Starnes parachute jump from 30,800 feet, with Jack Stilwill at the mike.

"Meet Your Navy" getting under way. On the air at 3 a.m. with "Bunkhouse Jamboree." Leaving the Eighth Street Theater to the Army and moving the old National Barn Dance over to the Civic Theater.

Every time we look backward—whether it's to 1924 or the thirties or the forties—you listeners are there helping, telling us what to do and how to do it. Looking backward or forward—you're a mighty fine lot of people . . and it's been a real privilege to enjoy this first twenty-five years of broadcasting service with your help and counsel.

Clark Gable in SOMEWHERE I'LL FIND YOU. Most contract starlets would have given their right eyelash to play opposite Gable, but Esther maintained that she was a swimmer, not an actress. The role went to Lana Turner.

Esther made her first screen appearance in ANDY HARDY'S DOUBLE LIFE (1942). Not only did she get to swim, but she received her first screen kiss from all-American boy Mickey Rooney. After a large-scale publicity buildup, during which she became one of the G.I.'s favorite pin-up girls, Esther's career was launched in a series of lavish color productions which featured big-name guest stars and carefully choreographed underwater ballets, including BATHING BEAUTY (1944), ZIEGFELD FOLLIES (1946), EASY TO WED (1946), and NEPTUNE'S DAUGHTER (1949). The turn of the decade marked a decline of budget and producer's interest in the splashy spectaculars, but only temporarily, since Esther's swimming talents up to 1949 had lead her to surface as number eight on the exhibitors' list of top box-office stars. The MEMORY CLÜB'S selection, EASY TO LOVE, scheduled for Saturday, October 25th, comes at the peak of the second cycle of Esther's aquatic extravaganzas. EASY TO LOVE was shot on location in Cypress Gardens, Florida; the climax features a smiling, glittering Esther Williams leading one hundred water skiers over the waves.

In 1955, after the disappointing returns of JUPITER'S DARLING, MGM released Esther from her contract. She free-lanced at other studios for a couple of years, making only four films after leaving MGM. The most recent was THE MAGIC FOUNTAIN (1961), produced in Mexico. Since then she has appeared in several television specials, married her one-time leading man Fernando Lamas, and lived comfortably on the earnings from her own swimming pool company. Her 18 underwater escapades at MGM brought the studio over \$80 million in rentals, and a great deal of pleasure to audiences everywhere. For a star who, in her own words, "Can't act, can't sing, can't dance," she has left a motion picture legacy she can take pride in. And yes, at 54, she still swims.


