

■ Every once in a while, a rumor starts floating around to the effect that Jimmy Durante is slipping. Perhaps he's been given only a comic relief role in a movie, or his Hooper descends a trifle, or his activities are confined to wayside benefits. At that point, gloomy critics predict that, after all his years at the top, Jimmy is heading for collapse. Then suddenly, as in 1943, the public remembers how much it likes Jimmy. His nightclub is jammed, his radio audience soars, he gets top billing in a film, and, before you know it, magazine writers begin to make much of Jimmy's magnificent comeback. All kinds of explanations have been advanced for Durante's perpetual popularity. One eminent psychologist devoted a study to it and came up with the conclusion that Jimmy does what the common man wants to do but hasn't the nerve to-such questionable activities as massacring the English language, insulting the management of a restaurant, tormenting stuffy old ladies in evening clothes. The real reason, we think, is that Jimmy is a perfectionist and an artist, a master of timing, and an entertainer who knows exactly what he's doing, whether it's bursting into song or springing a line like "Surrounded by assassins" or "Don't raise the bridge boys, lower the river." After 32 years Durante is still, in his own words, "raising Cain from Portland, Maine, to San Diego."



DURING A RECENT talk-show appearance, comedian BOB HOPE dropped the hint that BING CROSBY and DOROTHY LAMOUR may be joining him on yet another ROAD picture! A script is currently being prepared, and if the effervescent 72-year-old comedian can talk the easy-going 74-year-old crooner out of retirement, we may well see THE ROAD TO TOMORROW!

Dorothy Lamour, a comparative spring chicken at 61, is enthusiastic about the project; and Crosby's retirement is only a put-on since he recently cut an album in England with Fred Astaire, and his current single, "That's What Life is All About," proves conclusively that his voice has lost none of its melted-sugar appeal.

THE ROAD TO TOMORROW would be the eighth in the series of knock-about comedies that the trio made for Paramount and United Artists over a period beginning in 1940. (We'll list all the titles for you momentarily... in the meantime, pause for a moment. Can you name all seven Roads?)

Paramount Pictures were kicking a musical script around called THE ROAD TO MANDALAY. The picture was to have been a vehicle for the comedy team of Burns and Allen, but a scheduling conflict arose. The studio then sought Fred MacMurray and Jack Oakie to play the leads, but they, too, had other commitments. Third choice were Bing Crosby and brash newcomer Bob Hope, who was beginning to make a career out of being second choice for movie roles: his first part in a feature film, THE BIG BROADCAST OF 1938, was originally intended for Jack Benny.

Crosby and Hope took the picture by the neck and rode it wildly to its conclusion, driving the crew into hysterics and frazzled straight musical director Victor Schertzinger to distraction. Their free-wheeling performances led to six sequels and a phenomenal \$50 million in box-office receipts around the world. The title, ROAD TO MANDALAY, was changed by Paramount execs to ROAD TO SINGAPORE, obstensively because the latter seemed more sinister. Appropriately for the spirit of the picture, the plot took place in neither location, but on the fictional island of Kygoon.

ROAD TO ZANZIBAR was an immediate follow-up in 1941, and plot and serious romance (which had dared to rear their heads, albeit briefly, in SINGAPORE) were abandoned in favor of the spontaneous comedy Crosby and Hope pulled off so well. Billing was changed to reflect this attitude: whereas ROAD TO SINGAPORE had starred Bing Crosby, Dorothy Lamour, and Bob Hope, ROAD TO ZANZIBAR starred Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, and Dorothy Lamour. Una Merkel joined the cast as Dottie's buddy, and the two dames from Brooklyn took the ex-carnival performers for a ride in the jungles of Africa.

The trio continued to be chased by anguished natives and angry gangsters down THE ROAD TO MOROCCO (1942, with Anthony Quinn as a desert prince); THE ROAD TO UTOPIA (1945, really Alaska, with Douglas Dumbrille at his slimy best. The picture grossed a domestic \$4.5 million); THE ROAD TO RIO (1948, with Gale Sondegaard and the Andrews Sisters, capitalizing on the recording success they had with Crosby); THE ROAD TO BALI (1953, the only Road picture made in color); and finally THE ROAD TO HONG KONG (1962, with Joan Collins replacing Dorothy Lamour as the romantic lead, Dottie appeared as herself and sang a song during the picture's frenetic chase scene).

Bob and Bing and Dottie seem to enjoy each other's company so much that even if they just stood in front of an empty screen, **THE ROAD TO TOMORROW** would probably be as funny as much of the current crop of comedy film fare. As Hope maintains, the fun they have making the pictures rubs off on us as we watch these jovial journeys into hilarity.

# Forever Snooks

## FANNY BRICE'S TERRIBLE TOT THUMBS NOSE AT 25 BIRTHDAYS

when she whines "Wh-h-hy, Daaddy?" over your radio she may sound like a seven-year-old, but Baby Snooks is really a big girl. This year Fanny Brice's terrible tot celebrates her twenty-fifth anniversary. But as far as radio listeners are concerned, she'll remain seven for a long time to come.

Baby Snooks was born way back in 1921 and the birth was pretty much of an accident. Fanny went to a party following her vaudeville stint at New York's famed Palace Theatre. During the course of the party, Fanny was called on for a song. She went to the piano and asked the pianist to play the them popular "Perils of Pauline." As she started to sing, she suddenly switched her voice to that of a small girl.

"I'd wanted to try that voice out for a long time, but my agent said it wouldn't do for a professional routine," Fanny explained.

But the guests felt otherwise. After Fanny finished, the crowd applauded long and loudly, demanding more. The next day during the matinee performance at the Palace, Fanny waited until her last song to do a number a la Baby Snooks. The audience went wild.

"That was the birth of Snooks," Fanny explained. "She was six years old when she was born and has advanced

only one year since."

Fanny didn't take her theatrical offspring seriously at first. "At first I kidded the part," she recalled, "making a burlesque of the character, but all the time I knew that wasn't right—not what I meant to do. In the back of my mind I nursed it along—even watched kids for ideas,"

Even though Fanny grew up on New York's crowded East Side, she never got a chance at a real childhood. As she put it, "East Side New Yorkers grow up pretty fast." Since Fanny started out

to get a job on the stage when she was 14 years old, she felt she had missed something from her childhood. For years she would stop when she saw a group of children playing and listen to their conversation. She was curious

as to what normal children talked about.

"Now I do take Baby Snooks seriously," Miss Brice admitted. "I have a great sympathy for the little tyke and I try to do her so other people will see she isn't just a pest. I consider Snooks a real child. There are things she must never say or do. She is a precocious and often naughty child, but never in bad taste, and she never wanders too far from reality."

Snooks became the delight of several editions of the "Ziegfeld Follies" but it was not until 1938 that the American public could generally enjoy the hoyden-

ish character. She became a headline on "Good News of 1938," one of that season's top radio offerings, and after one guest appearance moved in as a regular member of the cast. About that time it was decided that the tempestuous tot had been an orphan long enough and that the strong, guiding hand of a father was needed

More than thirty actors were auditioned before Miss Brice settled on Hanley Stafford for "Daddy." Stafford, who has played the long suffering father throughout the years since, was selected after Fanny listened to him read only three lines of script.



CHARLIE BARNET began his career as a bandleader in 1929 at the ripe old age of 16, when he fronted a band on a transatlantic ocean liner. It wasn't out of need that Charlie became a

bandleader, since his family was quite well-to-do.

By 1933 the band was somewhat established, with a portion of a musical library which Charlie had purchased (allegedly for \$20) from Jan Garber. It was also during 1933 that the Barnet bunch made its first records, for the Melotone label, with a group including Chris Griffin, Eddie Sauter and Benny Carter on the trumpets; Red Norvo on vibes and piano; Adrian Rollini on vibes and xylophone; and THE Harry Von Zell on vocals (Charlie also sang on a few of the early records). Von Zell sang two tunes, "What Is Sweeter" and "I Want You, I Need You."

The Barnet band recorded for several more labels between 1934 and 1939 without much success. On one session made for Bluebird in 1936, Charlie featured a vocal group which was christened the Barnet Modernaires. Later the group left the band, dropped Barnet's name from the group, and joined Paul Whiteman. After a couple of years, The Modernaires again left Whiteman to join Benny Goodman, where they remained for one week. Shortly thereafter they joined Glann Miller, and, well you know the rest.

The Barnet band was not doing very well prior to its second record contract with Bluebird. Shortly after the contract was signed in 1939, the band recorded its booting version of Ray Noble's "Cherokee" and the rest is history. Legend has it that right after the band waxed "Cherokee" the recording engineer, who was unimpressed with the tune, said to Barnet:

"When's your birthday, Charlie? You can have that last one as a present,"

By the time Charlie Barnet left Victor-Bluebird in 1942, the band was one of the toprated in the country with hits such as "Cherokee," "Redskin Rhumba," "Pompton Turnpike," and a group of four 'Ideas,' "The Duke's Idea," "The Count's Idea," "The Right Idea," and the Barnet Band's takeoff of the sweet bands, "The Wrong Idea."

Charlie continued his swinging band through the forties and into the fifties, with a brief fling at bop. During this time, more hits followed: "Skyliner," "Flat Top Flips His Lid," "Little John Ordinary" (the title being a takeoff of Fletcher Henderson's Big John Special), "Bebop Spoken Here" and "Claude Reigns" (another takeoff).

What does Charlie Barnet do today? In late 1966 he commissioned a new musical fibrary and led a band for a short time. During recent years he has appeared on many television shows and in 1973 toured Canada.

And his music is as good as ever.


