

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

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

# Home Town GIRL MAKES GOOD

Betty Lou seemed headed for Broadway . . . but fate stepped in and radio claimed her for its own.

HEN a little six-year-old kid named Betty Lou Gerson stopped the show back in Birmingham eighteen years ago during an amateur performance, the home folks predicted that some day she'd blaze her name along the footlight trails. And they might have been right about this child of the Southland—except for the fact that radio snatched her up before she had her feet firmly planted on the theatrical stage.

For more than four years now, this attractive brunette starlet has been talking back to a microphone.

Born in Chattanooga, Tennessee, on April 20, 1914, Betty Lou moved with her parents to Birmingham, Alabama, when she was two. Her father was president of the Southern Steel and Rolling Mill there and Betty Lou learned her readin', 'ritin' and 'rithmetic at the Margaret Allen School. Later she studied at Loulie Compton Seminary, also in Birmingham, and then went down to Miami, Florida, to wrestle with a curriculum offered at Miss Harris' School for Girls.

Whenever there was a school play, the lead automatically fell to Betty Lou—and that none of the other girls resented it is a tribute to the dramatic talent she showed at even an early age. Acting came as naturally to her purring to a kitten.

As soon as her school days were over, Betty Lou made her first excur-

sion into the Northland, heading for Chicago and its renowned Goodman Theatre. It wasn't long before she had graduated from the role of student—and was teaching dramatics herself.

Instructing other aspiring young actresses in the technique of the theatre was fun for a while, but Betty

Lou soon discovered that it wasn't what she wanted for a steady diet. It was merely a sublimation of her own desire—this teaching other aspirants the means of accomplishing what she herself was secretly hungering to do.

Just about that time, opportunity beat a tattoo on her door. A playright friend of hers asked her to read a sketch over the air. The letter applause resulting from this single appearance was so encouraging that Betty Lou decided that the time had come for a concentrated attack on the radio front.

She gained an audition at the NBC Central Division Studios in Chicago in 1934-and from then on in, her story has been one of sensational success. Her versatility-she is equally proficient in roles calling for French, English or southern dialects, as well as in straight ingenue parts ---was an important factor in her speedy rise to stardom. Most recent of her stellar successes is her role in "Arnold Grimm's Daughter," a daytime dramatic program heard daily over the NBC Network, in which she plays the lead part of the daughter, Constance Grimm Tremaine.

In private life Betty Lou is Mrs. Joe Ainley, wife of a Chicago advertising agency radio production man, whom she married in 1936, two years after she had entered radio. Five feet four and a half inches tall, Betty Lou tips the scales at 112 pounds. Her curly hair is dark brown—as are her enormous eyes.

Boating and swimming are her favorite hobbies and a camping trip is her idea of the perfect vacation. She hopes some day to be able to live in the country, preferably near a lake, and with a stable full of horses and a kennel full of dogs.

There is probably no figure in the world more widely recognized than that dilapidated little tramp with the funny moustache, the bamboo cane and the bowler hat. Charlie Chaplin's famous form is universally known; his comic genius universally accepted. The peculiar thing about Chaplin is that although he is recognized as one of the motion picture medium's greatest clowns, the work on which his reputation rests is seldom seen by a mass audiance.

Chaplin was born on April 16, 1889 in London, the only child of a music-hall family. His half-brother Sydney was his mother's son by a previous marriage. Sydney and Charlie planned careers as music hall entertainers, and individually, they had very successful careers. Sydney, like Charlie, enjoyed success with Fred Karno's comedy troupe in England, starred in comedy shorts for Mack Sennett at Keystone, and later went to work for his brother managing Charlie's business affairs.

By the time Charlie reached the States on his second Karno tour of Vaudeville houses, he was determined to stay. Mack Sennett had seen Chaptin play the drunk in the Karno revue A NIGHT IN AN ENGLISH MUSIC HALL, and shot off a telegram requesting that somebody named Chaffin report to his agents as soon as possible. Hoping Sennett was referring to him, Chaplin visited the offices of Kessel and Bauman, owners of the Keystone Company.

Chaplin was hired at \$150 a week: more money than he had ever made in his life. At Sennett's studios, no scripts were used in the preparation of slapstick comedies. One day Sennett was starring at an empty hotel lobby set, looking for an idea. "We need some gags here," he told Chaplin. "Put on some comedy make-up. Anything will do." As Chaplin walked to the wardrobe building, the figure of the tramp was born in his mind. And once he put on the costume, his mind filled with comic ideas that had never occured to him before, One extended bit of funny business lasted for 75 feet of film, which was in direct contradiction to Sennett's unwritten rule that a gag must be finished within 20 feet.

Chaplin left Keystone at the end of 1914 with 35 films under his belt and a contract with Essanay that would net him \$1,250 a week. His first film under the Essanay banner, HIS NEW JOB, was filmed in Chicago; subsequent shorts came from the northern California studios where Bronco Billy Anderson filmed his westerns.

In 1916, Chaplin was established as a genuine star, one of the fledgling motion picture medium's first celebrities. While at Mutual Pictures, Chaplin made 12 short films and earned over a half-million dollars. His brother Sydney arranged for Chaplin to work for First National under the industry's first million-dollar contract. The Chaplin Studios were built in Los Angeles to produce his pictures; today that building is the home of A & M Records.

While producing such hits as THE KID for First National, Chaplin went into partnership with Douglas Fairbanks, Mary Pickford, and D. W. Griffith in the new United Artists Company. He was still under contract to First National at the time, and UA had to struggle along without his contribution until 1925, when his first comedy for the company, THE GOLD RUSH, completely wiped out all the debts it had accumulated.

Chaplin's feature comedies were more successful than his shorts had ever been. When talkies came in. Chaptin was the last holdout, producing CITY LIGHTS in 1930 and MODERN TIMES in 1936, both as silent pictures. His first talkie, and the last in which the tramp appeared, was his most successful: THE GREAT DICTATOR (1940), Personal problems and accusations concerning his political beliefs forced Chaptin to leave the United States in 1952. He returned, smiling and happy, in 1972 and appeared at revivals of his classic features. Recently the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences voted Charlie Chaplin a special Oscar for his outstanding contributions to filmed comedy. The people welcomed Chaplin as a genius. His work, his films, speak for themselves . . . all the more eloquently without words.
