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Cincinnati Convention

Review of the 3rd Annual Cincinnati Old Time Radio Convention by Bob Burnham

I have been to quite a few OTR conventions during the past 10 years, and have come away from many with different feelings ranging from depression (sorry this one's over—can't wait 'til next year) to exhaustion (boy, am I glad this one's over—don't even want to THINK about next year!).

After a disappointing turnout at Cincinnati's 1988 convention, I went to this one with mixed feelings, but I left with mostly sadness that this warm and friendly bunch were largely scattered across the country, and that more frequent meetings were not practical!

The convention apparently started well before the scheduled time of 3:00, Friday April 21st. I arrived just minutes before that time and was greeted by concerned old friends wondering why I was so late! Needless to say, I wasted no time easing in. As in previous years, this convention was a two day affair. There were a few important differences this year, however, that helped to make this one a resounding success. First, special guest, Willard Waterman, famous radio character actor and voice of The Great Gildersleeve was on hand. Second, publicity, especially by local media (a couple of TV stations, and a couple of radio stations) attracted a great many newcomers. Third, the representation of collectors and dealers present travelling from all over the country, was even more impressive. There were, of course, those of us "regulars" present from the Detroit area. St. Louis and many points in between. There were also people who came from Illinois, Connecticut, New York, California, and even Ontario, Canada on hand. I was told prior to the convention, that every dealer table had been taken. The dealer room as far as those present, very much

resembled that of the Newark convention although somewhat smaller in physical size. A great many of the more reputable OTR dealers with which you may already be familiar, were present, including Gary Kramer of Great American Radio, Barb Davies, Don Aston of Aston's Adventures. Terry Salomonson of Audio Classics, of course, Bob Burchett and Herb Brandenburg of Old Time Radio Digest, and myself just to name a few. Activity in the dealers room was brisk through much of the entire convention. Of course, many of us are already good friends, and it was enjoyable to see each other again.

members of the Cincinnati OTR club, and/ or The Dave Warren Players as well as the newly formed OTR organization called GRACIE were busy recreating selected shows. Some featured Willard Waterman, working side by side with the nonprofessionals.

The shows done this year were Results, Inc., The Whistler, Tom Mix, Fred Allen, and Let's Pretend, as well as a short segment from The Great Gildersleeve. Waterman was featured in obviously, Gildersleeve, and the Whistler in a part he originally played on radio in 1948. Although I understand there was some nervousness

(a natural reaction!) on the part of some. working with a pro like Waterman, despite this and minimal rehearsal time, the shows came off very well indeed. Waterman adapted to the situation like a hand to a glove, and his expertise at his craft added a professional touch to the presentation. Obviously, the others' experience from previous conventions PAID OFF!

The GRACIE organization mentioned was formed as a result of a previous Cincinnati convention, and they are locally based. Their primary function is to recreate radio shows. Members do no necessarily have an interest in collecting shows,

although some do, and are involved in the hobby as well.

The audience turnout was quite substantial for the recreations and the performances were very well received. Dave Warren of the famed Dave Warren Players in Newark, was entirely in charge of the recreations in Cincinnati, and also played some of his familiar roles in them such as Senator Claghorn in Fred Allen, and in the leading role of Tom Mix. As was the case previously, Gary Yoggy (also of Newark fame) MCed much of the presentation.

Joe Senter, a local collector, collected and coordinated some of the sound effects with me beforehand, and with additional help from the GRACIE sound people, that aspect was pretty much nailed down. The others involved are too

numerous to list—suffice it to say, a great time was had by all, and if this, only their third annual convention, is a sample of what the future holds, it reassured me beyond any shadow of a doubt, that old time radio is definitely alive and thirving at least in Cincinnati, Ohio!

As before, Bob Burchett, who as you know, is editor of Old Time Radio Digest. was responsible for much of the convention and is to be congratulated for one heck of a successful weekend.


Friday morning I got down to the lobby



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Further Further Review by Terry Salomonson

This is my first review of all the old time radio conventions that I have attended. But being that I'm now attending them in different cities throughout the year. I thought maybe I should start some kind of a comparison. if not for me, at least for my accountant. After all, these trips are paid for by AUDIO CLASSICS, and I have to figure out if they are indeed worth the time and expense of gearing up for them ahead of time and the travel involved. A lot of sleepless nights go into preparing for one of these trips, and with conventions now in Newark and Cincinnati every year, are they worth going to? I do know that SPERDVAC has been having their West Coast conventions, but I just haven't made one yet. In any event, this is my review of the most recent Bob Burchett effort, and in comparing this one to the two past ones, I'll have to decide if I'll go to another one?

For the first Cincinnati OTR Convention, in 1987, timing was not the word of the day. First off, with everyone traveling for the first time to this new OTR meeting site, the trick was to get to the hotel and check in. Unlike Newark, this hotel, the Marriott Inn, is seen from the expressway AND can be gotten to quickly. That is important for someone who is going to be crawling out of a car after driving for hours, if not days, and wants to lie down for awhile. I took the off ramp, took three right turns and was there. Going to the Newark convention is not bad now, but the first three years EVERYONE kept talking about seeing the hotel from the expressway, but they couldn't get to it. A lot of us kept going up and down the expressway, passing the hotel several times, but couldn't figure out how to get there. It was becoming one of those "you can't


get there from here" times in one's life.

The problem with Cincinnati's first convention involved several things. First, on a personal note, I showed up not as planned. I wanted to be there about an hour or so before the dealer room opened at 6:00 p.m. I arrived at about 7:45 p.m. and immediately set up my tables and started selling. I checked into my room later that night after the dealer room closed at about 10:00 p.m. Somehow Bob Burchett forgot that the Kentucky Derby was that weekend (May 8-9, 1987), so rooms were at a premium. as was parking and dining anywhere in town. Worse than that, Bob planned this first convention on one of the first great spring days, so naturally most people that would have come to see the convention, were either at the track, or home working on their lawns and barbecuing. He did get some advertising out (more would have helped), but not as much as he would have liked with the Derby. That first Friday night, had a lot heavier crowd than Saturday day or Saturday night. I ended up buying more than I sold, taking home more than I brought, and seeing more friends that weekend than I would during the rest of the year. The best part of these conventions is seeing people that you only normally write to, or call on the phone occasionally. I have always felt that if I never got anything else from this hobby, I would have made some very nice friends that I looked forward to seeing every year, and would be very disappointed if they missed the convention.

Okay, so much for the first convention. Those of us who came to that first convention, knew ahead of time that it might not be anything more than a hig get together of a few of the larger collec-

tors/dealers anyhow. We knew that there wouldn't be any "stars" or rehearsals for any re-creations, or the big Saturday night banquets. We were happy just to be there, see each other, and listen to Burchett laugh every few minutes. And we could hear that laughter no matter where he was in the building. I picked up three vintage TV's from the late forties, and about nine old radios, most of which worked. This by-the-way, didn't make any points for me with Ladonna Kramer who really had her eye on one particular radio.

On Sunday morning, as I was getting ready to leave, Bob Burchett offered to take me to breakfast. "Breakfast is on me, and I'll drive," he declared. I locked up my car and walked over to his and found out very quickly that we weren't going anywhere. Affluent Robert had left his car phone on since Friday afternoon, and the car battery was dead as it could be. After jump

starting his car, I followed him in my car to the Bob Evans restaurant he chose for breakfast.

For the second convention, Bob was wiser. He moved the date up to April 22-23, 1988 when the weather wouldn't be as nice and the mint juleps weren't being poured down at the track. He also did a little more advertising earlier, which helped. Larrived on time, but we now had a new dealer room, and after I found it, I spent several hours putting labels on cassettes that I didn't have time to do before I left. This involved several hundred cassettes and a lot of ribbing about it. The best surprise about the second convention was that Ron Barnett showed up at the last second. Because of the lack of a Saturday night banquet, Ron graciously took me to dinner at La Maisonette in Cincinnati. As expected of a five star restaurant, the meal was fantastic. The dealer room at the convention was crowded and again Ladonna was not very happy with the old radio purchases that I made. She vowed to get even with me in 1989. I was just buying too many radios before she got a chance to make her mind up. Most of the same dealers/ collectors from the first convention were there. Gary & Ladonna Kramer, Bob and Debbic Burnham, Bob Burchett (who suckered me into some expensive LUM & ABNER cookbooks), the Old Time Radio Digest group, myself and even a dealer from as far away as Kansas City showed up. The dealer room seemed to be getting smaller. I think that the room was actually smaller than it was the first year, but more people in the dealer room made this second convention a bit cramped. The guy behind me had one of Edgar Bergen's traveling trunks that I kept tripping over every time I had to get out from behind the tables. And if you have ever seen an

entertainer's stage trunk, then you know that they are not small. The hotel made out very well on sodas and ice after they turned off the air conditioning system. But all in all, everyone had a nice time. and I think most people were already thinking about the third convention. After all, this second one was noticeably better than the first. The rumor at this convention was that Don Aston was going to show up. As it turned out, it was only a rumor and after all every convention should have at least one good rumor. That is probably why the first convention didn't work out as well as Bob thought it would, because it didn't have at least one good rumor.

April 21-22, 1989—the third convention. By now it was becoming apparent that Bob Burchett was not going to stop putting these Cincinnati conventions on until he did at least one of them right! I was really ready for this one. I made up all of the cassettes that I would take, at least a month before the fact. My handouts were ready. I did make up a couple of dozen reel-to-reel tapes at the last minute, but that didn't stop me from getting out the door on the day that I had planned to. Unfortunately, I planned on leaving about 8:00 a.m. on Thursday April 20th. By the time I did get out the door and on the road, it was 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon, which put me at the hotel about 9:00 p.m. I must admit, one reason 1 was a little late getting into the hotel. was that for about 30 minutes I was buying old radios in the parking lot from Tim Kaiser. Before he could get them in the door, he was showing me the latest radios that he was planning to sell at this year's convention. Now, even though I showed up a day early for this convention, I was late for the Thursday night dinner that Bob threw for this convention's quest star Willard Water-



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


man and his wife Mary Anna. Oh well, the best entrances sometimes are the late ones where everyone notices that you're late and then takes about twenty minutes making jokes about it. The nice part of this dinner were the people around the table Willard & Mary Anna Waterman, Barbara and Dave Davies, Bob Burchett, Tom Monroe, myself, and last but not least, all the way in from California, Don Aston. There went this year's rumor.

This year's dealer room was really filled to capacity. Don Aston (California) took tables, along with Barb & Dave Davies (Connecticut), Karl Rommel, Gary & Ladonna Kramer, Bob & Debbie Burnham (all from Michigan), Ivan Snell (Kansas), and myself (Missouri). Other dealers from Ohio, and several from the Kentucky area were also present along with Herb Brandenburg and the Old Time Radio Digest group. The Burnhams showed up later than everyone thought they would, so their arrival was very noticeable. Not one, but two TV camera crews showed up this year. I missed the coverage on the local radio and television stations, but they did cover it and that fact was evident with the number of people that came into the dealers room and watched the recreations in the room next door. Friday, I believe, was the best afternoon and evening, but Saturday had its share of people also. I didn't get to see any of the re-creations or workshops. I didn't get to see them at the Newark conven tion either. The nice thing about the Cincinnati convention is that I don't have to travel as far to "not" see certain events. So I will wait for the audio tapes of these events to listen to what I missed.

There is no doubt in anybody's mind that Willard Waterman was the hit of this year's convention. I attended a small luncheon with Willard and his

wife Mary Anna. Barb & Dave Davies and Bob Burchett were also present. It was one of the highlights of the convention, and it wasn't on the schedule of events. The charm that I heard Willard demonstrated during the re-creations, I certainly seen during our lunch. I have to say that most of the stars of the golden days of radio are some of the nicest people I've ever met over the years. A few though, are down right rude! Two years ago one particular "star" came to the Newark convention and many people were left wondering, "If this convention and the people who are here to meet these actors are such a hindrance, then why did "star" X bother coming at all?" I was witness to several rude statements and actions on the part of this particular person. Most of the actors and actresses that come, love these conventions. A few of our favorite stars from these old radio programs are just perfect people when it

comes to autographs, their time, especially their endurance with the crowds, and their love of their fans. Willard Waterman is in the top 10% of this list. It wasn't Willard the STAR, it was Willard the friend, Willard the interested in old time radio person, and Willard the "I'm glad I'm here and I'm enjoying this as much as anyone else" person. A very genuine, down-to-earth person.

back of it. The other six or seven radios I bought fit in my car along with a conple of Don's boxes, but I never could have gotten that floor model in the car. Maybe one of the problems with room in the car were all those books that I bought from Barh Davies, Both she and ber husband thanked me several times for paying off their expenses for the trip with the purchase of the books I made from them. Or was it all of the books that I bought from Paul Meeks? I hone that next year Bob Burchett has the Secesight to invite to the dealers' room a manufacturer, dealer, or distributor of large book shelves. I sure could ese some.

A few of the dealers spent part of Satanday night in my room talking about seconvention, comparing it to the last and talking about how the next one meht go next year. The only one missing ses Bob Burchett, so we thought it ment be a good idea to get him in on conversation. After calling him, he ment about an hour with us talking and planning, and by the time the evening to a close (about 1:00 a.m.), we thought that next years convention wald be even bigger and better than these first three. Stop that tape squeal

Ed Carr

Noisy, teeth clinching, it's like having a pig running rampant in your recording room. Thats tape squeal, is there a remedy for it in one word Yes. But let me state here and now, it's only a temporary one, and one that works for me.

It's important that it does work over the years. I've collected approximately 400% track 1200 ft. reels 7½ ips from discs. I do not own the majority of discs now, so I must preserve my tapes and the quality of them.

One thing seems obvious, 90% of the tape with this problem is of the black back coated variety, the real dark black (not all brands, at least so far, have come up with the problem).

Brands that I personally have had experience with are Capital Q19, Ampex Consumer 20//20 or 406. Strand, and I am not quite sure of Shamrock 031. I have a few reels of this and so far no problem. These have been of recent acquisition and only time will tell.

Locale doesn't seem to influence the problem one way or another, humid not to humid, cold etc., for instance California, now I can't be 100% sure but Speedvac has or still has the problem. Yet a friend of mine lives a few hundred miles away and he doesn't have the problem. Some people in Colorado don't either. What does cause the problem I haven't the faintest idea. Bad batch of tape? possible, but remember in my case it was years, and it recorded we'll the 1st time around.

And before I forget, the other 10%, tape that is, seems to be of the silver backing. I once tried to take material off a reel of this and no matter what I did, forget it, so—you have an idea of what tape to avoid, but also remember this, not all types of tapes mentioned here are inherent with this problem.

So far Ampex 641—used 642, both 1800 ft. and Ampex 631-632 both 1200 ft. and Scotch 20 do not show any traits. Ampex is non-backcoated, Scotch is.

Silicone, this is what works for me, absolutely, nothing else, even a commercial product has not given me the results as has Silicone, now the technique is very simple.

Get a clean cloth and spray or soak a corner with the Silicone (you already have your machines set up for the transfer). On the machine that has the squealy reel start it up, apply the cloth before it reaches the heads, using thumb and forefinger cover both sides of the tape, let the tape slide between the cloth, then push fast forward and squeeze gently, let the tape go so far and then start the whole procedure over from where you stopped, doing this several times assures you of covering the whole tape with silicone. Now before it reaches the very end stop, and reverse the tape going through each step. It is possible your going to have to do this a few times, and sometimes you can get through another reel by wipening the heads with silicone. cover lightly all parts of the path the tape travels. Do not apply directly to the pinch roller. I could go on but by now you have the idea. It's time consuming and you have to have patience.
