## **Wunderkind Ezra Stone**

NO LONGER ANSWERS MOTHER'S CALL by Jack Rothwell



Henry! Henry Aldrich! That was the rallying cry for radio listeners from 1938-1953, as families gathered around the radio to hear what the irrepressible Henry would be up to next.

Unfortunately, Ezra Stone, whose memorable reply "Coming Mother!" entertained millions of people for many years, is no longer with us. Those who grew up in the 1940s with the adolescent radio character were shocked and saddened to learn of the sudden tragic death of the creator of that role. He died in an automobile accident on Thursday, March 3, 1994.

The squeaky-voiced "kid" was scheduled to be the guest of honor at Cincinnati's eighth annual Old Time Radio and Nostalgia Convention to be held at the Sharonville Marriott Inn on Friday and Saturday, April 15 and 16. Because Stone could still squeak to perfection the teenage role he originated on Broadway and NBC radio, he had planned to entertain us with a recreation of an "Aldrich Family" radio show.

Ezra Stone was born Ezra Chaim Feinstone in New Bedford. Massachusetts on December 2, 1917, to Solomon and Rose (Meadow) Feinstone. Stone was reared and lived in the Philadelphia area for many years. At the age of seven he started his acting career. He performed in Philadelphia's YM and YWHA under the direction of Maurice Sloan, at the Plays and Players, and with the touring National Junior Theatre. Moreover, he appeared on "Children's Hour" on WCAU, and other Philadelphia radio shows. It was Stanley Broza, the creator and MC of "Children's Hour," who gave young Ezra the name "Stone" in the late 1920s, a name he would carry throughout his career.

Stone graduated from Philadelphia's Oak Lane Country Day School of Temple University. During his teenage years when living in Brooklyn Heights and then Greenwich Village, he attended the prestigious American



Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York, where he later served as Associate Director and as a member of the board of trustees. After graduating from the American Academy, he began working in theaters, both on stage and behind the scenes.

When Stone was 18, he found his way to producer-director George Abbott and was hired to play the stage role of Mistol Bottome, a V.M.I. student, in the 1936 comedy Brother Rat. He also played a youthful part in Three Men on a Horse to excellent reviews. In 1937 playwright Clifford Goldsmith created the Aldrich family in the play What a Life, which was produced on Broadway by Abbott. At that time, Stone was both a production assistant to Abbott and an actor. Although at first Abbott felt that Stone was not right for the part of the young high school student. Henry Aldrich, he was permitted to read the part in tryouts with other

actors. Initially, Abbott tended to prefer Eddie Bracken, another young actor who read for the part. Obviously, we know who won the role. The loser, Bracken, later played Dizzy Stevens on the radio show.

In 1938, Stone's stage work came to the attention of radio star Rudy Vallee. who asked Goldsmith to write some "Aldrich Family" skits for his show. Thus, "The Aldrich Family" came to radio with the original stage cast, during the same year the play was running on Broadway. Because it was such a solid hit, Vallee wanted to sign "The Aldrich Family" to an extended contract. However, a bidding war erupted between the advertising agency for Vallee and representatives of "The Kate Smith Hour." Ted Colllins, the architect of Kate Smith's career, won that battle. Hence, for some forty weeks "The Aldrich Family" was featured in an eight-minute sketch on the highly popular show.

That successful nationwide exposure led to an engagement as Jack Benny's summer replacement on NBC beginning on July 2, 1939. As old-time radio fans have said over and over: Radio drama was unique because we all exercised our imaginations. Thus, there were as many Henry Aldriches and Homer Browns as there were listeners to the weekly show. Most of those listeners loved what they heard about the trials and tribulations of Henry, his family and his high school chums.

The summer show was a smash hit, and the network executives saw a potential gold mine. Therefore, the program became a regular half-hour series, sponsored by Jell-O. It was inserted into the Blue Network's Tuesday lineup and premiered on October 17, 1939. In 1940 it was moved to Thursday on NBC. By that time, the show's rallying cry, "Henry! Henry Aldrich!" became a national cliche. The program opened its regular run with Ezra Stone as Henry, House Jameson as his father, Katherine Raht as his mother, Ann Lincoln as his sister Mary,

and Jackie Kelk as Henry's friend and companion in mischief, Homer Brown. Clifford Goldsmith continued to write the weekly adventures of Henry for a few years, but then a staff of writers took over.

Stone was Henry Aldrich from 1938 to 1953 (with a three-year break for WWII military duty). During the period when he served as an entertainment specialist for both the Army and the Air Corps, "replacement Henrys' had to be found. First, Stone was replaced by his understudy, Norman Takar, Unfortunately, a month later, Takar was called to active duty by the Army Signal Corps. After a frantic search for a new Henry (some reports claimed that more than 700 young actors were tested), the role went to a real high school student, Dickie Jones. Even though Jones was only 16, he had worked in radio at age 5 and had film credits, as well. His major role was the voice of Pinocchio in the 1940 Disney animated feature. By July 1945, however, Raymond Ives became the fourth Henry, because Stone, Takar, and Jones were serving in the armed forces. Stone returned to the part in October 1945 and played the role until the show left radio in April 1953. Henry was 16 in 1938; he was still 16 in 1953. Unfortunately, Stone was too mature to play Henry when "The Aldrich Family" premiered on television in October 1949. However, he was asked to direct the first 13 episodes for NBC television.

Even as he served as a master sergeant in WWII, Stone's theatrical flair continued. He assembled 300 service personnel, all skilled actors and musicians, and staged the original production of Irving Berlin's This is the Army. The show opened July 4, 1942, at the Broadway Theatre in New York. A command performance for President Roosevelt took place on October 8, 1942, at the National Theater in Washington, D.C. The eminently successful stage revue was made into a movie in 1943 by Warner Brothers. Stone performed in both the stage and



screen versions.

As "The Aldrich Family" was winding down on both radio and television, Stone acted in and directed Broadway plays and directed television. In fact, as an actor, producer, director and writer, he had more than 1,000 stage, radio, television and screen credits. At the age of 21, he made his Broadway directorial debut in 1939 with Milton Berle's See My Lawyer. After WWII he directed many Broadway shows. including such hits as Me and Molly starring Gertrude Berg, and At War With the Army with Gary Merrill. On television Stone directed many popular series: "I Married Joan," "The Munsters," "Petticoat Junction," "The Phyllis Diller Show," "Lost in Space," "Please Don't Eat the Daisies," "Julia." "The Flying Nun," "The Debbie Reynolds Show," "The Jimmy Stewart Show," "Lassie," "Laredo," "The Sandy Duncan Show," and others.

He worked with a galaxy of stars, including such heavy-caliber performers as Fred Allen, Ezio Pinza, Martha Raye, Groucho Marx, Ed Wynn, Danny Thomas, Bob Hope, Bob

Cummings, James Garner, John Forsythe, Dean Martin, Debbie Reynolds, Gary Merrill, and Jimmy Stewart.

Stone occasionally acted on such television shows as "Hawaiian Eye" and "Quincy." In various interviews, he noted that even though his acting was sporadic, it was enough to build a

sufficient number of points in the Screen Actors Guild to enable him to retire with full medical benefits.

By his own admission, Stone's limited work in only two feature films was less than spectacular. Those Were The Days (1940), which starred William Holden and Bonita Granville, was a light-hearted comedy. Holden played a

"hell-raising" college kid who tried to woo a judge's daughter (Granville) to avoid a jail sentence. In addition to Stone's performance, Alan Ladd had a small role as a student. A much more fun-filled movie was the previously mentioned This is the Army (1943). It featured Ronald Reagan, George Murphy, Joan Leslie, George Tobias, Alan Hale, Joe Lewis, Kate Smith, Irving Berlin, and many others. This enjoyable picture provided a topical melange of songs and skits. The next time you see the film, watch for the scene where "real" Master Sergeant Ezra Stone lines up next to the mere "Corporal" Ronald Reagan. WOW! It sure took the corporal a long time to get the promotion to Commander in Chief.

In 1942, Stone married Sara F. Seegar. She was (and still is) a familiar face to television viewers (and rerun lovers), because in 1962–1963 she played the wife of the embattled Mr. Wilson on "Dennis the Menace." She also appeared as many of the "bosses' wives" on "Bewitched." For several years she performed in plays at the Bucks Country Playhouse in Pennsylvania. She died in August 1990. Ezra and Sara Stone raised two children, Josef and Francine, born on the same day, two years apart. There are four grandchildren.

Prior to his death, Stone was

President and Director of the David Library of the American Revolution in Washington Crossing, Pennsylvania. He accepted these responsibilities in 1979. His father, well-known philanthropist Sol Feinstone, founded the nonprofit organization for his collection of 2.500 Revolutionary War documents. Feinstone, who died in 1980 at 92, came to this country from Lithuania at the age of 14, alone and penniless. Eventually, he left the melting pot of the Lower East Side of New York to study forestry at Syracuse University. He amassed his wealth in the Philadelphia-area construction business, real estate and other investments.

According to several newspaper stories, Stone said that his father was determined to repay his adopted country for his good fortune. Stone said, 'He called the family together one night, it must have been in the 1950s, and just flat out said, 'Don't expect any inheritance. I'm giving everything back to this country.' And then he spent the rest of his life giving it away. He did a very good job, because there's nothing left, or very little left of his estate."

The David Library — named after Feinstone's grandson, David Golub — is a special collections research institution for scholars and the public at large. It contains about 3,000 volumes of books, including more than 200 rare books, and 2,500 manuscripts. The core of its resources numbers 10,000 reels of microfilm containing about seven million documents from repositories throughout the world. Among other activities, the library also gives annual fellowships, provides residence facilities, hosts lectures and seminars, and awards scholarships to major universities and institutions.

To many entertainment buffs, perhaps Sol Feinstone's best-known and best-loved legacy to the world was his son, Ezra Stone — the wunderkind actor, director, producer, writer and teacher of stage, radio and television.



In the new Feinstone Conference Center, "Stone Hall," an audio/visual montage from Ezra's selected memorabilia was on display. The David Library and the ground floor of the Feinstone residence facility, including Ezra's office were open to guests. His office was just as he left it.

We were warmly welcomed by his two children, Josef and Francine. We shared our experiences with Ezra and they shared some of theirs. We told them about Ezra's invitation to visit the farm and that we had made plans last fall to come and couldn't make it. We then got another invitation from Josef. The next day when we arrived Josef was at the library, but his wife,

Joyce, graciously gave us a grand tour of the house. The original kitchen was too small, so when Ezra and Sara moved back from California to live she insisted on building an addition which became a kitchen/family room over a garage. It was easy to see why this was where they spent much of their time. Ezra also worked there rather than in the bedroom upstairs that Sara converted into an office. During the tour we traded stories and our experiences with Ezra. He was still alive when the policeman found him at the accident, and his final words were "...grandchildren...love my grandchildren. . .I love my grandchildren. . " March 3, 1994.

Ezra Stone will be missed by everyone he touched. He had a way of making you feel special.





### Friends, Family Remember Veteran Actor Ezra Stone

A young and very trim Ezra Stone, with a greasy, wavy hairdo, talking into an old-fashioned NBC radio microphone.

This was the Ezra Stone the public knew. The accomplished, prolific stage actor. The wildly popular radio personality who played Henry Aldrich on "The Aldrich Family."

Later, Stone, who spent his final

years living in Lower Bucks County, went on to direct television shows, including "Julia," "Lost in Space," and "The Munsters."

At a memorial service Saturday, those who knew Stone, who died March 3 in a car accident at the age of 76, remembered the public and the private man. He helped friends. He bustled with incomparable energy. He loved his family so much, said his son, Josef, that his dying words were:
"...grandchildren...love my

grandchildren.

The service was held on the spacious grounds of the David Library of the

American Revolution in Washington Crossing, Bucks County. Stone lived not far from here in Middletown Township. More importantly, Stone was the president of the library, which was established in 1959 by his father, philanthropist Solomon Feinstone.

The library normally focuses on the years 1750 to 1800. But on Saturday, a portion of it focused on Ezra Stone.

The 350 guests who attended the service were invited to walk through a room decorated with hundreds of photos of Stone in his show business heyday.

The white, patrician beard and sailor's cap he sported in recent years was replaced by brown, wavy hair and chubby cheeks.

Stone, who grew up in Philadelphia, was discovered as a boy while performing for the city's Young Men's Hebrew Association. He was tapped for a radio program sponsored by a local automat company.


He moved with his family as a teen to New York and attended the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. He got his first big theatre role in 1936 playing Mistol Bottome in "Brother Rat." By 1938, he began to show his show business versatility. He got a job as casting director for legendary producer—director George Abbott.

That was also the year Stone won the role of Henry Aldrich in the Broadway play, "What A Life," which was later adapted into a long-running radio program.

During World War II, Stone joined the Army, became an entertainment specialist and directed Irving Berlin's "This Is The Army" revue.

Kenn Stilson, whose hiography of Stone will be out next year, said Saturday that journalists in the 1930s and '40s referred to Stone as "boy wonder" and "Broadway dynamo." Stilson said Stone was a hustler who worked on several projects at a time.







"Ezra created his own luck," Stilson said.

Saturday's service took on a show business sensibility at times. In a taped message, Bernie Wiesen said he was heartened when he first saw Stone perform because Stone, like Wiesen, was "short, stocky and Jewish."

"An inspiration!" Wiesen said of


In a letter, Jackie Kelk, who played Homer on "The Aldrich Family," reminisced about romps through New York and said Stone helped him through his "battle of the booze."

Comedy writer Richard Burdick, who worked with Stone on "This Is The Army" and remained good friends with him over the years, complained jokingly about the 3-minute limit imposed on speakers at the service.

"The only thing a person can reasonably do in three minutes is boil an egg." Burdick said to big laughs.


The program included the reading of a letter from former President and actor Ronald Reagan.

"He, was a true inspiration to young hopefuls and a role model to them," Reagan wrote in a letter to Stone's two children, Josef and Francine.

## **Aldrich Family Statistics**

A news item reprinted in the May–June, 1991 issue of OLD TIME RADIO DIGEST about Clifford Goldsmith intrigued me. It stated that the creator of Henry Aldrich had kept a card index of the names, professions, relationships, phone numbers, addresses and exact locations of houses and businesses of more than 400 of the fictional characters who had appeared in the Aldrich Family radio series.

My own study of the radio series had compiled a much more limited tabulation, based on only a fraction of the total shows originally produced. I knew, for example, that Samuel and Alice Aldrich lived with Mary and Henry W., their children, at 117 Elm Street, Centreville, located in middle America, west of Columbus, Ohio. Alice Aldrich's sister, Harriet Brier, was eventually engaged to Alvin Springer, owner of Springer's Hardware.

Samuel Aldrich was a lawyer by profession. His office secretary was Miss Thompson. He had a number of friends, including Will Brown, Homer's father; and Charlie Goslin, who lived at 12 Church Street. Alice Aldrich was a housewife. Her closest friend was Elizabeth Brown, Homer's mother.

Henry had a number of male associates. Before Homer Brown appeared on the scene and became his principal side-kick, he chummed with George Bigelow, Herbert Thompson, Happy Taylor and Tommy Walsh. The list eventually included Charlie Clark, Willie Marshall and Jimmy Bartlett.

Henry's principal girlfriend was Kathleen Anderson. However, before she appeared on the scene, Henry dated Barbara Pearson, played by Betty Field, and Constance Marshal. Even after Kathleen became his steady, Henry would date others: Diane Conway, daughter of George and Cora; and a very tall Helen. To my knowledge, the only girl Homer could attract was Agnes Lawson.

Henry and his friends attended Central High, where Mr. Bradley, the principal, "kept his finger on everybody's pulse," with the aid of his secretary Miss Shea. The staff included Miss Elliott (Latin), Miss Dudley (Latin); Miss Eggleston; Mrs. Nelson (Manual Training); Mr. Prescott (Music); Miss Trevor (Home Economics) and Miss Sutherland.

Centreville possessed a number of facilities. There were two newspapers, the Gazette and the Times. The editor of the latter was Mr. Blake, and one of its cub reporters was Mary Aldrich's boyfriend, Kermit Hannigan. There were three Drug Stores: DeHaven's, Hilliard's, and Marshall's; a General Store called The Emporium; Brown Realty Company; Schubert's Delicatessen; a street car service; Springer's Hardware; the Centreville Cleaners and a posh restaurant, The Mansion House.

Professional workers included Dr. Bennington, the doctor; Mr. Carson, and Mr. Johnson, ministers; Mr. Hubbard, the plumber; Mr. Jenkins, the tanner; and Police Officer Burns.

The Centreville Telephone exchange included the following numbers: Aldrich, Samuel Elm 303 (also 431) Brow, Will Elm 610 (also 232) Anderson

(Kathleen's parents) Elm 110 (also 344) Andrews, H(ildegard) Elm 669 Clark (Charlie's parents) Elm 889

Some of the telephone discrepancies need not be attributed to Goldsmith himself since other people worked on Aldrich Family scripts; Frank Tarloff, Patricia Dalgleish and Del Dinsdale, for example. They may not have had access to Goldsmith's list or been that particular about details.

One curious feature about many of

the Aldrich Family scripts was the attempt to resist the ungrammatical use of the accusative case in place of the nominative in popular speech. This led to the stilted, "Who I?" instead of

"Who me?"; "It was I" instead of "It was me." But it doesn't excuse miscues such as "with I" (October 17, 1939) and "to I" ("Selling a Date").


