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A personal tribute to Dave Warren

(A many-talented OTR Fan) by Gary Yoggy

To most people who attend our Old Time Radio conventions, Dave Warren, was a big, friendly, lumbering man with a mellow southern accent and a deep resonate cheerful voice. To me he was much, much more - he was my best friend in old time radio for over twenty years.

Dave and I first met when the Friends of Old Time Radio still held their conventions in Bridgeport Conn. We became instant friends, due, perhaps in part to the closeness of our ages, rather similar childhoods and our great fondness for old time radio.

Dave and I were part of a group that attended an "acting" workshop on old time radio and we each quickly saw the talent that the other possessed: I recognized that Dave had great ability to duplicate character roles like Senator Claghom (from Allen's Alley), Sheriff Mike Shaw (on Tom Mix) and Doc (on I Love a Mystery) Dave thought I had a great announcer's voice and style.

From this "taste" of acting grew the Dave Warren Players, for in addition to his acting skills, Dave had a real knack for casting the right voice in the right role. Soon an ever growing group of thespians was presenting re-creations of the Golden Age of Radio's most popular shows in Newark and later Cincinnati - like Duffy's Tavern, Tom Mix, Fred Allen, I Love a Mystery, Let's Pretend", It Pays To Be Ignorant, Mr Keen, Tracer of Lost Persons, Buck Rogers, Suspense, Amos and Andy and adaptations of great stories like Casablanca and Dickens' Christmas Carol (which Dave felt, along with many

others, was the "players" best production.)

The effects of these productions were electric: guest professionals commented that in many cases these re-creations were as good as the originals; other groups sprang up in various parts of the country to perform similar re-creations (few, if any, predated the Dave Warren Players); and these productions came to be considered by many fans and attendees as a highlight of the conventions. Dave was even especially requested by SPERDVAC to come to California and present a re-creation of Amos and Andy (that was viewed and praised by TV's original Lightin').

Perhaps fewer OTR fans were aware of Dave's great artistic skills many of the covers of the Old Time Radio Digest (in fact nearly all of the early ones) were drawn by Dave. The second cover featured a drawing of my Charlie McCarthy and Mortimer Snerd ventriloquist dolls (later reproduced on a coffee mug) and the pictures of two of our most beloved OTR convention guests (Ezra Stone and Willard Watterman) graced both digest covers and another highly prized mug.

Dave used his artistic skills in other ways too after all he was a professional artist - a painting of Ohio's Ulysses S. Grant hangs his in museum; his drawing of Roy Rogers' childhood home in Portsmouth, Ohio (Dave's hometown, as well) was presented to Roy personally by Dave AND Dave designed and drew a beautifu black and white montage of TV cowboy stars for the dust jacket of my 700 page book *Riding the Video Range: The*

Rise and Fall of The Western on Television.

Music was another love of Dave's. His involvement with The King's Men (including their European tour a few years ago) was a justified source of great pride. Dave was also active in his church choir until his health failed him - as he shared that God-given gift of a beautiful bass voice. Then there were the "duets" that Dave and I performed at nearly every convention - for any audience that would listen. (Dave, this one's just for you):

Shredded Ralston for your breakfast, start the day out shinin' bright, Gives you lots of cowboy energy, with a flavor that's just right! It's delicious and nutritious, bite-sized and ready to eat....

So take a tip from Tom, Go and tell your Mom,

Shredded Raiston can't be beat! (It was a whole lot better when you were here to help me sing it.)

All who knew Dave could relate stories of his many kindness - the special autographed drawing or poster; the specially recorded cassette of a show, (with Dave's hand drawn cover's; those personally drawn Christmas cards with scenes from his childhood... And as a frequent visitor in his home, I can attest to his love for his devoted wife, Lois and son, Jake.

So Dave, while you are sorely missed down here, we all know you're forever happy up there where Ohio State never loses to Michigan, Tiny Tim is eternally optimistic, and no one ever misunderstands the basic goodness and gentle humor of Amos and Andy.

The Great radio Audience Participation Shows by Rodney Bowcock

Jim Cox has acquired a fine reputation among the OTR community for writing insightftul, compulsively readable vofumes. Every time a new book is released from this well respected author, a buzz is instantly created among those in the hobby, and radio fans find themselves scrambling to get a copy of his latest book.

The Great Radio Audience Participation Shows (McFarland Press 264 pages \$45.00) continues the tradition started by such books as The Great Radio Soap Operas, and serves as further proof of exactly why Jim Cox is amongst the finest published OTR scholars around. Simply put: This book is a masterpiece, and fills a void that has been present in the OTR world for far too long. It belongs in the library of every radio fancier.

I must admit, that before reading this book, I was not a fan of audience participation shows (You Bet Your Life being an exception). However, this very readable book has changed all of that. Cox brings forth hundreds of interesting facts in regards to these shows that even the most fervent, knowledgeable OTR hobbyist may not know. The book mainly focuses on seventeen such programs, ranging from the most popular (Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts, You Bet Your Life) to shows that are lesser known (Welcome Travelers).

In addition to these in depth studies one also finds an exhaustive listing complete with descriptions of many shows that are not known at all to today's average collector. For example: Are you familiar with the 1950 CBS series "Somebody Knows"? How about the 1946 NBC series "Ask Me Another"? These, and hundreds of other shows are covered in the large listing in the back of the book.

One should not get the impression, however, that Cox only discusses game shows in his book. As he explains in the preface, audience participation shows fit into four categories:

"1. Those that highlighted information (e.g.; Information Please). 2. Those that highlighted money giveaways, in two sub-categories: the ones that called listeners at home (e.g.; Pot Of Gold) and the ones that drew participants from the audience (e.g.; Take it Or Leave It). 3. Those that highlighted stunts (e.g.; Truth Or Consequences). 4. Those that highlighted prearranged comedy (e.g.; It Pays To Be Ignorant)." It is this reasoning that allows many programs, such as Dr. Christian to be included that may otherwise be omitted.

Cox draws from many interviews with original cast members (such as Ralph Edwards and Art Linkletter) to give us a "behind the scenes" feel to many of these shows. Humorous stories, and highlights of better episodes are scattered throughout the book, to make the sections very amusing. We also get an extensive appendix that lists the sources used for the writing of this book, which serves as a very important resource to future researchers and authors. What I found to be a very interesting feature was the Hooper ratings included for all 17 programs discussed. It's very nice to know exactly how much the listening public enjoyed these shows when they

first aired.


Overall, Cox has produced a fascinating peak into a genre of radio that most don't think of today. The majority of collectors are gathering up and listening to the popular programs from the field of drama, comedy and horror. Adding audience participation shows is a second priority to most of us, but the book shows how these programs too are worthy of merit and preservation. It also shows us how rightfully popular the genre was in it's day.

The only negative thing that I can think of in regards to this book is the price. \$45.00 is a lot of money to spend on a book, especially one that's 264 pages. (It should be noted that the essential book On The Air: The Encyclopedia of Old-Time Radio by John Dunning sells for the same price, and has 840 pages.)

However, one can hardly blame the author for this. The price is gauged by McFarland Press, who focuses on libraries for the majority of their sales. Knowing this however, one can insure that the book will be in fine condition in the home library for years to come. It seems that the publisher has attempted to correct the price issue by releasing Cox's other recent work, Say Goodnight Gracie, in a paperback edition. Being one of the only publishing houses to actively release works with radio history as a subject matter, the high prices can be forgiven, however consideration to those that are budget minded would be nice.

Today, as further proof is shown that everything old is new again, a full forty years after the last radio programs left the airwayes, TV watchers are gathering around their sets to shout answers to quiz

show contestants, and to watch everyday people such as themselves prove their stamina and determination in extraordinary situations. Modern TV executives like to herald this "Reality TV" as a new, revolutionary endeavor. However, Jim Cox, through his book. The Great Radio Audience Participation Shows, reminds us today of the shows that pioneered this form of entertainment, which remains as striking and popular today as it did in 1936, when CBS debuted a program called Professor Quiz. His is a loving, well researched, book that will ensure that these shows receive the attention among scholars and hobbyists that they deserve.



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

Molly McGee...Heroine

I've never been happier in my life, Jim. That's what the missus said to me when I arrived home after the first of this seasons Fibber McGee broadcasts. Her voice was all trembly, but I knew she really meant what she said

The missus, you know, is Molly, and she had been planning for weeks to do that broadcast and the ensuing ones with me. Few people know how bitterly disappointed she was when her doctors wouldn't permit her to She tried to hide her disappointment even from me. She's a great trouper, that wife of mine, but I knew how she felt.

I could see the disappointment shining out of her eyes I'd been seeing it even in my sleep for days-ever since the doctors had told her, "No, you're not quite ready. Undue excitement at this time might be very serious. Some day you'll be entirely well-but that day hasn't arrived yet. You'll have to take your radio from the receiving end for a little longer."

And yet she could stand there and say, "I've never been happier in my life"-and mean it.

I had to leave the room in a hurry. I didn't want her to see me blubbering like a schoolboy. I felt like a chump, going all to pieces in the face of her courage.

Marian had forgotten her own disappointment She was sincerely happy because the show had gone satisfactorily in spite of the fact that it had had to be almost entirely rewritten at the last minute, when the doctors decided she couldn't participate, after all.

She had worried about that broadcast

-not about the fact that she wasn't to be in

it, but because she knew how badly I felt and wondered if my performance would show it.

As soon as I could straighten my face up I went back in to talk over the show with Marian. And before you know it she had me laughing until I was holding my sides. She's a genius at mimicry and she outdid herself that night, trying to cheer me up. Thats funny when you stop to think about it, isn't it? Here was Marian exerting every effort to make me feel better -when it was she who should have had the blues

But that's the way she is. Her unfailing optimism, her refusal to submit to seemingly inevitable disasters, her completely genuine good humor-they're as much a part of her as her Irish wit.

Makes me think of the time, years ago, when we were touing tank towns with a concert company we had organized. Things had gone from bad to worse and we finally wound up stranded in a village that makes Wistful Vita look like a metropolis by comparison. We pawned our instruments and bought tickets home. The train was hours late and we were sitting in a clammy railroad station huddled together to keep warm. All of a sudden Marian started laughing. "1 was just thinking," she gasped between outbursts, "what a surprise that pawnbroker will get when he discovers Charmaine inside the clarinet."

Marian has the same knack of glorifying everyday adventures that Ziegfeld had with with chorus girls. In this age of modern is this and that, the old-time copybook max-ims are good enough for Marian and me.

Take our radio career, for example. We waited 10 years--and waited patiently--before anything of any consequence developed. We didn't just loaf around while we were waiting, you understand. We worked and hoped and held tight to our conviction that things would come out all right.

During that entire 10 years we didn't miss a single week on the air, except when stage engagements interfered. Most of our programs were over small stations with a meager audience. There were times without number when I wanted to toss the whole thing overboard and go back to being a machinist, or selling washing machines, or carrying mail or doing any of the other dozen and one things I had done for a living before the radio bug started persistenty nipping at

Marian and me.

Marian never got flighty about my moods Shed always sit me down some place and say, 'Jim, if you're really tired of this struggle, then well give it up and you can go back to a routine job and I'll settle down to being a housewife again. But if you're just discouraged, then stick out that Irish chin of yours and get back in the ring. Nobody will ever whip the Jordans except the Jordans themselves.

Then she'd point out that we weren't due for another break yet--that the very fact that we had landed any radio job at all was a better break than lots of folks get in a lifetime.

Our first kilocycle caper was cut as the result of a dare. We were pretty much on our uppers and were visiting some friends on Chicago's north side. They had an old-time battery set and the program we were listening to was made up of jokes Joe Miller would have been ashamed to claim I said "I could do a better job of acting than anyone on that program is doing."

Ten dollars says you can't, shouted our host, who was in better financial condition than both the Jordans put together. Before I stopped to think how I'd ever pay off the bet if I lost it, I had accepted the challenge

The next morning Marian and I set out for a small Chicago station, as timid and nervous as if we'd never appeared in public before. Either one of us could face any kind of an audience without a tremor- but talking back to a microphone was something else again.

We were so scared we more than half expected our voices to break night in the middle of the audition. But somehow they didn't. The station took our names and said they'd call us when something came up. And we hung around the telephone like a couple of Hollywood extras waiting for a call from Central Casting until that phone call finally came through, days later.

We made our ether debut as the O'Henry Twins, for the munificent sum of \$10--not counting the \$10 we collected from the friend with whom we had made the wager. During the next decade our professional life was a jumbled up mixture of thrills and disappointments When things got too tough in radio, we'd pack our bags and play a series of one nighters. Then, when we had saved enough money to carry us over a few rocky weeks, we'd take a crack at radio again.

At one time or another, we were billed in the air lanes as the Smith Family, the Smackouts and the headliners on a children's program we put on. But we never could quite make the grade. Whenever I'd begin to get discouraged and let down, Marian would remind me that if we didn't intend to do our job however small--well, she didn't want to do it at all.

To that end I worked just as hard at any small role that came my way as I could possibly have worked if I had had top billing on the biggest show on the air. And Marian did, too, without any encouragement. She's built that way

Just when we had celebrated our tenth anniversary of doing our best in radio and getting nowhere in particular, our present sponsors decided we were just what they were looking for. Our breaks from there on have been better than we ever dared hope for.

The only misfortune weve had came nearly a year ago when Marian was forced to retire from our show for a time. She went to Sacred Heart sanitarium at Milwaukee. The doctors decided that she was simply wom out-that she had worked too hard and would have to rest for many months, relinquishing her radio role until she had fully regained her health.

I was frantic. I caught myself starting to worry about how I'd ever go on without her beside me in the studios.

Marian herself dispelled that worry before it had ever actually become crystallized by taking my chin firmly in her two hands and saying:

"Keep it up high, Jim I'll be with you every step of the way."

And every time I face a microphone, I face it with the realization that she knew what she was talking about. But then she always does!



The Golden Anniversary of My Little Margie by Nancy MacCraig

Half-a-century has passed since "My Little Margie" premiered on both radio and television. In the title role was lovable Gale Storm with dashing Charles Farrell as her father. Vivacious Gale remains in demand at old time radio conventions where the ever-popular show is re-created.

Gale's most recent appearance was in the Finger Lakes where she brought laughter and nostalgia to four sold-out audiences at the Clemens Center in Elmira. New York. This occasion was the fifteenth. anniversary of "Another Visit to Golden Age of Radio." an annual show created and directed by radio scholar Gary Yoggy of Corning, New York. Making the 2002 event more special was the fact that Gale honored Elmira Little Theatre by appearing on her birthday, April 5. A party honoring the star was held in the theatre lobby where Elmira's Mayor presented a written proclamation declaring April 5 as "Gale Storm Day". A large vase near the birthday cake contained 80 long-stemmed red roses from devoted fans who had followed her across the nation. Looking at youngappearing Gale would not give you the slightest hint of her age.

It is thanks to Gary Yoggy that Gale Storm spent her birthday in Elmira. Gary recalls, "It was at the National Friends of Old Time Radio Convention held in Newark, New Jersey, in 1995, that I first met the delightful Gale Storm while directing a Margie re-creation. Five years later, again in Newark, to my surprise, Miss Storm invited me to join her table at the banquet. While telling her that Elmira Little

Theatre annually presents a show of radio re-creations, I casually popped the question - 'Would you consider coming to the little town of Elmira to appear in our Little Theatre show?' To my amazement, Gale flashed that famous smile and said, 'Yes'."

Gary further comments, "It is impossible to remember the "My Little Margie" show without a fond salute to the late Charles Farrell. Gale and Charles are the only two actors from the show who appeared in both the radio and TV series. Interestingly, it is Elmira's Hal Roach of 'Little Rascals,' 'Our Gang' and 'Laurel and Hardy' fame, who orginated the "My Little Margie" show.

Gale Storm attributes the popularity of the Margie show to the fact that "it was fast and funny and had characters an audience could love. I did not play myself, but I put a lot of myself into the character." According to Richard Bullis of Florida, a long-time Gale Storm fan and friend, "It is the timeless appeal of Gale Storm's dynamic personality, and fond memories of her recordings, films, radio and TV shows that continue to bring people to her appearances at festivals and benefits." America offers magical rises to stardom. Thus is the story of a Texas-born girl christened Josephine Owaissa Cottle, the youngest of five children. Upon the death of Josephine~s father when she was but a year old, the Cottle family moved to Houston. During her later school years, involved in the drama club. Josephine was named "Best Actress" in the Texas State High School competition which brought

her to the attention of two teachers who insisted she enter a nationwide talent search on network radio called "Gateway To Hollywood." To the surprise of the 17-year-old, she won the local contest which took mother-and-daughter to Hollywood where, on New Year's Day, 1940, Josephine won the national contest and was named Gale Storm.

The actress says, "It was my two teachers, Miss Rona Collier and Miss Ellen Oatman, who changed my life for had it not been for them, I would never have entered the contest."

Miss Storm also relates that she and the male winner of the contest, Lee Bonnell, fell madly in love, married, had four children, and lived happily everafter for the next 45 years.

The contest brought both young talents contracts with RKO and Gale simultaneously completed her schooling while appearing in two movies.

Gale says, "My first TV series, 'My Little Margie,' was originally a summer replacement for 'I Love Lucy'. I was overwhelmed by the immediate success of it. Later came 'The Gale Storm Show: Oh, Susanna' in which I played a social director on a cruise ship with Zasu Pitts and Roy Roberts.

Twice widowed, her second marriage being to Paul Masterson, Gale Storm currently lives in Monarch Beach, California, She is willing to appear in re-creations around the country because she is dedicated to keeping alive an interest in the art of old time radio - "theatre of the mind." October 2002, will find Gale in North Hollywood for a re-creation.

Between appearances and answering fan mail, Gate says "I enjoy life with my family which includes 8 grandchildren

hand 3 great-grandchildren. I look forward annually to doing the narration for the Christmas musical presented by the choir of the South Shores Church. Life has been good to me, and I thank God for the many blessings and the happy life that He has given me"

Gale Storm personifies the word "star" and the word "lady" - two roles in life that are not necessarily synonymous. However, this petite bundle of energy comes chicly wrapped in the glitter and glamor visualized with Hollywood while simultaneously having the demeanor of a highly intelligent, gentle lady. Gale has the rare ability of making new acquaintances feet as if they are close, lifetime friends. She has the gift of turning negatives into positives, tense moments into humorous incidents, and a forever young-at-heart approach to life. With three stars on Hollywood Boulevard, Gale Storm is indeed an accomplished actress, and singer. But to me, Gale's greatest achievement is being a star human.

Old Time Radio Series Reviews

CRIME ON THE WATERFRONT

Mike Wallace, well-known radio and television news reporter/analyst, began his illustrious career as a dramatic actor in a series entitled Crime on the Waterfront, heard on NBC in the early months of 1949. Mike Wallace (known then by the first name of Myron) played the role of Lt. Lou Cage! of the NYPD; an officer assigned to challenging harbor details. Betty Lou Gerson, a seasoned radio performer, was cast in the role of a young reporter who mixed business with romance when it came to her relationship

with handsome detective. Scripts by J.T. Kelly were well crafted and each had an interesting conclusion.

CURTAIN TIME

Boy meets girl romances were common faire on dramatic anthologies heard on radio in late 1930's and 1940's. Curtain Time, sponsored first by Kix cereal and later by the Mars Candy Company, used a "little theater" format (similar to the one used on The First Nighter program), and the talents of Patrick Allen and Myron (Mike) Wallace were used to present an "on the aisle" setting. The program is best remembered when it was broadcast on Saturday evenings over NBC at 7:30. The cast in most dramas was drawn from a pool of Chicago actors headed by Hany

Eiders and Nannette Sargent.

DAMERON

Old radio detectives never die; they arejust reborn into a new era in time and locale. So it would seem in the KVI-Seattle series aired by the "Golden West Radio Network" in 1972-1973. Robert E. Lee Hardwick is featured as Dameron, a light-hearted, modern detective, who with the able assistant, Emil, and their high-tech communication system, become master problem-solvers for wealthy clients.

DANGER, DR. DANFIELD

For five seasons, between 1946-1951, ABC radio aired Danger Dr. Danfield, a crime drama about a criminal psychologist who probed the minds of master felons and often found himself and his lovely secretally, Rusty Fairfax, in the midst of an exciting adventure. Michael (Steve) Dunne was cast in the role of Dr. Daniel Danfield and Joan Johnson played the role of the ever-faithful secretary.

Private detectives on radio operated from various formats. The story line of Danger With Granger, was to have our hero, Steve Granger, re-create for you "one of his most interesting cases." This light-weight crime drama was heard over the Mutual radio network on Monday nights at 8:30 during the 1956-1957 season (from 7/23/56 to 2/25/57). In the stories, Granger, played by Michael Dunne, was a hard-boiled private investigator who operated in New York without a fashionable office. Lt. Mike Harding of Homicide and his old buddy Cal Hendricks always provided needed help and support

DARK VENTURE

Dark impulses of the minds of men and women lead them into the unknown. Dark Venture was a well-crafted anthology of radio mystery dramas, created by Larry Marcus. The program, a psychological thriller, produced by J. Donald Wilson, was heard on ABC for two short seasons, between 2/19/46 and 2/10/47. Good solid

radio actors like Carl Harburg, Lou Merrill, Betty Moran and Dwight Houser appeared in these dramas.


DEADLINE MYSTERY

Summer replacement or pilot radio programs seldom lasted on the air past the Labor Day weekend. Deadline Mystery, starring Steve Dunne, was one of those many casualties in 1947. The program, sponsored by the Knox Company. was heard briefly on Sunday afternoons at 2:00. The central character in the series was Lucky Larson (played by Mr. Dunne), a young reporter who writes about a new crime wave in Post-World War II America. Several cases reported involved the efforts of organized crime to control the housing industry.

DEVIL AND MR. 0

Between 1936 and 1943, Arch Oboler, master of the macabre. brought to radio an interesting thriller entitled Lights Out. This program was an anthology of suspense and horror stories prepared for radio-"the theater of the mind" After the series ended in the fall of 1943, several attempts were made at revival. Later, between 1949-1953 Lights Out was a popular TV program, In 1970-1973 Mr. Oboler tried to re-introduce great radio mystery to a new generation of listeners under the title of The Devil and Mr. 0. A complete run of 26 programs resulted.


