## Maisie

From John Dunning's book Tune in Yesterday.

Maisie was both a network and syndicated series, first seeing action on July 5, 1945, in a two year series for Eversharp. Based on the MGM movie series, it starred Ann Sothern as Masie Revere. Brooklyn beauty who saw the world as a Jane-of-all-trades but usually ended up dead broke in some out-of-the-way dive. The series was directed Tony Stanford. November 24, 1949, WMGM, New York, began syndicating a Maisie series written by Arthur Phillips and announced by Jack McCoy, Harry Zimmerman composed the music, and Miss Southern was supported by people from radio's top ranks ie Hans Conried, Sheldon Leonard, Ben Wright, Laurene Tuttle, Marvin Miller, Joan Banks, Elvia Allman, Bea Benaderet,

Peter Leeds, Patrick McGeehan, and Frank Nelson. The show was marked by Maisie's rather dense Brooklyn chatter and her penchant for getting into other people's problems. The opening was sheer 1940's: the click-click of Maisie's heels, followed by the long, slow whistle of a wolf. A fresh voice: "Hi-Ya, babe! Say, how about a lit---" A sharp slap, a pained "Ouch

## Ann Sothern and Roger Pryor

They're Hollywood's gayest and most devoted couple.

To see them together, you'd never know they were married. There is a youthful boy-friend-girl-friend quality about them that you don't often see in married folk, an insouciance, a spicy freshness and tang to their relationship rare and wonderful to behold.

They 're always kidding each other--always flipping wise-cracks back and forth. They do imitations of each other-they say exactly what comes into their minds.

And yet-

Beneath the flippancy and sauciness there is a strain of magnificent devotion. When he talks seriously, her eyes light up with pride, and she listens intently to every word he says. Every Sunday afternoon, she comes to his radio broadcasts, on the CBS Screen Guild program, sitting patiently all afternoon through the rehearsal, watching him work. Except for their individual business

appointments, they are never apart-always laughing, always together.

When she was operated on for appendicitis a few weeks ago, he disappeared from Hollywood affairs for two solid weeks. He became a complete recluse-in her room at the hospital-spending all his time with her, talking.

"Ann and I both believe in personal and professional independence," says Roger. "I never interfere with her career, and she never interferes with mine.

"We try to keep our home life and our business life entirely separate. We never discuss business affairs at dinner, or casually, with our friends. If there is a problem that is puzzling one of us, we may ask the other fellows advise. Ann may take my advise, and she may not. That's not my affair. I gave it and it's up to her to decide. We never argue and we never nag."

"Ann and I run our finances as we run our careers," says Roger. "We don't pool our resources except for living expenses. She has her own bank account, I have mine. That helps us both feel independent and individually alive."

There is for example, no family car. Ann has her car, Roger has his. Even the three dogs in the house have a separate masters. Roger has a big Doberman Pinscher of his

own-and Ann, to make up for the bigness of Roger's pet, has two little dogs of her own.

They make a point of never disagreeing over their own personal interests. Roger, for instance, is very athletic. He likes to play tennis, and in fact, is one of the stars of Beverly Hills at the sport. Ann isn't inclined to sports in the least. But she blithely trots out every time Roger plays, and sits on the side lines, under a parasol, watching every move.

Roger likes to fly, too. Now Ann can't abide flying. But she object to her husband's favorite pastime? Not in the least.

"Married life," says Roger, even with all the advantages, is so full of ups and downs-you've got to learn how to laugh at it all. Ann had that from the beginning. She can make joke out of anything. When things get too tense-bang!-out comes something funny, to save the day. It's like her operation. I was worried to death about it .. But I couldn't show my worry in front of Ann. She was too Sunday afternoon, came to my broadcast for Screen Guild, and then went on to Bette Davis's party at the Afterwards she Trocadero. was the life of the party that night-but she went on from the Troc directly to the hospital. Monday morning, she went under the knife. Brave girl,

isn't she? fact "

He glanced at his watch. It was time to go back to Ann. I watched him, as he drove off quickly in his mud-spattered, hard-ridden car. Yes. Ann must be a thought wonderful girl. . . . and the two of them a wonderful couple. ......

From Current Biography 1956 SOTHERN, ANN JAN. 22, 1912-Actress; Singer; Producer.

The actress who gained fame Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer films for her characterization of Maisie is Ann Sothern, who later became known to the television viewers as Susie in Private MacNamara on the CBS Secretary network. She is also president and principal stock holder of Vincent Productions, Inc., which manages and promotes entertainers for television, motion pictures, theater and night clubs. Miss Sothern launched her fifth season in Private Secretary September, 9, 1956, alternating on Sunday evenings with Jack Benny, and the American Tobacco Company as sponsor. According to Variety (September 12), "Few half-hour situation comedies have enjoyed such longevity."

Beginning in 1933, she made twenty-five pictures Columbia Pictures portraying a sweet voung ingenue."

Wonderful girl in MGM she first appeared as Maisie in 1939 in a film of the same name, and this proved to be such a success that MGM produced a series of pictures with Maisie as the heroine. "Honky-tonk Maisie with a heart of spun sugar" became so known that mail addressed to "Maisie, USA." reached Miss Sothern . also portrayed the character on seventy-eight radio programs for the Columbia Broadcasting (1945-47) and for MGM radio (1949-52).

> On Broadway she had singing roles in America's Sweetheart in (1931) and in 1933 she played in the road company of the musical Of Thee I Sing. she made such Although pictures as Panama Hattie, Lady Be Good, and Thousands Cheer, critics still referred to her as "Maisie." She returned to Broadway briefly in 1951 as the star in Faithfully Yours.

> The actress 's real name is Harriet Lake. The eldest of three daughters of Walter J. and Annette (Yde) Lake, she was born on January 22, 1912 in Valley City, North Dakota where her mother, a concert singer. was on tour. Her father was related to Simon Lake. inventor of the first submarine operate to successfully in the open sea (the Argonaunt, in 1897). She has two sisters, Bonnie and Marion, who gave up

potential musical careers when they married.

Harriette was educated in the public schools of Waterloo, and Minneapolis, Iowa Minnesota. In high school she won prizes for original musical compositions and upon graduation was sent to Detroit to represent the state of Minnesota as an outstanding youthful composer. She went on to study music at the University of Washington in Seattle, but later joined her mother in Hollywood, where Mrs. Lake taught diction and singing. She found Harriet a job with Christie Comedies. this When proved unsatisfactory, she worked for MGM. Kyle Crichton wrote in Collier's (July 12, 1941) that she was dropped by MGM in and evervone was 1929 when Florenz surprised Ziegfeld heard her sing and in 1930 gave her a place in the chorus of Smiles, a Broadway musical starring Marilyn Miller.

Miss Lake next appeared in America's Sweetheart, musical which ran on Broadway from January to June 1931, and then in Everybody's Welcome, which opened on October 13, 1931 and ran for 139 performances. She played the feminine lead in the road company of the George S. Kaufman-Morrie Ryskind-Ira Gershwin show, Of Thee I Sing, for thirty-three weeks and then

replaced Lois Moran in the same part in the Broadway production on June 19, 1933.

When the show closed, Columbia Pictures invited her to return to Hollywood. The New York Herald Tribune (November 18, 1935) said that the change of name from Harriette Lake to Ann Sothern was made by Columbia, which also persuaded her to change the color of her hair from red to platinum for a role in Let's Fall In Love. In a review of the film Richard Walls, Jr.

( New York Herald Tribune, January 23, 1934) called Ann Sothern "an agreeable musical comedy ingenue." United Artists borrowed her later in 1934 for Kid Millions with Eddie Cantor. She was first starred by Columbia in Eight Bells (1935) and then in The Girl Friend with Jack Haley (1935).

Soon after her marriage in 1936 to actor-band leader Roger Pryor, she became dissatisfied with ingenue roles made personal appearances with the Pryor band and sang in night clubs. "dumb" stenographer character part in Trade Winds appealed to her and MGM producer J. Walter Rubin finally succeeded in persuading his studio to offer her a Ann Sothern in contract. Maisie proved a "sensation." Louella Parsons (New York Journal American, June 16, 1939) predicted that Ann

Sothern would be one of the biggest stars on the MGM lot. She had made Hooray For Love with Gene Raymond (RKO) and Brother Orchid with Edward G. Robinson (Warner Brothers) before Maisie was released. Both films were on Broadway in 1940 almost as soon as Congo Maisie, the second Maisie picture.

In her effort to get away from Maisie, Miss Sothern made a number of other films which included *Cry Havoc*, a melodrama of Bataan. Bosley Crowther (New York Times, November 24, 1943) called Miss Southern "a wan and wistful Maisie as a hard boiled ex-waitress."


