REGISTRATION

Friday afternoon, November 11th. Registration and the Collector's Room will be open at 2 PM. SPERDVAC can still use volunteer help at the Registration Desk both Friday and Saturday. The Collector's Room will include radio memorabilia such as books, magazines, videos and authorized radio programs for sale.

RE-CREATION

ORT KALW FM IN SF AIRS NEW PLAY

Old Radio Theatre, now in its 18th year on Bay Area radio, will present an original story that will at once dispell the anticipation of such programs by having a little fun mixed with unusual sound effects and an unpredictable ending.

Veterans from the Mira Loma Players, a group Cary formed over two years ago to re-create classic suspense stories and dramas from radio's golden past, will be featured and include Joan Aanonsen, Hugh Aanonsen, Tony Herrmann, Danita Sorenson, Anabel Pelham, Robert Sorenson and Roberta Morris. Cary has produced and aired fifteen new productions with the nucleus of the group as listed above.

Pat Franklyn, no newcomer to radio production, has a leading role in the spoof Cary has entitled, "The House Near the River." Franklyn recently appeared in two successful Cary productions, The Ghost and Mrs. Muir and Ladies in Retirement. In this one, she will perform as narrator and as one of the characters,

Long-time figure of KNBR Radio, Del Boubel rejoins the group after his successful portrayal of Sidney Carton in Cary's A Tale of Two Cities. Stage actors Bill Herring and Paul Lally are heard in featured roles, as is singer Shelley Johnson.

Old Radio Theatre has been heard since September 1971, starting at KPFA and moving to KALW in 1986. While once a center for radio production, Sar Francisco has seen very few radio producing companies in the last several years and Cary sees a need, judging from mail and phone calls.

The story of "A House Near the River" is a simple, cliche-filled romp about Jessica, a woman who has recently passed on, who hates her relatives and returns, not only to haunt them, but to do them in when they arrive at her eerie, mysterious old mansion to hear the reading of her will. Jessica perpetrates several questionable happenings and ultimately has her way by doing them all in.

Veteran radio producer, director and sound engineer, Leo Kulka and his staff have assisted Cary in the recording and production of the show which features usual and unusual sounds associated with ghost stories.

"The show is only being aired once," Cary reports, "because a new version of Orson Welles' War of the Worlds' will take over my usual time slot on the Sunday night repeat. So, I hope people can catch it on the first shot and laugh along with us. I'm very heartened by the response some of my folly has elicited. The things I felt might no longer be accepted on radio have been the very ones that have proved to be the most popular," Cary says. "More, I am very excited about the number of young actors who call me to see if their talents can be used. We have two or three generations who truly do not know a thing about radio production and they jump in and learn right along with me."

Cary's show is heard on Saturday mornings at 11 with a repeat on Sunday evening at 7 PM (KALW-FM, 91.7 in San Francisco).

BOD ELECTION TO BE HELD

January 15, 1989 will be the LAST DAY to declare your candidacy for election to the 1989 SPERDVAC Board of Directors. Election for the seven director seats will take place at the annual

meeting in March.

Election Chair, Catherine Passarelli, asks that all who wish to be candidates send their declarations and candidate's statement to her at 10615 Butterfield Road, Los Angeles, CA 90064 - Attention: Election Chair. Candidates' statements must be in the Election Chair's possession no later than January 15, 1989. If there are any questions, the Election Chair may be reached at (213) 838-6894.

The following are the official rules governing the 1989 Election:

ELECTION CHAIR

The Election Chair will be appointed by the President, subject to the approval by the Board. The Chair will see that a notice of the election is in the November issue of the SPERDVAC *Radiogram*. A copy of the election rules will also appear in the same issue.

CANDIDATE STATEMENTS

Candidates' statements will be mailed with the ballots. The statements shall be limited to 200 words, and may be accompanied by a black and white picture not to exceed 1½x2". Any words in excess of 200 will be cut from the statements. Statements must be submitted to the Election Chair by January 15, 1989. The Election Chair is responsible for mailing candidates' statements with the ballots. Statements will be listed in reverse alphabetical order. Candidates' names will be placed on the ballot in alphabetical order. A candidate's name will be eliminated from the ballot if his/her membership dues are not current.

BALLOTS

Ballots will be stamped with the corporate seal and mailed first class no later than the second Saturday in February. If the official ballot is lost or destroyed, no other ballot will be issued. All absent voter ballots must be received by the Election Chair no later than the Friday before election day. Absentee ballots must be mailed in an envelope with the word "BALLOT" clearly marked on the front. Ballots delivered in person must be taken to the place of the annual membership meeting held in March. No ballots will be accepted after 12:15 PM on that day. Absentee ballots will be placed in the possession of the Election Chair and remain unopened until all ballots are to be counted. No ballots will be counted prior to the official count.

BALLOT COUNT

A three-person team, all non-candidates, will count the ballots. One of the team must be the Election Chair. The results, which will include the exact count of votes for each candidate, will be announced prior to the end of the March meeting and will be published in the April newsletter. If a tie should occur, a run-off between or among those tied will take place at the March meeting if a quorum is present (10% of the membership whose dues are current and are eligible to vote). If a quorum is not present, the Election Chair will mail new ballots with the April newsletter. They shall be counted at the May meeting. Ballots shall be kept in the possession of the Election Chair for a period of six months following the election, then they will be destroyed.

EXCEPTIONS

Any candidate wishing to do anything not covered in the above rules must apply to the Board of Directors prior to the second Saturday in February. Any candidate doing anything not covered by the election rules or approved by the Board of Directors may be disqualified as a candidate.

REMEMBER: To be eligible to vote, your s,DUES MUST BE CURRENT ON JANUARY 15, 1989. Only members who are fully paid up on that date will receive ballots.



GOES TO GRAND

This is a report to all my OTR associates all over the country on an Old Time Radio concert that I directed at Le Petit Theatre in New Orleans, one of the country's oldest community theaters. It was aired over Radio WRBH in New Orleans, a station for the blind and print handicapped, on Saturday, August 20, 1988.

We never received a review, so I will tell a bit about the show. We did three shows: a Thin Man show, a Fred Allen show, and a Shadow show. The audience was enthusiastic. There was applause when Peter Lorre came on, as local actor Lary Hesdorffer, and I wondered who they were really applauding, Peter or Lary, Some of the commercials that Charlie Matkin, local announcer, performed were soundly applauded. I wonder if Post Toasties and Blue Coal ever were that enthusiastically received. Even a fluff that occured on The Fred Allen Show got a great deal of laughter. Despite the errors, the show was good. There were extraneous noises on the broadcast which, I suppose, were caused by not soundproofing the mike stands. The gunshots were done by pricking balloons with pins. That's good for stage stuff, not for broadcasts. Our sound effects team was superb, rejuvenating an old art form. And, our very young organist was outstanding in performing OTR music. Lastly, all of our actors want to do it again. What a tribute! And, I hope to do another Old Time Radio concert again soon at Le Petit Theatre.


Committee work becomes less sweet


