New additions to SPERDVAC tape libraries available

Sixty-six hours of radio history are represented by the General Library catalog page enclosed with this issue of the *Radiogram*. This month we are making available two dozen more adventures with **The Couple Next Door** and 60 broadcasts of **The Great Gildersleeve** with Willard Waterman.

Also available are recordings of interviews with Warren Lewis, Charles Michelson, Wendell Seward, Ed Jaeger, Ray Kemper and William Alland. And members may check out recordings of the 1991 SPERDVAC convention.

News broadcast fans will want to hear the H. V. Kaltenborn programs on tapes 1406 and 1409.

Next month we will release an additional Archives Library catalog

page. Some of the shows are already recorded and available from the Archives librarians.

Archives tapes 1563-1565 are **People Are Funny** shows and tapes 1569-1578 have ten programs from the first season of **Mayor of the Town** starring Lionel Barrymore with Agnes Moorehead. They include the first four shows, which aired on NBC before the series moved to CBS.

Tape 1566 has a WW II era Hello Mom show and Music With Wings. On tape 1567 are Rogue's Gallery (6-29-47) and Let George Do It (10-3-47). A special program promoting donations to the Canadian Red Cross (with plenty of bigname performers), is on tape 1568.

Three programs for housewives

are on tape 1579. They are Mid-Morning Matinee (5-31-39), Edith Adams' Future (7-25-41) and We Are Always Young (also 7-25-41). Tape 1580 has the Screen Guild Theater stories "Shopworn Angel" (10-2-44) and "A Letter to Three Wives" (11-3-49).

We will also have shows from I Want a Divorce and Dangerously Yours next month.

The performance will be followed by a buffet meal. Tickets, which are tax-deductible, range in price from \$25 to \$75.

Radio in Review

And Now the News: The Story of Broadcast Journalism (Columbia University Press: New York, 1991) by Edward Bliss, Jr.

This is the most extensive history of radio and television news to date. Beginning with the invention of the telegraph in 1837, the book traces the development of broadcast journalism from the primitive broadcasts of early inventors through the rise of network news departments and current trends in cable and computers.

Bliss has written an exciting narrative that speedily moves from one major news event to another, carrying the reader through the evolution of news practices, styles, and technology. Interlaced within the history are brief biographies of famous reporters and commentators, such as H. V. Kaltenborn and Edward R. Murrow, giving a human dimension to what could have been dry material.

Almost half of this nearly 600-page volume is devoted to radio's part in news development, going as far as the 1970's and the origination of National Public Radio. An especially informative chapter is on radio's war with newspaper presses in the 1920s and 30s over the right to disseminate information. Of special interest to radio theater enthusiasts is Bliss's two brief discussions of news recreation programs: The March of Time and CBS is There.

Bliss's description of U.S. news broadcasting in Europe during World War II is particularly memorable. Censorship, beach landings, makeshift radio shacks are described in several riveting chapters. Unfortunately, Bliss barely discusses the other parts of the world that were gripped by the war, especially the Pacific Islands, although radio news certainly played its part there as well.

While most of the information in the first half of Now the News has been printed in other books already. Bliss has done an excellent job of weaving isolated threads from various broadcasting histories into a unified text. What is new are short, colorful testimonies from people who worked in radio as interviewed by the author. Radio fans unfamiliar with the story of the journalistic aspects of the medium will find this part of the book useful and enjoyable reading. If you intend to purchase the book, a cheaper paperback copy has recently been released.

An evening with Alice Faye

It was an Alice Faye Film Festival, but Alice Faye, radio star, was as much a part of a wonderful night as Alice Faye, actress.

The Stanford Theatre in Palo Alto, CA is a David Packard Project, an ongoing gift to anyone who loves old movies, shown from the best prints, in this beautiful old theatre which he rescued from extinction and brought back to life a few years ago. Any night of the week you can slide your five dollars under the glass and ease into a comfortable seat for an evening of entertainment from the greatest motion pictures ever made.

The Stanford Theatre often has weeks in which they honor a star or a director and feature their films exclusively, and when he can, Mr. Packard talks the stars into attending. He interviews them on stage between features, and they take questions from the audience.

Friday night, Oct. 10, as part of the Alice Faye Festival, the star herself was there with us... a sold out, knocked out audience of 1250. "Tin Pan Alley" was shown first, and then she walked in to take a seat with us to watch "Alexander's Rag Time Band." What a unique feeling to be a part of an audience watching a film with the star seated there with you.. knowing that when we applauded at the end of one of her songs we weren't just applauding the image on the screen but the real person too.

She looks sensational, the figure, just the same, the warm smile, those beautiful eyes . . just not a lot different in person from what we had seen on screen . . . and as Mr. Packard pointed out, the last time "Alexander's Rag Time Band" had played the Stanford was in 1938!

But I was there not particularly as a fan of the actress but as a fan of the radio star...born a little late to have really appreciated her films, but intrigued by that image I had formed over those years of hearing her on the **Phil Harris/Alice Faye Show**, and David Packard — maybe he is of the same era — absolutely recognized that a lot of people were there because they got to know her on radio. After talking with her about movies for a while, he started talking about her radio days, and surprised her with a recording of her singing on **The Fleischmann Hour**. The song was "Mimi".. and she sang along for a while.

Her voice is exactly the same. The voice form the screen, the voice I remember from the radio, and the voice coming live from the stage that night, no difference. Then Mr. Packard played an excerpt from a **Phil Harris/Alice Faye Show**, including a complete Rexall commercial. It was one of those shows in which Phil is worried about the sponsor being unhappy with him. He asks their daughters who the greatest entertainer on radio is and of course they answer "Mommy."

In the conversation that followed we found out that their real daughters have made it possible for Phil and Alice to become great grandparents, that they have been married for 51 years, and that they got to know each other when their Dobermans had a fight.

The Stanford has an organ which rises out of the pit, used for intermissions and for accompanying silent movies, and a vocalist had come out of the pit during intermission to sing some of Alice Faye's hits. Miss Faye said that she enjoyed that so much she would be back to sing . under one condition: that when she did she would be allowed to stand by the organist and rise from the pit too!
