Radio announcer Frank Barton dies

Former network radio announcer Frank Barton died Jan. 11. Barton, whose credits include Screen Directors' Playhouse and One Man's Family, was 85.

After graduating from St. Mary's College in 1930, Barton worked as a musician because he couldn't find work in any other field. He played trumpet for Tom Coakley's band at San Francisco's Palace Hotel and later for the Anson Weeks Orchestra.

In 1932 he was playing with a band whose shows were broadcast live during appearances in Denver. Station management was unhappy with the announcing done by the band leader, so Barton was given the job. "I played trumpet and sat in the back row of the orchestra, so after every selection I'd have to run to the front of the band, announce the tune, run back and pick up my horn to start the tune," he told SPERDVAC.

"One night ... I scrambled back to my seat and promptly sat on my trumpet," he continued. "I had to play the rest of the night on an E flat malaphone."

Actor Barton Yarborough introduced Barton in 1936 to Bill Andrews, then NBC's chief announcer in San Francisco. Later he was awarded a junior announcer's position in the Bay area for \$100 a month. He augmented his salary by playing in a band on weekends. A year later Barton became a senior announcer, raising his monthly income to \$185. "I gave up the trumpet and





Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and, in the forties, A Date With Judy. "The reason I got the job is that I tried to emulate Harry Von Zell when I took the audition," he revealed. A Date With Judy was then a summer replacement show.

Barton did the West Coast commercials on Rudy Vallee's Sealtest Variety Theater plus work on the early Dragnet shows. He also worked on the Charlie McCarthy Show, Frank Sinatra Show, Joan Davis Show and A Day in the Life of Dennis Day. In 1949 he became announcer on One Man's Family, a position he held until the series left the air in 1959.

When the television era began, Barton announced many of the popular NBC programs. He and his wife Alyce retired to Palm Springs in 1974. They moved to Tucson in 1992. In addition to his wife, Barton is survived by his six children and stepchildren and by eight grandchildren.

My double dare

Editor's note: Last month, former child actor Conrad Binyon shared a memory of a radio show he appeared on with James Cagney. This month we include another of Binyon's recollections of his work in early radio.

Many performers of the OTR era possessed a talent for "doubling." That is, they could make their voices sound different and therefore play two roles on the same program.

I worked on a show where the star was "Lassie." I saw human actor Earl Keene in the wings doing back up dog barks if trainer Rudd Weatherwax's collie dog, currently playing the famous canine, missed any of his cues. Earl also did Lassie's whines, pants and growls.

As a child voice, I hardly "doubled." I never thought I should develop the talent, for the directors of the shows I was called for normally had me do just one part. But my first opportunity to "double" was given me by Irving Brecher, producer/writer of The Life of Riley starring William Bendix and Paula Winslowe.

The story line had Riley involved somehow with a farm yard goat. At the first rehearsal script reading there was a scene where Riley was with the goat and casually made remarks to the animal. The comedy of the scene was that the goat would bleat back at Riley, apparently engaged in the conversation.

During the reading we came to the goat scene and Don Bernard, director of the show, said, "We need somebody to do the goat for the reading." For a lark, I said I'd try the goat bleats for the first reading and the night's preview show. (The preview was a reading of the script in front of a studio audience for their reaction to the story; it wasn't broadcast.)

On the second reading of the script I did my best to imitate what I

thought a goat sounded like. I thought it a little strange for the preview audience to see the kid who played Junior Riley now doing a scene playing a goat.

The following Sunday, the day the show normally aired, I arrived at rehearsal fully expecting to see an animal impersonator actor there to take over the part of the goat. Seeing nobody, I approached Mr. Brecher and asked him if he still wanted me to do the goat sounds. I don't remember exactly what he said, but it was something like "Sure,

kid, keep doing what you're doing." Mr. Brecher was the producer; his word was my affirmation.

During the rest of the rehearsals, and above all the show where William Bendix and I garnered some laughs at my "goat lines" and his responses to them, I felt completely at ease. Although I later didn't list animal impersonations as one of my specialities in Lew Lauria's Radio Artists Directory, I'll remember the day Irving Brecher made me the goat of The Life of Riley.

Mail Call

Editor.

On behalf of the members who borrow tapes from the open reel Archives Library I wish to express my surprise and outrage at the increase in borrowing fees from this library. (Radiogrām, Feb. 1995)

What justification do you have for a \$4.25 increase? Just last year when there was a one penny increase in postage the Board saw fit to increase the fee by seventy-five cents. Now, for an increase of \$1.14 in postage, you raise the rate again another \$4.25.

This action can only be interpreted as trying to get around the bylaws by closing down the library through rate increases rather than by vote of the membership. In contrast, the Archives cassette library did not get an increase in postage when the rates went up a penny, only the open reel. This time I believe the increase in postage for the cassette library was sixty-three cents, BUT their rental rate only increased fifty cents!

SPERDVAC has from the beginning been an organization where members who have chosen the open reel format for their collections of old-time radio can borrow tapes in that format. Because of the growing popularity of cassettes, we made all of our shows available in that format also. Now, because a majority of our members are cassette borrowers, SPERDVAC has chosen to turn its back on the long-time collectors who do not wish to use cassettes.

This action is especially unfair for Archives borrowers. The original purpose of the Archives Library was to provide the average collector access to first (or at the most second) generation tapes from transcription discs in the finest sound possible. The open reel tapes, recorded at 7-1/2 ips in real time, are far superior to the high speed duplicated cassettes. In fact, there is no reason for an Archives Library for cassettes which are mass produced. These could just as well be offered in the General Library for the rental price of 15 for \$8.75.

I request that SPERDVAC reduce the rental fees to reflect the actual increase in postage, taking into account the fees were increased to \$5.75 last year for the one cent postage increase!



We are sad to learn of the recent deaths of two SPERDVAC members, John Butcher of Canyon Country, CA and Bruce Brant of Hollywood. Bruce was a longtime member and donated materials to SPERDVAC's General Library in the early years of the organization. Later he served as a dubber of the audio version of the newsletter and sent them to blind members.

Dixon Chandler came across an article by Frank Bresee in the Famous Monsters in Filmland publication describing Bret Morrison's participation in a Frankenstein radio series broadcast during 1932 over WCFL, Chicago. It was to be a half hour show each week for 13 weeks. Morrison was still in high school when he showed up for the audition, and found he was the only one there. Many legitimate actors at the time thought radio was beneath
