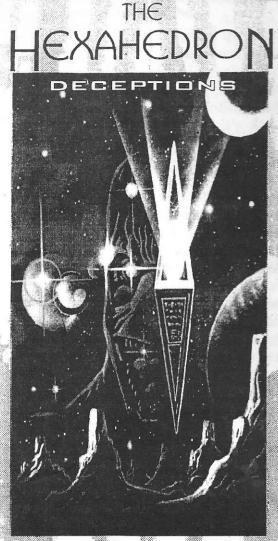

Open reel machine meets OTR collectors' needs

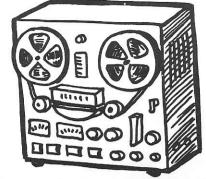
In my brochure of tech tips for old-time radio collectors, I recommend Otari equipment for those collectors who want to stick with the open reel format. Yes, I know Teac still makes a reel deck with 1/4 track heads, but that machine—for what it is—is over-priced and not as well suited for the heavy-use old-time radio show collectors require.

Many open reel collectors are trying to get by, using equipment that hasn't been in production for 10-15 years or more. The parts are difficult to locate for many machines, and in many areas it's even more difficult to find a place to get them serviced.

The worst part is these machines are substandard when it comes to recording quality. Any cassette deck today will record and play audio more accurately, cleaner and quieter than most consumer reel decks manufactured in the 1970s. If you're going to keep your reel collection, and continue recording reels, now's the time to think about purchasing a deck manufactured in this decade!

Over a period of about 20 years, I have used various types of reel equipment in professional installations made by companies like Ampex, ITC, Studer/Revox. Many years ago, another company that briefly made consumer reel decks entered the professional arena: Otari. Today, Otari equipment of some sort can be found in almost every broadcast facility and professional recording studio.

Unfortunate fact: It is very difficult to locate Otari equipment on the used market, and when you



do, the price is usually high. The reason is simply that no one wants to get rid of these machines, because they ARE so good! My recommendation—if you can afford it—is to purchase a NEW deck. The price may be more than you want to spend, but the high quality and durability of the product easily justifies the price.

With old-time radio show collectors, there are usually two problems with using professional gear to play their old 1/4 track tapes: Speed and Tracking. Professional equipment uses two track or full track format. On these machines, "low" speed is usually 7-1/2 i.p.s. and "high" speed is 15 i.p.s. With the basic Otari model, however, this situation is handled favorably for OTR collectors. You can special order the machine with 1/4 track heads, but it is not necessary. The stock two track model comes with a standard feature, equipped with an extra 1/4 track playback head that is easily switched in. And a small slide switch in the back turns this machine instantly into a 3-3/4 and 7-1/2 i.p.s. machine. With a small modification, you can access four speeds externally: 3-3/4, 7-1/2, 15 and 30 i.p.s.

As reel collectors, many of us have tolerated those totally

Now's the time to think about purchasing a deck manufactured in this decade.

WORTHLESS mechanical counters on older decks. The Otari features a real time digital counter that measures seconds, minutes and even hours in five digits. When you rewind or fast forward the tape, the counter moves accordingly, allowing you to accurately track your position on the tape.

If you're technically inclined, the machine has front panel bias and equalization controls to calibrate the machine precisely for the tape used. It even includes two built-in test tone generators to help with this calibration and other adjustments. Yes, if you know how to do it, you can even make used Ampex 641 tape sound very nice, indeed!

Pitch control is another standard feature. Depending on the exact model you get, pitch can be varied by as much as +/- 15%.

What about extra features? One thing I always hated about consumer reel decks is when they tack on features that had minimal use, yet actually contributed to the basic machine problems and maintenance costs. One example is auto reverse. Auto reverse on a reel deck is one feature that gives you double the number of heads to wear out, and/or adds some mechanical nonsense that is a nightmare to service. The Otari machine does NOT have anything even remotely like this. Since it is a machine, professional direction" operation is considered the norm. Obviously, you CAN play both sides of a 1/4 track tape simply by reversing the reels.

The Otari also has excellent cueing and editing features. For those of us familiar with the lost art of editing reel tape with a splicing block, the Otari has an edit button, as well as a sturdy cue lever that facilitate these

functions nicely.

Overall use

The control buttons have a positive "feel" to them. They're not exactly feather touch, but rather push buttons that operate microswitches. The transport is extremely durably built and all of the functions are very responsive. The machine is very gentle on the tape when going from fast wind mode to a play mode. One caution, however: When first threading a reel, make sure the tape is thoroughly gripped by the take up reel, before starting the machine. If you thread the tape via the "friction"

mode, thin mil tape (like 1.0 mil 1800' 7" tapes) will stretch at the beginning when the take-up reel finally gets a grip on the tape. There's a lot of torque in Otari motors (like the old Ampex workhorses). Unlike the old pro machines, however, it's "intelligent" torque controlled by modern electronics.

Servicing

The machine comes with an excellent owner's manual that also doubles as a service manual. Factory service is available at their headquarters based in California, although this may not be necessary,

as they also maintain an excellent parts department in this same location. Technical support is also available, and any competent local service center should be able to handle the Otari. Since the basic transport and overall design has been in production for over 10 years, and Otari has shown a great track record for long-time support, the chances of total obsolescence are much less than with a consumer deck. That factor. plus the fact that this machine is in such widespread professional use, makes it a wise investment.

Sure, it's not digital, and it WILL cost MORE than a digital audio tape recorder, but if you're like many collectors who hold many hundreds of OTR reels, buying an Otari is a good path to take. Also, for longterm storage, digital tape recording is NOT as dependable and as proven as analog tape recording. Just ask the folks in charge of the archives at the Library of Congress!

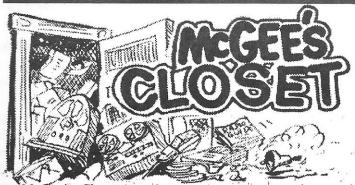

Radio director Robert Novak dies

Robert Novak, 77, whose directing career spanned the "golden ages" of radio and television, died June 18.

Novak began his career as a concert pianist with a scholarship from Julliard. This led him into the early days of radio at WHN, New York City and eventually to a job as a radio director for the Young and Rubican advertising agency.

During his career, Novak directed many notable radio programs, including The March of Time, Manhattan at Midnight, The Kate Smith Hour, Meet the Press, Great Moments in Music, Bobby Benson and the B-Bar-B Riders, True Confessions and the Gabby Hayes Show.

Later, Novak joined Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. as assistant program manager for KPIX, San Francisco. He was also program manager at KGO, San Francisco and at KDKA, Pittsburgh.

Novak also participated in numerous civil activities. During World War II he produced a multitude of shows, entertaining service men at various military bases and hospitals throughout the eastern U.S.

An avid magician, Novak was a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians, authored several books on magic, and even produced and directed a magic show on television, "Magic in the Air."

While in Pittsburgh, Novak also served as general manager of the famed Pittsburgh Playhouse.

During his later years in San Francisco, Novak also launched Bing Crosby's "San Francisco Experience," acting as producer and director of the unique show.
